Stab victim

stable; man

charged

A man was charged with attempted second degree murder following an altercation Saturday afternoon at an East Lane Street home.

Roberto Antonio Orellana Alarcon, 25, of Fritzche’s Trailer Park on East Lane Street is being held without bond at Bedford County Jail.

The victim was in stable condition Monday at Vanderbilt University Medical Center in Nashville with a stab wound to the neck, Detective Nathan Everhart of the Shelbyville Police Department said. The wound is not life-threatening, according to Everhart. Alarcon has confessed to the stabbing, Everhart said. He was charged with attempted murder for allegedly saying he wanted to kill the victim.

A witness told police the victim had gone to a

New tag promotes Duck River safety

Winning design in contest submitted by SCHS art student

The design for the new “River Life” license plate tag was announced at an assembly at Shelbyville Central High School Monday. The tag will go to funding first responders, public safety partners, and search and rescue crews on the Duck River.

This project was coordinated through the Shelbyville-Bedford Community Foundation. It was designed to increase public safety and education on the Duck River, according to Shelbyville Bedford Partnership CEO Shane Hooper.

The tag will be an extra \$35, which will go to buying equipment and markings for the river. The plate must receive 1,000 pre-orders by June 2023 in order for the state to begin production.

“This new tag will be used to support all of the first responders and Bedford County public safety officers that respond to accidents on the Duck River,” said Hooper. Bedford has 56 miles of the Duck River, according to David Kitchens.

Top three

Some 580 students submitted artwork, according to Hooper. First Community Bank contributed the funds

to art teachers Megan Straub and Angie Jackson in the amount of \$500.

Awards were also granted to the top three winners. In first place was junior student Allejandro Contreras Cabrera in the amount of \$500.

Cabrera said his design was inspired by the biodiverse life of the Duck River, which holds dozens of fish species. He also said he wanted to capture the recreational aspect of the river and added the canoe.

Cabrera said he is “still stunned” about receiving first place. “I didn’t think I would even get top three.” He said he enjoys art and has considered going into either an art-related or financial field of work after high school.

Second place went to sophomore Kaylee Smith who received \$300. She said she wanted her design to be “fun” and “cute.” She said after high school, she would like to go into studio animation.

Third place went to junior Madelyn Simpson who received \$100 for her design. She said she wanted her design to have a “cartoon-feel.” She said she hopes to teach elementary school one day.

Honorable mentions were also recognized: Elijah Cartwright, Ana Correon, Lilly Gray, Claire King, Kaydence Meyer, Abigail Perez.

Poll: Many fear immigrants influence elections

PHOENIX (AP) — With anti-immigrant rhetoric bubbling over in the leadup to this year’s critical midterm elections, about 1 in 3 U.S. adults believes an effort is underway to replace native-born Americans with immigrants for electoral gains.

About 3 in 10 also worry that more immigration is causing native-born Americans to lose their economic, political and cultural influence, according to a poll by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research. Republicans are more likely than Democrats to fear a loss of influence because of immigration, 36% to 27%.

Those views mirror swelling anti-immigrant sentiment espoused on social media and cable TV, with conservative commentators like Tucker Carlson exploiting fears that new arrivals could undermine native-born citizens.

In their most extreme manifestation, those increasingly public views in the U.S. and Europe tap into a decades-old conspiracy theory known as the “great replacement,” a false claim that native-born populations are being overrun by nonwhite immigrants who are eroding, and eventually will erase, their culture and values. The once-taboo term became the mantra of one losing conservative candidate in the recent French presidential election.

“I very much believe that the Democrats — from Joe Biden and Nancy Pelosi, all the way down — want to get the illegal immigrants in here and give them voting rights immediately,” said Sally Gansz, 80. Actually, only U.S. citizens can vote in state and federal elections, and attaining citizenship typically takes years.

A white Republican, Gansz has lived her whole life in Trinidad, Colorado, where about half of the population of 8,300 identifies as Hispanic, most with roots going back centuries to the region’s Spanish settlers.

“Isn’t it obvious that I watch Fox?” quipped Gansz, who said she watches the conservative channel almost daily, including the top-rated Fox News Channel program “Tucker Carlson Tonight,” a major proponent of those ideas.

“Demographic change is the key to the Democratic Party’s political ambitions,” Carlson said on the show last year. “In order to win and maintain power, Democrats plan to change the population of the country.”

Those views aren’t held by a majority of Americans — in fact, two-thirds feel the country’s diverse population makes the U.S. stronger, and far more favor than oppose a path to legal status for immigrants brought into the U.S. illegally as children. But the deep anxieties expressed by some Americans help explain how the issue energizes those opposed to immigration.

“I don’t feel like immigration really affects me or that it undermines American values,” said Daniel Valdes, 43, a registered Democrat who works in finance for an aeronautical firm on Florida’s Space Coast. “I’m pretty indifferent about it all.”

Valdes’ maternal grandparents came to the U.S. from Mexico, and he said he has “tons” of relatives in the border city of El Paso, Texas. He has Puerto Rican roots on his father’s side.

While Republicans worry more than Democrats about immigration, the most intense anxiety was among people with the greatest tendency for conspiratorial thinking. That’s defined as those most likely to agree with a series of statements, like much of people’s lives is “being controlled by plots hatched in secret places” and “big events like wars, recessions, and the outcomes of elections are controlled by small groups of people who are working in secret against the rest of us.”

In all, 17% of Americans believe both that native-born Americans are losing influence because of the growing population of immigrants and that a group of people in the U.S. is trying to replace native-born Americans

with immigrants who agree with their political views. That number rises to 42% among the quarter of Americans most likely to embrace other conspiracy theories.

Alex Hoxeng, 37, a white Republican from Midland, Texas, said he found those most extreme versions of the immigration conspiracies “a bit far-fetched” but does believe immigration could lessen the influence of native-born Americans.

“I feel like if we are flooded with immigrants coming illegally, it can dilute our culture,” Hoxeng said.

Teresa Covarrubias, 62, rejects the idea that immigrants are undermining the values or culture of native-born Americans or that they are being brought in to shore up the Democratic voter base. She is registered to vote but is not aligned with any party.

“Most of the immigrants I have seen have a good work ethic, they pay taxes and have a strong sense of family,” said Covarrubias, a second grade teacher in Los Angeles whose four grandparents came to the U.S. from Mexico. “They help our country.”

Republican leaders, including border governors Doug Ducey of Arizona and Greg Abbott of Texas — who is running for reelection this year — have increasingly decried what they call an “invasion,” with conservative politicians traveling to the U.S.-Mexico border to pose for photos alongside former President Donald Trump’s border wall.

Vulnerable Democratic senators up for election this year in Arizona, Georgia, New Hampshire and Nevada have joined many Republicans in calling on the Biden administration to wait on lifting the coronavirus-era public health rule known as Title 42 that denies migrants a chance to seek asylum. They fear it could draw more immigrants to the border than officials can handle.

U.S. authorities stopped migrants more than 221,000 times at the Mexican border in March, a 22-year high, creating a fraught political landscape for Democrats as the Biden administration prepares to lift Title 42 authority May 23. The pandemic powers have been used to expel migrants more than 1.8 million times since it was invoked in March 2020 on the grounds of preventing the spread of COVID-19.

Newly arrived immigrants are barred from voting in federal elections because they aren’t citizens, and gaining citizenship is an arduous process that can a decade or more — if they are successful. In most cases, they must first obtain permanent residency, then wait five more years before they can apply for citizenship.

Investigations have failed to turn up evidence of widespread voting by people who aren’t eligible, including by non-citizens. For example, a Georgia audit of its voter rolls completed this year found fewer than 2,000 instances of non-citizens attempting to register and vote over the last 25 years, none of which succeeded.

Blake Masters, a candidate for Senate in Arizona, is among the Republicans running for office this year who have played into anxieties about a changing population.

“What the left really wants to do is change the demographics of this country,” he said in a video recorded in October. “They want to do that so they can consolidate power so they can never lose another election.”

- The AP-NORC poll of 4,173 adults was conducted Dec. 1-23, 2021, using a combined sample of interviews from NORC’s probability-based AmeriSpeak Panel, which is designed to be representative of the U.S. population, and interviews from opt-in online panels. The margin of sampling error for all respondents is plus or minus 1.96 percentage points. The AmeriSpeak panel is recruited randomly using address-based sampling methods, and respondents later were interviewed online or by phone.

New program offers discounted internet service

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Joe Biden announced Monday that 20 internet companies have agreed to provide discounted service to people with low incomes, a program that could effectively make tens of millions of households eligible for free service through an already existing federal subsidy.

“High speed internet is not a luxury any longer. It’s a necessity,” Biden said at a sun-drenched rose garden event with representatives from participating companies, as well as members of Congress.

The \$1 trillion infrastructure package passed by Congress last year included \$14.2 billion funding for the Affordable Connectivity Program, which provides \$30 monthly subsidies (\$75 in tribal areas) on internet service for millions of lower-income households.

With the new commitment from the internet providers, some 48 million households will be eligible for \$30 monthly plans for

100 megabits per second, or higher speed, service — making internet service fully paid for with government assistance if they sign up with one of the providers participating in the program.

Biden noted that families of four earning about \$55,000 annually — or those including someone eligible for Medicaid — will get a \$30 monthly credit, meaning about 40 percent of Americans will qualify.

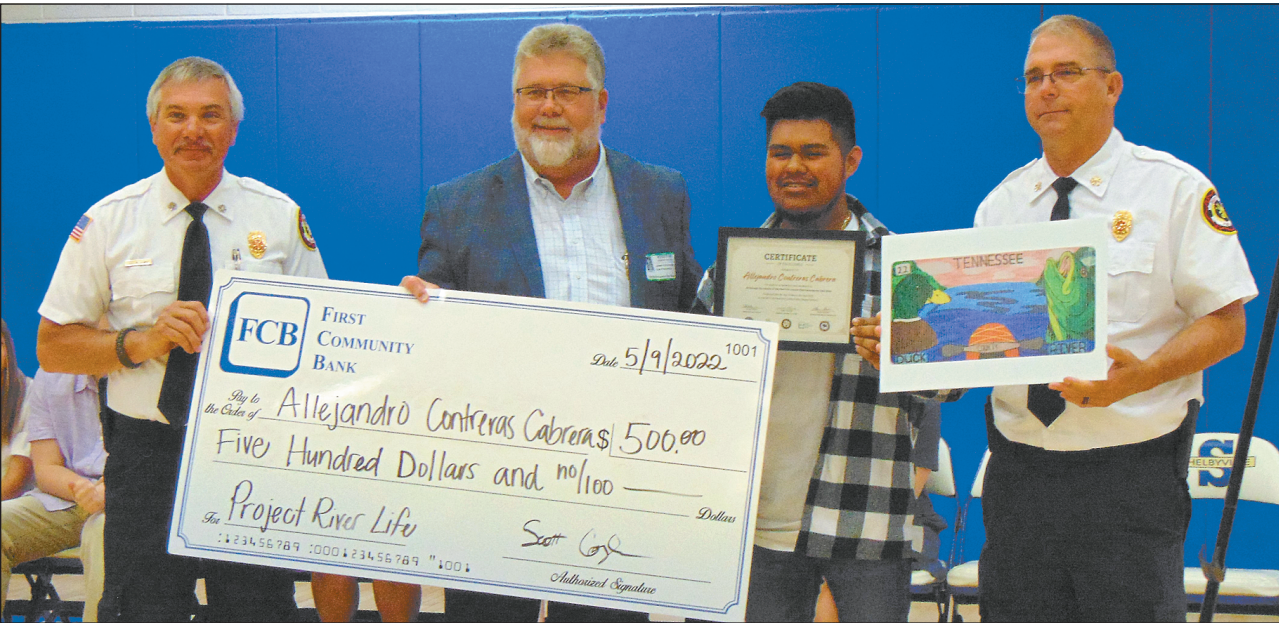
“This is a case where big business stepped up. We’re trying to get others to do the same thing,” Biden told the crowd to sustained applause. “It’s going to change peoples’ lives.”

Advocates were cautiously optimistic.

“It might be a game-changer,” said Marty Newell, coordinator for Rural Broadband Policy at the Center for Rural Strategies in Whitesburg, Kentucky, where he said slow internet has plagued residents and businesses alike.

## State ID requirements changing

Tennesseans have a little less than one year to update their identification to continue having full access to certain services.

According to the Tennessee Dept. of Safety and Homeland Security, beginning on May 3, 2023, people must have a REAL ID license to be able to access commercial flights, certain federal buildings, and military bases. The updated identifications were first issued on July 1, 2019, and thus far, over two million Tennesseans have obtained one.

Several alternatives are available for use in the place of a REAL ID. Documents acceptable to Homeland Security include a U.S. passport or passport card, a U.S. Department of Defense ID, a permanent resident or border crossing card, an acceptable photo ID issued by a federally recognized, Tribal Nation or Indian Tribe, or a foreign government-issued passport. A full list can be

found at <https://www.tsa.gov/travel/security-screening/identification>.

To apply for the REAL ID at a Driver Services Center, you need to bring proof of U.S. citizenship or legal presence, a valid Social Security Number, and two proofs of residency. If you have changed your name, you will need a certified legal document noting the change. The department said that all documents must be originals or certified and photocopies will not be accepted.

The cost of a REAL ID is \$28, but if you wish to get one outside of your renewal period, there may be a duplicate fee.

If you don't need a REAL ID, a standard license will still be good for general identification purposes like driving, purchasing alcohol or tobacco products, applying for federal benefits, voting, and accessing hospitals, post offices, and federal courts.

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# Ceiling fan response

**Dear Heloise:** This is in response to the ceiling fan operation letter you received that is outdated. Ceiling fans today (not all but most) have a reverse switch on the motor body. So you can refine the air flow depending on your cooling or warming needs. In winter, fans should spin clockwise on a low speed, otherwise you will start to feel a cool breeze. This creates an updraft that moves the trapped air near the ceiling around the room, which is helpful in rooms with high ceilings. In the summer, fans should spin counterclockwise. The air circulating makes you feel cooler without affecting the room temperature. You can set the thermostat at a higher temperature without compromising comfort.

Since they are so versatile, they help make you feel comfy, which allows you to adjust the thermostat, giving the A/C, HVAC and energy bill a break. Thank you. -- Ginger N., a retired certified lighting consultant in Florida

Spray muffin tin with nonstick cooking spray. Sprinkle flour on work surface. Flatten pastry sheet and roll into rectangle.

Drizzle caramel sauce over pastry and spread within 1/2 inch of edges. Sprinkle chopped walnuts over caramel sauce.

Starting on short end, evenly roll pastry with filling to other end.

Cut pastry into nine pieces. Place pastries cut side up into muffin cups.

Bake 22 minutes, or until golden brown. Immediately remove from pan to wire rack. Let cool 10 minutes. Drizzle with additional caramel sauce and dust with powdered sugar.




WEEKLY 400-600 LB FEEDER STEER M&L 1-2

WEIGHTED AVERAGE PRICE (\$/CWT)




WEEKLY 400-600 LB FEEDER HEIFER M&L 1-2



AG NOTES

SALE TAX CHANGE

(Released by the Tennessee Farm Bureau and edited by me)

The Tennessee General Assembly unanimously passed the Modernization of Agriculture Sales Tax (SB905 Stevens/HB1405 Halford).

As amended, this legislation will provide much needed clarity and certainty on the tax status for both farmers and the businesses from which farmers purchase input items. As a result, qualified farmers will be able to purchase some input items that have previously been denied an exemption.

The new exemption language more closely aligns to the process used in manufacturing and eliminates wording that previously resulted in unfavorable agency interpretations.

For many years, the confusion, inconsistent taxation and resulting uncertainty has been frustrating to farmers, retailers and the Tennessee Department of Revenue.

Going forward, all items used to cultivate, produce, harvest, process, market and transport crops (and crops here includes plant and animal agriculture as well) will be exempt from sales tax for qualified farmers with the Tennessee Department of Revenue. Several items farmers believed should be exempt were not covered under the previous law and will now be exempt from sales tax for qualified farmers.

To use this exemption, individuals must still apply and receive a qualified farmer exemption card from the Tennessee Department of Revenue. Farmers who currently have an agriculture exemption certificate will not need to reapply. The Department of Revenue reissues agricultural certificates of exemption every four years without action by the farmer.

Automobiles, trucks, household appliances, and gasoline or diesel used in vehicles operated upon the public highways ARE NOT exempt today and the status does not change with this bill.

More information will be provided on how this law will operate as guidance from the Tennessee Department of Revenue is developed.

The Modernization of Agriculture Sales Tax law will take effect January 1, 2023.

CATTLE SUPPLY

University of Missouri's Scott Brown, and ag economist who follow the cattle market, looked at numbers and made his prediction on USDA data. The USDA's latest Cattle on Feed report showed placements outside of the top-end of pre-report expectations indicating more cattle were being pulled ahead, largely due to feed availability and drought concerns. Brown says that likely indicates shorter supplies in late 2022 and early 2023, and "once we get short, we'll be short for a long period

of time."

(What does this mean for consumers? We won't be out of beef, but we'll see the retail markets raise prices somewhat, is my guess.)

DROUGHT

We hear the weather on TV a lot, and we see mostly what is happening in our area. We also hear about the fires, tornadoes and floods here and there. We are truly fortunate to have the weather that we are having now.

I want to share what is happening out west. This impacts us as well. Cowherds in Texas and the Great Plains have been sold due to not having enough water. This dry weather is also having a heavy toll on cropland in the middle part of the country. The weather is either too much or not enough moisture, mostly not enough. Planting is about 20% complete, and we'll see what the crop predictions end up.

WISDOM

This month's edition of the Progressive Farmer's Cornerstone section is on maturity. There are some thought-provoking quotes here. I'll share some.

William Arthur Ward said "To make mistakes is human; to stumble is commonplace; to be able to laugh at yourself is maturity." Jane Austen said "Self-knowledge is the first step to maturity." And likewise, Rob Lowe said "I think part of maturity is knowing who you are." Ralph Waldo Emerson said "The years teach much which the days never know."

My two favorites are these. Hermann Hesse said "Youth ends when egotism does; maturity begins when one lives for others." Christopher Reeve said "What makes Superman a hero is not that he has power, but that he has the wisdom and the maturity to use the power wisely."

Think about it.



rose bouquet; they’re wild and different and crafted with love by local farmers to bring joy to our community.”

### Tennessee strawberry farmers

ers are getting premium fruit. We pick at peak ripeness which offers the best flavor and nutrition for our customers.”

The strawberry season runs from approximately mid-April in West Tennessee until the end of June in upper East Tennessee. To prolong the season on their own farms, many enterprising growers cultivate several varieties. Some varieties mature early and others ripen later, so farms with a selection keep customers returning for each new harvest.

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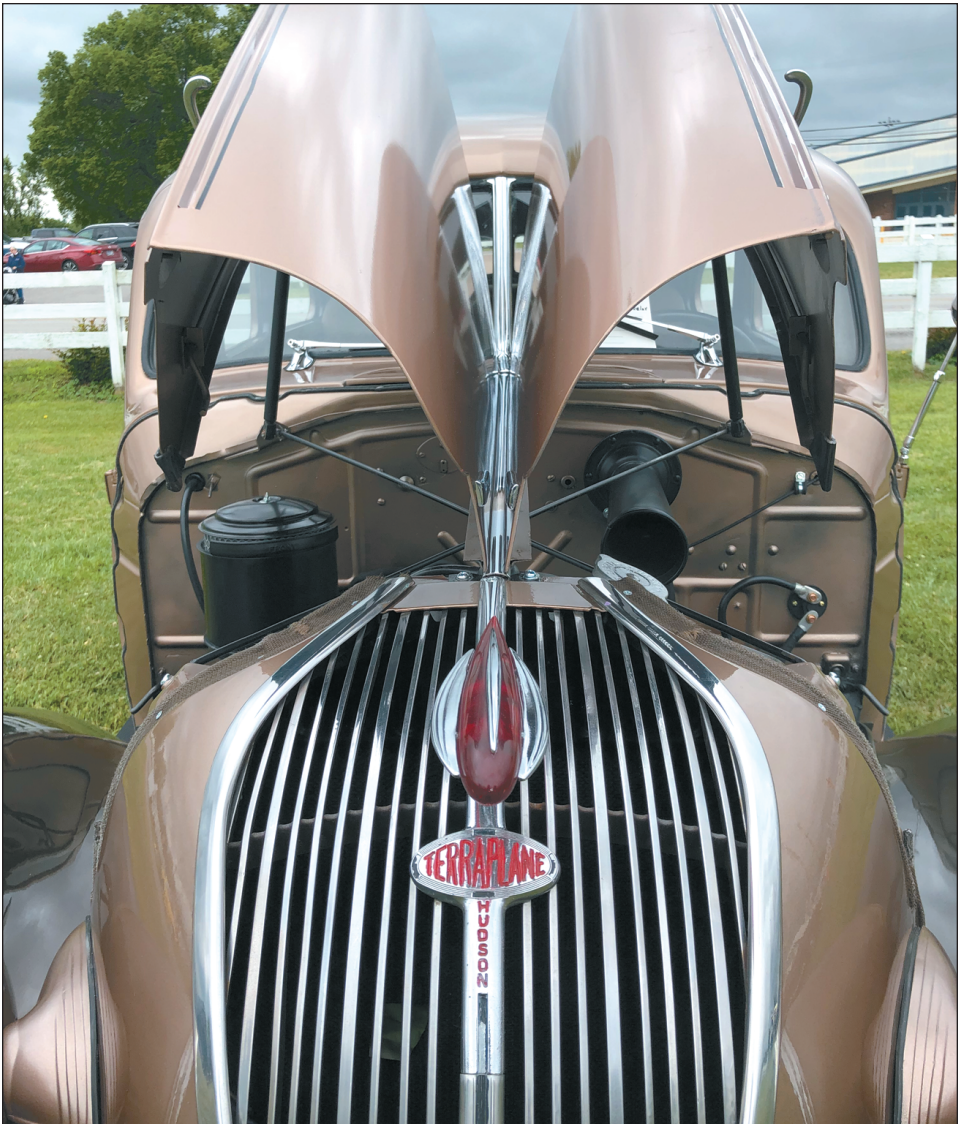
