Homeless camps more widespread

Evictions continue amid rising costs

Editor's note: Today's stories and photos are part of a continuing T-G series on the growing number of homeless persons in Bedford County.

Bedford County Listening Project, a renter's advocacy group, hosted a "Homeless Warming Party" on Tuesday to bring attention to what the group described as an unfair eviction and the lack of affordable housing in Shelbyville.

The term "homeless warming" is a play on a housewarming party. But since many residents, like Cara Grimes, are being evicted from their rentals, more and more people are having to face the possibility of home-

As housing costs keep climbing across the country, more than 11 million Americans report being behind on rent payments, according to Surgo Ventures, an action tank with the goal of solving world health problems.

Amid rising costs of rent and overall cost of living seen across the country, Grimes said she was behind on rent. She said her neighbors were paying \$500 monthly and are now having to pay \$700.

After missing her payment, Grimes was served a 7-day notice and told to pay by June 7. However, she said her money order, which she tried to give for payment on June 7, was denied by her landlord. She was in General Sessions Court Wednesday.

Grimes had several defenses ready, citing that the landlord gave her improper notice. The detainer warrant was prematurely filed, that is, the detainer should not have been filed until June 8, because the notice period was through June 7. She said she did comply with the

Plus, "I had the rent money on June 7th when it was due, and I had the rent money today [Wednesday.] It really feels like my landlord is retaliating against me for speaking up about renters' rights for the past two years."

Her landlord agreed to forego the cost of rent. But she was given until June 27 to move out-along with her husband and two young

"I felt intimidated by [Juage Charles] Rich, who made it seem like being evicted was a good deal for me and my family," Grimes said. "It's not right. This whole process was wrong."

Grimes said she had no idea why her money order was rejected, while nowhere in her lease does it specify that a seven-day notice can be served.

While sitting in court Wednesday afternoon, another case was brought up involving a renter being evicted with a premature detainer.

'In that case, a 30-day notice was given, and the landlord tried to take possession prior to those 30 days. Judge Rich ruled that the court cannot intervene until the notice expires. This is the same logic (one of three that Grimes was prepared to argue) that should have led to the dismissal of Cara's detainer warrant," Ashley Bachelder from the BCLP explained. Grimes has been a leader

with BCLP for two years. "I'm going to keep fighting for myself and renters because this is what we're up against and this is why it needs to change," she said. "This is really personal,

and I wish I didn't have to do this as a mother of two," Grimes said. At Tuesday's event, several neighbors and members of the BCLP came out to show support for Grimes. Bachelder added, "Being

munity together. We want landlords to work with their tenants."

Attending the recent "Homeless Warming Party" were Shelbyville City Council members Stephanie Isaacs, Marilyn Ewing, and Gary Haile.

Isaacs said Shelbyville needs more affordable housing and more homeless shelters. She said she has reached out to nonprofits like Open Table in Nashville, which helps with

the homeless community. All the new development that costs upwards of \$250,000 makes her "nervous," she said. "We have to be taking care of our folks here first."

To combat this common theme of landlord retaliation, Isaacs said she has suggested enforcing landlords to get permits before they lease out properties.

"We don't want to stop people from doing business. But Bedford is full of great people who want to raise their families, work and need a place to live that's not falling apart," she said. "We need to hold landlords accountable too."

Isaacs has been talking with City Council member Henry Feldhaus about finding solutions to improve communication between tenants and landlords. "Apparently, there is not a method in Tennessee to do a permitting process," Feldhaus, who has also been in discussion with City Attorney Ginger Shofner and City Planner Waleed Albakry. "Cities in particular don't have any authority to do something like that." When the population

gets to over 60,000, then counties can begin looking at legislative solutions, Feldhaus said. Additionally, if the City

did get in a permitting process, they would have to hire an employee to oversee the process and inspections. Those fees for landlords would in turn cause rents to go up more, according to Feldhaus. "It's becoming a major

issue nation-wide; it's not just Shelbyville," Feldhaus added. "But I do sympathize with their plight. It's a difficult situation to be in." City Council is in the

process of finding a new city manager. Isaacs said she hopes that the one hired will be familiar with housing issues. better when we're in com-

Halls Mill Market back in business

100+year tradition continues

When Beth Nicolay opened up the Halls Mill Market, she opened it with the expectation that it would once again become a gathering place for the community.

After the market's grand opening on Monday, it seems it will be just that.

Despite the nearly 100-degree temperatures, many from the Halls Mill community as well as many from outside the area, and even outside the state of Tennessee, came out to enjoy freshly grilled burgers, live music, and a float down the Duck River.

Nicolay is partners with Chuck Baker, who also owns Barrelhouse BBQ in Lynchburg and at the Nearest Green Distillery. Nicolay said the restaurants will be a handful to manage but they are looking forward to serving the community.

The market has a small grocery section as well as a comfort food menu, including BLTs, chicken sandwiches, the Mill Burger, Lynchburg's favorite Grilled Cheese on Crack, and BBO pulled pork sandwiches.

Halls Mills store history

In 1910, David A. Turrentine built the Halls Mill store. This original building is still standing with only an additional side room and concrete porch.

That porch is where many Halls Mill natives remember sitting on hot summer days, talking about life and the world, according to resident Daphne Motes.

A.F. Temple was the first merchant. He then sold his merchandise to partners Thomas Hall and T.L. Lawwell. From there, the store passed through several hands until it became what it is today.

In addition to the market, visitors can also book kayaks with Lucky Duck River Rentals. Anyone looking for a little water sport can rent a kayak or canoe and be launched from the Halls Mill Bridge Road and float 5.5 miles downriver to Rattlesnake Lodge Road.

The cost is \$35 per kayak or \$60 tandem and a \$20 transportation fee.







My heart is filled with love for my three adult children and my three precious granddaughters. And it is filled with such wonderful memories of my mother and my father.

I read the following story, and it is worth sharing with you today...

"Near midnight, my wife and I were driving home from the University of Illinois where our son Randy was a junior. My wife was asleep in the passenger seat next to me.

"I headed north, wondering what on earth had possessed us to take the afternoon off to make the trek to campus and back, a six-hour round trip driving through the small towns dotting Highway 47. All for nothing.

'For weeks Randy had been telling me how much fun he was having playing intramural coed flag football. Maybe it was his talk of diving catches and trick plays, but I'd felt this sudden urge to cheer him on, like we had in high school.

"Just several hours earlier my wife and I had met him at the field. It was a crisp fall evening—perfect football weather. I was pumped.

"Randy introduced us

to his teammates. 'You really came all this way just to see us play?' they asked.

"The cheering section consisted of my wife, me and an injured player on crutches. But we didn't mind. We watched the kids stretch and warm up, run through some drills and then...there was some sort of delay.

"Randy ran over. 'The other team had to forfeit,' he said. 'They don't have enough players.'

"I tried to hide my disappointment. No big deal, right? Unless you'd just driven three hours to get

"We took Randy out for lunch. That was nice, but I'd had my heart set on seeing him in action. I'd wanted to cheer for my

"Now, returning home, slowing the car to a crawl through the town of Yorkville, I couldn't help thinking that the whole idea had been foolish. I was behind on work. I really needed to clean out the garage.

"I thought of all the T-ball games and soccer matches, band concerts and science fairs I'd gone to over the years for our five children.

"Once my wife and I even snuck into Randy's English class to see him perform in a skit. We had been the only parents there that day too. I'd worked hard to be a supportive dad, but was I trying too

"Ahead I saw a bridge crossing over the Fox River. A distant memory stirred...from back when I was a Boy Scout. Every fall our troop made a twoday, 40-mile canoe journey down the Fox.

"There was one year I would never forget.

"My dad dropped my brother Mark and me at the launch, made sure our life vests were snug and said goodbye as our flotilla set off. I plunged my paddle into the water and pulled hard, then lifted and stroked again. Mark, in front, did the same.

"Before long we had

a good rhythm going. 'I wish Dad could see us,' I thought.

"About a mile downriver we came to a bridge. I looked up and there he was. Dad, standing right in the middle of the span. He didn't shout instructions or do anything embarrassing. He simply waved until we passed underneath. I looked back and he was gone. Huh? Was I just imagining him?

"But several miles later, at the next overpass, there he was again. And the one after that. And the next.

"It turned into a game. The whole troop began looking for him. Every time we rounded a bend that day someone would shout, "There's your dad!"

"All the boys were waving now, but no one was happier to see him than I was.

"My dad had taken a chance and literally gone the extra mile (and then some) to show us his love. All these years later it had never left me.

"Now as I drove across the bridge in the darkness, I imagined Dad standing there, waving, still encouraging me. It made me think of a nightly prayer I'd said when the kids were younger, asking God to help me be the kind of dad my kids needed.

"At last I understood the most important thing I could do for my children—just be there, even if it meant going the extra mile, the way my dad did for me, cheering me on."

...Being a father is an important job. With God's help we can even make it a good job. I pray that you will have a wonderful day of celebrating Fatherhood.


Support the groups you are part of financially as well. It doesn't have to be a major contribution. You would be surprised how it adds up if every member of a board donates just \$10

PUBLIC NOTICE FOR ELDERLY VOTERS OR VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES

Any elderly voter or a voter with a disability whose polling place is inaccessible may vote early, by absentee ballot or at the election commission office on Election Day.


If the voter chooses to vote at the Election Commission Office on Election Day, they must complete an affidavit at the Election Commission Office not later than July 25, 2022 stating that their designated voting location does not comply with the provisions of Public Law 98-435 of the 98th Congress.

As an alternative to voting at the election commission office on Election Day, the voter may vote by absentee ballot or during the early voting period (July 15, 2022 through July 30, 2022).

To vote an absentee ballot by-mail, the voter must make the request in writing and include their name (as registered), date of birth, social security number, residence address (911 address), mailing address (if different from residence address), the election(s) they wish to vote in, the reason they are requesting to vote an absentee ballot and their signature. The written request must be received not later than July 25, 2022. Requests must be mailed, hand delivered, faxed or emailed to the Bedford County Election Commission, 100 Public Sq West, Basement, Shelbyville, TN 37160. If you are voting during the Early Voting period, remember to bring acceptable photo identification with Forms of acceptable identification include a federal or Tennessee state government issued photo identification.

Bedford County Schools receives grant from GIVE

T-G STAFF REPORT

Late last year, Bedford County Schools was awarded \$260,641 in grant funding through the Governor's Investment in Vocational Education (GIVE) to implement the Community Healthcare Alliance project. The GIVE act paves the way for longterm education-industry partnerships to address skill gaps in the workforce.

The Community Healthcare Alliance is designed to sup-

port the growing need and solid industry demand for healthcare professionals in Bedford County and the Southern Middle TN region. The CHA project aims to provide opportunities and resources to Bedford County students considering a career in healthcare.

Grant funds are being used to establish a full medical simulation lab at Community High School, provide a summer externship experience to select Health

Science high school teachers, and support structured workbased learning opportunities for students.

The CHA is supported by a Collaborative of education and industry partners, including Bedford County Schools, TCAT Shelbyville, Shelbyville-Bedford Partnership, Vanderbilt Bedford Hospital, Community Clinic of Shelbyville and Bedford County, and Meharry Medical College - School of Dentistry. The

Shelbyville-Bedford Partnership serves the Collaborative as Project Director - assisting with the alignment of education and industry goals, new industry partner recruitment, governance, and reporting.

To date, students have engaged in an industry tour with Middle Tennessee Pharmacy Services, a virtual clinic experience with Community Clinic of Shelbyville and Bedford County, and 10 students have become OSHA-certified.

In addition, four Bedford County Schools teachers participated in a Teacher Externship in the second week of June.

Spending a day at the facility of each partner in the Collaborative, this professional development experience allows our teachers to gain valuable insight into organizational operations and occupations, helping them to connect the classroom to the workplace.

BOSTON The Golden State Warriors are NBA champions once Celtics 103-90 on Thursday night for their fourth title in

the last eight seasons. Stephen Curry scored 34 points and was named the NBA Finals MVP as the Warriors claimed the franchise's seventh championship overall. And this one completed a journey like none other, after a run of five consecutive finals, then a plummet to the bottom of the NBA, and now a return to greatness just two seasons after having the

league's worst record. "We found a way to just get it done," Curry said after the Warriors accepted the championship trophy and celebrated on the

court. With tears in his eyes and hoarse with emotion, Curry struggled to speak as he explained what allowed the Warriors to capture their latest crown.

"It's part of a championship pedigree, our experience," he said. "We built this for 10-11 years. That means a lot when you get to this stage."

Draymond Thompson, Green and Andre Iguodala, it's a fourth championship. The first three rings came in in Game 6. and made five consecutive

trips to the finals. "They're all unique, they're all special," coach Steve Kerr said of the multiple titles. "This one might have been the most unlikely. ... It takes a group effort to get it done and we had a

great group." Injuries, including ones that sidelined Thompson for 2 1/2 years, and roster changes changed everything. But this season, with Thompson returning around the midway point, the Warriors were finally

back. Back on top, too. Champions, again, denying the storied Celtics what would have been their record 18th championship, one that would have allowed Boston to break a tie with the Los Angeles Lakers for the most in league history.

This tale for the Warriors ended much differently than what was their most recent finals appearance against Toronto in 2019, one that saw Kevin Durant tear his Achilles tendon in Game 5 and then Thompson tear his ACL in what became the Raptors' title-clincher

2015, 2017 and 2018, when The aftermath of that Durant's decision to leave that summer in free agency to join the Brooklyn Nets and Thompson's own Achilles injury while reha-

bilitating his knee injury. "It all paid off," Thompson said. "It was dog days, a lot of tears shed. ... You knew it was a possibility, but to see it in

"There is urgency with respect to Tampa," Manfred said Thursday during a news conference following an owners meeting. "There needs to be a resolution in the Tampa Bay region for the Rays." Tampa Bay's lease at Tropicana

Field in St. Petersburg, Florida, where the team has played since its inaugural season in 1998, expires after the 2027 season. The Rays said in January that MLB had rejected the team's plan to split its season between Florida and Montreal. "Obviously, the end of that lease

is a hard deadline, but you need to take into account that stadiums take a little bit of time to build, right?" Manfred said. "So we are getting to the point where wherever it is in the region that has an interest in having 162 baseball games, they need to get to it, get with the club — I know the Rays are anxious to get something done — and see if a deal can be

Asked whether he was considering relocation, Manfred responded: "Right now, I'm focused on Tampa," putting emphasis on "right now" and later adding he was referring to the region, not the specific side of the bay. "I think a great man once said, all good things must end at some point. And but right now we're focused on Tampa."

All eyes on NFL's Watson decision

While Deshaun Watson maintains his innocence and fights to clear his name, the Cleveland Browns and football fans everywhere wait for the NFL to determine an appropriate penalty for the star quarterback accused of sexual misconduct by 24 women.

A person familiar with the league's investigation told The Associated Press a decision is expected before training camp. The person spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because the investigation, conducted by Lisa Friel and Todd Jones, is still ongoing. Once it concludes, former U.S. District Judge Sue

Robinson, who was jointly appointed by the league and the NFL Players' Association, will review the league's findings to decide whether Watson violated the personal conduct policy and whether to impose discipline. This will be Robinson's first case since being hired

as the league's disciplinary officer under the latest collective bargaining agreement finalized in March 2020. Previously, NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell had the authority to suspend players.

The league and the union can recommend a potential length of suspension. If either the union or league appeals Robinson's decision, Goodell or his designee "will issue a written decision that will constitute full, final and complete disposition of the dispute," per terms of Article 46

Pitch clocks shorten minor league games

NEW YORK — Pitch clocks have shortened games by an average of 29 minutes in the minor leagues this year as the season nears the halfway

Minor league games with a pitch clock have averaged 2 hours, 35 minutes, down from 3:04 through June 14 last year, in an experiment that Major League Baseball is preparing for possible adoption in 2023.

However, robot umpires calling balls and strikes are not close to a big league promotion.

Triple-A is using a pitch clock of 14 seconds with no runners and 19 seconds with runners, while lower levels are using 14/18. Experiments also are underway with limits on defensive shifts and use of larger bases.

The new president of the Southern Baptist Convention said Wednesday he will accelerate sex abuse reforms in the nation's largest Protestant denomination. Texas pastor Bart Barber's first priority: to assemble a

panel of people — Southern

Baptist leaders and experts -

to shepherd this work for the whole convention as mandated by thousands of representatives from local SBC churches. The day after his victory in a run-off race against Tom Ascol, a Florida pastor who vowed to take the conservative denomination further right, Barber reiterated his desire to lead by being

a unifier and peacebuilder. The

SBC has seen deep divisions

and a steady drop in membership for more than a decade. During a news conference Wednesday, Barber voiced his commitment to forming a new action group to help carry out the recommendations of the Sexual Abuse Task Force, which delegates overwhelmingly approved Tuesday. Delegates at the SBC's national meeting also agreed to create a way to track church workers credibly

Those recommendations came after a blistering 288-page attempt to collect a debt report from outside consultant, Guidepost Solutions. The firm's seven-month independent investigation found disturbing details about how denominational leaders mishandled sex abuse claims and mistreated victims. On the final day of the two-

day annual meeting, the convention also overwhelmingly approved two sex abuse-related resolutions. One apologized for "the harm our actions and inactions have caused to survivors of sexual abuse," and for not heading survivors' warnings. The other called for all states to criminalize sexual relationships between pastors and those in their care. Survivor and longtime advo-

cate for reform, Christa Brown, said the convention did the "bare minimum" this week, and renewed her call for a government investigation into abuse in the SBC. On Wednesday, Barber said

sexual predators have used the convention's decentralized polity to turn congregations "into a hunting ground." But with systemic changes and reforms, Barber hoped sexual predators will be put on notice. "The hunters are now the

hunted," he said. While he was reluctant to

provide a timeline for action, he promised to appoint the new task force swiftly. Barber repeatedly called for

Southern Baptists to find common ground despite their differences over issues such as race and gender roles. "I do believe we have seen some unhealthy ways recently

that secular politics have dominated the conversation here in the Southern Baptist Convention," Barber said. "As Christians, we need to be engaged in politics. We just need to make sure that in the dance between theology and politics, theology leads." Barber said "the coarseness and crass discourse out there

has crept into" the SBC and into people's social media feeds. Expressing anger on Twitter and 'trying to own" people instead of solving problems has only deepened divisions among Southern Baptists, he said. "Every way I've served SBC has left scars," he said. "But this family of churches is worth it."

However, the SBC, despite its size and political influence,

has yet to figure out a way to stem long-term declines in membership or in baptisms their key metric for religious vitality – that began long before the pandemic disruptions. Annual baptisms stood at

154,701 in 2021, down 63% from their 1999 peak. Membership stood at 13.7 million, down 16% from its 2006 peak, according to statistics from the SBC's

affiliate, Lifeway Christian Resources.

Barber said tracking membership is complicated and results can be skewed, but noted the SBC president has little influence over it. "It's the local churches that are going to carry the gospel forward and help us grow," he said.

By any measure of the nation's political and religious spectrum, the SBC is staunchly conservative. But groups such as the Conservative Baptist Network and Founders Ministries, which Ascol has long led, have mobilized to pull the SBC further to the right, claiming that its leaders and seminaries are being influenced by liberal trends and "wokeness."

Candidates aligned with these groups were defeated for SBC president, chair of its Executive Committee and president of the influential Pastors Conference, held each year just before the annual meeting. But at least one of their preferred candidates prevailed in a narrow vote - Victor Chayasirisobhon, pastor of First Southern Baptist Church of Anaheim, for first vice president.

But throughout the meeting, hardline Southern Baptists voiced a slate of criticisms from the convention hall floor. They derided the hiring of Guidepost for the investigation following a recent pro-Pride tweet, pushed back against allowing Saddleback Church to remain in the convention despite ordaining women pastors and more.

A report by the Credentials Committee, which reviews if churches are in good standing, said it wasn't clear whether the denomination's official opposition to women pastors applied only to lead pastors or also to other ministry roles.

Rod Martin, a co-founder of the Conservative Baptist Network, vowed to continue its efforts, tweeting "I don't think people realized we'd reached the point where an ostensibly conservative Credentials Committee can't define the word 'pastor'. "

He predicted a different result in next year's annual meeting, in New Orleans, which unlike Anaheim is in the Southern Baptist heartland.

Delegate Scott Dunford, executive director of church planting at Redeemer Church in Fremont, California, said he voted for Barber because he sees him as a strong conservative who is also compassionate toward other groups. Coming into the convention, Dunford said the sex abuse crisis was foremost in his mind.

"(Barber) really seemed compassionate to the concerns of the sexual abuse victims - in a way I didn't hear from the

other candidates," he said. But Dunford doesn't believe appointing women as pastors will help alleviate the problem.

"Every denomination has a

SBC president commits to move sex abuse reforms forward **By DEEPA BHARATH**

ANAHEIM, California The new president of the Southern Baptist Convention said Wednesday he will accelerate sex abuse reforms in the nation's largest Protestant denomination. Texas pastor Bart Barber's

first priority: to assemble a panel of people — Southern Baptist leaders and experts to shepherd this work for the whole convention as mandated by thousands of representatives from local SBC churches. The day after his victory in a run-off race against Tom Ascol,

a Florida pastor who vowed to

take the conservative denomina-

tion further right, Barber reiter-

ated his desire to lead by being

a unifier and peacebuilder. The SBC has seen deep divisions and a steady drop in membership for more than a decade. During a news conference Wednesday, Barber voiced his commitment to forming a new action group to help carry out the recommendations of the Sexual Abuse Task Force, which delegates overwhelmingly approved Tuesday. Delegates at the SBC's national meeting

also agreed to create a way to

track church workers credibly

accused of sex abuse.

Those recommendations came after a blistering 288-page attempt to collect a debt report from outside consultant, Guidepost Solutions. The firm's seven-month independent investigation found disturbing details about how denominational leaders mishandled sex abuse claims and mistreated victims.

On the final day of the twoday annual meeting, the convention also overwhelmingly approved two sex abuse-related resolutions. One apologized for "the harm our actions and inactions have caused to survivors of sexual abuse," and for not heading survivors' warnings. The other called for all states to criminalize sexual relationships between pastors and those in their care.

Survivor and longtime advocate for reform, Christa Brown, said the convention did the "bare minimum" this week, and renewed her call for a government investigation into abuse in the SBC. On Wednesday, Barber said

sexual predators have used the convention's decentralized polity to turn congregations "into a hunting ground." But with systemic changes and reforms, Barber hoped sexual predators will be put on notice. "The hunters are now the

hunted," he said. While he was reluctant to

provide a timeline for action, he promised to appoint the new task force swiftly. Barber repeatedly called for

Southern Baptists to find common ground despite their differences over issues such as race and gender roles. "I do believe we have seen

some unhealthy ways recently that secular politics have dominated the conversation here in the Southern Baptist Convention," Barber said. "As Christians, we need to be engaged in politics. We just need to make sure that in the dance between theology and politics, theology leads." Barber said "the coarseness and crass discourse out there

has crept into" the SBC and into people's social media feeds. Expressing anger on Twitter and 'trying to own" people instead of solving problems has only deepened divisions Southern Baptists, he said. "Every way I've served SBC has left scars," he said. "But this

family of churches is worth it." However, the SBC, despite its size and political influence,

has yet to figure out a way to stem long-term declines in membership or in baptisms their key metric for religious vitality – that began long before the pandemic disruptions.

ing to statistics from the SBC's

Annual baptisms stood at 154,701 in 2021, down 63% from their 1999 peak. Membership stood at 13.7 million, down 16% from its 2006 peak, accord-

affiliate, Lifeway Christian Resources.

Barber said tracking membership is complicated and results can be skewed, but noted the SBC president has little influence over it. "It's the local churches that are going to carry the gospel forward and help us grow," he said.

By any measure of the nation's political and religious spectrum, the SBC is staunchly conservative. But groups such as the Conservative Baptist Network and Founders Ministries, which Ascol has long led, have mobilized to pull the SBC further to the right, claiming that its leaders and seminaries are being influenced by liberal trends and "wokeness."

Candidates aligned with these groups were defeated for SBC president, chair of its Executive Committee and president of the influential Pastors Conference, held each year just before the annual meeting. But at least one of their preferred candidates prevailed in a narrow vote - Victor Chayasirisobhon, pastor of First Southern Baptist Church of Anaheim, for first vice president.

But throughout the meeting, hardline Southern Baptists voiced a slate of criticisms from the convention hall floor. They derided the hiring of Guidepost for the investigation following a recent pro-Pride tweet, pushed back against allowing Saddleback Church to remain in the convention despite ordaining women pastors and more.

A report by the Credentials Committee, which reviews if churches are in good standing, said it wasn't clear whether the denomination's official opposition to women pastors applied only to lead pastors or also to other ministry roles.

Rod Martin, a co-founder of the Conservative Baptist Network, vowed to continue its efforts, tweeting "I don't think people realized we'd reached the point where an ostensibly conservative Credentials Committee can't define the word 'pastor'. "

He predicted a different result in next year's annual meeting, in New Orleans, which unlike Anaheim is in the Southern Baptist heartland.

Delegate Scott Dunford, executive director of church planting at Redeemer Church in Fremont, California, said he voted for Barber because he sees him as a strong conservative who is also compassionate toward other groups. Coming into the convention, Dunford said the sex abuse crisis was foremost in his mind.

"(Barber) really seemed compassionate to the concerns of the sexual abuse victims - in a way I didn't hear from the

other candidates," he said. But Dunford doesn't believe appointing women as pastors will help alleviate the problem.

"Every denomination has a

sexual abuse problem - even those that have women pastors," he said. "Anywhere you have a large group of people interacting, you're going to have wolves trying to manipulate the situation.' The Rev. Clint Sullens, pas-

tor of Faith Baptist Church in Monroe, Georgia, said he cast his vote for Tom Ascol because "he is scripturally focused," which is needed now. "But, I'm not discouraged or

disappointed at where we are right now," he said. "We had great men to choose from." Sullens is hopeful the

denomination will come together especially to prevent abuse and better care for survivors. He believes uniting on critical issues is possible. The delegates also defeated a proposal to defund the conven-

tion's public-policy arm, which has long been a target of critics complaining it isn't conservative enough. Supporters said the Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission will be needed more than ever given the anticipated state battles if the Supreme Court overturns the Roe v. Wade decision that legalized abortion.

Future prospects, and how to benefit

We've heard statements about industries looking at 231 North Industrial Park — which would increase traffic even more — but where are they? If any actually show up on that now-empty land, I'll believe it when I see it. Is it just me or do I

detect a touch of arrogance in the "We know who they are but we're not going to tell you..." pronouncements about supposed new industries given to Shelbyville City Council and Bedford County Commission members at their meetings? I respect the need for a certain amount of pre-announcement corporate privacy, but this seems to be going

After months of "projects" I'd like to actually see an announcement. This repeating that an industry is coming - and so far, nothing - makes me wonder if these are actual definite future industries or just companies considering this area.

I've also wondered if any real effort is being made to attract more large, national retail? All we hear is talk about industry and education, I'd like to see an individual hired to specifically focus on retail development. All that person has to do is get a Chick-Fil-A in a permanent location in Shelbyville and they'll be loved forever.

Sometimes I brainstorm about ideas that could benefit Shelbyville. Consider...

An upscale (there's nothing wrong with that word...) multi-story downtown apartment complex like those in Murfreesboro. The large lot stretching from Deery Street to North Jefferson Street along Depot Street would be a good place to start. Buy

the Times-Gazette building, knock it down instead of remodeling it, and you've got a perfect large lot. I've thought for years that the land under the T-G is much more valuable development-wise than the building itself.

Plans for a new downtown restaurant and an amphitheater near Duck River are a good start. We already have other downtown eateries. Having a downtown theater rare these days — helps. Add some entertainment venues and you've got a desirable area for living. Look at cities like Nashville, Murfreesboro and Huntsville, and think big. I've heard on and off that a high school may be added to Liberty School at some point, and that location makes sense. That would drive more traffic to that junction.

It would depend on property owners' wishes for the future uses of their land, but I could see the area developing into a






