

City considers tax rate reduction

No one really wants to pay taxes, but since most people have to do it, any relief is appreciated. Mayor Randy Carroll and the

Shelbyville City Council are trying to give taxpayers a break by reducing the annual rate paid per \$100 of assessed value to \$1.48, down from \$1.59. The number was discussed during a budget workshop last week.

City Treasurer Kay Parker was tasked with revising the budget for 2023-24 based on the \$1.48 figure. The new budget and any related documents will be considered at the June 29th council study ses-

During the workshop admin-

istrators in all city departments informed council members of their needs, especially possible cost of living pay increases, the need to prevent employees from moving to other cities or counties for better pay and benefits, and the ability to hire new staff. It was proposed, but not voted on, to provide six percent across-the-board raises for city employees.

At the \$1.59 rate, the estimated revenue is \$8,800,014. The \$1.48 rate would provide revenue of \$8,191,208. A proposed \$1.36 rate would drop revenue to \$7,527,058.

"You see what our needs are in Shelbyville right now," Mayor Randy Carroll said. "We need police officers, firemen, and people needing money to keep up with the cost of living.

"My recommendation is to go to \$1.48, a \$600,000 reduction in revenue. I think that is the safe thing to do. The council can do what it wants to do. We do not want to reduce any services. We want to improve services. Council members can have their own opinions but \$1.48 is what I personally recommend for our next fiscal year."

Carroll added that sales tax revenue could make it possible to decrease the property tax rate, even more, the next year.

"Thank you, Mayor, for bringing up the property tax rate," council member Henry Feldhaus said. "A couple of years ago we set the tax rate at \$1.59 based on what we

saw the employees needed and the city needed to fill the ranks of the police, fire, public works, and the recreation departments.

"It worked. They are basically at full employment. We need to send a message the City of Shelbyville is proud of its employees and keep others from cannibalizing our employees. I would like to see it stay at \$1.59."

City Manager Scott Collins admitted there are several things to consider.

"I'm an eternal optimist," Collins said. "I think our sales tax is going to continue to increase. I am very optimistic on the future of Shelbyville. And apparently, the State of Tennessee is too because

"Bedford County is located within the fastest growing section of Tennessee. Our new residents want to enjoy the beauty of our countryside but still be able to work from home. The ability to help develop a locally planned high-speed fiber delivery network will allow those doing business and school work at home opportunities that were not previously available," Bedford County Mayor Chad Graham. River Life license plate deadline extended

The reservation deadline for the River Life license plate has been extended to June 2024.

The tag will go to funding first responders, public safety partners, and search and rescue crews on the Duck River. This project, which was coordinated through the Shelbyville-Bedford Community Foundation, is designed to increase public safety and education on the Duck River. The tag is \$35 to reserve, which will go to buying equipment and markings for

The plate must receive 1,000 pre-orders by June

2024 in order for the state to begin production. The design of the plate created by Shelbyville Central High School student Alejandro Contreras Cabrera, who won a school-wide competition last year. For his design, Cabrera used a mallard, a bass, and the bow of a kayak. The mallard and the bass are the Duck River's most common species, and the bow of the kayak its recreational opportunities.

The vitality of the Duck River has often been overlooked through the years, according to Shelbyville-Bedford Partnership Beth Davis, who has helped to coordinate this project. Through this new license plate,

Though many see the Duck River as "muddy and green," it is in fact one of the most biologically diverse rivers in the world with more than 650 freshwater species (more than any other inland river in North America), including varieties of fish, mussels, snails, crayfish, frogs and turtles, insects, and algae.

American arrested for pushing 2 US tourists into ravine at German castle, leaving one woman dead

BERLIN (AP) — An American man has been arrested over the death of one U.S. tourist and an assault on another near Neuschwanstein castle in southern Germany after he allegedly pushed the two women down a steep slope, authorities said Thursday.

The incident near the popular tourist attraction happened on Wednesday afternoon near Marienbruecke, a bridge over a gorge close to the castle that offers a famous view of Neuschwanstein.

The 30-year-old man met the two female tourists, ages 21 and 22, on a hiking path and lured them onto a trail that leads to a viewpoint, police said in a

"The younger of the two women was attacked by the suspect," said police spokesman Holger Stabik. "The older one tried to rush to her aid, was then choked by the suspect and subsequently pushed down a slope. "

The assailant then appears to have attempted to sexually assault the 21-year-old before pushing her down the slope as well. She fell nearly 50 meters (165 feet), ending up close to her friend.

A mountain rescue team reached both women. The 22-year-old was "responsive" and taken to a hospital, police said; a helicopter carried the 21-year-old with serious injuries to a different hospital, and she died there overnight. The suspect left the

scene but was quickly arrested nearby. Bystander video posted online showed police leading away a handcuffed man in a T-shirt, jeans and a baseball cap. Eric Abneri, a recent

business graduate from the University of Pittsburgh who took the video, said the man appeared to have scratches across his face.

"He did not say a single

word. He didn't open his mouth; he didn't mumble," Abneri told The Associated Press. "He just walked with the police and

that was it."

Abneri said he and friends reached the scenic overlook as a helicopter arrived and they saw rescuers lower themselves down to the victims.

"I'm honestly absolutely stunned someone is still alive from this. It is like falling from the top of an absolute cliff," he said.

Abneri described it as "a very, very difficult rescue because of those cliffs and because the helicopter came mere feet above the tree line at the top of the

"They did an unbelievable job," he said. Police said the man they

arrested was American and described him as also a tourist; prosecutors said the women were fellow U.S. citizens. The 22-yearold remained hospitalized Thursday, according to prosecutors.

Authorities didn't identify either the suspect or the victims or give any further details. Police said a judge

in nearby Kempten on Thursday ordered the suspect held pending a potential indictment ,Aî a process that can take months Äî and he was taken to jail. He is under investigation on suspicion of murder, attempted murder and a sexual offense. Police said they and

prosecutors were focusing on trying to reconstruct exactly what happened and called for any witnesses to come forward. Neuschwanstein, locat-

ed in southern Bavaria close to Austria's border, is one of Germany's most popular tourist attractions. It is the most famous of

the castles built by King Ludwig II of Bavaria in the 19th century. Construction started in 1869 but was never completed. Ludwig died in 1886.

We need a plan for how to overcome our challenges, and with the guidance from TNECD and its partners, this program offers us an opportunity that would otherwise be difficult to achieve," said Roane County Executive Wade Creswell.

Claiborne County Mayor Joseph Brooks said about his county's participation in the program, "Claiborne County is looking forward to getting data from the program that will assist in its efforts to secure funding to help close the gaps in broadband coverage across the county and learn more about opportunities that are already available to residential customers."

Tennessee communities stand to receive significant funding for broadband infrastructure enhancement, thanks to federal infrastructure dollars and opportunities being made available by the state. Community planning

support offered through initiatives like the Tennessee Accelerate Program will help level the playing field so more cities and counties-regardless of size or staffing—can prepare to submit for capital dollars to help transform broadband in their communities.

The program works to

prepare communities for establishing and implementing a full-scale broadband connectivity vision. Through more than 30 hours of no-cost expert counsel developed by the Benton Institute and funded by Heartland Forward, the program offers structured engagement for setting broadband goals, understanding funding options, and targeting capital dollars to support implementation.

The program is anticipated to run through July 2023. Heartland Forward and the Benton Institute previously joined together with local partners to successfully run similar Accelerate programs in Arkansas, Illinois, and

Tennessee's college-going rate increased by 1.5% for the Class of 2022, a year after statewide numbers significantly decreased since 2017. The state's rate is now

54.3%, including this year's highest increase since Tennessee Promise began, according to a new report from the Tennessee Higher Education Commission.

In last year's report, the college-going rate for high school graduation dropped from 63.8% for the Class of 2017 to 52.8% for the Class of 2021. "College going for the

class of 2022 is up across all race and gender pairs. However, these increases are not evenly distributed," the report said. "Black or African American students of both genders, Hispanic/ Latino females, and white males saw growth in college-going rates above the

statewide growth of 1.5

Students who took dual

enrollment college courses, last year's study says, while in high school had a higher college-going rate than those who didn't.

The proportion of students choosing to attend Tennessee Colleges of Applied Technology or Locally Governed Institutions increased along with enrollment at out-of-state public institu-

Class of 2023, including raising the college-going rate to 60%, increasing adult enrollment in high education, and improving the alignment between coursework and workforce The commission is also working on a "Drive to

55," an attempt to have 55% of those ages 25 to 65 in the state holding a post-secondary credential by 2025. That number was 47.3% in 2021.

EASY MICROWAVE CLEANING

Drag ban ruling is a win for LGBTQ residents, free speech

Members of the LGBTQ+ community and their allies in Tennessee received a Pride Month present late last week when a federal judge ruled a state law targeting drag performances was unconstitutional.

Judge Thomas L. Parker of the Federal District Court in Memphis, an appointee of former President Donald Trump, said the law, which forbids adult cabaret performances by "male or female impersonators" on public property or where minors

might view them, violated the First Amendment's protection of free speech.

State Attorney General Jonathan Skrmetti said the ruling did not invalidate the law outside of Memphis and vowed to appeal the court's decision, but we hope the ruling gives guidance to law enforcement and performers everywhere in the state.

The law was spearheaded by state Rep. Chris Todd, who fought a personal vendetta against a drag show he'd never seen in his home district in Madison County. Since it became law, it's been unclear exactly what it prohibits.

Tennessee already has constitutionally grounded obscenity laws criminalizing obscene live performances. This law, passed by the Legislature and signed by the governor, was always intended to intimidate the LGBTQ+ community.

It's unacceptable and unconstitutional that our elected representatives are using the power we've granted them to bully residents of

On past Father's Days, I would have grabbed two cards - probably last minute. One card for my dad and one card for my

My dad didn't ever get to hold Tinsley, but I'm thankful he did see a picture of her before he passed away the very next

I was so busy during those months, that losing them was nothing short of surreal. I could not comprehend that I would no longer be able to pick up the phone and call my dad to tell him about my latest problem or wacky experience or just chat about one of our animals, our health, or sometimes about a death.

I still thought I'd be able to walk into the house next door and see my stepdad sitting in his recliner and asking me how to do something on his Facebook page or with his flip phone. Yes, a flip phone. I don't know how many times Jimmy told me during a conversation, "Don't go putting that on Facebook!" But, once he was on Facebook, he realized it was another way for him to satisfy his nosi-

Jimmy came into my life when I was in my late teens. He and Mom married when I was 20 years old. For the first few years, I think Jimmy and I just tolerated each other. And we enjoyed irritating each

He was always there to fix my car or whatever part of my house that needed fixing. Mostly because Mom probably made him. If he wasn't on his golf cart, he was on the lawn mower. Our yards stayed immaculate. Now, that does not mean he did not

gripe about mowing my yard, but no way was he letting me drive his precious mower!

Things between us changed significantly when my daughter, Jordan, was born. Jordan trying to say

"Grandaddy," said "Dadat" instead. From then on, we called him Dadat. The two of them were tight. Now he had a partner in crime riding with him on the golf cart. Speaking of Odor Eaters, I've been waiting for the other shoe to drop, revealing new austerity policies.

Will the mentors on "The Voice" be replaced by a warm handshake and a See 'n Say toy? Will "Dumpster Diving with the Stars" and "The Hiding-His-Face-Behind-His-Hands Singer" grace our screens?

Remakes and reboots remain a popular life preserver for broadcasters, so don't be surprised if we get a new version of "The 1950s test pattern – with most of the original cast!" (I hear the same pennypincher has a pitch for converting all the conflagrations on "Fire Country"

into the 24-hour yule log.) Gameshows are cheaper to produce than dramas, but even they face reconfiguration. Get ready for "Let's Make A Deal: You Get to Meet Wayne Brady and We Get to Sell Your Blood."

PBS is not immune to economic realities. "Masterpiece" may be renamed "Some Unrecognizable Scrawls I Hung on the Refrigerator Door to Keep My Six-Year-Old Happy.'

Brrr. Yes, I really dodged a bullet thanks to my career obstacles. In an alternate timeline, I could be pulling my remaining hair out over network belttightening.

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

Confidence in science fell in 2022 while political divides persisted, poll shows By MADDIE BURAKOFF

AP Science Writer NEW YORK (AP) - Confidence in

the scientific community declined among U.S. adults in 2022, a major survey shows. driven by a partisan divide in views of both science and medicine that emerged during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Overall, 39% of U.S. adults said they had "a great deal of confidence" in the scientific community, down from 48% in 2018 and 2021. That's according to the General Social Survey, a long-running poll conducted by NORC at the University of Chicago that has monitored Americans' opinions or key topics since 1972. An additional 48% of adults in the latest

survey reported "only some" confidence. while 13% reported "hardly any," according to an analysis of the survey by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public The survey showed low confidence levels among Republicans as partisan gaps

that emerged during the pandemic era have stuck around, said Jennifer Benz, the center's deputy director. "It doesn't look all that dramatic when you just look at the trends for the overall public," Benz said. "But when you dig into

that by people's political affiliations, there's

a really stark downturn and polarization."

Between surveys in 2018 and 2021, as the pandemic took hold, the major parties' trust levels headed in opposite directions. Democrats reported a growing level of confidence in science in 2021, Äî perhaps as a "rallying effect" around things like COVID-19 vaccines and prevention measures, Benz said. At the same time, Republicans saw their confidence start to plummet.

In the 2022 survey, Democrats' confidence fell back to around pre-pandemic levels, with 53% reporting a great deal of confidence compared with 55% in 2018. But Republicans' confidence continued its downward trend, dropping to 22% from 45% in 2018. Confidence in medicine has also grown more polarized since 2018. That year, Democrats and Republicans were about equally likely to say they had high confidence. By 2022, though, Republicans' confidence had fallen to 26%, while Democrats' has remained about the same as

it was before the pandemic, at 42%. Overall, 34% of Americans reported a great deal of confidence in medicine in 2022, compared with 39% before the pan-

Generally, scientists have had a high level of trust compared to other groups in the U.S., said John Besley, who studies public opinion about science at Michigan State University. And even with the latest declines, confidence in science is still higher than many other institutions, he pointed out.

But the split between political parties is a cause for concern, experts said.

"You can definitely see the impact here of people taking cues from their political For Sudip Parikh, CEO of the American

Association for the Advancement of Science, the drops were "disappointing but not surprising." He sees them as part of an "overall pulling apart of our communities" and a loss of trust in many institutions. The latest survey found that distrust

has grown for some other groups, too. According to the 2022 survey, confidence in the Supreme Court has plunged to its lowest level in at least 50 years. Americans also reported lower levels of trust in education, the press, major companies and organized religion.

love horses. I would have a stable full of them if I had the funds.

Tennessee Walking Horses are my favorite horse breed. My daughter rode for many years and made a special connection with one of her horses, Gen's Ten High, which lasted long after the bay gelding passed away from

But I have always been intrigued with thoroughbred horses as well. I was fortunate enough to have the opportunity to hug Secretariat, who won the Triple Crown 50 years ago, while he was in his paddock at Claiborne Farm.

Covering the Kentucky Derby and Kentucky Oaks day at Churchill Downs in Louisville, Kentucky was one of my top experiences as a sportswriter for many years.

There are a number of partnership deals arranged for the purchase of thoroughbreds making it possible for those who aren't ultra-rich to participate.

But my enjoyment of thoroughbreds has been dampened by the multiple deaths at tracks hosting Triple Crown races this spring. A dozen horses have died in the past few weeks at Churchill Downs. One died at Pimlico Race Course, home of the Preakness and two died this past week at Belmont Park in Elmont, New York, site of the Belmont Stakes. Six horses have died at the race course since May 4.

PETA officials are outraged of course. There have been calls for suspension of track operations and for investigations.

If one horse had died at a major Tennessee Walking Horse event like the Celebration SWAT teams would have invaded the grounds. Not only the show, but the breed would be shut down during an investigation.

Thoroughbreds are fragile and their racing careers are short. But with so many untimely deaths I have to ask where are the United States Department of Agriculture officials who keep such a close high on major walking horse shows? Veterinarians do check thoroughbreds before races and scratch horses they judge unfit. But these veterinarians are not government officials.

I assume, based if nothing else on their fantastic purchase prices, that most thoroughbreds are treated well. I have not spent enough time at those barns, outside of Kentucky Derby week, to know firsthand.



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Tannehill says Hopkins would be good fit with Titans

NASHVILLE — Tennessee quarterback Ryan Tannehill met DeAndre Hopkins for the first time during the three-time All-Pro's free agent visit with the Titans.

The quarterback who turns 35 in July and is going into the final season of his contract spent some time with Hopkins and his girlfriend in what Tannehill called a nice meeting.

"I think he'd be a good fit here," Tannehill said Wednesday. "But we'll see what happens."

Hopkins made Tennessee the first stop on his free agent tour, coming into Nashville on Sunday and meeting with Titans players and coaches Monday. The five-time Pro Bowl receiver, who turned 31 earlier this month, is a free agent for the first time and is headed to New England

The Titans held their final on-field practice of the offseason Wednesday with



veterans such as Derrick Henry and twotime All-Pro Kevin Byard among those not at the final voluntary practice. Tennessee is only keeping rookies

around for the next two weeks. Hopkins can take his time as the NFL switches to vacation mode before training camps open in late July. The Titans report July 25. "I don't think there's anything that's

going to happen here today, I would imagine," Titans coach Mike Vrabel said. "But there's follow-up every time we come and have conversations, and we'll see where it goes."

Treylon Burks, currently the Titans' top receiver, also skipped Wednesday's session. That left a reminder of how young the Tennessee receiving group is with the current group combining for six touchdown catches last season. Vrabel, who played linebacker in his 14-year NFL career, had 12 in his career.

Arizona released Hopkins on May 26 in a salary cap move after failing to find a trading partner.

The Cardinals cut Hopkins three seasons after acquiring him in a blockbuster trade in 2020 with Houston and had signed him to a \$54.5 million contract extension through 2024. Hopkins would have counted close to \$31 million against the cap this season for Arizona, which took a dead cap hit of \$22.6 million.

Hopkins ranks 36th in NFL history with 11,298 yards receiving over 145 games.

Titans receivers coach Rob Moore, who played receiver himself for 10 NFL seasons, said a key for any free agent is understanding Tennessee's culture first. He declined to speculate on what Hopkins could bring to the Titans, who ranked 30th in passing yards in averaging 171.4 yards

"But we all know what a great player he's been over his career, and I think what he's done kind of speaks for himself," Moore said.

Bauer hit with another accusation, denies allegation and countersues

PHOENIX (AP) An Arizona woman has accused former major league pitcher Trevor Bauer of sexual assault, alleging in a lawsuit updated this week that he held a knife at her throat and choked her until she passed out during a rape that left her pregnant in late 2020. Bauer was never arrested

or charged and he has countersued, denying the allegations and accusing the woman of faking a pregnancy and trying to extort money from him. "Trevor Bauer categori-


cally denies this woman's unhinged allegations," the player's co-agents, Jon Fetterolf and Rachel Luba, said in a statement Wednesday.

They said she had made million-dollar several demands against Bauer over two years, prompting him to file a criminal complaint against her.

Scottsdale Police Officer Aaron Bolin confirmed Wednesday that Bauer filed a criminal complaint on Jan. 24 alleging the woman was trying to extort him, but detectives did not recommend charges to Maricopa County prosecutors. Bolin said there were also no charges recommended after the woman filed a complaint against Bauer on Dec. 20, alleging a sexual assault two years before.

The woman's accusations are laid out in a civil suit updated this week in Maricopa County Superior Court. She first sued the former Cy Young Award winner in December, and Bauer countersued in April.

The Associated Press does not typically iden-

tify people who say they have been victims of sexual assault. The woman's attorney did not immediately respond Wednesday to a voicemail seeking additional comment.

In his countersuit, Bauer said he had one consensual sexual encounter with the

woman in 2020. He said the woman later said she was pregnant and demanded \$1.6 million to end the pregnancy.

Bauer said he refused to pay that amount, but told the woman he would support her decision concerning the pregnancy and pay any medical costs, as well as child support. His said in his lawsuit that he ultimately paid \$8,761 for the expenses related to the woman's reported pregnancy and its subsequent termination.

The woman said in an updated complaint filed Tuesday that she ultimately decided not to terminate the pregnancy, but had a miscarriage.

Bauer was suspended by Major League Baseball after a woman he met in San Diego alleged that he had beaten and sexually abused her in 2021. He

denied the charges and said that anything that happened between them was consensual. Bauer was not arrested

or charged. After Bauer's suspension ended, the Los Angeles Dodgers cut him and no team picked him up. He now plays in Japan.

Esquer said. "I thought between the change and the fastball that his stress pitches were down."

She finished this season with a 22-1 record and an 0.90 ERA. In her two years at Oklahoma, she won two national titles and finished with a 44-2 record.

"I am excited to return home and be Jordy Bahl the softball player, but more importantly, the person," Bahl wrote in announcing her decision to play for the Cornhuskers. "I am excited thinking about growing the game that has provided me so many opportunities for growth, in the home state, a current overlooked state for girls in softball at all ages, and I am excited to finish the softball journey right where it began."

Bahl was a first-team National Fastpitch Coaches Association

All-American this season and a Top 10 finalist for USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year. In 2022, she was NFCA Freshman of the Year and a first-team All-American.

She pitched 24 2/3 scoreless innings at this year's Women's College World Series and was named its Most Outstanding Player. She went 4-0 at the World Series in Oklahoma City

and earned the save in the decisive championship series victory in Game 2 last week against Florida State.

The Sooners finished 61-1 and extended their Division I-record win streak to 53 games. Nebraska was 36-22 overall, finished fourth in the Big Ten and played in an NCAA regional this season

Chaos erupts in USA-Mexico match

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Four players were ejected and the match was cut short by the referee after repeated homophobic chants Thursday night.

The United States' 3-0 victory over Mexico for a spot Sunday in the CONCACAF Nations League final against Canada will be remembered as much for the ugliness as for two goals by Christian Pulisic and one by Ricardo Pepi.

Americans Weston McKennie and Sergiño Dest were ejected by Salvadoran referee Iván Barton along with Mexicans César Montes and Gerardo Arteaga during the testy second half.

"These are rivalry games. These are derby games. Things like this happen across the world and in no way am I embarrassed," B.J. Callaghan said after his first game as U.S. interim coach. "It comes from a good place. They care about each other so much in that locker room that they're standing up for each other. Sometimes does it have an issue where we take a red card? Yeah, but when you know where it comes from, you can accept it and it's a learning lesson for us."

Play was halted in the 90th minute because of homophobic chants. When action resumed, 12 minutes of stoppage time were signaled but resumed chants caused Barton to end the match in the eighth minute added minute.

FIFA fined Mexico 100,000 Swiss francs (\$108,000) in January for anti-gay chants by fans at two games,

"In terms of the chant, I want to make it very clear first and foremost, for our beliefs and our culture, it has no place in the game," Callaghan said. "It has no place in our value system."

With its first three-goal victory over Mexico in 23 years, the U.S. stretched its unbeaten streak against El Tri to six (three wins, three draws), matching the Americans' longest, from 2011-15.

The U.S. went ahead when Gio Reyna poked the ball off Montes and then while prone, poked it forward off Jorge Sánchez. Pulisic burst behind the defenders, took a pair of touches and from the edge of the 6-yard box slotted the ball past goalkeeper Guillermo Ochoa.

McKennie started the move toward the second goal with a long pass down a flank to Weah, who crossed. A sprinting Pulisic got behind Israel Reyes and Sánchez, stabbing the ball in with his left foot from 6 yards,

Montes was given a straight red card in the 69th for kicking Balogun while the two were challenging. McKennie was given a red card two minutes later for placing a hand on Sánchez's neck during the ensuing arguing and shoving.

Pepi scored his seventh international goal, receiving a pass from Dest, taking a touch and rounding Ochoa. Dest and Arteaga were sent off in the 86th for shoving each other.

Oklahoma's Storako and Haley Lee, Florida State's Kathryn Sandercock, Oklahoma State's Rachel Becker and Kiley Naomi and Alabama's Montana Fouts were drafted by both but have not signed.

The leagues are riding softball's rising wave of popularity. And if USA Softball has its way, the two leagues will work together for the overall betterment of the sport.

WPF started last year with two teams playing the traditional team style. Former Oklahoma star Jocelyn Alo decided to play for WPF last year after setting the home run record for Division I softball. She helped make the league's first season successful enough that it added the Oklahoma City Spark and the Austin Smoke to the USSSA Pride and the Smash It Sports Vipers for this season. Action begins Thursday. Access to the WPF Dugout Pass can be purchased.

The college game

The college game continues to post strong numbers, feeding interest in the pro game. On-site attendance at the Women's College World Series in Oklahoma City set a new record this year of 12,290 fans per session. The championship series averaged 1.6 million viewers on ESPN, with Game 2 pulling in 1.9 million, a 7% increase over last year.

As college softball has flourished, so have attempts to capitalize. Women's Professional Fastpitch, founded by USSSA, USA Softball, and Smash It Sports, hosted its first inperson draft in April and chose 24 players. Athletes Unlimited chose 14 players the next month.

er Sydney McKinney, two-time college batting champion and Athletes Unlimited's No. 1 overall pick, likes being part of a pro league that increases the sport's visibility.

"It just gives so much

WPF commissioner Lauren Chamberlain likes what Athletes Unlimited is doing. She hopes that down the road, the leagues can steer clear of each other or even merge.

"I think the folks at AU are doing a great job," Chamberlain said. "I think their concept is incredible. And again, it's giving opportunities to more professional softball players. So I do see something in the future. I'm really excited, but I wish them the best of luck in their season and hopefully they do for us."

Cheri Kempf, senior vice president of Athletes Unlimited and its head of softball, said there are more elite softball players than roster spots, so the more opportunities the better.

"I think that's where the win is," she said. "If we can find ways when there are multiple opportunities in a sport, if you can find ways to work together and to make those opportunities more instead of less and make the opportunity bigger and versus making a player choose either/or, then that's when we succeed in this sports entertainment space, in growing women's sports in general."

Ohio to mandate defibrillators in schools, sports venues after Hamlin's collapse

COLUMBUS, Ohio —

Automatic external defibrillators, or AEDs, could be placed in nearly every school or sports and recreation venue in Ohio under a proposal that cleared the Republican-dominated House Wednesday with overwhelming bipartisan support.

The legislation, sparked by the sudden cardiac arrest of Buffalo Bills player Damar Hamlin in January on the field during a football game in Cincinnati, would require that all public schools, municipally-owned sports and recreation locations such as gymnasiums and swimming pools, and some private schools have on-site AEDs.

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Current Ohio law allows school districts to require AEDs on site, but it's an elective decision that's left to individual districts.

State Rep. Adam Bird of New Richmond, one of the bill's sponsors, said he's confident many districts already have AEDs, but making it a requirement can help further protect students.

Under the bill, employees would be required to undergo special training on how to use AEDs and recognize the signs of cardiac arrest. Informational sessions for students on sudden cardiac arrest would be required before the start of any athletic season.

emergency action plan for schools, centers and sports groups to adopt on the use of AEDs.

Hamlin went into cardiac arrest, fell flat and had to be resuscitated on the field after making what appeared to be a routine tackle during a game against the Cincinnati Bengals that was being broadcast to a national prime-time audi-

ence on Jan. 2. More than two dozen

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supporters showed up to testify on the bill in committee hearings, including medical groups, emergency responders and those whose lives were saved by having access to an AED during a cardiac episode. All supported the possible new requirement as a way to save lives that may oth-

erwise end too soon.

The proposal now heads to the Senate for consider-

ation.



Battle to replace Brady to extend into minicamp

TAMPA, Fla. — The Tampa Bay Buccaneers aren't in a rush to declare a winner in the competition for Tom Brady's old

While 2018 No. 1 overall draft pick Baker Mayfield and inexperienced third-year pro Kyle Trask continue to make strides in learning a new offense being installed this offseason, coach Todd Bowles says he won't announce a starting quarterback before training camp begins late next

"Some time during camp or right after there will be a decision made," Bowles said during the team's mandatory minicamp this week.

"It's still a competition right now. We're not going to award (anybody) in shorts and T-shirts," Bowles added. "In any competition, there's waiting involved. You have to see who wins."

Mayfield, the first pick in the 2018 draft by the Cleveland Browns, is with his fourth team in six seasons after signing a oneyear contract that could be worth up to \$8.5 million. The 28-year-old is 31-38 as a NFL starter, including 2-8 with the Carolina Panthers and Los Angeles Rams in 2022.

Trask was a secondround pick of the Bucs in 2021 and spent the past two years as the thirdstringer behind Brady and Blaine Gabbert. He made his regular-season debut last January, competing 3 of 9 passes for 23 yards against Atlanta in a Week 18 loss that had no bearing on the NFC South standings or Tampa Bay's playoff seeding.

"Tom is just a pro through and through, so that was such a blessing quarterback room filled with him, Blaine and Ryan (Griffin)," said Trask, a Heisman Trophy finalist at Florida who was drafted two months after Brady led the Bucs to the second Super Bowl title in franchise history.

"They had all the experience in the world," Trask added, "so just to come into that room and just try to soak up as much knowledge while I was in there, that is a priceless experience for me."

Brady retired for the second — and what the seven-time Super Bowl winner insists is the last – time in February.

Mayfield, who led the Browns to one playoff berth in four seasons, is excited about the prospect of jumpstarting his career in a system being installed by new offensive coordinator Dave Canales, who takes over play-calling following the firing of Byron Leftwich.

Canales spent the past 13 years working for Pete Carroll — first at USC, and then with the Seattle Seahawks, where he played a role in quarterback Geno Smith earning AP Comeback Player of the Year honors last

Teammates say it has been fun to watch Mayfield and Trask compete during voluntary workouts spread over three weeks and a threeday mandatory minicamp that concluded Thursday.

Bowles, meanwhile, isn't concerned that waiting until training camp to make a decision might hinder the eventual winner from getting an adequate amount of work with the rest of the starters ahead of the regularseason opener.

"I feel comfortable with where I'm at right now. Now, it's about making sure that my comfortability resonates with everyone else," said Mayfield, who spent the first four years of his career in Cleveland before beginning the 2022 season with Carolina and finishing with the Rams.

"The quarterback's job is to make sure everybody gets on the same page and make sure we breathe that confidence throughout the whole team," Mayfield added. "I feel good with where I am at right now, but there is obviously always room to improve."

Despite winning their second consecutive NFC South title and third straight playoff berth with Brady at quarterback, the Bucs struggled offensively and finished with a losing record. One of the reasons was the absence of a consistent running game.



Tennessee spring turkey harvest reported

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency has compiled figures from the state's recently completed 2023 spring wild turkey hunting season. The total reported harvest is 31,802, a six percent increase from 2022 and a two percent decrease over the previous 5-year average (32,495).

The season saw changes with a twoweek later opening date than in previous years and the bag limit reduced from three birds to two birds, only one of which could be a juvenile or jake.

Harvest at the beginning of the season was extremely high and then dropped considerably as the season progressed. Harvest on private land during the 2-day Young Sportsman Hunt and the opening weekend were 71 percent and 45 percent higher than the respective 5-year averages, but by 20 days into the season, reported harvest was above the 5-year average by only 11 percent.

"The steep drop-off in harvest as the season continued may be attributed to the lower bag limit," said Roger Shields, TWRA Wild Turkey Program Coordinator. "As hunters reached their 2-bird limit, they had to stop hunting. In the past, they may have continued hunting and harvested additional birds."

Despite the slow finish to the season, a total of 25,500 hunters reported harvesting at least one turkey, 20 percent greater than the 5-year average of successful hunters.

Athletics clear major hurdle in possible relocation to Vegas

CARSON CITY, Nev. - The Oakland Athletics cleared a major hurdle for their planned relocation to Las Vegas after the Nevada Legislature gave final approval on Wednesday to public funding for a portion of a proposed \$1.5 billion stadium with a retractable

The deal that backers said will help further establish Las Vegas as the new "entertainment and sports capital of the world" still needs the governor's signature, and MLB still must approve the A's move to the Las Vegas Strip, but both are anticipated. The Assembly approved

the final version of the bill with \$380 million in taxpayer money on a 25-15 vote after making minor changes to the measure the Senate approved on a 13-8 vote Tuesday just hours before the Vegas Golden Knights won the Stanley Cup. The Senate accepted the

changes with no debate on a voice vote Wednesday night and sent it to the governor's desk as an "emergency measure" adopted during the special legislative session that convened with Democratic majorities in both houses June 7. Republican Gov. Joe Lombardo had proposed the

stadium spending plan. The governor's office

didn't immediately respond

to requests for comments

Wednesday night from The Associated Press. The A's said in a statement released by the team they look forward to "Lombardo's signature as our next step" as they "work to bring the Athletics to Las Vegas."

The \$380 million in public funding would mainly come from \$180 million in transferable tax credits and \$120 million in county bonds. Backers have pledged that the creation of a special tax district around the proposed stadium — that would be the smallest in Major League Baseball — would generate enough money to pay off those bonds and interest. The plan would not directly raise taxes.

The Nevada plan had revived the national debate over public funding for private sports clubs. A's representatives and some Nevada tourism officials have said the measure could add to Las Vegas' growing sports scene and act as an economic engine. But a growing chorus of economists and some lawmakers have warned that such a project would bring minimal benefits when compared to the hefty public price tag.




















According to the National Council on Aging, one in 10 older adults experience elder abuse, but a study by the National Center on Elder Abuse estimates only one in 24 cases are reported.

Tennessee collected \$7.1M in sports gambling taxes in May

The Center Square -Tennessee collected \$7.1 million in privilege taxes on mobile sports betting in May, which is nearly \$2 million more than the state would have collected under a new tax structure set to begin on July 1.

Tennessee taxes sportsbooks 20% on adjusted gross income for now but will shift to a 1.85% tax on gross wagers starting in July. Over the past two years, most of the state's sportsbooks were not hitting the 10% profit mark required by the state.

But since a change in accounting regulations of

AGI last July, that has shifted, and in May the sports-

books made 12.8% in AGI. Tennessee's Sports Wagering Advisory Council is scheduled to meet at 9 a.m. Thursday to discuss the specifics of rules for the new laws going into effect on July 1. Those rules involve the specifics of registration fees for new operators in the state.

Since July 1, 2022, Tennessee has collected \$82.6 million in taxes, and, under the new taxing system, that would have been \$69 million.

Tennessee is the only state that will tax sportsbooks based on gross wagers.
