# Audits and taxes: town hall scrutinizes budget By ZOË WATKINS

District 1 held a town hall at the old — but newly renovated — Wartrace Gym to discuss the basics of county government and the upcoming budget for the fiscal year 2023-24.

The latter half of the town hall discussed issues like beer sales in the county and providing tablets to inmates at the Bedford County Jail.

But at the center of the conversation were property taxes and auditing the county budget.

Commissioners Drew Hooker and Eric Maddox discussed with attendees the possibility of lowering the property tax rate by implementing a wheel tax.

Though Maddox said he was not for any new tax, Hooker explained that by lowering the property tax rate and adding a wheel tax, the burden would be spread more evenly across the county versus on property owners.

There are 55,000 vehicles in the county versus 22,000 property owners. At something like a \$75 wheel tax, that would allow for a \$4 million revenue stream. For reference, the property tax increase last year brought in around \$4.8 million specifically for raises for county employees, according to the Bedford County General Fund.

"I'm searching for ways to lower property taxes. That is my goal. So, I'm trying to think outside the box...to see what our options are...," said Hooker.

finance director Robert ler will have to approve Daniel.

"The comptroller, they require an audit of every county in the state, and they actually do the audits," minus the larger cities, like Nashville or Memphis. "All the schools have to be audited in addition to the county and those are normally contracted to an independent auditor.

"But the state has to approve anybody that does an audit. The comptrolbecause they do a pretty complete audit."

Daniel continued, "I think it would be spending money unwisely. And the reason I say that is because they do such a thorough audit that even when you do a contracted audit with an independent auditor, I don't think they're as thorough. And I used to be on that side of the coin," said Daniel, who used to work with a CPA firm and did

audits regularly.

Hooker said he was unsure of how much an audit would cost the coun-

Bedford is also required to receive approval of the budget by the state. The county sends the budget within 15 days of adoption on June 29, so usually early July. If the state sees anything suspicious, they send it back for review or for change, according to

# **Council decides on Spring Street developer**

In one of the more interesting voting situations by the Shelbyville City Council in many years, the Bedco Investment Limited Partnership's Request For Proposal was approved for the Spring Street properties, known as the Kyle-Trollinger buildings, at the regular June meeting.

Council member Henry Feldhaus made a motion to accept the Bedco proposal for the right to negotiate, but it did not receive a

Mayor Randy Carroll then asked if anyone had a motion on the Glass Hollow Table & Tavern proposal. Council member Bobby Turnbow made a motion to accept. Council member William Christie seconded the motion.

There was a lengthy discussion on the merits of both proposals.

Turnbow and Christie voted yes with council members Gary Haile, Stephanie Isaacs, Marilyn and Henry Feldhaus voting against

Ewing, the motion. City Attorney Ginger Bobo said that, with one motion failing for lack of

a second and a 4-2 vote

against the second motion,

maybe the council should reject the proposals and start over.

"Do you need any additional information?' Shofner asked. "We need to hear what you want. You are saying you are rejecting it because no one carried the votes. You can just say you are rejecting these proposals and you want to start over."

Feldhaus once again made a motion for accepting the Bedco proposal. This time it was seconded by Isaacs. The motion passed 4-2 with Feldhaus, Isaacs, Haile, and Ewing voting to approve and Turnbow and Christie voting no. Bedco is headed by

Mike Davis and also includes Mindy and Craig Campbell of the Grindstone Cowboy located in Eagleville. Their offer was \$125,000.

Glass Hollow Table & Tavern is represented by Chavigny Beasley and

her son, Jeb House. Their offer was \$330,000. Shofner said that since this was a real estate transfer it did not need to have competitive bidding

City Manager Scott Collins and his staff will enter into negotiations with Bedco before any final agreement which would be closed within a 30-day period.

The project must be completed within a twoyear period.

"We want to see those buildings come alive," Carroll said. "Both proposals were excellent. We are all trying to do the best we can for the city."

# Shelbyville's rental problem

Several threats to Bedford County's growth were discussed during a Wednesday meeting with Tennessee Valley Authority representatives for the "Connected Communities" initiative. Chiefly, Shelbyville's housing crisis can be traced to the lack of affordable, reliable housing and the rise of higher-

This is especially seen among Shelbyville's rentals.

Councilman Henry Feldhaus, who attended the meeting explained, "We have several landlords that sort of focus on rehabbing old houses. But they have gone to a weekly rental structure."

This is mainly because if someone gets behind on their rent, it takes them only three weeks to get out of the house instead of three months, like if they're on a monthly rental. For the judicial system, tenants have to miss three payments to be evicted. However, Tristan Call with the Bedford County Listening Project said they have seen renters evicted for missing a single payment. "Go to General sessions on Wednesdays at 1:15 p.m., and you'll see people getting evicted," he said.

"That's the economics of the rental business," said Feldhaus. "What that happens to do is those that can only afford a week's rent happen to migrate here because we have the houses here...That to me is a big drag on our economy and demographics here.'

Call said there are more on this weekly rental system than what you might see in a bigger city. But they have seen a trend in some moving away from the weekly payments because they were evicted. And rent prices continue to soar. Studies show

Tennessee's rent has increased by 38% since 2020, with states like Colorado and Florida experiencing the highest increase at over 45%. Zoning Director Chris White said, "I'm not mak-

ing the statement that we have plenty of rental units ➤ See Problem, Page 4A


# **Lemuel Stephens 'Steve' Parks**





**FARMERS MARKET** Several of our farmers market vendors met last week and they hope that they will be ready next week. So, we are going to attempt to open the Farmers Market at the pavilion next to the big blue water tower at the Celebration Grounds on Thursday, June 22. The market will open at 2:30

This spring has not been good to gardeners, with the late frosts and the cold weather. And the moisture issues have not been favorable either, ranging from too wet early to too dry as of late. Remember, our market is locally grown, so we are totally dependent on the weather.

Come see us at the market next week.

# **DRY WEATHER**

We have experienced some dry weather of late, but nothing like our friends out west. I just read an article in the Drovers Daily, a publication of the Farm Journal. It said that last week 34% of the U.S. corn crop was covered in drought, and this week it jumped to 45%. And 39% of the U.S. soybean crop is also in drought.

The latest U.S. Drought Monitor shows 54% of the continental U.S. is experiencing D0-D4, which is exceptionally dry to exceptional drought conditions. Folks, this getting critical early on in the growing season.

Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa seem to be hardest hit but Texas and Oklahoma are just as bad. They've been dealing with not water, literally, for so long their cow herd has been decimated.

So, when you want to complain about hot dry weather, remember, it's summer time and it's supposed to be hot. But our friends to the west and north are worse off than we are. Think about 'em.

# **ANTIBIOTICS**

It's official now. As of this week, the FDA's new directive "Guidance for the Industry #263" has officially gone into effect. This means over-thecounter (OTC) livestock antibiotics will no longer be available through traditional retail channels. Instead, these antibiotics will now require a prescription from a licensed veterinarian.

If you have a sick animal, you'll have to contact your veterinarian for a prescription. Most likely you will not be dispensed a large supply bottle, you will instead receive doses for a prescribed treatment protocol.

That is, if you have a patient/client relationship established with your veterinarian. They will be audited for this relationship and their diagnosis, prescription and/or recommendations.

# Claiborne County homicide victim identified after more than three decades

COUNTY - A man whose skeletal remains were found in 1986 in Claiborne County has been identified, and special agents with the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation are asking for the public's help to determine who killed him. On August 24, 1986,

skeletal remains were discovered by hunters along an isolated and abandoned trail in the Caney Valley area of Claiborne County. TBI agents began working with the Claiborne County Sheriff's Office to investigate the death. Forensic anthropologists determined that the skeletal remains were those of a white male, likely between the age of 30 and 40. The victim had been shot, and his death was ruled a homicide. According to the University of Tennessee Anthropology Department, the man had been deceased for six months to a year prior to the discovery of his remains. After exhausting all leads, investigators could not determine the victim's identity, and he was classified as a John Doe.

In September 2015, the University of Tennessee Forensic Anthropology Center submitted a sample of the man's remains to the University of North Texas Center for Human Identification (UNTCHI). A DNA profile was developed and entered into the Combined DNA Index System (CODIS) and the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System in hopes that the man would eventually be identified.

In December, as part of

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the Unidentified Human Remains DNA Initiative, TBI agents submitted a sample of the man's remains to Othram Inc., a private lab based in Texas, for forensic genetic genealogical DNA testing. Scientists provided information about possible relatives connected to the man. A TBI intelligence analyst used that information to locate potential family members in Arkansas. Agents made contact with two of those individuals and confirmed they had a brother they had not heard from in more than four decades. With the assis-



tance of the Hot Springs Police Department and Pine Bluff Police Department in Arkansas, agents were able to obtain familial DNA standards for possible siblings of the man, which were submitted to the TBI Crime Lab in Nashville for entry into CODIS.

Last week, the UNTCHI positively identified the man as Jerry Harrison (DOB: 12/20/57) of Little Rock, Arkansas, who last

contacted his family in 1982 after he began traveling across the country. Now, TBI special agents are hoping the public can help provide information that may help solve the murder of Jerry Harrison. If you have information about this homicide, specifically any knowledge about individuals Mr. Harrison may have been with before his death, please call 1-800-TBI-FIND.

# Most Tennessee districts saw below 25 percent move to proficient on TCAP reading retake

The Center Square -The majority of Tennessee school districts saw less than 25% of the students who re-took the Tennessee Comprehensive Assessment Program third-grade reading test advanced to a proficient score.

Full statewide averages will be released later but the Tennessee Department of Education released districtlevel statistics this week on the re-takes after 60% of students did not receive a

"proficient" status on the first test.

Student who didn't receive a proficient mark on either test but scored "approaching" will be allowed to participate in a reading summer camp,\_appeal the result or commit to take tutoring throughout fourth grade.

The Tennessee Accelerating Literacy and Learning Corps tutoring involves 30-40-minute small group sessions two or three times a week throughout the school year.

The summer camp option, over four weeks, requires at least 90% attendance.

Appeals can be submitted before June 30.

"The TCAP retake assessment pathway provides an important opportunity for third grade students identified for potential retention to be able to retest to move directly to fourth grade, and we are proud of students who par-

announced today that it

ticipated in the retake for exploring this pathway," Interim Commissioner Sam Pearcy said. "The work and dedication of schools, districts, educators and families across the state made this opportunity possible for our students, and we are glad to see such strong participation in the first year of implementing this law."

Metro Nashville schools saw 52.1% of eligible students retake the test, with 11% of those students advancing to "proficient" while Memphis Shelby County saw 95.6% of eligible students take the test with 8.1% moving up to "proficient."

Clay County saw the largest jump on the retake with 47.1% of eligible students retaking the reading test and 62.5% of those students scoring "proficient."

Lexington County schools saw the secondlargest jump on the retake with nearly 70% of eligible students retaking the test and 40.5% of those students advancing to "profi-

Nineteen districts saw less than 10 or less than 1% of students advance to "proficient" on the retake.

(AP) — Next year, North America will see one of the largest and most impressive solar eclipses in living memory. And many people will be viewing that celestial phenomenon through specially designed glasses made in the Mid-South.

Bartlett-based American Paper Optics is the world's largest 3D optics company as well as the largest supplier of safe solar eclipse glass-

es. The company makes all its products in the Memphis area, chief marketing officer

Jason Lewin said. The company, founded in 1990, sold 45 million pairs of eclipse glasses before the 2017 solar eclipse and in the run-up to next year's - and an annular eclipse, sometimes known as a "ring of fire" eclipse, in the western United States this fall the company hopes to sell upward of 75 million pairs. A total solar eclipse occurs when the moon passes between the Earth and the sun, entirely blocking the face of the sun.

"It's... this is a lifetime experience. So we do not want (people) working on that Monday (April 8). I want (people) to drive over to Arkansas," to see totality, said John Jerit, president and CEO of American Paper Optics.

American Paper Optics already has gotten more than 30 million orders and is selling all over the U.S., Mexico and Canada. Totality for the annular eclipse on Oct. 14 will cut its way southeast from Oregon to Texas, with lesser levels of visibility spreading out in each direc-



# O'Rourke takes over Cascade volleyball program

Megan O'Rourke has been around the game of volleyball for over a decade, having played and coached since her high school days in New Jersey.

She jump started her coaching career as a sophomore in high school by assisting with youth camps and clinics before being recruited to play for Montclair State University in New Jersey, where she spent three years playing until COVID cut her college career short.

After coaching at the high school and club level post-college in New Jersey, O'Rourke made the move to Murfreesboro for graduate school at Middle Tennessee State University while also coaching the 16U team for Alliance Murfreesboro.

"Although the program is new, I feel like it's the perfect place for me to jump in because my style of volleyball is more of the USA technique and mechanics, and

that isn't really in Tennessee yet. I've worked closely with personnel directly associated with the USA Women's volleyball team both as a player and a coach, so

it's pretty cool to be able to bring that to Cascade," O'Rourke said.

"With my experience and being relatively fresh out of my playing days, I can relate really well to the girls on the team. I was the quiet kid that didn't say a word, and I didn't find a voice until I got into college," O'Rourke

# Byard leaving business of pay cut request to agent

NASHVILLE — Two-time All-Pro safety Kevin Byard will talk about most any topic when asked.

Being asked to take a pay cut going into his eighth NFL season by the Tennessee Titans is very different.

Byard knows the NFL is a business, and that's why he's leaving the Titans' request earlier this year to his agent and new general manager Ran Carthon. It's also why Byard hadn't talked about the Titans' request until Thursday.

"I don't really want to get into my feelings or anything about that and any emotions ...," Byard said. "I guarantee you I would not be the last player, and I haven't been the first player, (that had a team) come to about a pay cut."

Carthon, hired in January as the first Black general manager in the franchise's history, confirmed just before the NFL draft that Byard had been asked to take a pay cut. Byard has never missed a game and led the Titans in both tackles and interceptions each of the past two seasons.

Byard has been working out on his own throughout Tennessee's offseason program.



He said Thursday as the Titans wrapped up their three-day mandatory minicamp that he told coaches of his plans to work out on his own very early this year.

Being on the field for this minicamp

"I felt it was very important for myself, though, and for me, to come here and be a leader and be the person I've always been making plays, communicating and things like that ...," Byard said. "That's who I'm always going to be."

Making it easier for Byard to work out on his own is Shane Bowen is going into his fourth season as defensive coordinator. The biggest change was the hiring of Chris

Harris as the defense's new passing game coordinator and cornerbacks coach.

Byard said he staved in touch with coaches to learn any changes to a defense that ranked first against the run in 2022, but last against the pass in allowing 274.8 yards a game. He also talked a lot with coach Mike Vrabel — at the golf course.

Defensive lineman Denico Autry also reported for the mandatory minicamp along with Byard. Vrabel said he used both veterans as examples Wednesday. "Denico and Kevin showed up for the

mandatory minicamp obviously been working, ready to go, brought energy, picked up where they left off, and so that's the expectation for everybody whether they're here or not," Vrabel said. Byard, who agreed to a new extension in July 2019, currently ranks second only

with a \$19.6 million salary cap hit, according to Spotrac.com. He is under contract through 2024. The four-time defensive captain has started 105 of 114 games played since

2016 out of Middle Tennessee. Not only

is he the Titans' longest-tenured player on defense, he also leads all NFL safeties with 27 interceptions since the start of the 2017

Turning 30 in August, Byard started working out on his own about two weeks after the Super Bowl in February. Byard said players need different approaches at different stages of their careers. He's also not the first to stay away from the voluntary portion of the offseason program.

"I just control the things that I can control," Byard said.

# Wilson putting struggles behind, embracing chance to learn from Aaron Rodgers

FLORHAM PARK, N.J. — Zach Wilson never expected to be here at this point in his NFL career.

The No. 2 overall pick in the 2021 draft is the New York Jets' backup quarterback behind Aaron Rodgers. It has been a twoyear stretch that has seen Wilson go from the future of the franchise to a reclamation project.

And learning from the player he has always wanted to be like.

"It's interesting, right?" Wilson said Friday, the first time he spoke with reporters since the end of last season. "Of course I wish things had gone differently the past two years and I would've played amazing. But I truly believe things happen for a reason."

Trying to discern what that reason is has been part of what has been a tumultuous journey for Wilson, who has shown brief flashes of why he was so highly coveted. But overwhelming struggles have marked his short time in the NFL.

In 22 starts, Wilson has 15 touchdowns and 18 interceptions with a lowly 55.2 completion percentage and an unsightly 70.9 quarterback rating. As his production dipped, so did his confidence — to the point he was benched twice last season and coach Robert Saleh insisted Wilson needed a mental reset.

Meanwhile, the Jets knew they needed to address the quarterback position in the offseason. They were open with Wilson, telling him they'd bring in a veteran who presumably would take over as the starter.

"I can't be bitter at the situation," Wilson acknowledged. "I didn't perform well."

General manager Joe Douglas pulled off the trade that shook up the NFL in April, when he acquired Rodgers from Green Bay after months of speculation.

Wilson, who in January declared he would make an incoming veteran's life "hell" at practice, was suddenly going to be teammates with his idol.

"How old is he 40?" a smiling Wilson said. "He's double my age. I'm like, 'You're like my big brother I never had.' Sometimes your little brother has to make your life hell."

The 39-year-old Rodgers, however, said the 23-year-old Wilson has "been incredible" this off-

"He hasn't made my life hell every day," he said with a grin. "He's been a joy to work with and I give him so much credit because it's a tough situation what he went through." Rodgers attended every

voluntary practice this offseason while getting to know his new teammates and helping offensive coordinator Nathaniel Hackett install his system. And that's after the four-time NFL MVP hadn't attended voluntary sessions his last few seasons with the Packers.

"The last six weeks have been about the most fun I've had in a while," Rodgers said. "It's fun to come to work and be excited about what we're doing."

Rodgers' presence has raised expectations for a franchise that has failed to make the playoffs the last 12 seasons, the longest active drought in the NFL.

He has insisted he is no savior. But he might be exactly that for Wilson.

"They have a really nice relationship and because of it, guards are down and there's really good communication back and forth," Saleh said of Wilson and Rodgers. "I think there's a level of trust in the quarterback room right now between the coaches and the players amongst one another where communication isn't met with cyni-

"It's met with acceptance and because of it, I think it's going to help him get better."

Wilson was thrust into the starting job as a rookie, learning life in the NFL on the fly — and taking plenty of criticism along the way. Now, the pressure is off. Wilson can watch Rodgers and get a mental blueprint of what success at this level looks like.

"The QB room being with Aaron, I think it's feeling like every single day there's so much to learn," Wilson said. "You know, it's like every day I'm just like, 'Wow, like I just learned 10 different things about playing the quarterback position."

Wilson spent time with Rodgers in January in California, several weeks before Rodgers decided he wanted to continue playing — and intended to do so for the Jets. The two, who hit it off when the Jets and Packers had joint practices in Green Bay two summers ago, talked a little football.

There's plenty of that

Wilson, who said he was humbled by his struggles, is now hopeful about his future.

"Like I said, I think everything happens for a reason," Wilson said. "Am I going to have this opportunity to learn from the greatest quarterback of all time and this staff if things didn't happen the way they

"So, I'm very optimistic about it."

# **Martin Truex Jr. surges** to 4th career Sonoma Raceway victory

SONOMA, Calif. — Martin Truex Jr. shows up at Sonoma Raceway each year brimming with the confidence only acquired by repeated success on a

Last summer, team owner Joe Gibbs admits he didn't give Truex a car capable of demonstrating his driver's mastery of this hilly road course.

One year and innumerable Toyota improvements later, Truex roared right back to Victory Lane in wine country.

Truex won at Sonoma for the fourth time in his NASCAR Cup Series career Sunday, passing Chase Elliott for the lead after a final-stage restart and holding off Kyle Busch.

The 42-year-old Truex confidently drove his Joe Gibbs Racing Toyota to another victory at the track where he also won in 2013, 2018 and 2019. Only Jeff Gordon has more victories (five) at Sonoma than Truex, who earned the 33rd win of his Cup career and his second in the last six races after winning at

Dover. Truex went winless in 2022, and the subpar Toyota cars and setups took most of the blame. Gibbs particularly remembers last year's trip to Sonoma as "one of the worst races we've had in our race team" in terms of setup and performance.

Truex finished 26th in Northern California last year, but the experience

didn't budge his confidence. "I knew I can navigate around this track," Truex said. "Maybe I'm not the best driver at this track. I don't know. Maybe somebody else could go a tenth of a second faster in my car than I do. I doubt they could, but it's possible. But they're not going to be a second off like we were last year. When you're that far off, it's like, 'Yeah, that was dumb. What were we even thinking (with that setup)?' ... But I never thought we

couldn't win again." Elliott finished fifth in

his return from a one-race suspension for deliberately wrecking Hamlin at Charlotte. Elliott, who has missed seven races this season, twice held the lead in the final stage before Truex blew past him on fresher

Truex has seven top-10 finishes in his last nine races, reflecting Toyota's improvement for 2023.

"You come to Sonoma with Martin Truex, and you expect to win," crew chief James Small said. "Thankfully, today we gave him a car, and he was able to do that. ... We have a better understanding of the car on road courses now. Everything just makes more sense. We don't seem so stupid anymore. It's nice from our end that we can start using logic."

Joey Logano was third behind Busch, with Chris Buescher in fourth. Elliott had his third top-five finish of the year, but is still winless.

Truex and Busch, who was 2.979 seconds behind in his Richard Childress Racing Chevrolet, had the 11th 1-2 finish of their long Cup careers. They spent the previous four seasons as teammates at JGR, and Truex also held off Busch to win at Sonoma in 2019.

"Not too bad," said Busch, who won last week's Cup race outside St. Louis. "Just wish we had a little bit more. I was just trying to keep him honest there at the end. ... It's good for us, because (Toyota is) so good on road courses. They've done the work. We did a good job keeping it competitive.'

Truex appeared to be cruising toward victory before pole-sitter Denny Hamlin spun after he made contact with the wall with 19 laps to go. Hamlin's car slid sideways across the start-finish line.

Elliott led coming out of the caution with 15 laps left, but Truex surged up on fresher tires and reclaimed

the lead for good.

"I really think he's confident when he comes here," Gibbs said. "It really feels like he's got a real feel with Sonoma. From time to time, drivers have a real confidence about some tracks, and he's like that here.'

Truex first took the lead in the second stage. The race was caution-free until the 49th lap, when Busch took the lead by not pitting. Truex came out 10th, but first among the cars with fresh tires - and he tore through the field and reclaimed the lead with 42 laps to go.

# Also ran

Tyler Reddick started second in his bid to win for the fourth time in the Cup Series' last six road course races, but the Northern California-born driver steadily slipped down the standings. He got back up to second in the final stage before his pit stop, but he

blew a tire with 14 laps left. Defending champion Daniel Suárez also struggled to make headway after starting in ninth, ultimately finishing 22nd. A year ago in Sonoma, Suárez became the first Mexican-born Cup

driver to win a race. The pits

Michael McDowell was in position to contend in the final stage, but he lost seven positions with a slow pit stop. He ultimately finished seventh, and he wasn't sure exactly what went wrong for his crew.

"That's all it takes in the Cup Series," McDowell said. "(Truex) was the car to beat all day, but I think we had the second-best car out here. If I'd rolled out of pit road first or second, I think we could've had a shot at it."

After a one-week break, the Cup Series begins its 10-race sprint to the playoffs June 25 at Nashville Superspeedway.

# Jena Antonucci becomes 1st female trainer to win a Triple Crown race

NEW YORK — Jena Antonucci turned a Triple Crown marred by thoroughbred deaths on the track and threatened by bad air quality from wildfires in Canada into a celebration for racing and women.

Arcangelo took the lead at the top of the stretch and won the Belmont Stakes on Saturday, making the 47-year-old Antonucci the first female trainer to win a Triple Crown race.

After the horse crossed the finish line, Antonucci doubled over and rested her arm and head on the back of a chair. She kissed the horse on the nose when it returned to the area in front of the winner's circle.

# For this US Open in LA, fairways look wider than they really are







# What to stream this week: 'Extraction 2,' Stan Lee doc, 'Star Trek' and 'The Wonder Years'

This week's new entertainment releases include albums from John Mellencamp and Killer Mike, season two of "Star Trek: Strange New Worlds" arrives on Paramount+ and there's a documentary that explores Marvel comic creator Stan Lee's life and cultural impact. The new "The Wonder Years," about a middle-class Black family in Montgomery, Alabama, in the 1960s, returns for its second season, and "Gold Rush" fan favorite Todd Hoffman is trying to turn his fortune around by rehabilitating a rundown mine in Alaska in Discovery Channel's "Hoffman Family Gold." And EA Games bills its Formula One game F1 23 as "a fresh start."

Albums from John Mellencamp and Killer Mike, as well as the return of Chris Hemsworth's gun-for-hire antihero in Netflix's "Extraction 2" are among the new television, movies, music and games headed to a device near you.

Among the offerings worth your time as selected by The Associated Press' entertainment journalists are season two of "Star Trek: Strange New Worlds," and new "The Wonder Years," about a middle-class Black family in Montgomery, Alabama, in the 1960s, returns for its second season.

# **NEW MOVIES TO STREAM**

- Clinical death is just a minor obstacle for Chris Hemsworth's action hero Tyler Rake, who audiences can see again in "Extraction 2," debuting on Netflix on Friday. In this outing, he's assigned the dangerous task of rescuing a Georgian gangster's family from a prison. Director Sam Hargrave promised twice as much action and more emotion in this outing, produced again by the Russo brothers. And Hemsworth has said that they opted for practical stunts and set pieces over green-screen fakery, which could be a bit frightening filming a sequence atop a train going 40 miles per hour through the snowy Czech Republic while a helicopter hovered 23 feet in front of him flying backwards.
- "Chevalier," a lush, dramatic biopic of an accomplished Black man in Marie Antoinette's France who was all but erased, came and went in theaters without a lot of fanfare. But it's now headed to Hulu starting on Friday where audiences can learn about Joseph Bologne, the Chevalier de Saint-Georges, the son of a wealthy French plantation owner and an enslaved Senegalese teenager who rose through the ranks of French society due in part to his extraordinary musical talents as a composer and a violinist. Kelvin Harrison Jr. plays the title role in the Stephen Williams-directed film, which I wrote in a review "may be more fiction than history, but it's worthwhile with effective acting, tension (helped by Kris Bowers' score) and a decadently beautiful production."
- And on Disney+, a new original documentary about the late Stan Lee premieres on Friday. "Stan Lee," directed by David Gelb, promises to explore Lee's life and cultural impact. Lee, who died in 2018 at age 95, co-created an army of comic book characters including Spider-Man, the X-Men, Iron Man, the Incredible Hulk, the Fantastic Four, Ant-Man and many more who have in the past 15 years become household names thanks to the popularity of Marvel films, many of which feature fun Stan Lee cameos.

# **NEW MUSIC TO STREAM**

- John Mellencamp's output is not slowing down. A year after releasing the album "Strictly a One-Eyed Jack," the heartland rocker is back with "Orpheus Descending." Many of the 11 tracks including the anti-gun violence anthem "Hey God" and a song about the homeless crisis "The Eyes of Portland" focus on social issues. "All of these homeless/Where do they come from?/ In this land of plenty/Where nothing gets done," sings Mellencamp, 71, on the latter track.
- Father's Day may be around the corner, but Killer Mike is honoring his mother on his new solo album, "Michael." The single "Motherless" has Mike rapping about his late mother, featuring R&B singer Eryn Allen Kane: "I be missin' huggin' you, I miss kissin' you/I miss all the jewels and I miss all your wisdom, too." Another single is the Run the Jewels-like "Don't Let the Devil," in which he shows off his delinquent side, with the lyrics "Catch me after Sunday service disturbin' the church's workers.'
- Loss is also in the DNA of the new album by multi-instrumentalist, singersongwriter Meshell Ndegeocello. "The

Omnichord Real Book" is an album made after she lost her parents. "This album is about the way we see old things in new ways," Ndegeocello says. First single "Clear Water" is a soul-searching Sly Stone-inspired song featuring Jeff Parker's bluesy guitar lines and vocals by Justin Hicks. The album was produced by Josh Johnson and also features Jason Moran, Ambrose Akinmusire, Joel Ross, Jeff Parker, Brandee Younger, Julius Rodriguez, Mark Guiliana, Cory Henry, Joan As Police Woman and Thandiswa.

— Only one band can make fonts sound cool and that's Queens of the Stone Age, who are out Friday, with the 10-track studio album "In Times New Roman..." On the spiky, off-kilter "Emotional Sickness," frontman Josh Homme sings "Use once and destroy/ Single servings of pain/A dose of emotion sickness I just can't shake." But on "Carnavoyeur," he has a smooth, distant cool: "Flying high, realize/There are no more mountains to climb."

# Adored, scorned, impossible to ignore in life, Berlusconi in death draws tributes even from critics

ROME (AP) — Adored, scorned, impossible to ignore in life, Silvio Berlusconi in death drew tributes even from critics, and ever more lush praise from admirers, including Russian President Vladimir Putin and Pope Francis. Following word of Berlusconi's death

on Monday in a Milan hospital, where he was being treated for chronic leukemia, reaction poured in from around the world, from national leaders to Pope Francis to announcers who burst into tears on one of his TV networks, for the populist threetime premier and media mogul.

Here are some of the reactions:

- Russian President Vladimir Putin in a condolence telegram hailed Berlusconi as a "patriarch" of Italian politics and a true patriot who has improved Italy's standing on the world stage. "I have always sincerely admired his

wisdom, his ability to make balanced,

far-sighted decisions even in the most difficult situations," Putin said in the telegram released by the Kremlin. "During each of our meetings, I was literally charged with his incredible vitality, optimism and sense of humor." Berlusconi hosted Putin twice at one

of his Sardinia Emerald Coast villas, and the Russian reciprocated, including with a stay at Putin's dacha. For Berlusconi's last birthday in September, Putin gifted him bottles of vodka, even as the Italian government staunchly backed Ukraine in the war against the Russian invasion.

Undoubtedly, he was a politician of the European and the world scale," Putin said. "There are few such people in the international arena now. He was a great friend of our people and did a lot to develop business, friendly relations between Russia and European countries." Berlusconi had expressed reservations about sanctions against Russian interests over the invasion. - Far-right Italian Premier Giorgia

Meloni, whose coalition government's junior partners include the Forza Italia party Berlusconi founded three decades ago, bid him "farewell, Silvio" in a video statement carried on Italian television. With his passing, "a great European political leader and a great Italian is gone. His intuitions, his battles, his commitment transformed our nation and opened spaces for authentic liberty."

- In a condolence telegram sent to Berlusconi's eldest daughter, Marina Berlusconi, and assuring his closeness to all the family, Pope Francis said the late premier had carried out "public responsibilities with an energetic temperament." Francis prayed that God grant "eternal peace for him and consolation of the heart for those who weep for his passing." Francis said he joined in the condolences "with a fervent remembrance in prayer."
- "We had our political differences but on a personal level, he was always charming and engaging company," Anders Fogh Rasmussen, a former Danish prime minister and former NATO secretary general, said of Berlusconi.
- Italian President Sergio Mattarella, whose role as head of state was coveted by Berlusconi — he sought unsuccessfully in recent years to be chosen by Parliament for that position — in his tribute described the former premier as a "protagonist of of long seasons of Italian politics.

"Berlusconi was a great political leader who marked the history of our Republic, influencing its paradigms, customs and language," Mattarella said.

- On one of the three private TV networks in Berlusconi's media empire a pair of announcers hosting a live morning talk show choked up and shed tears when giving the audience the news of his death. Outside one of Berlusconi's villas, in Arcore, near Milan, someone placed a scarf from AC Milan soccer club, which Berlusconi long had owned, next to bouquets of flowers.

# JPMorgan settles with victims of Jeffrey Epstein, deceased financier charged with sex trafficking

JPMorgan Chase announced a settlement Monday with the victims of Jeffrey Epstein who had accused the bank of being the financial conduit that allowed the financier to continue operating a sex trafficking operation. Epstein was arrested in 2019 on federal

charges accusing him of paying underage girls hundreds of dollars in cash for massages and then molesting them at his homes in Florida and New York. He was found dead in jail on Aug. 10 of that year, at age 66. A medical examiner ruled his death a suicide. The lawsuit filed in Manhattan fed-

eral court in November sought to hold JPMorgan financially liable for Epstein's decades-long abuse of teenage girls and young women. A related lawsuit has been filed in the U.S. Virgin Islands. "We all now understand that Epstein's behavior was monstrous, and we believe

this settlement is in the best interest of all parties, especially the survivors, who suffered unimaginable abuse at the hands of this man," JPMorgan Chase said in a written statement early Monday. According to the lawsuits, JPMorgan

provided Epstein loans and regularly allowed him to withdraw large sums of cash from 1998 through August 2013 even

though it was aware of his participation in sex trafficking. The anonymous victim, referred to as Jane Doe, said she was sexually abused by Epstein from 2006 and The bank continued to count Epstein as

a client despite the fact that Epstein was

arrested and pled guilty to sex crimes in

2008 in Florida.

The settlement with Jane Doe arrives on the same day that a judge granted Doe's lawsuit class-action status, meaning future awards would be granted to Doe and other

"Any association with him was a mistake and we regret it," the bank said in a prepared statement. "We would never have continued to do business with him if we believed he was using our bank in any way to help commit heinous crimes." The settlement comes roughly two

weeks after JPMorgan Chase CEO Jamie Dimon testified in a deposition for the case, where he denied knowing about Epstein and his crimes until the financier was arrested in 2019, according to a transcript of the videotaped deposition released last Both lawsuits were filed after New York

state in November enacted a temporary law letting adult victims of sexual abuse to sue others for the abuse they suffered, even if the abuse occurred long ago. Terms of the settlement were not dis-

closed. Lawsuits are still pending between the U.S. Virgin Islands and JPMorgan Chase, and the bank is still pursuing its lawsuit against JPMorgan former executive The bank has denied the allegations

and sued Staley, saying he hid Epstein's crimes to keep him as a client. Staley left JPMorgan in 2013 to later become CEO of the British bank Barclays. Staley stepped down from that role in 2021 due to his prior relationship with Epstein.
