SAGUACHE COUNTY -A

person suffered life-threatening injuries when they were hit by a pickup early Friday morning, May 6, on Saguache County Road 49.5, Colorado State Patrol reported.

At approximately 2:40 a.m. on May 6, CSP responded to a vehicle versus pedestrian crash on Saguache County Road 49.5 just south of Saguache County

Investigation revealed that the vehicle, a blue 1995 Chevrolet 1500 pickup, was traveling south on Saguache County Road 49.5 approaching a vehicle that was stopped on the right shoulder. A person was near the center of the road, next to the stopped vehicle, CSP reported.

The Chevrolet struck the pedestrian with its front while swerving to the left, CSP reported. The Chevrolet left the scene and drove home. The driver called and reported the crash after returning

The pedestrian suffered lifethreatening injuries and was transported to Memorial Hospital in Colorado Springs.

The incident was still under investigation, CSP reported.

San Luis Valley enters Stage 1 fire restrictions

STAFF REPORT

MONTE VISTA — The Bureau of Land Management's (BLM) San Luis Valley Field Office entered Stage 1 fire restrictions on May 6 due to dry conditions and high fire danger. The fire restrictions apply to all BLMadministered public lands within the boundaries of Alamosa, Conejos, Saguache, Rio Grande, Mineral, and Costilla counties.

"Gusty winds and low relative humidity have dried fuels in the San Luis Valley, priming them for ignition," said San Luis Valley Field Manager Melissa Garcia. "In order to reduce the risk of wildfire ignition and loss of values at risk, Stage 1 fire restrictions that go into effect tomorrow will remain in effect until further notice."

Under Stage 1 Fire Restrictions the following acts are prohibited:



Mitchells rebuff investigation, say there is more to story

My husband Clay and I have two children in the Sargent School District, and I am a member of the Sargent School District Board of Education. We focus on resilience and grit in everything we do. We recognize the need for continual self-improvement and growth, and we are working on that with the district.

Imagine our feelings when we received death threats. Imagine our frustration when after three years of advocating for our child, we had to use outside services for assessment and diagnosis of learning disabilities. Imagine our concern in observing mistreatment of staff members who leave the district mid-year. Currently, allegations exist against my husband and myself related to our actions within the Sargent District. These allegations contain false information and information taken out

In truth, my husband and I have been critical of the district because of challenges with our children. These challenges include a failure to provide assessment, failure to provide agreed upon services for speech therapy and reading interventions, lack of gifted and talented programming, and disclosure of confidential information. These problems continue.

This year, we were asked to complete gifted and talented programming for our child at home and in the most recent round of state testing, necessary accommodations for our child were not provided. Additionally, sensitive meeting notes about our child were found on the playground in April of 2022.

Also of great concern, the district has created situations where individual students and staff members are marginalized based on association, race, and religious belief. These issues represent the basis of the complaint I filed in January.

To be clear, I am not worried about he prayer of one student, at one event. I am concerned about the culture of the district and the creation of an inclusive environment where all families feel

The investigation conducted on the complaint was a sham — the investigator did not interview material staff member. Please listen to the Feb.

she used to reach her conclusions. Unfortunately, on April 25 at a public meeting, the Board and staff members compounded this problem and retaliated against me for complaining about civil rights violations.

The investigative reports by Mrs. Martinez were incompetent in every respect. She did not describe the legal standards under review, she did not interview relevant witnesses, and she was tainted by bias from the start.

This is textbook arbitrary and capricious conduct, and it was rubber stamped by a majority of the Board in its vote of censure.

Other individuals have complained about racism, religion, and freedom of expression. A 2021 complaint from a parent group noted that a district employee used a racial slur. In a parent survey it was reported that "Also if your ethnicity is not Caucasian and have money, then people look down on you and don't talk to you. Makes people feel like they do not belong.

My husband and I believe in standing up for what is right in all cases. Critically, standing up for a person's rights, including civil rights and Constitutional rights, is not "blackmail" or "harassment."

The only media posts my husband and I have created related to the district are presentations of data and facts. We have shared information on district performance levels, district enrollment, etc. This information is publicly available. It was done in the spirit of improvement. To address and solve problems we must acknowledge their existence and look for solutions.

I am accountable for my actions as a Board member. However, during the April board meeting staff members attempted to re-write history related to my voting record. It was stated that I abstained on Mr. Crowther's contract due to a conflict of interest, but then voted no on Mrs. Hemmerling's contract when an investigation was ongoing.

I never stated that I had a conflict of interest. I abstained because the motion that was made to renew Mr. Crowther's contract also contained a motion to approve a leave of absence for another

witnesses or identify the legal standards 28 board recording, you will hear that I asked a question related to the leave of absence and then voted to abstain. I was advised by district legal counsel that I could sit on the interview committee for Mrs. Hemmerling and that I could vote on the renewal of her contract.

Staff members have stated that I refused to return keys. Neither my husband nor I have ever been asked to return keys. In fact, in January we were issued an additional key fob. Additionally, Mr. VanBibber himself loaned us his keys on April 16.

Conflict that exists between the district and my husband and I is not related to the religious views of anyone, nor is the conflict directed at any one person. Rather it is related to fundamental differences in opinion on education and inclusivity.

The attempt to re-write history and place blame on us is a deflection from the difficulties the district faces related to educational performance and in serving children.

For example, in 2021, only 13% of sixth grade students were proficient in math. It is important to remember the lack of credible information that has already been supplied to the public.

In February, we heard that I was attempting to remove the Pledge of Allegiance from the school and that I filed a lawsuit against teachers. As can be seen from the release of my complaint, these rumors are not true.

Clay and I continue to volunteer for the district. We have coached almost every pee-wee sport imaginable, we have installed playground equipment. pulled weeds, picked up trash, fixed and installed projectors, donated money, served on committees, coordinated fundraisers, and volunteered in the

There is much more to this story, but we are limited in space. We hope you will recognize the passion we bring to advocating for children.

We ask you to critically think about the materials that are being presented to you and carefully consider allegations brought forth without evidence and conclusions that have been created by only looking at one side of the story.

The Only Way to Make **Everything All Right**

We all have a deep need to feel time and energy trying to do things that make us feel like we're okay – okay with ourselves, with others and even God. But we don't need to wear ourselves out trying to be right with God through our own effort. The truth is we can't make our lives right on our own, but we can receive the righteousness of God by putting our righteousness faith in Christ.

Therefore no one will be declared righteous in God's sight by the works of the law; rather, through the law we become conscious of our sin." That means the reason God established the law was to show us how much we need a Savior who can make us

righteous before Him.
Self-righteousness is believing we are made right with God through our own works. For example, a person might think, "Well, if I read through my Bible every year, then God will be pleased with me." But the truth is we read the Bible because it helps us in our everyday life, not because it makes us right with God. In the same way, my preaching doesn't make me a righteous person. The only way we are made righteous (right with God) is by having faith in Jesus Christ—it's not something we can ever earn in our own effort.

I used to really struggle with self-righteousness. I remember years ago when the pastor at the church I was attending encouraged us to read through the Bible in a year. Every Sunday he'd ask, "Who's been doing your Bible reading?" Well, I didn't want to be the one not standing up, so

I got really serious about it.

We all got a calendar so we could check off the days we read the chapters. As long as I had all my checkmarks, I liked that calendar. But then I got 36 chapters behind and had these big, gaping holes! It was like a nightmare for me.

So one day I decided I was going to

catch up, and I zipped right through the chapters. And honestly, when I closed my Bible I felt relieved. But then I heard the Holy Spirit speak to my heart, saying, "So, what did you learn?" And I realized I could not remarked the saying. remember one thing!

God taught me an important lesson that day. He would rather we read one verse and actually get something out of it and connect with Him than read

36 chapters and learn nothing.

The point is we need to have the right motives for the things we do and stop making laws out of tasks that make us feel better about ourselves

In 2 Corinthians 5:21 (NIV), Paul writes, "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." Every day of my life I say, "I am the righteousness of God in Christ." Now, I'm not righteous because I do verything right as because I do everything right—no one is perfect, and none of us do everything right. The Bible says in 1 John 1:8 (NIV), "If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us.

Now, it's important that we try to do what is right, but God wants us to live through faith in Christ. Then, as we have a personal relationship with Him, He puts the desire in us to do what's right and we can do it by His grace because we want to do it.

grace because we want to do it.

In Philippians 3:3 (AMP), Paul explains that we "take pride and exult in Christ Jesus and place no confidence [in what we have or who we are] in the flesh." He says he obeyed the law without fault, and if any person had a reason to have confidence in himself by the law's standard, he had more of a reason

than anyone.

In verses 7 through 9 (NIV) of that chapter, Paul goes on to say, "But whatever were gains to me I now consider loss for the sake of Christ. What is more, I consider everything a loss because of the surpassing worth



of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things. I consider them garbage, that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ—the righteousness that comes from God on the basis of faith.

Paul is saying that in order to have a relationship with Christ, he had to be willing to gather up all of his accomplishments and the things he had worked so hard for and be willing to get rid of them. That's because it's nothing but trash compared to the priceless privilege of knowing Christ

I want to be clear and say that what we do matters, but our good works do not make us acceptable to God. We are only made right with Him by putting our faith in Jesus Christ. That's when we can rest in knowing that everything is all right.



Martinez knew the value of education and the value of physical fitness. Growing up in Monte Vista, he participated in nearly every sport available including football, wrestling and baseball. He played in the band and was an excellent student. He was quarterback for the Pirate football team for three years and competed four years on the state wrestling team and played baseball all four years. Glen chose to play baseball for Ottawa University in Ottawa, Kan. on an academic and baseball scholarship where he earned his bachelor's in mathematics.

He subsequently earned a surveying degree from Westwood College and was going to work on his Master's in Hydro-Engineering at Boulder, Colorado University, when he made his decision to join the Marine Corps.

What is a Children's **Advocacy Center** demic. Prior to the COVID-19, the SLV

A Children's Advocacy Center (CAC) is a child-focused, facilitybased program in which representatives from many disciplines, including law enforcement, child protection, prosecution, mental health, medical and victim advocacy, child advocacy, work together to conduct interviews and make team decisions about investigation.

The Children's Advocacy Center of the San Luis Valley (SLV CAC) has been serving the community of the San Luis Valley since 2013. The services provided are to children ages 0-17 and their non-offending caregivers. Services are free and consists of family advocacy, forensic interviews and Sex Assault Nurse Examinations (SANE) and well-

Family advocacy is offered to the non-offending caregiver and family members. A Family Advocate provides support to the family from beginning to end of a case. Forensic interviews are for children who have experienced sexual abuse/assault, severe abuse/neglect and or have witnessed a crime. Forensic interviews are neutral, unbiased and aimed at eliciting facts from children in a developmentally appropriate manner. There are currently three forensic interviewers and bilingual interviews are available. The Tu Casa, Inc. SANE program is also a key program that works within the SLV CAC service area. The program offers acute sexual assault examinations within four days of the assault and a wellness exam any time after the fourth day.

Referrals for forensic interviews and SANE services must be made by the Department of Social/Human services, Law Enforcement or the District Attorney's Office. The number of interviews completed in 2013 was 20. The number of interviews completed in 2021 was 102. The SLV CAC is located in Alamosa, CO, but provides services to all six counties in the SLV.

The number of referrals received for services decreased significantly during the two years of the COVID-19 Pan-
