Vehicle pursuit ends in rural Saguache

SAUGACHE COUNTY - Two men on parole were arrested after crashing a stolen vehicle while trying to evade law enforcement on Sunday, June 5.

At about 6 a.m. on Sunday, CPD was notified of a vehicle pursuit heading toward the town, Center Police Chief Dale Meek reported.

The incident began when a man who lives in South Fork observed his Jeep being stolen at his house. He began chasing the thieves in his other vehicle.

The suspects, later identified as Zachary Wymer, 25, and Jimmy Gollihugh Jr., 44, were in separate vehicles — Wymer was driving the stolen Jeep and Gollihugh was driving the Ford F150 truck. The victim chased the vehicles through Del Norte and down Highway 112 until they turned north on County Road 43.

The suspects continued through the La Garita area until the Jeep was wrecked by the suspect a few miles north of town.

The driver of the Jeep got into the white truck and crossed over U.S. 285 into the Russell Lakes

Meek explained he and another CPD officer continued to pursue the truck through the dirt roads around County Road 50 moving south toward County Road G. As the truck reached the intersection of C.R. 50 and C.R. G stop sticks, a tire deflation device, were deployed as the suspect vehicle ran the stop sign at the intersection.

ASU trustees terminate president's contract

Dr. Kent Buchanan named acting president

ALAMOSA – In a unanimous vote Friday, after an apparent several hour executive session, Adams State University Board of Trustees terminated the institution's contract with President Cheryl Lovell. Kent Buchanan was named acting president effective immediately.

Buchanan has been Vice President of Academic Affairs at ASU since March 1, 2020. ASU Trustees

Amanda DeLaRosa and Jen Mueller were named by board chairperson Michelle Lueck to head up a search committee for a new president.

The trustees passed two resolutions during the noon hour meeting Friday, the first terminating the contract with Lovell and a second appointing Buchanan as

Chairman Lueck and several members of the board cited a lack of leadership from Lovell while terminating a contract signed on June 1,2019. Lovell was originally hired as interimpresident in September 2018 and her "interim" title was removed by the board in February 2019.

"This was not an easy decision," Lueck said. "However, we believe Dr. Buchanan and the entire executive council will transition to a new era with

In reading the first resolution terminating Lovell's contract, Lueck cited concerns about the "behavior of the current administration" and added "it is time for a leadership change at ASU." Speaking individually, most of the board members echoed those feelings.

Trustee David Tanberg said it was made "quite clear" to Lovell a year ago what changes she needed to make and what the consequences would be if improvements weren't made.

Trustee Pam Bricker said it was a difficult and stressful decision for the board to make, but that the "university needs to move in a positive direction," adding that a different "set of skillsets are needed" at ASU.

One of the newest trustee appointees, Mark Martinez said, "transparency and trust are paramount" and a change was necessary in ASU's leadership.

Trustee DeLaRosa added that a different leader is needed to "carryout the directions of the board."

After appointing Dr. Buchanan as

acting president, trustee Arthur Ortegon said, "we're turning the keys over to you in continued trying times," and her encouraged him to continue putting the students first.

Faculty trustee Beth Bonsetter wouldn't comment on the termination of Lovell's contract but did say the faculty supports the appointment of Buchanan.

When hired by President Lovell, Buchanan brought more than 25 years of experience in higher education to ASU. He served as provost and vice president for academic affairs at Oklahoma City University for the previous 13 years. He was also a tenured professor of biology at two other universities, including Tulane university's leadership.

University Health Sciences Center.

He has been credited with leading efforts to add new academic programs at ASU in online platforms as well as strategic planning, budget development, accreditation, and faculty development.

In a statement Friday afternoon, Buchanan said, "I am willing to step in as acting president of Adams State. I accept this role because I have absolute confidence in our faculty and staff's commitment to their profession and dedication to our students. Together we willkeepmovingAdamsStateforward."

Backing into a divorce





Your Night Sky

Cygnus the Swan

Cygnus the Swan is another Summer Triangle constellation. It's a bird flying through the sky. This is Deneb's constellation with 13 stars, and it is one of the easiest to find. Vega is up high, and Deneb is at the lower left of the Triangle in the ENE just on the edge of the Milky Way. Cygnus is also known as the Northern Cross. In December it stands upright in the NW and is also known as the Christmas Cross. This time of year, it's high

This constellation is in front of the Milky Way and is a water bird flying over the river. The word Deneb comes from the Arabic word tail and is the Swan's tail. Albireo represents the swan's head and is 3 stars to the right of Deneb. It's a blue, white star 430 LY away

from us. With a telescope you can see that it's a double star with the brighter one orange and the dimmer

The Swan's body, wings and head lie inside the Triangle. Cygnus is one of the most prominent constellations in the Northern Sky. It lies in a rich area of the Milky Way and contains many nebulae and open clusters. Its most distinctive feature is the Great Rift which is a relatively close dark cloud of dust that blocks light from the Milky Way. Try viewing it with binoculars or a telescope to find its many treasures.

This constellation represents a swan flying down the WNW, recalling the Greek God Zeus' disguise while seducing Leda the later gave birth to the Gemini twins Castor and Pollux which apparently

came from Zeus.

The bird's wings span the Milky Way at a location packed with stars and deep sky objects. It's highest in the sky late summer into fall. The North American nebula is a colorful gas cloud on the Swan's southern border just below Deneb. So, when you find Deneb, explore the sky to the right of it and discover the Swan. Then use binoculars or a telescope to see all the wonderful things in that area of the sky.

The full moon is on the 14th, but it's going to do some unusual things this time. When you see it, it will be very yellow and low in the sky. Normally the full moon is very high in the sky and very bright white, but this time it isn't going to rise. It will stay low in the sky and wife of the King of Spaita. She not become white. I've learned from experience that feelings are fickle. One day they can be up, one day they can be down, and other days they are just all over the

God gave us feelings, and they are not wrong in and of themselves—they are an important part of enjoying life. We don't need to deny that we have them, but we do need to prevent them from controlling us.

In 1 Corinthians 3:3 (AMPC), the apostle Paul is talking to new Christians, and he says, "For you are still [unspiritual, having the nature] of the flesh under the control of ordinary

The flesh is our desires—what we want, think and feel. And Romans 8:8 says that "those who are living the life of the flesh [catering to the appetites impulses of their carnal nature cannot please or satisfy God, or be acceptable to Him."

The Bible is saying that always doing what we feel like doing will hinder us from doing what God wants us to do. We need to get to the place in life where we are not controlled by our emotions so we won't miss out on His good plan

for our lives.

I realize that some people are more emotional than others. However, with God's help, we can get to the point where we obey God and do what His Word says to do -regardless of our

Let me give you an example. You may know I was sexually abused by my father for years. My mother eventually found out but never confronted him because she was afraid of him. Needless to say, the abuse and pain I experienced as a child deeply affected me, and it took years for the Lord to help me receive emotional healing and truly forgive my parents.

When they reached a point where they needed someone to help take care of them, the Lord spoke to my heart

had been the best parents in the world. So we moved my parents to a house just eight minutes away from us, bought them a car and furniture, and met their every need. My father showed some appreciation, but he still remained the same mean and cranky man he had always been.

But one morning, three years afte we had moved them to St. Louis, my mother called to say my father had been crying all week and asked if we could come over. Dave and I went to their house, and that day my father asked me to forgive him for what he had done to me as a child. He cried and cried and also asked Dave to forgive him.

We assured him that we had forgiven him and asked if he wanted to ask God to forgive him so he could begin a relationship with Jesus Christ. He said yes, and we all prayed right there on the spot. Ten days later, I had the great honor of baptizing my father at church.

I can truly say that for the next four years, prior to his death at age 86, I saw a true change in my father. I know without a doubt that he's in Heaven. My mother had asked my forgiveness years before this, and I had the joy of knowing her last years were peaceful.

The point I'm trying to make is when the Lord asked me to help my parents, I certainly didn't feel like doing it. I had a choice to obey Him and do what I knew was right or follow my feelings



and miss out on what He wanted to do in their lives and mine in the process.

I want you to take a moment and think about this: Are your feelings preventing you from doing something God has asked you to do? In the moment, it may seem that getting "your way" is the most important thing or that you'll be giving up too much if you go along with God's plan.

But the truth is while you can't always control how you feel, with God's help, you can control what you do. And when you obey God, He always rewards you beyond anything you can imagine.

I encourage you to pray and ask the Lord for strength in this area. Ask for His help to choose His will over what you want, think or feel in the moment. Because you'll never regret making good decisions, doing things God's

We live in a noisy world

ALAMOSA — Audiology was born in the 1940s after thousands of American soldiers were returning from the War with noise-induced hearing loss. The Army wanted all these veterans to be fitted with hearing aids, and the scientists they enlisted in these efforts suggested that something should be done to protect the soldiers from getting hearing loss in the first place.

Little did those early hearing health pioneers know just how loud not only the war front would get, but how loud the world would get! And yet, 80-plus years later, and despite all the developments in hearing protection... custom earplugs, musician's earplugs, noise suppression circuitry, softer more comfortable earplug materials, and sound abatement technologies, noise exposure is still one of the most common causes of permanent hearing loss.

Loudness is measured in what's called decibels (dB). Over time, cause hearing loss — or other hearing problems, like tinnitus (a sound in your ears that won't go away). The



your hearing. For example, a whisper is approximately 30dB, normal conversational speech is 55-65dB, a movie theater is 70-104dB, a stereo in a closed cab tractor is 85-100dB, music through earphones/earbuds at the highest volume is 96-114dB, a chainsaw is 105dB, and a shotgun is 150dB-160dB! And remember, any sound that's 85dB or higher can listening to any sound that exceeds 100dB for any amount of time risks permanent hearing loss.

The CDC estimates that 12.5% of louder a sound is, and the longer you children and adolescents ages 6-19 listen to it, the more it can damage years (approximately 5.2 million)

and 17% of adults ages 20-69 years (approximately 26 million) have permanent damage to their hearing from excessive exposure to noise. And to think that this kind of hearing loss can be prevented by using appropriate hearing protection and hearing conservation practices!

• Turn down the volume.

• Use appropriate hearing protection devices (such as earplugs and earmuffs) when you cannot avoid loud sounds.

Forest Service gives presentation on coming fire season

Rio Grande County Commissioners listened to a presentation by Colorado State Forest Service Supervisory Forester Adam Moore about the current conditions of the state managed forest during their meeting on April 27.

Moore was accompanied by Forester Sam Scavo who spoke briefly to the board about some of the projects that were being completed this year to help spread education on fire mitigation in and around homes.

Moore began the presentation by handing out a publication being distributed throughout the community that gave a detailed account of what the forests are experiencing during the current drought conditions.

"The emphasis of this year and this report is the current draft conditions which significantly affect the health of the forest and whether or not the trees can fight off infections and disease," explained Moore.

Moore continued to explain that as of June of 2021 snowpack in the region, specifically the Upper Rio Grande, was only 23% of normal. "We are at 23% of normal,"

Cancer survivors enjoy exercise and celebration

ALAMOSA — It all started in the spring of 2018. Danielle Smith had an idea for her master's research project. She was drawing from personal experience when she hypothesized that exercise, and exercising with others, might help improve a person's outcome in battling cancer. The thesis took on a life of its own when it combined forces with the Adams State University undergraduate Kinesiology practicum class. ASU's Human Performance & PE Department later benefited from a grant from the Colorado Cancer Coalition and receives supportive ongoing funding from the Larry Holder annual memorial golf tournament fundraiser.

On May 5 a celebration was held at the Alamosa Family Recreation Center. Tracey Robinson, Ph.D., Adams State University professor, Instructor Ines Curti, ASU graduate student, and her team of kinesiology students, and Peggy Johnson, retired ASU instructor, greeted the participants and celebrated with them in their journeys.

Karen Holder introduced herself and her son, Jeffery, and his wife, Susan, to the room full of ASU students and teachers, cancer survivors and their families, and SLV Health staff. She said, "My husband Larry would have loved this exercise program. He was socially outgoing and this is exactly what would have kept him on track with healthy

As the participants from current and past years filled the room for the celebration, they were greeted with a slide show created by the students. They laughed, reminisced, and greeted each other warmly. Kelly Gurule, Director of the SLV Health Foundation, welcomed everyone and stated, "This is not a graduation, because it is not an ending. This is a celebration and chance to thank everyone for their involvement." Kelly welcomed comments from the participants after thanking all those who made the program an ongoing success.

"I started my cancer treatments at the MD Anderson Cancer Center in Albuquerque. I was not sure how my care would be here, but I'm telling you, Dr. Cooper and her staff are the best. They are right up there with my former care center. This program has meant a lot to me and my husband who came with me to each exercise class with enthusiasm. It was a huge pick-me-up. I believe our future generation is in good hands after having such positive interactions with these students.'

"This program did a lot for my wife as she always came home with a great attitude," commented one of the spouses.

One survivor emotionally shared her gratitude. "I am so grateful for this program. I took a lot away from each class and it filled my heart. It was a great bonding experience."

One former Manassa resident shared "When I returned (to the Valley) after a 21-year absence, I really didn't have any friends. Every time I came to this class, I felt like I belonged. I began forming new friendships. There's no judgment, just acceptance."

Rose, a two-time cancer survivor, said, "We had the common bond of cancer. I enjoyed the class so much and plan to keep up with my exercise. I hope none of us ever have to go through

One of the participants also requires ongoing therapy for a different health condition. He commented, "These classes meant so much to me. The people who have worked with me are so good, I feel so blessed."

As more of the participants shared their experiences, the last one summa-

South Fork Youth Fishing Clinic set for Father's Day weekend

SOUTH FORK — Nothing says summer like the annual Youth Fishing Clinic at Tucker Ponds near South Fork. The annual Father's Day weekend event is a way to spend the day with family and friends learning the fundamentals of fishing.

The South Fork Visitor Center in partnership with Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) hosts the event every year to help educate up-and-coming anglers on the dos and don'ts of fishing in Colorado.

Tucker Ponds is 16 miles outside of South Fork. Young anglers can, in a sense, get their feet wet. CPW sets up stations and divides participating children into groups to learn about Colorado fishing regulations, the type of aquatic life in the area, how to bait and cast a fishing pole and so much more. Each station is hands-on and geared toward educating youth on the basics of catching fish and what to do once it's been caught.

Colorado State rules and regulations can be confusing, even for adults and this event gives local CPW officers a chance to start teaching future anglers at a young age. Several

volunteer officers come and show participating children how to identify certain species of fish that reside in local waters, how to be safe while in the woods, and how to follow important rules and regulations.

South Fork is home to some of the best fishing in the state with Gold Medal waters all along the Rio Grande and the plentiful lakes and reservoirs within 20 miles of the town, which includes Tucker Ponds.

For the event, CPW stocks the two small ponds so that participants are pretty much guaranteed to catch a fish and there is nothing better for Father's Day than to hear the laughter as young anglers reel in their first fish for the day.

After the stations, children with family and friends are allowed to hit the shores and fish. Each child has a chance to go home with a fishing pole if they do not already have one thanks to the donations made by CPW. A hotdog lunch will be served in the afternoon and families are encouraged to make a day of it and stay to fish.



Man hikes Continental Divide Trail toward recovery

CREEDE — With 600 miles behind him and 2,400 more to go, Asheville, N.C., musician and videographer Ben Phan — stage name Ben Phantom is hiking the Continental Divide Trail (CDT) in support of PIVOT-Point WNC, a nonprofit therapeutic adventure group that helps those in recovery and those at risk of substance

After dodging forest fires in New Mexico, Phan has just crossed into Southern Colorado. He's sharing his five- to six-month journey through video updates filmed on the trail.

"As a person in recovery who has really benefited from the therapeutic experience of being in the wilderness, I want to help others who are struggling have that level of healing," says Phan. "Because many people don't have the resources or skills or confidence to experience the benefits of being in nature, PIVOTPoint fills a real need. Wilderness adventures can be lifechanging — they have been for me."

Serving the Southeast region, PIV-OTPoint provides community-based, behavioral health interventions that focus on inter- and intra-personal skill-building. Through hiking, rafting, mountain biking, rock climbing, and paddleboarding, PIVOTPoint is stepping in to provide what Executive Director Matthew Nannis sees as a powerful enhancement to more traditional, standalone offerings.

"We are providing practical, usable skills and strategies for people trying to reframe a relationship with either substance use or underlying factors hindering growth, health, and pro-social development. Our work supports folks in reflecting on the internal landscape while exploring the wilderness through outdoor engagement," said Nannis.

Phan openly shares his journey of recovery and says that for him, the wilderness itself is healing.

"When I'm a part of something greater than myself, the wilderness and big mountains, I feel right-sized — it feels good to be 'a part of,' instead of thinking everything's about me," he says. "And it forces you to be present the decisions that you make have immediate consequences."

The CDT is a "choose your own adventure trail," says Phan, offering alternatives as hikers wind their way through its mountains, valleys, and deserts. Phan started at the Mexico border and is following a continuous footpath through New Mexico, Colo-

If Phan makes it to Canada, he'll have completed the "Triple Crown" of hiking the three long-distance trails in the U.S. He hiked the Appalachian Trail (AT) in 2008 and completed the Pacific Crest Trail (PCT) in 2014.

"I first started writing songs on the PCT," says Phan. "Every so often it's important for me to take an extended journey into the wilderness, to have time to step back and reflect and listen - to get in touch with that true creative source that comes from something bigger than me, that doesn't originate or end in me.'

Phan will be carrying a guitalele, a guitar-ukulele hybrid, that he'll play on some of his trail videos.

Through Phan's trek across the CDT this year, Nannis says he hopes that others are inspired by the transformative powers of the natural environment.

"PIVOTPoint is creating this peer-2-peer campaign to celebrate Ben and raise funds to purchase the equipment needed to outfit our 3-day, 2-night mini-immersion programming. These therapeutic camping excursions provide the at-risk and recovery communities with a foundation of the connection that Ben finds out on the trail," says

a production for the stage. Everything from countless hours rehearing scripts to perfecting lighting cues and electrical connections to preparing costumes, props and so much more. The theatre relies heavily on its backstage crew to make the magic become exactly that, magic.

One of the most important pieces to a great production comes from above, below, and all around and it's something many audiences never think twice about while they are engrossed with what is happening on stage, but it is something Lighting Manager Willow McGinty loves to create. This will be the third season McGinty has worked for CRT.

"I started in high school and at first was just an electrician for theatres but then when I was going to college in Denver, I heard about Creede. Working here is great because you feel like you're part of a community within a community and though I feel like we are waiting to see what the audiences will be like post-pandemic, I am really looking forward to the impactful and powerful productions here at CRT," said McGinty.

The love McGinty has for the electrical part of backstage work shows in each production. Lights are programmed to help cue cast members, show emotion, sync with the musical accompaniment and much more.

"Most of the time when we do a good job, people don't notice. It takes a community to put on a show and one to keep it going," McGinty said.

Marcus Carroll is beginning his first year with CRT as the Production Stage Manager for "Native Gardens" and "Always... Patsy Cline."

Stage managers act as the hub of the community wheel behind the stage at CRT and make sure that lines of communication are clear between each department.

"I had known about Creede for a few years and after being in the theatre scene in Chicago for several years and looking for work, Creede jumped out and I figured why not," explained

Carroll felt it was kind of meant to be seeing as he had passed through Creede while hiking the Continental Divide Trail a few years prior and though he hadn't spent too much time in Colorado, it didn't come as much of a shock to come and live in the rural

"After I visited, I decided to apply again and here I am. Sometimes I wake up and can't believe I'm here," Carroll said.

In his off time as production stage manager, Carroll enjoys being able to socialize with fellow staff members and loves being able to just walk to

'In places, like Chicago, you have to plan to be social because everyone is so busy. Here, it's completely different," he said.

Even though this is his first-time doing repertory theatre, Carroll has embraced the challenge and is looking forward to the season.

"My job is to track the progress, technical and artistic elements of a chow and to maintain it throughout the season-long run," he said.

Erin Lavpene is the Costume Manager for "Steele Magnolias" and "Sherwood" this season and gets involved in the process of creating a production long before most of the other backstage crew does.

"I start by reading the script and getting to know the characters. I work with the director's vision of what each character looks like or how they may

Many steps must be taken to prepare change throughout a show and work from there. I do research on specific time frames and specific places and use it to create the costumes," explained

This is the first year Lavpene has been with CRT and is also her first time in Colorado.

"I spent time in other rural communities. One was a tiny town on an island off the coast of Maine and let me tell you about rural," laughed Lavpene. "Here at CRT though the company interacts differently than other places I've been. The people I work with are easygoing and more cheerful. It's just more personable."

Lavpene is excited and terrified of the coming season but knows that above all, this has been a cohesive and fun experience and one she will never forget.

Fellow Costume Designer Rossina Lozoya is more than happy in her new role and looks back to what brought her to Creede.

"When I was in school, I didn't even know costume design was an option. I started out in graphic design, and I was miserable. One of my professors could tell. He pointed to a stage in the Theatre Department and said, 'Those are your people,' and he was right. I didn't even know how to sew at the time.'

Lozoya is excited for the coming season and one particular production

"I'm very excited about 'Native Gardens' because we'll have three Latina women involved in the process, the director, our scenic designer and myself. It's important to have the voices onstage backed by the people creating the story. It makes a difference," she said.

The Assistant Stage Manager for the Ruth Humphreys Brown Theatre, Olivia Zapater-Charrette knows how important the role she holds is and how important it is to be organized while keeping communications rolling during production.

"You really have to see the big picture and be aware of everything all at once. You know the script, all the movements of actors, all of the costume changes and props. It is such a joy to be the one who knows everything. The nitty-gritty of it is knowing when people need you and being there when they do," said Zapater-Charrette.

Not only does Zapater-Charrette know everything there is to know about the production, but she also takes the time to know the people she is working with as well.

"Stage managers take on the support of all the people and make sure it is a positive space and positive environment and help is all ways possible,"

Though she wasn't particularly prepared for her first season at CRT, her second season this year was a lot better

"I came much better prepared this year than last time I was here, and I am so thankful to my mom for taking me to Costco before we came up," laughed Zapater-Charrette. "Even though I was nervous, I received a warm welcome. People are so warm and supportive, and it comes from every direction."

Willhelm Peters is also experiencing Creede for his first year and also came from Chicago.

"I started out as an actor and then a friend of mine suggested I try to be a stage manager and that was 14 years ago. In the spring, I came to Creede and it wasn't too much of a change for me but driving here was interesting. My job here is to take care of all the people. Cast members, backstage members, designers, all of them. I imagine myself as a host of a party and that while we



are all in the same room, everyone feels included," Peters said.

It was the Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) program at CRT that brought Peters to Creede.

"I had never felt supported so completely in a very long time. CRT had the most descriptive and enlightening EDI program and that is what brought me here. What was nice was that they also fulfilled their promise to be inclusive and it has been amazing.

"Our backstage crew works really hard to bring productions to life. They are real people with real lives that are making this happen. What you are






