If you are unable to attend during distribution hours and need food assistance, call 719-850-2643.

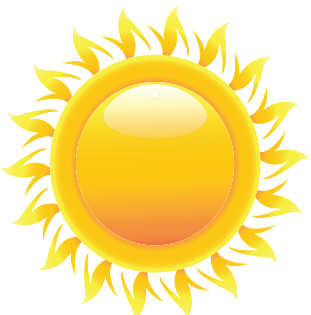
Center Public Works installing new stop signs

Waters: Why are you running

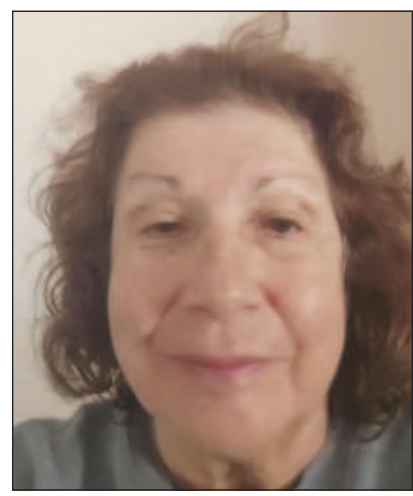
for the board?

Poor Boy Car Club founder Richard Garcia recently presented Dahle with a check for \$2,000.

Dahle's husband, Chris, was extremely grateful to the car club.

"We had heard that the car club was going to make a donation, but we had no idea how much," Chris Dahle said. "We saw the donation and we were like wow. The cost of getting to and from cancer treatments is so hard. This has really made such a huge difference for us. We are shocked and grateful to Richard and the car club for what they have done. This really shows you how truly generous people from the Valley can be. I mean people kind of keep to themselves but when somebody is in trouble, people here band together and help each other out. It's just one of the great things in this community. We are very grateful and truly appreciate it. We hope we can either pay it forward someday or recommend someone else who might need help too."

Christi Dahle spoke about some of her journey. "I was diagnosed with breast cancer this summer. This was going to be our summer. It was our 25th wedding anniversary. We were going to do some nice things this summer and everything hit," she said.

Chris Dahle added, "We were at the hospital, and she had her mammogram on our anniversary. Then they got her in and did the biopsy on our anniversary, and on her birthday was when we got the positive result back for cancer. It was just hard; the timing was just hard. Everything we had planned to do on celebratory days, turned out to be days of more bad news. It was hard. She is

so brave. We are all proud of her here. We have had to drive up for chemotherapy and that's been hard too."

Christi Dahle spoke about her journey.

"We have an amazing support team," she said. "Everybody that I have talked to in the San Luis Valley that has had cancer, has said they went through this particular center in Colorado Springs, and they are really good. They are so positive there. The drive has been hard. It's been hard to get up at 3:30 every morning and drive. For different reasons we have felt like we can't get up there the night before. They have been so good about scheduling all our appointments on the same day too, but it is a lot."

Christi Dahle said she has done her initial chemotherapy appointments and is now facing surgery with a longer road to go.

Chris Dahle stated that he and his wife have about a year and a half to go before anything will be over, along with medication for many years after. He believes that they will be through the worst of it by the end of the year, but Christi will need chemotherapy after that.

"Despite all of this we are on the upswing though. Christi is very positive," he said.

"We have no other option," Christi said. "We are going to get through this. The support has just been amazing. From our church family, the community, the car club, everyone. We have had people bringing

us meals. We appreciate everyone so much."

Christi Dahle said that when Christi went back to teach that everyone was wearing t-shirts one day that stated, "Together we fight in Christi."

Christi Dahle said she did not expect the car club donation at all. With tears in her voice Dahle said, "It totally caught me off guard. I was not expecting any of that. My jaw was on the floor, it was so amazing. The donation was presented to me at a staff meeting at the school. Richard Garcia was there, this happened two weeks ago. I was just completely amazed by the generosity that was shown to us."

Garcia was proud to issue the donation to Christi Dahle and said, "We are so happy to be able to help such a wonderful person in our community. It is our hope that it helps her, and she gets better very soon. We are so happy that we were able to help her."

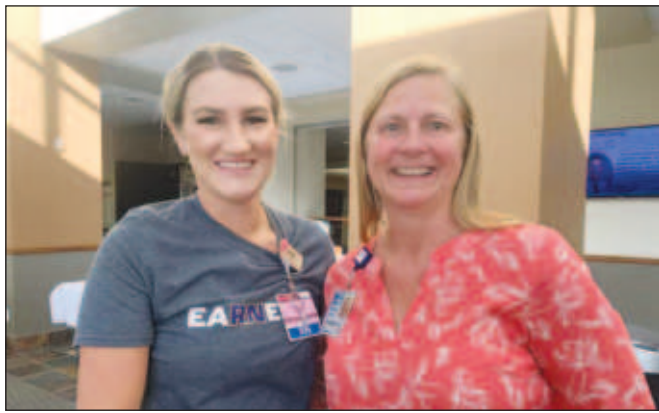

The diagnosis was the autoimmune disease ITP (Idiopathic Thrombocytopenic Purpura). The DAISY Foundation was established in 1999 by the family of J. Patrick Barnes who died from complications of the autoimmune disease Idiopathic Thrombocytopenia Purpura (ITP) at the age of 33. DAISY is an acronym for Diseases Attacking the Immune System. The family wanted to recognize the nurses for providing extraordinary care to their loved ones.

something that could and would attract new, highly qualified educators to our district. I also think that we always strive for academic achievement and that goes hand in hand with having qualified educators in the field. This helps our students grow.

Waters: Are there any issues confronting the entire board?

Lenberg: I think there are several areas they [the board] have been addressing right along and I would like to contribute to that. Safety as always. They have upgraded the safety process. Addressing parent needs in conjunction with students

to keep our students in school is a high priority. Helping people understand that education is really a vital part of success.

Waters: As a lifelong educator, do you have any ideas on how to address the student attendance issue? It is my understanding is that in the post-pandemic period, it has been difficult to get students back into classrooms.

Lenberg: Yes, that has been a challenge. I'm not sure what we need to do. We need to have discussions with parents and try and figure out what their needs are. We're going to have to do a lot of exploring of different ideas. We're in a new time and people's needs are different, and we need to take

those ideas that people offer us and try to develop and foster good programs so that parents do get their kids to school. In a four-day week, you would hope that absenteeism would be almost nil, and so far that is not happening.

Waters: Is there anything else you would like to discuss?

Lenberg: I want to learn as much as possible and I hope to do a good job of representing not only the district that I'm in but also this community. We have some really incredible people in this district, both students and personnel. We are very fortunate. This is a very diverse community and we need to address all of these things so that we can grow.

building at the corner of 6th Street and San Juan about a year ago, he had no idea that an almost casual question would lead to the creation of a one-of-a-kind, progressive partnership.

BGCSLV was in significant need of administrative office space. When Miltenberger took the helm in 2018, the organization had seven staff and one site. Under his direction and just five years later, BGCSLV now has almost 60 staff and eight — soon to be nine — sites. But rapid growth left 15 administrative staff without offices. Desks placed in spaces also used for BGC-SLV programs with kids wasn't working out, for anyone.

In June of 2022, Miltenberger went on the hunt for office space to rent.

"(BGCSLV) has a moral obligation to keep our money local and help the downtown economy," he said. "We looked at space across from Friday Health and on the outside of town. We knew the Democrats were going to vacate offices in the building on San Juan, so we thought we should take a look."

As the saying goes, timing is everything.

The building has an interesting history. Built in the late 1920s, it was the location of the first automotive dealer in Alamosa. For the past 27 years, it has been the site of a little known but very successful company that made Hawaiian cookies to sell in other markets. The owners of the building — the Peter Tamada family trust and their partners, the Yoshimuras — were considering their options as health concerns had prompted them to "make a shift."

When Tammy Yoshimura saw Miltenberger checking out the building, she came outside and asked if she could help him.

Miltenberger's goal was to rent a space flexible enough to provide a few private offices but also a common area where people could meet and "pop up" their laptop to do some work but also permanent enough to keep "their stuff" on site. "We looked at the space and thought... yeah, we could make this work."

And then Yoshimura asked him if he wanted to

see the rest of the building. That simple question changed the entire trajectory of things.

"I had no idea what we were walking into, but as soon as I started looking around, all these things started to align. How do we preserve a building so that real estate prospectors from California don't buy it, have it sit vacant until it appreciates in value and then flip it? How can we use this building to meet communal needs?"

In a twist to what Miltenberger calls the "genesis" story, his questions were answered.

"The night after we took the tour, I had a dream that we were in this building working together with other non-profits. Literally, I had a dream about Jason Medina [Community Foundation of the SLV], Liza Marron [founding director of SLV Local Food Coalition] and Mick Daniel [SLV GO!] and we were all in this building working together."

Miltenberger's dream was prophetic. As soon as other non-profit partners heard that he was looking for space, he started getting calls. SLV GO! had grown and needed more room. Southwest Conservation Corps' three crews were transporting a trailer full of equipment back and forth to Salida every day because they had no place to store it safely in Alamosa. SLV Gen Wild was looking for space as was SLV Local Food Coalition who needed more commercial kitchen space and other resources.

"All these incredible assets in this building played into what was needed. The commercial kitchen is one. Office space is another."

And, thus, was born The Hub.

Although parts of the building are still undergoing extensive renovation, the potential of the 13,000 square foot building is enormous. There is a garage space that will accommodate crews with Southwest Conservation Corps. A large commercial kitchen will not only provide needed space to SLV Local Food Coalition, but also space for caterers and cottage food operators who need larger, commercial-grade facilities for food preparation. There is space for a "gear library" where people can check out kayaks, stand-up paddle boards, or fat tire bikes for biking on sand, snow

or mud. Miltenberger envisions another weekend space for art and entertainment catering to adolescents. Office spaces currently under renovation have skylights that fill the rooms with natural light. And, in support of downtown merchants, one large space is currently being used for storage of commercial merchandise.

But the building will also accommodate smaller organizations. "There are 150 registered non-profits in the San Luis Valley, and the majority of those are run out of homes. So, how do we support those non-profits?"

Starting in October, The Hub is offering subscriptions for \$100 a month where foundation partners, government partners (think community outreach directors for a member of the House or Senate), and small non-profits can access a completely renovated flex-space accommodating individuals in need of Wi-fi for a Zoom call or to pop up a lap top and do some printing or staff members who need a place to meet.

All of this is just scratching the surface of what is possible. But Miltenberger also has a larger goal in mind.

Up until 2017, the building was occupied by a Nurse Practitioner who was charged with 50 counts of felony distribution of controlled substances following an investigation that revealed thousands of prescriptions for controlled substance written within a year's time. Those prescriptions led to the deaths of three people and countless lives destroyed.

"It was probably the largest drug operation in southern Colorado. This building is about restoration and undoing damage done in people's lives." He pauses and then says, "This building has a lot of work to do."

For those who were hungry, tacos were provided by Tacos Martinez in a taco truck outside of the center while, inside, there were activities for the kids and resource tables with information available to the community.

Despite how easy they consistently make it look, the event was the result

of significant effort from ASD's Jamie Madigan and the Family Center's director Courtney Vigil (who couldn't attend due to COVID) along with a large number of individuals and organizations who logged long hours behind the scenes, including the Planning Committee, Shooting Stars, PALS, SLV Behavioral Health Group, Alamosa Public Library, Center for Restorative Programs, SLV AHEC, Boys and Girls Clubs of the San Luis

Op-Ed: Rio Grande County Commissioners oppose Prop HH

Dear Citizens of Rio Grande County and Other Colorado Voters,

The Rio Grande County Board of County Commissioners firmly believes citizens should have a say in matters of taxation and public spending. The November 2023 ballot presents this opportunity. The Commissioners also believe an informed vote requires clear and concise ballot language adequately describing the impact of a “yes” or “no” vote. The Colorado General Assembly passed legislation signed into law by the Governor on May 24, 2023, known as Senate Bill 23-303 “Reduce Property Taxes And Voter-approved Revenue Change” which is a lengthy 48-page bill that is neither clear nor concise and contains a question referred for voter approval identified on the ballot as “Proposition HH”.

The referred ballot measure language specified is “SHALL THE STATE REDUCE PROPERTY TAXES FOR HOMES AND BUSINESSES, INCLUDING EXPANDING PROPERTY TAX RELIEF FOR SENIORS, AND BACK-FILL COUNTIES, WATER DISTRICTS, FIRE DISTRICTS, AMBULANCE AND HOSPITAL DISTRICTS, AND OTHER LOCAL GOVERNMENTS AND FUND SCHOOL DISTRICTS BY USING A PORTION OF THE STATE SURPLUS UP TO THE PROPOSITION HH CAP AS DEFINED IN THIS MEASURE?”

The Commissioners believe the ballot question is intentionally misleading and fails to specify several important facts to inform a voter’s choice. The ballot question does not specify the amount of taxes to be reduced; does not specify what the expanded property tax relief for seniors consists of; does not specify the amount of backfill to local governments and special taxing districts; does not indicate the “state surplus” consists of tax dollars collected over the current Tax Payer Bill of Rights (TABOR) cap that would otherwise be refunded to tax payers and; does not specify the new TABOR cap would allow government to grow at a greater rate than inflation and population.

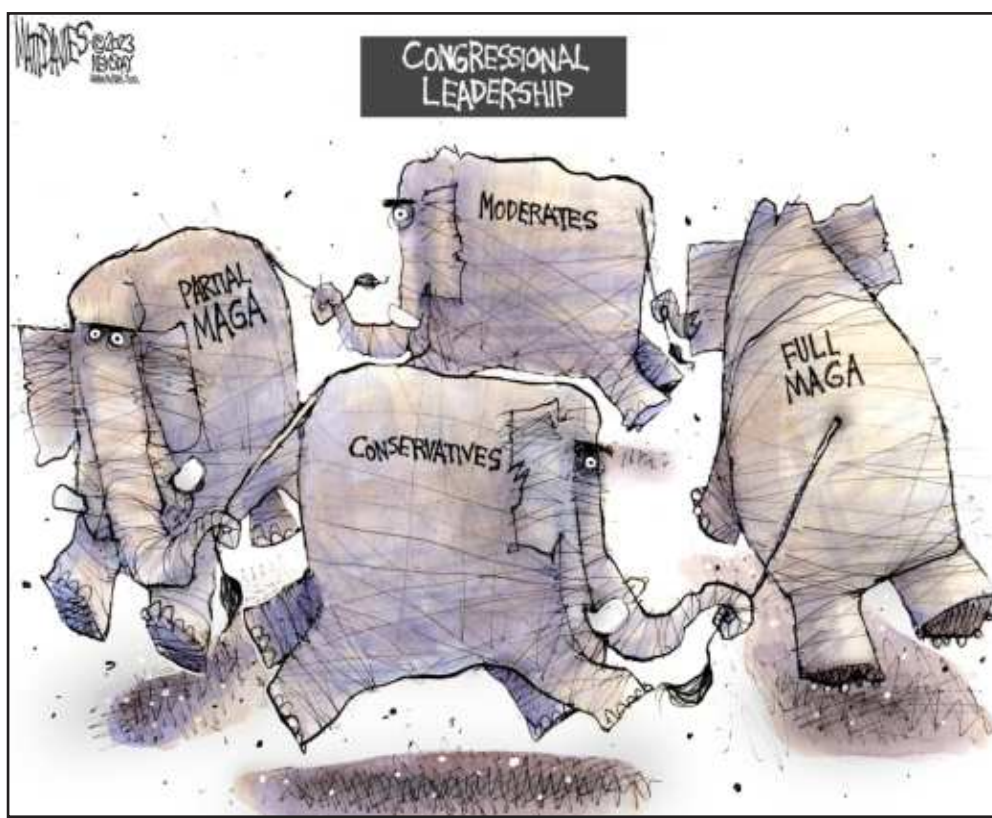
If approved, Prop HH would allow government entities to increase their mill levies, over and above the “revenue limitation”, without a vote of the taxpayers. It would also authorize a 25% increase in the annual growth rate in the state spending limit, adding dollars to the state’s largest budget on record and would allow the state of Colorado to collect and spend an additional \$9 billion funded by this significant increase in taxes.

The ballot question also allows the state legislature to extend Prop HH through 2040 producing a \$21 billion net tax increase, all without voter approval. Conservative estimates indicate the average homeowner would face a net tax increase of more than \$400 per year through 2032 due to the loss of TABOR refunds.

Prop HH also threatens local control of property tax revenue for local governments and its tax-paying base. Prop HH transfers decision making from the local level to the Governor’s office and the state legislature. This measure strikes down more than 100 years of precedence in Colorado and further consolidates power at the State level.

The Rio Grande County Commissioners are strongly opposed to Prop HH and urge all citizens of Rio Grande County and the State of Colorado to vote “NO” on Prop HH on the November 2023 ballot as it clearly violates the State Constitution, seems purposefully written to mislead voters, and obscures the fact that passage would eliminate future TABOR refunds and reduce the limits placed on the growth of state government.

The White House dog scandal

Last week, President Joe Biden’s German shepherd Commander bit a Secret Service agent. That marked the 11th time — yes, the 11th time — that Commander had bitten one of the agents and other Secret Service officers who guard the president. Some of the attacks left wounds requiring medical attention, and at least one required hospital care for Commander’s victim.

Obviously, the dog should have been removed from the White House a long time ago. What other workplace would allow a dog, even the boss’s dog, to remain after biting at least 11 people? I say “at least” because there are 11 known incidents, but it’s not clear that all the incidents are known. The situation is actually a scandal, and it reflects badly on Biden, who apparently does not care if his dog repeatedly attacks the people who protect him.

The public would not know about any of this had the conservative legal group Judicial Watch not filed a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit seeking Secret Service emails and other records. Among the documents handed over was an email from Nov. 3, 2022 that said Commander had bitten a Uniform Division officer two times, once in the upper right arm and also in the officer’s thigh. After being bitten twice, the officer used a steel cart to shield himself from the attacking dog. Then, according to the emails, “White House medical treated the officer and made the decision to have [the officer] transported to a hospital.”

In case anyone thinks the president and first lady Jill Biden don’t know what is happening, consider this email from Oct. 26, 2022. “Recently Commander has been exhibiting extremely aggressive behavior,” a Secret Service officer wrote.

“Today, while posted, he came charging at me. The First Lady couldn’t regain control of Commander and he continued to circle me. I believe it’s only a matter of time before an agent/officer is attacked or bit. He would have bitten me today if I didn’t step towards him a couple different times. It was bad enough that the agent on the detail asked if I got bit.” Mrs. Biden apparently witnessed the whole incident.

When the first news of Commander’s attacks came out in July, the White House issued a statement suggesting Commander has been under a lot of stress and that the Bidens were “working through ways” to improve the situation. “The White House complex is a unique and often stressful environment for family pets,” the statement said, “and the First Family is working through ways to make this situation better for everyone. They have been partnering with the Secret Service and Executive Residence staff on additional leashing protocols and training, as well as establishing designated areas for Commander to run and exercise.”

Now we have news of another attack. And the White House has issued another insubstantial statement. “The First Family continues to work on ways to help Commander handle the often unpredictable nature of the White House grounds,” a White House statement said. “The President and First Lady are incredibly grateful to the Secret Service and Executive Residence staff for all they do to keep them, their family, and the country safe.”

The reaction is similar to a 2021 situation involving Biden’s previous German shepherd, Major, who also bit a number of people in the White House. President Biden called Major a “sweet dog,” while

a White House spokesman said the dog was “still adjusting to his new surroundings.” Major was eventually sent to the Bidens’ home in Delaware.

Now, incredibly, after Commander’s attacks, the situation has become something of a joke. On Monday, Politico published a story headlined, “Commander’s taste buds,” which noted that Commander seems to bite only Secret Service personnel and not White House staff. “Among staff, there is an emerging belief that, in the eyes of Commander, they are off limits,” Politico reported, “that the dog only has an appetite for the Secret Service.”

In fact, the article said, Commander is quite popular with White House staff. “Everyone loves him,” one anonymous worker was quoted as saying. “He’s always so friendly.”

One might think the situation is just great, with the exception of all those people who have been bitten and had to have medical care, in one case hospital care. In the non-White House world, a dog that has done what Commander has done might well be euthanized, and without a doubt would be removed from the area where he attacked people over and over and over. But not President Biden’s dog.

Now, the president appears to be trying to explain away the situation. Biden didn’t really want the dog, Politico reported, but felt he had to accept the pet. “When Biden’s brother James gave Commander to the president for his birthday in 2021 after Major had been sent away — and as the first family was still grieving the loss of their longtime German shepherd Champ — it caught the White House off guard,” Politico reported. “A person close to the Bidens said that the president and first lady initially weren’t thrilled to be introducing a new puppy into their chaotic White House life, but they felt like they couldn’t turn down a gift from a well-meaning family member.”

Only in Washington does a politician do damage control by distancing himself from his dog.

So what now? The first thing to say is that this is not funny. It’s not a story about “Commander’s taste buds.” It’s about a president who has allowed his White House to become a dangerous assignment for the agents who protect him. A president who puts his dog over the men and women who put their own lives on the line to save the president of the United States. As Joe Biden might say -- not a joke. So when will the president do something about it?

RIP, Marius Aurelius Spartanicus: the priest's dog

Catholic priests are not used to hearing penitents laugh while lined up for confession.

When Father Joseph Krupp peered out of the booth one day, he saw that his broad-chested, 72-pound boxer was in a chair and, when the line moved, the dog took the next chair.

Everyone knew this hound had sins to confess, after raiding wedding receptions, opening church fridges and, on one occasion, scarfing down a three-pound roast. Krupp laughs when describing how the latest of his rescued dogs "absolutely murdered" a rabbit -- next to a statue of St. Francis of Assisi, patron saint of all creatures great and small.

The priest said he has intentionally adopted old dogs, hoping to "give them a few happy years. ... I always thought that I was trying to heal the dogs. This time, God sent the dog to heal me."

This canine parable began during a tough stretch in the priest's work in a number of Michigan parishes. Krupp has served as chaplain for the Michigan State University football team, led the university Catholic campus ministry and now supervises the state's Northeastern Deanery, with 12 parishes and four schools.

The priest went to the Hillsdale Humane Society eight years ago to donate a bed, toys and food after his latest dog died. Then he saw a battered, "broken-hearted" boxer no one wanted.

"He was found tied to a tree, along with another dog. The other dog had died of starvation, and he was close to it. He had been shot with numerous pellets, his tail was broken, and a lot of his teeth were missing," wrote Krupp to his many @JoeInBlack readers on X (formerly Twitter).

The dog was hours from death, but shelter workers saved him.

As Krupp arrived, a former student "sent me a message. She told me she was praying for me, and God told her that He was going to give me a remarkable gift that day. I walked in just as they were walking a dog out," he wrote. "He lifted his head, saw me and ran at me so hard and fast that the leash came out of the volunteer's hand. I sat on the floor, and he jumped on me, licking me and pushing me to the ground. I just couldn't quit laughing."

This particular priest is 6-foot-1 and 270 pounds, so it isn't easy to pin him down. Krupp named the dog Marius Aurelius Spartanicus, after a Roman general he was studying at the time.

Veterinarians estimated the dog was at least 7 years old and boxers live about a decade. Thus, Marius was at least 15 when he died last week.

Christian thinkers through the ages -- ranging from St. Augustine of Hippo to Methodist pio-

neer John Wesley -- have pondered whether animals, especially pets, will be in heaven. Oxford don C.S. Lewis wrote that it's "possible that certain animals may have an immortality, not in themselves, but in the immortality of their masters." If animals exist in heaven, perhaps "the man will know his dog: the dog will know its master and, in knowing him, will be itself."

Krupp said he knows children will be asking him about Marius.

"I take a kind of perverse joy in listening to the many people who are absolutely sure that ani-

mals don't go to heaven, as well as the folks who are absurdly sure that they do," he said. "I want to say, 'Hey! You don't know that! I, for sure, don't know God's mind."

"But this is God we're talking about. And we're talking about the pain felt by a kid who cannot fathom life without his dog. So, I'm not going to say what God can or can't do."

Here is another relevant question: In an age of loneliness and stress, should more Catholic priests have pets?

"Dogs are never cruel. ... I also think that some

random, happy chaos in a priest's life can be a good thing," said Krupp. "Priests work hard, and we face a lot of death, sorrow and conflict. I think some clergy need dogs because they want one. Then there are clergy who may not want a dog, but they probably need one."

"I'm not sure if I'll have another dog after Marius. I'm going to leave that up to God."

In the large Junior Varsity Boys division, junior Summit Mashburn crushed the field and gained 19 places to a hard earned 31st. Coming off a pre-season shoulder injury, in his first and last race of his high school career, senior Gus Miller started

at the very back of the 107-rider field. Miller crossed the finish line to a huge round of applause from the crowd, placing 95th.

In his last high school career race, senior Tyler Roberts finished 34th in his 3 lap Varsity Boys division race. Roberts celebrated 7 years as a Rattler and was awarded a belt buckle from the Colorado League for competing in all four of his high school years.

Also racing three laps, senior Valerie Goodland pushed to a respectable 10th place finish in the Varsity Girls division.

The Rattlers compete in the Piedra Division of the Colorado High School Cycling League. There were four regular season races and a state competition for the seven racers that qualified. The team heads to Greenwood Springs on Oct. 21 for the state championships.

Colorado clean energy employment rises to 64,000, doubling fossil fuel jobs

Colorado's fast-growing clean energy sector today employs more than twice as many workers statewide as the fossil fuel industry, a report released this week by a trade association found.

The Clean Jobs Colorado report, released annually by clean energy business group E2, analyzed 2022 federal employment data and counted nearly 64,000 Coloradans employed across a range of categories including energy efficiency, renewable electricity generation and clean vehicles. That's more than double the roughly 30,000 Coloradans directly employed by coal, oil and natural gas, according to E2's analysis.

"Clean energy jobs are not only critical to the health of the energy industry but also increasingly important driving Colorado's overall economy forward," Susan Nedell, E2's Mountain West advocate, said in a press release. "And this trend will only increase in the coming years as clean energy jobs make up more and more of new jobs."

Clean energy employers in Colorado added 2,700 jobs last year, and employment has grown about 11% faster within the industry than in the state's economy as a whole since 2020.

"If our lawmakers want to keep and continue attracting these good paying jobs to Colorado we need their support for policies that can ensure Colorado

workers and businesses reap the economic benefits from the clean energy transition," Nedell added.

Amid a push by Gov. Jared Polis and Democratic lawmakers to accelerate the transition to 100% renewable energy, Colorado is one of only six states in the country to have more than 5,000 workers employed in both solar and wind energy, and ranks 7th nationwide in total renewable generation jobs.

The energy efficiency sector, which includes both traditional HVAC services and renewable or high-efficiency alternatives, accounted for about half of Colorado's total clean energy jobs in 2022, according to E2's analysis.

Though hardly a traditional car manufacturing

hub, Colorado now has nearly 5,000 workers in the clean vehicle sector. State leaders have touted the jobs created by new and expanded facilities planned by EV battery manufacturers, including a lithium-ion factory in Brighton and an innovative solid-state battery plant in Thornton.

"Proven by these new numbers, Colorado remains one of the most promising regions for renewable energy and energy storage development," said Mike Kruger, president of the Colorado Solar and Storage Association. "And as the new clean energy projects announced in the past year have shown, Colorado is proving it can compete with anyone for future workers and investment."

The Wellness Center's Teaching Kitchen will coach people with dietary needs on how to select and prepare meals utilizing nutrient-dense foods, which are available locally. Learn what ingredients are best and how to create a lifestyle of healthy eating.

Encouraging teams of people with common needs to provide support to one another can help with people's success in attaining health goals.

With a focus on good ingredients, the Teaching Kitchen will use fresh herbs grown from the Living Herb Wall in the Center's Garden Meeting Room or food grown in the geodesic dome greenhouse.

Nutrition classes will be offered, and participants can learn how a plant-slant diet leads to a healthier life. Benefits include boosting immunity, strengthening bones, and helping the digestive system function.

People living in the Blue Zones stay active; they daily partake in low-intensity activities like gardening, cooking, housework, yard work, kneading their own bread, walking, dancing, and socializing.

Moving matters. The concept of keeping active and moving naturally throughout each day is crucial to longevity. Exercise reduces stress, boosts your energy and mood, enhances memory and ability to focus, improves sleep quality, and helps with weight loss and maintenance.

The Wellness Center's Fitness Center and Studio will facilitate physical activity. Take a new movement therapy class or release endorphins by testing out a variety of equipment.

The center will offer classes such as Tai Chi or get your hands in the dirt and work in the greenhouse gardens to be located in the Geodesic Dome nearby.

Exiting the Fitness Center door, you can connect to eight miles

of natural single-track walking trails in Del Norte's Lookout Mountain Park. Research has shown there is a correlation between happiness and time outdoors spent in nature and around nature.

The Wellness Center provides Quiet Rooms for folks to downshift, focus on their breathing, relax, reflect, and perhaps meditate.

The Center will provide information on community events and opportune ways people can gain satisfaction and pride by giving back to their community, improving the quality of life of others in the Valley may additionally improve your well-being.

Connecting with others is another Blue Zone concept. According to specialists, if you have strong family and social connections, you are more likely to have stronger immune systems and live longer. The Wellness Center's Community Lounge will be a great location to meet with friends. Face-to-face time with other people helps with a sense of belonging. Surrounding yourself with a circle of friends who share your commitment to a healthy lifestyle plays a role in happiness and managing stress in your daily life.

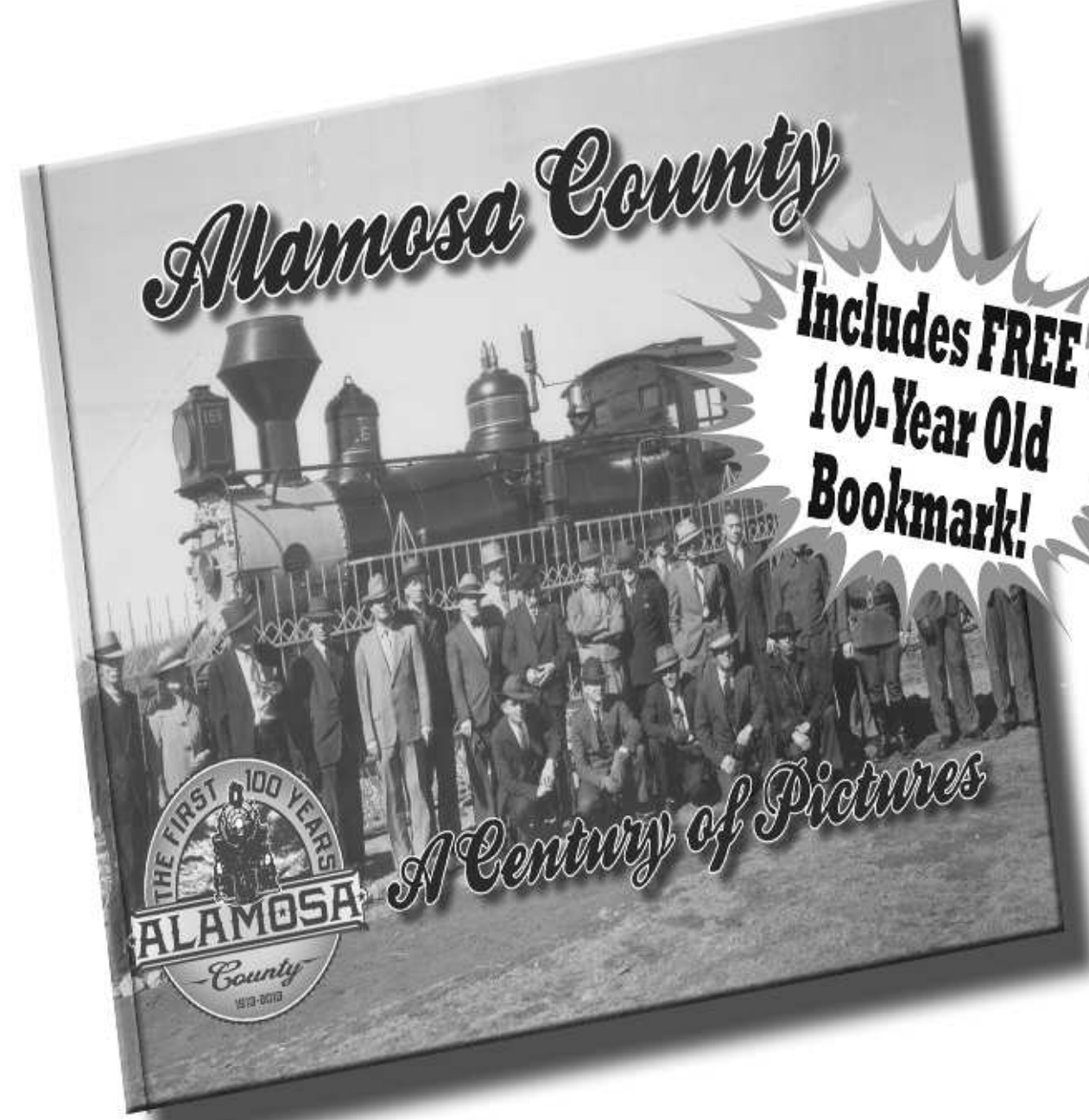
Other benefits include lowering the risk of depression, anxiety, and heart disease.
