Man shot, killed outside apartment

A Shelbyville man was shot and killed in an incident at Davis Estates Apartments, Davis Lane, late Friday night.

Rafael Mendoza Pineda 43, a resident of the apartment complex, died of multiple gunshot wounds inflicted around 10:30 p.m. Detective Sgt. Sam Jacobs of the Shelbyville Police Department said Saturday. The wounds were to the "body and head," Jacobs said.

Witnesses told police two men, one armed, fled on foot after the shots were fired. One appeared to be a white male

with a handkerchief over his face, Jacobs said. The witnesses were unable to get a better description due to darkness.

Sgt. Chris Vest and Officer Bailey Dineen found Mendoza lying in an outside hallway at the apartments. No pulse was detectable, police said.

The wounds were inflicted by a handgun, according to Jacobs

No suspect has been identified as of Monday, Jacobs said. The detective said the investigation is in its early stages.

Shelbyville City Council voted 6-0 in approval of Collins. His hiring was effective immediately – at least, as soon as a background check is complete. Collins said a physical, part of his pre-employment requirements, was to

Collins' starting salary was set at \$125,000, according to his contract. City Attorney Ginger Shofner read the contract's terms in detail to the council before the vote, A

\$5,000 per year raise will be awarded if Collins receives a favorable evaluation by the council after 6 months. Collins will be required to live within Bedford County under the contract's terms but may reside outside the Shelbyville city limits due to what Shofner termed the

"current housing situation." He is "highly encouraged" to live in Shelbyville, according to the contract. Former City Manager Josh Ray had been criticized by the council after saying he was unable to find affordable

housing inside Shelbyville. A provision in the contract says Collins cannot be fired

during the first 90 days after a city election. "I was down here, met with your department heads and had an opportunity to tour your facilities," Collins told the council. "As a matter of fact, when y'all had the big rain event two or three weeks ago it was all I could to keep from calling Buck (Vallad, Director of Public Works) and make sure he was safe.

"The process has been phenomenal. I've been following you closely for a month through the Times-Gazette, through your excellent website that has all your minutes and videoes. I am ready to get to work."

Graham reflects on last four years

With the annual Tenn-Walking Horse National Celebration going on in Shelbyville, many Bedford County natives are reminded of the 84-year tradition while many new residents are experiencing what all Bedford has to offer.

Bedford County Mayor Chad Graham said, "The Celebration is a cornerstone of our community. It's not only a big part of our economy; it's part of our public image." He said the preliminary

numbers from this year's show have all been positive, indicating a great year for the show. "My hope is that

our visitors to Bedford feel welcome. I would especially like to thank all of those in the community who make the show possible - whether it's by working on the grounds in some capacity, buying a ticket or a box and turning out to support the show, or by just showing hospitality to our visitors during this busy time. I also want to congratulate the Celebration's leadership

for their hard work and

dedication."

Four-year reflections

Graham said he has been on this road to becoming mayor since 2010, when he ran for school board and became involved in community enrichment activities. He said this was to make the learning curve of the office less steep.

When Graham was sworn into his first term in 2018, he did not predict three hurdles: organized protests at the Courthouse, the COVID-19 pandemic, and credible death threats. For the first, Graham's

office saw protests from Black Lives Matter, White Lives Matter, and the Bedford County Listening Project groups beginning in 2017 and last through Then COVID hit in 2020.

Having had a background in healthcare as Emergency Medical Services director, Graham said they trained

for pandemics such as this. "But that was from a medical standpoint, not a government perspective." And within the last month or so, Graham said he received credible death threats on social media by one resident in the Bell Buckle area. The

The contract contains routine requirements for a new city manager's contract, such as 15 days paid vacation time immediately; a vehicle allowance of \$450 per month, although Collins will be responsible maintenance; reimbursement for trips under 100 miles from Shelbyville.

UN agency to inspect Ukraine nuclear plant in urgent mission

KYIV (AP) — A U.N. nuclear watchdog team set off on an urgent mission Monday to safeguard the Russianoccupied Zaporizhzhia atomic power plant at the heart of fighting in Ukraine, a long-awaited trip that the world hopes will help avoid a radioactive catastrophe. The stakes couldn't be higher for the International

Atomic Energy Agency experts who will visit the plant in a country where the 1986 Chernobyl disaster spewed radiation throughout the region, shocking the world and intensifying a global push away from nuclear energy.

"Without an exaggeration, this mission will be the hardest in the history of IAEA," Ukrainian Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba said. Underscoring the urgency, Ukraine and Russia again

accused each other of shelling the wider region around the nuclear power plant, Europe's largest, which was briefly knocked offline last week. The dangers are so high that officials have begun handing out anti-radiation iodine tablets to nearby residents.

To avoid a disaster, IAEA Director-General Rafael Grossi has sought access for months to the Zaporizhzhia plant, which Russian forces have occupied since the early days of the six-month-old war. Ukrainian nuclear workers have operated the plant the whole time.

them from disclosing evidence of the occupiers' crimes at the plant and its use as a military base," Energoatom said, adding that four plant workers were wounded in Russian shelling of the city where they live.

Clashes erupt after Iraqi Shiite cleric resigns, 10 dead

BAGHDAD (AP) — An influential Shiite cleric announced Monday that he would resign from Iraqi politics, prompting hundreds of his angry followers to storm the government palace and sparking clashes with security forces in which at least 10 protesters were Protesters loyal to cleric

Muqtada al-Sadr pulled down the cement barriers outside the government palace with ropes and breached the palace gates. Many rushed into the lavish salons and marbled halls of the palace, a key meeting place for Iraqi heads of state and foreign dignitaries.

Iraq's military announced a nationwide curfew and the caretaker premier suspended Cabinet sessions in response to the violence. Medical officials said at least 15 protesters were wounded by gunfire and a dozen more were injured by tear gas and physical altercations with

Iraq's government has been deadlocked since al-Sadr's party won the largest share of seats in October parliamentary elections but not enough to secure a majority government. His refusal to negotiate with his Iran-backed Shiite rivals and subsequent exit from the talks has catapulted the country into political uncertainty and volatility amid intensifying intra-Shiite wrangling.

Iraq's majority Muslim population is split into two sects, Shiites and Sunnis. Under Saddam Hussein, the Shiites were oppressed until the U.S.-led invasion reversed the political order. Now the Shiites are fighting among themselves, with the dispute centering around power and state resources but also influence over the Shiite street.

To further his political interests, al-Sadr has wrapped his rhetoric with a nationalist and reform agenda that resonates

powerfully among his broad grassroots base of supporters who hail from Iraq's poorest sectors of society and have historically been shut out from the political system. Many were first

followers of his father, a revered figure in Shiite Islam. They are calling for the dissolution of parliament and early elections without the participation of Iranbacked Shiite groups, which they see as responsible for the status quo. During Monday's

clashes, Saraya Salam, a militia aligned with al-Sadr gathered in the capital's Tahrir Square to "protect" protesters, one of its commanders said. An Associated Press

photographer heard gunshots being fired in the capital and saw several protesters bleeding and being carried away. It was not immediately clear who fired the gunshots. A senior medical

official confirmed at least 10 protesters were killed by gunfire. The number was also confirmed by the Sadrist media office, which provided a list of 10 names. Iraq's caretaker premier

said he would open an investigation into the shootings and said the use of live ammunition against protesters was forbidden. Protests also broke

out in the Shiite-majority southern provinces, with al-Sadr's supporters burning tires and blocking roads in the oil-rich province of Basra and hundreds demonstrating outside the governorate building in

Iran considers intra-Shiite disharmony as a threat against its influence in Iraq and has repeatedly attempted to broker dialogue with al-Sadr.

In July, Al-Sadr's supporters broke into the parliament to deter his rivals in the Coordination Framework, an alliance of parties, from forming a government. Hundreds have been staging a sitin outside the building for over four weeks. His bloc has also resigned from parliament. Framework is led by al-Sadr's chief nemesis, former Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki. This is not the first

time al-Sadr, who has called for early elections and the dissolution of parliament, has announced retirement from politics — and many dismissed Monday's move as another bluff to gain greater leverage against his rivals amid a worsening stalemate. The cleric has used the tactic on previous occasions when political developments did not go

But many are concerned that it's a risky gambit and are worried how it will impact Iraq's fragile political climate. By stepping out of the political process, al-Sadr is giving his followers, most disenfranchised from the political system, the green light to act as they see fit. Al-Sadr also commands

a militia and maintains a great degree of influence within Iraq's institutions through the appointments of key civil servant positions. His Iranbacked rivals also have militia groups.

Iraq's military swiftly announced a nationwide curfew beginning at 7 p.m. It called on the cleric's supporters withdraw immediately from the heavily fortified government zone and to practice self-restraint "to prevent clashes or the spilling of Iraqi blood," according to a statement. "The security forces

affirm their responsibility to protect government institutions, international missions, public private properties," statement said.

Iraq's caretaker Prime Minister Mustafa almostly Iran-aligned Shiite Kadhimi also demanded that al-Sadr call on his followers to withdraw from government institutions. The U.N. mission in

Iraq said Monday's protests an "extremely dangerous escalation," and called on demonstrators to vacate all government buildings to allow the caretaker government to continue running the state.

It urged all to remain peaceful and "refrain from acts that could lead to an unstoppable chain of events."

"The very survival of the state is at stake," the statement said. Al-Sadr announced his

withdrawal from politics in a tweet, and ordered the closure of his party offices. Religious and cultural institutions will remain open, it said. The true motivations

behind al-Sadr's announcement appeared to be a reaction to the retirement of Shiite spiritual leader Ayatollah Kadhim al-Haeri, who counts many of al-Sadr's supporters as followers.

In a surprise announcement Sunday, al-Haeri said he would be stepping down as a religious authority for health reasons and called on his followers to throw their allegiance behind Iran's Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, rather than the Shiite spiritual center in Iraq's holy city of Najaf.

The move was a blow to al-Sadr, who despite harboring ambitions to be a religious authority lacks the scholarly credentials to be an ayatollah. Al-Haeri, who resides in the Iranian holy city of Qom, once provided him with the legitimacy he lacked by designating al-Sadr as his representative in Iraq. He cut ties shortly after with the cleric, but continued to enjoy the support of his

By calling on his followers to side with Khamenei, al-Haeri brought on a crisis of legitimacy for al-Sadr.

when we need another firetruck, not buy five firetrucks at one time," he said. This plan examines the life expectancy of items and technology, then incorporates their cost into the budget later on. For example, widgets typically expire in seven years, so the plan would include the need to purchase another widget in seven years after purchase. "It's always been a

reactive system. This allows us to be proactive." **Economic**

His biggest goal was to get a next generation economic model, which is what led to the Shelbyville-Bedford Partnership, that would be progressive and proactive. "People are coming to

Bedford whether we like it or not. The question is are we going to live with what shows up or are we going to go after what we want," Graham added that

the industrial park sat empty for at least six years before he became mayor. But now the industrial park will be occupied by TCAT-S, Duksan Electera, and another industry to be announced soon. This is in addition to other U.S. 231 improvements including the Nearest Green Distillery, Tennessee Downs, and Middle Tennessee State University's aviation department coming Shelbyville Municipal Airport. "That is a tremendously successful four years in

my opinion. Economic development is slowgoing, so we've wrestled and fought trying to find enough money to put infrastructure in the ground to convince companies to come on in here," said Graham.

Also, correcting the pay structure through the new \$2.32 property tax rate has enabled the county to

qualify for hiring highly

skilled workers, addressing

recruitment and retention

issues. "We as a county haven't done a good job in the past in investing in our product and our product is our people," said Graham.

The next four years

But now it's time to focus and follow-up with those projects.

"We're probably not going to see the kind of gains over the next four years that we have the first four because we're going to have to actually see these projects through and tweak them out," Graham

Graham said on the

argument of whether the

government should make their priority clean water affordable housing, before touching on other development, that he instead wants to see the entire system "float up." "I wasn't afraid to

dabble in multiple things at the same time with the hope that if it takes hold, it will float the whole system," he said. "We talk about we're

making big investments over here in the industrial park to bring in industry, but we have people over here who don't have affordable housing or clean water...I feel like the solution there is that I've got to dilute those issues to bring some other things in that can then help us to lift the system," said Graham. He added that at the same time the county

should focus on bringing in people who will "support some of these things that make this an attractive place," according Graham.







FARMERS MARKET

AG ENHANCEMENT

The Tennessee Agricultural Enhancement Program (TAEP) was established to provide cost share dollars to agricultural producers for the purpose of making long-term investments in Tennessee farms and communities. Participation allows producers to maximize farm profits, adapt to changing market situations, improve operation safety, increase farm efficiency, and make a positive economic impact in their communities.

The annual application period is October 1-7, 2022. New application materials are now available here at the Extension office at 2105 Midland Road. Please note Hay Storage and Hay Equipment rotate each program year, and Hay Storage will be offered in 2022-2023.

Approval notifications are scheduled to be mailed mid-December. Program purchases can be made starting October 1, 2022 and must be completed by the program's final reimbursement request deadline. Participants are encouraged to make purchases and submit reimbursement requests in a timely manner to avoid processing delays at deadline time. Payments are based upon expenses for eligible program items.

Programs include Dairy Solutions, Herd Health, Genetics, Row Crop Solutions, Hay Storage, Livestock Equipment, Livestock

SIMPLE AND SERENE

Solutions, Permanent Working Structures, Poultry Grower, and Producer Diversification. All of these programs are described in the TAEP packets or online at the TAEP website.

BLOAT AND SLOBBERS

I received an email about some hay that had been fed to a horse and the horse developed excessive slobbers. The hay had also been fed to some goats and they bloated. The hay grower had sold some hay to a sheep grower, and they had concerns about mycotoxins. Everybody was beginning to panic a bit. But there were other facts that we needed to know.

Here are more of the facts. The hay was orchardgrass and red clover. No one said anything about any mold or bad smelling hay. It also turns out that the goats had been ill and were not in the best condition to begin with.

First fact is that a lot of hay growers add red clover to the mix to help feed nitrogen to the grasses and to also add protein to the forages when fed to ruminant livestock. Red clover does cause excessive slobbers in horses and it is not recommended to feed horses such a mix. I've never heard that this causes colic in horses, but the slobbers are enough reason to not give it to horses. This is a normal reaction, but not one of extreme concern.

For ruminant livestock

such as cattle, sheep and

goats, such hay with the red clover can be fed in moderation and is a good feed. The problem for bloat exists due to the sudden change in the gut microbial populations that break down the clovers for the benefit of the animal, and this leads to a build-up of gases in the digestive tract. Coupled with the goats existing condition, this red

clover was a case of too

much of a good thing all at once.

The sheep that was fed this same hay did not react unfavorably, but the caution of the grower to the complaints caused the shepherd to stop feeding it. After checking with two ruminant nutritionists about the mycotoxin concern they both agreed that this was probably not the issue since not mention of mold or off-smell.

My recommendation was to feed the hay with some caution but not panic.





Rocket launch scrubbed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — NASA called off the launch of its mighty new moon rocket on its debut flight with three test dummies aboard Monday after a last-minute cascade of problems culminating in unexplained trouble related to an

engine. The next launch attempt will not take place until Friday at the earliest and could be delayed until mid-September or later.

The mission will be the first flight in NASA's Artemis project, a quest to put astronauts back on the moon for the first time since the Apollo program ended 50 years ago.

As precious minutes ticked away Monday morning, NASA repeatedly stopped and started the fueling of the Space Launch System rocket because of a leak of highly explosive hydrogen, eventually succeeding in reducing the seepage to acceptable levels. The leak happened in the same place that saw seepage during a dress rehearsal in the spring.

The fueling already was running nearly an hour late because of thunderstorms off Florida's Kennedy Space

Then, NASA ran into new trouble when it was unable to properly chill one of the rocket's four main engines, officials said. Engineers continued working to pinpoint

the source of the problem after the launch postponement was announced.

"This is a very complicated machine, a very complicated system, and all those things have to work, and you don't want to light the candle until it's ready to go," said NASA Administrator Bill Nelson.

Referring to launch delays, he said: "It's just part of the space business and it's part of, particularly, a test flight."

The rocket was set to lift off on a flight to propel a crew capsule into orbit around the moon. The six-week mission was scheduled to end with the capsule returning to Earth in a splashdown in the Pacific in October.

The 322-foot (98-meter) spaceship is the most powerful rocket ever built by NASA, out-muscling even the Saturn V that took the Apollo astronauts to the moon.

The dummies inside the Orion capsule were fitted with sensors to measure vibration, cosmic radiation and other conditions during the shakedown flight, meant to stress-test the spacecraft and push it to its limits in ways that would never be attempted if humans were aboard.

Asked about the possibility of another launch attempt on Friday, mission manager Mike Sarafin said, "We real-

ly need time to look at all the information, all the data." Even though no one

was on board, thousands of people jammed the coast to see the rocket soar. Vice President Kamala Harris and Apollo 10 astronaut Tom Stafford were among the

VIPs who arrived. Assuming the shakedown flight goes well, astronauts will climb aboard for the second Artemis mission and fly around the moon and back as soon as 2024. A two-person lunar landing could follow by the end of 2025.

The problems seen Monday were reminiscent of NASA's space shuttle era, when hydrogen fuel leaks disrupted countdowns and delayed a string of launches back in 1990.

Later in the morning, NASA also officials spotted what they feared was a crack or some other defect on the core stage — the big orange fuel tank with four main engines on it — but they later said it appeared to be just a buildup of frost in a crevice of the insulating foam. Launch director Charlie

Blackwell-Thompson and her team also had to deal with a communication problem involving the Orion cap-Engineers scrambled to

understand an 11-minute delay in the communication lines between launch control and Orion that cropped up late Sunday. Though the problem had cleared by Monday morning, NASA needed to know why it happened before committing to a launch.



"We just reached down and played some bully ball at the end. Connor Huie had a great last drive where we took a lot of time off the clock to seal it."


The Champions (1-1) started out strong in the first quarter by stopping the Lions' (0-2) offense, and marching down the field for the first touchdown of the game.

Araiza, 2 teammates accused of gang rape

SAN DIEGO — Matt Araiza, the punter who led San Diego State to a recordsetting season before being drafted by the Buffalo Bills, and two of his former Aztecs teammates were accused in a civil lawsuit Thursday of gang-raping a teenager at an off-campus party last fall. The lawsuit, filed in San

Diego County Superior Court, accuses Araiza, Zavier Leonard and Nowlin "Pa'a" Ewaliko of gangraping a then-17-year-old girl at a Halloween party at a home where Araiza had been living. The plaintiff, now 18, is

identified in the complaint as "Jane Doe" because she was underage at the time. No arrests have been made and San Diego Police

have not publicly identified any suspects. Leonard is listed on San

Diego State's roster as a

redshirt freshman offensive

lineman from Arlington, Texas. Ewaliko is not listed on this year's roster, but was on the 2021 roster as a defensive lineman from Seattle. The lawsuit states that

the teen had been drinking with friends when they decided to go to the party on Oct. 17 and she was "observably intoxicated upon arrival." She became separated from her friends and was approached by Araiza who offered her a drink, according to the lawsuit. She believes the drink "not only contained alcohol, but other intoxicating substances," the complaint said.

She told Araiza, who was 21 at the time, that she was a high school senior, according to the lawsuit. She alleges he then led her to a side yard where he asked her to perform oral sex and then had sex with her before taking her to a bedroom in the home. There were at least three

other men in the room,

including Leonard and Ewaliko, according to the complaint. The lawsuit states that Araiza threw the teen onto the bed and she went in and out of consciousness while she was being raped. It added, "but she does remember some moments from the horrific gang rape."

After an hour-and-ahalf, the teen "stumbled out of the room bloody and crying," according to the complaint. Her nose, belly button, and ear piercings had been pulled out. She immediately told

her friends about the rape and the next day reported it to police and underwent a rape exam, according to the lawsuit. Officers coached her on calling Araiza, which she did 10 days later as detectives recorded it, according to the complaint.

During the call, Araiza confirmed having sex with her, the lawsuit states, but

when she asked him "And

did we have actual sex?"

he responded "This is Matt

Araiza. I don't remember anything that happened that night" and hung up.

"This was a horrific crime, the kind of which happens all too often," attorney Dan Gilleon said in a statement to the AP. Gilleon said this case is especially egregious because it not only involved "self-entitled athletes," but multiple organizations from the university to the Buffalo Bills "have acted the part of enablers looking the other way in denial that my client deserves justice even if the defendants are prized athletes." The Los Angeles Times

first reported the lawsuit. Attorney Kerry

Armstrong, who represents Araiza in the criminal investigation, called the allegations untrue based on the findings of an investigator he hired.

"I 100% do not believe that he ever forcibly raped this girl or had sex with

her while she was passed

out or drunk or anything

like that," Armstrong told the AP. "It's unfortunate that she's filed a civil suit. I think it's a cash grab."

Armstrong said the Bills were aware of the allegations and investigation of Araiza before the lawsuit was filed because he provided the team updates since he was retained by the punter about six weeks ago. "Matt Araiza's very

upset about this, as you can imagine. He's very disappointed," Armstrong said. "But he's going to get his day in court eventually." Armstrong said he's been

informed police have all but completed their criminal investigation, which will then be reviewed by the district attorney to determine whether to file charges. Marc Xavier Carlos, who

is representing Ewaliko in an ongoing criminal investigation, and Jamahl Kersey,

The 22-year-old Araiza, who attended San Diego's Rancho Bernardo High, was SDSU's most recognizable player during a schoolrecord 12-2 season that netted a No. 25 ranking in the final AP Top 25 poll. He routinely flipped the field with his jaw-dropping punts and set an NCAA record with a 51.19-yard average. He won the Ray Guy Award and was a first-team AP All-American. "We were recently

made aware of a civil complaint involving Matt from October 2021," the Bills said in a statement. "Due to the serious nature of the complaint, we conducted a thorough examination of this matter. As this is an ongoing civil case, we will have no other comment at this point."

Young, Anderson driven, dominant for No. 1 Alabama

Will Anderson Jr. glowers at the camera like it was an opposing quarterback on third-and-5. Standing next to him, Alabama's Heisman Trophy -winning quarterbeack, Bryce Young, sports a beatific smile befitting football's glamour position.

The two most decorated players in college football a fierce pass rusher and a poised-beyond-hisyears passer — took different approaches to the No. 1 Crimson Tide's team

They're on the same page when it comes to one pursuit: A national title.

Having arguably the best offensive and defensive player both back for their third (and final?) season in Tuscaloosa is an embarrassment of riches, even for coach Nick Saban and Alabama.

"To have two players that make such a significant impact on our team as those two guys, I don't recall ever having a circumstance like that,' Saban said. Alabama is banking

on Anderson and Young to lead the team back to a national championship after a tantalizingly close call last season. Both are high on the lists of preseason Heisman Trophy candidates and potential No. 1 NFL draft picks. Despite all that, and

lucrative celebrity endorsement deals, Saban and their teammates say Anderson and Young just aren't the types to get complacent. "That's why me and

Bryce work so well together, because we are kind of wired the same," Anderson said. "We both want to be great and want to improve every day, and we're always looking for some way to get better." Last season would be

hard to top statistically for the two. Young set Alabama sin-

gle-season passing marks with 4,872 yards and 47 touchdowns in his first season as starter. He was intercepted just seven times on his way to becoming the Tide's second straight Heisman winner.

But instead of heading to Hawaii with his family, Young worked out twice a day with his trainer and threw most days during the semester break before returning to Tuscaloosa for

the summer. "He was ultimately, utterly committed to the season," Young's father, Craig, said.

Anderson led the nation with 17.5 sacks and 34.5 tackles for loss. He won the Bronco Nagurski Trophy as the nation's top defensive player. Anderson finished fifth in the Heisman balloting, just missing out on finalist status and an invitation to the New York with his teammate.

sister Afterward, Shanice encouraged him to use that near-miss as motivation. "For him, I feel like as he gets more successful, it's just fueling him to set new goals, reach new heights," Shanice Anderson said.

The omission bothered him enough that the Heisman is now on the annual goal sheet Anderson keeps on the back of his phone. It's a new addition to a list that he's been compiling with Tide staffer Sal Sunseri before each season.

But Anderson says what drives him is a love of football and competition.

"Do what you do best, and that's play football," he said. "But also for me, I'm not saying I psyche myself up, but there's a little voice like, 'These people don't respect you.' It's kind of like I've got to get my respect. I've got to go out there and do what I've got to do. I feel like that's what keeps me going."

Alabama's coordinators give similar reports on their best players.

"He's different from everybody else," defensive coordinator Pete Golding said. "He doesn't let the noise get to him. He's trying to be the best football player he can be and he's trying to bring people with him. And that's a daily job for him that he looks forward to."
