SLV Dish Cook Off spices up Frontier Drive-Inn public preview

CENTER - The SLV Dish Cook Off celebration during the Frontier Drive-Inn public preview on July 9 added spice to the free event. Hundreds came to tour the renovated facility, sample competitive chili, patronize vendors, and settle in at sunset to watch "The Wizard of Oz."

Built in 1955, the Frontier Drivein reopened with a new focus. Now it's the Frontier Drive-Inn with an extra "n" to focus on "hospitality and art with an outdoor theater and projected sound."

Instead of parking in rows and hanging speakers on car windows or tuning car radios to the right frequency, spectators today sit in the grassy viewing area and hear the movie from concert-style speakers.

As the added "n" implies, guests can stay overnight. Plans to add RV campsite hookups will increase accommodation from rooms in four Quonset huts and 10 yurts. The preview on July 9 was open to the public free of charge, but most Please see PREVIEW on Page 4A

Center approves interim police chief, audit results

CENTER — The Center trustees approved appointing veteran Sgt. Aaron Fresquez to the interim police chief position of the Center Police Department at the Town Board meeting on July 12.

The meeting started 45 minutes later than scheduled because the trustees devoted extra time with auditors to scrutinize the town's finances.

The budget for mending roads, for example, calculated costs in 2021 before hyperinflation and supply chain issues drastically changed calculations worldwide. Barely into the second half of the year, they're already \$130,000 over budget. So, the board approved the audit results and agreed to prioritize projects for completion before the fiscal year concludes.

TownManagerBrianLujanprovided updates for grant-funded activities. Working with Saguache, Del Norte, and La Jara, Lujan is spearheading the Please see CENTER on Page 6A

CENTER — Working in Center for 10 of his 13 years in law enforcement, veteran Center Police Department Sgt. Aaron Fresquez stepped into the role of interim police chief of CPD when former chief Dale Meek moved to Alaska.

'My plan is to continue on the same path he left us with," Fresquez said. "We had a meeting yesterday, and everyone is on board. We're a sevenman department right now."

To fill his spot, Fresquez appointed Cpl. Joseph Roybal to the interim sergeant position. Another officer,

from her job at the Saguache County Jail. Adolph is currently learning law enforcement skills at the Flatrock training facility in Commerce City. Closer to home, the Chief's twin brother, Adam, and sister, A.J., are also on the force, a trio with roots in a strong law enforcement family. Their father, Robert Fresquez, was the Chief of Police in Del Norte for 33 years. "I used to do ride-alongs with my dad and his guys for a really long time when I was old enough, and so did my brother Adam," Fresquez recalled. the unit."

Along with adding more officers to

continues to expand. Long before former Chief Meek arrived in 2019, Fresquez described an attempt in 2014 to start training and hiring police dogs. It didn't work out. When Meek started, he wondered where the canine officers were.

"He said, 'let's work on that. Figure out what we need to do.' We knew that funding would be an issue," Fresquez recalled. "So, I did a lot of legwork asking local businesses for donations. I ended up raising \$58,000. That started

crowds on different days. But after the Saguache Chamber of Commerce combined the events last year, the tradition became even more festive.

The artists will set up on the courthouse lawn. This year, hollyhock plants and seed cards will be sold across the street outside the Saguache Hotel. The 2022 Hollyhock Seed Card features the artwork of Caroline Irwin, the 2021 art contest winner.

The 2022 art contest includes divisions for children under 18 and adults. To enter, artists can deliver their work to Saguache Town Hall during the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. between July 18 and July 22.

Prizes for all contests will be awarded at 2 p.m. First-place winners will take home \$100 in cash. Second and third place winners in all three categories (hollyhock garden, nonhollyhock garden, and art contest) will take home prizes valued at \$75 and \$50, respectively.

Former Saguache artist and resident, Byron Williams, sparked the first Arts Walk 13 years ago. Known for his decorative gourds (and love of hollyhocks), Williams sought to celebrate more artists in town and showcase their work.

Once the hollyhock was selected as the town flower, Williams was instrumental in establishing the Hollyhock Festival 11 years ago. Hollyhocks are hardy, droughttolerant, and flexible enough to adapt to soil conditions. The colorful flowers bloom today in the Middle East, Europe, and North America, some perhaps planted in the San Luis Valley during the early 19th century. For the first year of the Hollyhock

for training, and his brother, Adam, started an enterprise managing a pool of dogs. Although the Center Town Board has a budget for the program, the K9 Unit funds itself. It also offers new solutions to emerging problems. In response to school shootings, for example, a few police departments around the country have incorporated canine officers with their School Resource Officers (SROs).

In negotiations with the Center Consolidated School District, the department currently provides a parttime SRO and would like to train a dog "that will sniff out firearms and ammunition," Fresquez explained.

Are you bugged by a conscience, carrying around baggage from a certain mistake or decision that produces feelings of regret or even selfloathing? We've all said or done things that we

wish we could take back. And while it's completely natural to grieve over a bad decision or mistake you have made, it is not God's plan for you to live with guilt and condemnation. Jesus came to set you free from that kind of life (see John

our sins completely. Psalm 103:12 says, As far as the east is from the west, so far has he removed our transgressions from us" (NIV).

And when you trust His promise of forgiveness, any burden of guilt that you have will be lifted from your shoulders.

Breaking the Habit of Guilt I had a terrible problem with guilt for many years. I grew up in an angry, unstable, abusive atmosphere, which caused me to become a negative, angry, judgmental adult. This verse isn't saying you should live a sloppy life and sin as much as you want; it means when you fall short of perfection in any area of your life, you will always have another chance to get back up, brush yourself off and try again with God's

European bride online.



Your Night Sky **By DARLENE DANKO**

Great Perseids

The Perseid meteor shower is fast approaching, and we have a new moon dark sky when they peak! They're visible from July 17-Aug. 24 but are best within two weeks before they peak on the night of Aug. 12, and for another week after that. The full moon is on July 13, the Herd which is just the last quarter is July 20, but the below the "W" shaped new moon is on July 28.

Meteors are tiny particles of rock and dust that Earth passes through as it orbits the Sun. When the comet swings around the Sun, its solar heat boils off ice and trapped dusty debris. When the debris trails cross Earth's orbit we have a meteor after the meteors disappear. shower.

Swift-Tuttle that has an interesting orbit that takes 133 years. It goes out past Pluto and then inside Earth's mph. That's amazing! So, we need orbit. When it's closest to Earth the to hope for a clear dark sky close to sun heats it up and releases fresh material into the stream. That makes the meteor shower spectacular when the comet is that close to us. Even though the next closest passing to us

won't be until 2126 we'll still have great meteors to view.

Meteor showers are named for the area they seem to originate from. This would be the constellation Perseids Cassiopeia the Queen in the

NE. The Perseids are spectacular to watch. They have more fireballs than any other shower. There are many bright meteors that leave trails which form because Perseids are fast. Then the trails last for up to two minutes

What's interesting is that a typical The Perseids come from comet bright meteor is produced by a particle no larger than a pea. They enter our atmosphere at 50,000 to 165,000 the peak. At the peak we can see up to 110 meteors per hour. Perseids can be very colorful in addition to being bright.

In the evening you'll see some shooting high overhead, but you'll also see Earth grazers. These travel horizontally across the sky close to the horizon. They are slow moving and long lasting. So have fun watching them!

I live in South Fork and on July 3, I was getting ready for bed when I heard a loud noise, so I looked out and saw fireworks. Then I ran out and viewed all the fireworks. They were wonderful! Fortunately, we live in a place where we can see them from our yard.





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Moffat residents, trustees tackle town troubles

working meeting of the Moffat Town Board on July 6, multiple residents raised issues during the public comment period, ranging from the glow of grow lights before dawn to rumors of a proposed name change for the town.

One recurring topic drew vigorous head-nods and almost two dozen people.

For months, the bathrooms in Ralph Mitchell Park needed more than a thorough cleaning. The signs clearly stated, "DO NOT PUT CLOTHING, SHOES, GARBAGE, STICKS IN THE TOILET. WE ARE UNDER SURVEILLANCE."

Baroz enters plea of not guilty by reason of insanity

He is accused of Los Sauces murders

By PRISCILLA WAGGONER

ALAMOSA - Adre Baroz, accused of murdering five individuals in the case commonly known to residents as "Los Sauces," has entered a plea of not guilty by reason of insanity in the case.

The court accepted the plea and District Judge Michael Gonzales, presiding, ordered a psychiatric evaluation of Baroz to be conducted. A status hearing in the case is set for Sept. 29.

Baroz was formally charged with a total of 13 felonies, including five counts of murder in the first degree with deliberation related Selena Esquibel, Myron Martinez, Zeven Garcia and Shayla Hammill. He is also charged with five counts of tampering with a deceased body for his alleged involvement in burning the remains of the victims.

This case, which involves Baroz plus three other co-defendants, is enormous.

According to what was presented at the time of the preliminary hearing, the case involves the murder of five people, all of which took place at different times over the course of roughly two at the time.

Of those 46, eleven over two counties, contains more than 50,000 pages of documents with more likely to be included, lengthy statements from two confidential informants plus statements - both direct and indirect — from at least a dozen individuals, lengthy interviews conducted by the Alamosa Police Department, the Colorado Bureau of Investigation and Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, multiple search warrants, collection of multiple pieces of evidence including parts of bones, analysis from a specially trained forensic anthropologist and a forensic odontologist. And, as the investigation was still ongoing at that time, there is the possibility of more to come.

With a plea of not guilty by reason of insanity, and should the that Baroz was not sane at the time he allegedly committed the crimes, the responsibilities in prosecution of the case will expand.

Fred Johnson, Chief Trial Deputy DA with the DA's office in the 20th Judicial District who was assigned as special prosecutor to the case, will be required to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that Baroz committed the crime. But, according to state law, he will also have to disprove beyond a reasonable doubt that he was sane

Forty-six states currently allow states — including Colorado place the burden of proof on the state to prove a defendant was sane versus that burden resting with the defense to prove he was not.

Given the size and complexity of the case, the multiple motions that have been filed as the case has progressed plus the systemic delays that are often a part of the psychiatric evaluation process especially related to an insanity plea in a case involving alleged multiple murders over two months it is difficult for even attorneys familiar with the process to predict how long this case might last before coming to resolution.

All that is known at this time is that the next hearing, scheduled as a "status" hearing, is on the docket for about 11 weeks from now.

In the meantime, Baroz has to the deaths of Korina Arroyo, psychiatric evaluation indicate been transferred from the Alamosa Detention Center but where he is currently being held is not known.



RGC approves funding for boater safety project

RIO GRANDE COUNTY – Rio Grande County Commissioners met on June 29 with Emma Reesor, the Executive Director of the Rio Grande Headwaters Restoration Project.

Reeson has been working through the Headwater Restoration Project to improve safety along the Rio Grande Canal and specifically the low head dam where the canal breaks from the river.

Reesor provided an overview of the project. The Rio Grande Canal, located near Del Norte, diverts water from the Rio Grande and supplies irrigation water for more than 69,000 acres of agricultural land. The canal's low head dam diversion structure

Grande's Gold Medal reach, which begins in South Fork at the Highway 149 bridge.

The Gold Medal reach relies upon the canal's low head dam because it acts as a barrier to the upstream movement of nonnative fish species which would otherwise threaten existing trout fisheries, Reesor stated. This segment of the Rio Grande is actively used by a variety of recreational boaters, especially anglers who float fish the Gold Medal trout fishery.

The project addresses the need for portage deterring boaters around the low head dam. However, the canal's low head dam poses

marks the downstream boundary of the Rio significant risks for boaters, according to Reesor. Accessibility Project (Project) will address the The diversion structure creates a roughly 10-foot change in the river's water surface elevation. This forms a dangerous hydraulic jump, which can entrain objects for long periods. Currently, there is no formal portage around the canal's low head dam.

> "As river recreation increases locally, the need for safe portage around this drowning hazard has become increasingly urgent," Reesor stated.

> The project would increase safety along the section of the river and allow for an alternative route.

"This Rio Grande Canal Boater Safety and

safety hazard at the Canal and enhance recreational opportunities by constructing a new user-friendly watercraft portage around the LHD and improving aquatic habitat," Reesor stated.

Reesor explained that though they have received funding from several sources, the project still needed \$20,000.

"The total cost of the project is \$300,872," Reesor said. "To date, the partners have secured \$280,872 for project design, construction, and signage, which includes a Colorado Water Plan grant, cash contributions from local organizations,



need to purchase a Colorado OHV Use Permit. These can be purchased at any Colorado Division of Parks and Wildlife office or vendors who sell hunting and fishing licenses.

Doing your homework involves finding out what challenges are along the trail. Has it been cleared recently or are there downed trees and big rocks to navigate? Do you have proper clothing and safety gear? Helmets, eye protection, long pants, long sleeve shirts, gloves and over-the-ankle boots are a minimum. Check out the local weather report to see if you need cold weather or rain gear. Have a map, compass, and/or GPS along so you know where you are. Be sure to fill your gas tank and take along appropriate tools for any emergencies along the way.

So now you're prepared but is your motorcycle? Be sure to do a thorough inspection of the engine, brakes, suspension, and tires. You don't want to be deep in the woods and have a breakdown, or worse an accident that breaks your bike and possibly you. In addition, the For-

system for motor vehicles, you'll or any motorized vehicle operating on the Forest.

> Stay the Trail Colorado emphasizes never go out alone. Experiencing the trails and backroads with a group is a fun proposition and highly recommended. If you're like me and like to do a solo run, you can still do it. In this case, your partner is letting someone know where you are heading and then sticking to the route. 



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
