MONTE VISTA - For almost a quarter of a century, potato growers in the United Stated have wanted full access to the market in Mexico. That goal was finally accomplished on May 11 when the first shipment of U.S. potatoes crossed into Mexico, headed south past the border zone and into the interior of the country.

Since that first shipment, 11 more trucks have crossed the border carrying fresh potatoes from the U.S.

Born to Carl and Bobbie Aden of Del Norte, Colo., he was rechristened "Mike" by his older brother Gary, who did not like the name Gregory. The nickname stuck, and for the rest of his life everyone knew him as Mike. Five years later, younger sister Karla joined the family.

Mike graduated as valedictorian from Del Norte High School in 1960. As was necessary in a school with a graduating class of 33, he would play running back on the football field and then switch to tuba for the halftime performance. Though Mike was too small to play basketball against the "giants" of Leadville, he was a talented towel boy. Always the team player, Mike returned during his college summer breaks to join performances of the Del Norte High School marching band.

Outside of school, Mike drove his father's Conoco truck, making fuel deliveries to area businesses, farmers, residents, and service stations, as well as running the Del Norte Conoco station on Grand Avenue. When they finished their work, Mike and his father would fish the waters of the Rio Grande, bringing their fresh-caught trout home for his mother to fry up for dinner.

Mike also played the piano, refining his 1000-song-fake-book chops at Fun Valley and in the barrooms of Creede with his trio. Later in life, he would entertain his family and friends on the piano, notorious for his rambunctious version of The Kingston Trio's "MTA", dubbed "The Running Song" by his grandchildren.

Mike attended the University of Colorado, later embarrassing anyone nearby with his enthusiastic airmarching-band performance of the CU fight song. He studied Economics, Accounting and Mathematics, receiving a BA and MA, and was a Ford Foundation Scholar. He was the president of his fraternity. Mike then enlisted in the U.S.Army Officer Candidate School at Fort Benning, where he became a lieutenant in the U.S. Army Infantry.

A certified public accountant, Mike's long professional career lifelong friendships. Mike charmed included stints with General Electric, his guests with his over-the-top Touche Ross, Del Lingco Business generosity and sincere interest,

could expect memorable handdrawn maps, with somewhat cryptic annotations, to local tourist attractions. And although his proud driving tours of his neighborhoods might lack attention to the road, they never lacked hilarity.

Always a spiffy dresser, Mike's idea of casual wear was a button-down shirt and slacks. He kept his Norelco under the front seat of his car so that he was always clean-shaven.

Mike's greatest source of pride and joy was the family he built with his wife Nora, a family that consisted of five children and the 11 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren (with one more on the way), who knew him as Pepa. Mike's happiest times were when the entire family was present for the holidays or summer. He thrived in what he called the "complete bedlam" of the scene. Mike spent hours and hours each year preparing the winter wonderland miniature village, with lights and trains that enchanted countless children during the holiday season.

Their children's spouses, partners, and friends were always welcome into Mike and Nora's home. This hospitality was also extended to Mike and Nora's neighbors, resulting in



bombarding new acquaintances with his genuine curiosity.

His curiosity extended beyond people. He was game to try just about anything at least once - whether it was cultural events, ziplining, or standing in the rowdy section at a soccer game.

Mike took many trips with his wife and family, including to China, Europe, Alaska, Costa Rica, and the Cayman Islands, as well as destinations around the United States with his grandchildren during the highly anticipated Camp Mimi summer sessions.


And like it or not, flesh is here to stay as for some reason naked flesh sells us everything from beer, to boats to cars and more.

New meteor shower

Three independent studies have investigated the likely hood of a new meteor shower occurring this year at the end of May. They have predicted that it will really happen. We'll see if it really does happen. They've predicted that it will occur at 10 p.m. on May 30, and early morning on May 31.

I'm hoping that we really get to visualize this new meteor shower. Comet 73P Schwassman-Wachman 3 (SW3) orbits the Sun every 5.4 years.

This comet was discovered in 1930 when people saw its meteor shower.

The dust trails ejected in 1995 will closely approach Earth: so, meteors due to this dust trail are highly expected in 2022. We could see 140 meteors per hour. That would be amazing! Of course, that's a wild card and we may only see 14 per hour, or none at all.



Rio Grande County Museum opens in time to celebrate 150 years of history

RIO GRANDE COUNTY – The Rio Grande County Museum announced last week that it will be open and ready for patrons in time for Memorial Day weekend in the San Luis Valley. For the past five months, the museum was closed for maintenance and cleaning but is now ready to welcome history buffs back for the summer.

The museum will have new exhibits and is working to bring back the historical integrity of the organization. The museum serves Rio Grande County; this includes South Fork, Del Norte Monte Vista and towns that no longer exist like Loma, West Del Norte, Rock Creek, Whiskeyville and Baxterville. New exhibits are being constructed and the overall feeling is one of optimism.

This year marks the 150th anniversary of the town of Del Norte which was established in 1872. On Oct. 21, 2021, Del Norte was officially named by J. Cary French 150 years ago in 1871. French was one of five men who came to this location in the fall of 1871 for one purpose; to lay out a townsite and begin the adventure of creating a new and wonderful place to live.

After a rigorous journey across the eastern United States to the South Fork of the Rio Grande, French and his team of prospectors platted and laid the first stakes of what would soon become the town of Del Norte. After countless hours of conversation, French wrote in his diary on Oct. 21, 1871, that, "Went to town site – laying out lots and blocks, with Scottie, Fred, Phillips and Lovett. Quit at 2 p.m. Had a meeting in my room after supper. Named the new town Del Norte."

The original plat and map of Del Norte is housed in the Rio Grande Cunty Museum with French's diary that talks about their struggles and observations while journeying to



the site of Del Norte. The journal speaks of the first findings of gold and other ore in the Summitville Mining District and the glorious expanse of the Rio Grande that was untouched and unsettled except for the Pi-Utes who still resided in the area

In 1872, the Conejos County Commissioners' proceeding show they granted the corporation of



the Town of Del Norte to the first Del Norte Town Trustees, French being one of them. Two years after, Rio Grande County was formed and designated in 1874, breaking off from Conejos County with four other communities, including Hinsdale County and Lake City.

Once the corporation of Del Norte was complete, the sale of land began and the first Del Norte citizens traveled to the new town in hopes of a life of riches and prosperity. Del Norte was quickly recognized as the "Gateway to the San Juans" and was the beginning of the gold and silver rush that came to the area and created communities like South Fork, Monte Vista and Creede.

Del Norte was a lively area, home to many who came here for outfitting, staging, freighting and served as a business center for places like Summit, Lake City, Silverton, Ouray and Telluride. Del Norte was also designated the county seat once Rio Grande County was formed two years after the corporation approval.

According to records at the Rio Grande County Museum by 1872, Del Norte was up and running with promotion of the area in full swing. Thomas Pollock wrote to the Pueblo Chieftain, "People are crowding in there at a rapid rate. The miners expect to return to the mines earlier this spring and advise that outfitting should be successful. Farms are being taken up in the Rio Grande Valley and by next season there will be sufficient produce raised for home consumption. Taking everything into consideration, Del Norte, and the country tributary to it, has a brilliant future in store."

The next few months will be a celebration of the past and the future as Del Norte and Rio Grande County celebrates. Several events and exhibits are being planned for Rio Grande County and details will be announced by the Rio Grande County Museum as they are formalized.

Polis in Alamosa to sign major water bills into law

ALAMOSA – Two significant bills directly addressing Colorado's water issues — both sponsored by State Senator Cleave Simpson (R-District 35) - were signed by Governor Jared Polis (D) on Monday, May 23, in a ceremony at the Rio Grande Water Conservation District (RGWCD) in Alamosa.

As has been reported, SB22-028, the "Groundwater Compact Compliance and Sustainability Fund," will devote \$60 million, split evenly between the Rio Grande and Republican River Basins, to purchase well permits and retire irrigated acreage.

In addition to ensuring compliance with the long-standing Rio Grande Compact amongst Colorado, New Mexico and Texas, the funding will provide unprecedented support to RGWCD's ongoing, intensive efforts in sustainably managing the San Luis Valley's aquifers and preserving agriculture into the future.

Funding for the legislation was made available through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

Gov. Polis started the signing ceremony with strong praise for Sen. Simpson's "leadership on water issues" in the legislature. He went on to cite the process that got the legislation passed. "Water doesn't care if you're

Republican or Democrat," Polis said. "The passage of this bi-partisan legislation is the result of bottom-up work from Senator Simpson and [State] Senator [Jerry] Sonnenberg (R) working jointly with the Department of Agriculture and Department of Natural Resources to make this critical investment possible."

Simpson opened his comments by saying, "This is my first bill signing," an acknowledgement that drew a warm laugh from those in attendance. "This was a monumental task, and it took quite an effort. The bill went through five committees, two readings on the floor of the senate, and one on the floor of the house, and there wasn't a single 'no' vote. This bill will help us move forward. It's not a hand-out; we've been working on this for years. But it's coming at a crucial time as we struggle with water issues."

He closed by thanking everyone for their collaboration.

Department of Natural Resources Executive Director Dan Gibbs expressed his gratitude to the sponsors of the bill and Polis for his support, saying it was "huge for the area." He spoke of the drought, which has caused "unprecedented stress and threatened the livelihoods and agriculture as a whole - in communities around the state," while also acknowledging the "hard-earned progress" of people in the Rio Grande and Republican River basins. "The state stands by local leadership," he said, "and I look forward to partnering in the future."

Kate Greenberg, Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture, closed the official comments by thanking Sen. Simpson, SLV Water Conservancy District Manager Heather Dutton, Sen. Sonnenberg, and Conejos Water Conservancy District Manager Nathan Coombs for their partnership in getting the legislation passed.

Greenberg touted the legislation for accomplishing what has been the goal all along: providing "voluntary, compensatory solutions" to water issues. "[The San Luis Valley] is the place where we will look to leadership on the best way to move forward with water challenges facing agricultural communities in the state.

With that, Gov. Polis signed SB22-028 into law.

That signing was followed by a signing ceremony for the second piece of legislation: HB 22-1316, The Colorado Water Conservation Board Construction Fund Project.

'There are so many good projects in this bill, totaling just over \$17 million," Polis said, "with funding for weather modification, incentives to reduce water consumption" and many others.

Simpson, who sponsored HB 1316 as well, said, "People may think this is a routine bill for Colorado Water Conservation Board projects, but this bill is anything but routine. My main motivation for running for office was related to water. I'd set a goal of \$100 million in my mind, and this, plus [SB22-028], is a big step forward.'

Another bicameral, bi-partisan

victory, HB22-1316 devotes funding to a myriad of projects addressing Colorado's water issues, with allocation from the Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB) Construction Fund to the CWCB, or the division of water resources in the department of natural resources for much needed projects.

Specifically, funding will be allocated to nine areas.

The bill will support continuation of the satellite monitoring system, including renovation of existing gauging stations; replacement of outdated collection platforms; lysimeter support, data collection, and maintenance; upgrading of transmission components of the satellite monitoring system established and operated pursuant to section 37-80-102 (10), C.R.S.; stream gauge flood hardening projects; and data collection efforts related to flood forecasting and warning.

Funding will be allocated to support continuation of the weather modification permitting program, which assists water conservation districts, water conservancy districts, and other water providers with the development of cloudseeding programs which provide benefits to recreation, streams, and reservoirs through snowpack enhancement.

The bill paves the way to fund continuation of technical assistance for federal cost-share programs, such as assisting applicants seeking competitive grants from federal water infrastructure, quality, and delivery programs. Examples include the USDA's regional conservation partnership program, the Colorado River Basin salinity control program, and the Gunnison selenium management program.

When it comes to water issues, litigation is always a consideration. HB22-1316 allocates funding to assist in addressing legal issues associated with compact compliance or any other litigation activities.

The bill also provides support for the Colorado Mesonet Project, created to collect vital data related to temperature and precipitation, and the Water Forecasting Project, which includes development of new ground and aerial remote sensing data and equipment and hydrologic modeling.

Funding will also be allocated to support the upper Colorado River Commission's modeling and data analyses, comprehensive dam safety evaluations on existing dams that have a potential consideration for enlargement, the Platte River Recovery Implementation Program, which will support restoration of native and endangered species, and continued efforts in incentives for sustainably managing the Republican River.

Finally, there will be grant funding available for projects that assist in implementing the state water plan.

Polis signed 1316 into law to another

round of applause. "I'm a little overwhelmed," Simpson

said. "And I'm so honored to represent District 35, especially the San Luis Valley.'

Gov. Polis made several stops in the San Luis Valley, including the CSUSLV Area Extension and Del Norte. Look for more stories about Polis in the Valley in next week's issue.

director of the Colorado Potato Administrative Committee, in Monte Vista to celebrate the achievement.

agriculture," Polis said. "Up until now, we've been left out of reaching those markets. This agreement has changed all that."

The National Potato Council states that the U.S. exported \$60 million of fresh potatoes to Mexico in 2021. According to Polis, opening up all of Mexico to U.S. grown potatoes could result in a possible increase of \$190 million export value increase - or \$250 million each year — in the next five years, a figure that Polis suggested was conservative. That equates to a four-fold increase in the amount of potatoes exported south over current levels.

Locally, the expansion will have a significant impact.

"We shipped 1.22 million cwt. of potatoes to Mexico from our 20-21 crop. That represents \$17 million in their market," Ehrlich said.

Polis touched on the effort put into the agreement by Colorado's Department of Agriculture, including a trip where he and Greenberg travelled to Mexico to meet with officials and officials from Mexico coming to Colorado to observe productions in the state. Undersecretary Moffitt echoed Polis, saying that "the San Luis Valley showcased to Mexico what

American production is all about." She added that standard healthy farming practices in the Valley, like crop rotation, were discussed.

"Their observation of production has given full confidence to Mexico. Growers here are some of the best in the world. You produce a high-quality product, and we will only ship the best product south," Moffitt said.

Polis added that Mexico President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador recognizes the importance of establishing a "western hemisphere supply chain," the value of which

Continued from Page 1A some moisture last week, but drought conditions continue to worsen throughout the area.

As of May 8, the snowpack in Colorado was 60 percent measured as percent of median snowfall, up 5 percentage points from the previous week. The Southwest and San Luis Valley were 3 and 11 percent, respectively.

Stored feed supplies were rated 15 percent very short, 24 percent short, and 61 percent adequate. Sheep death loss was 70 percent average and 30 percent light. Cattle death loss was 79 percent average and 21 percent light, USDA reported. The changing conditions helped to add to the local snowpack, however, drought conditions persist throughout the San Luis Valley, raising concerns about water shortages and wildfires. A wildfire broke out recently near the Visitor's Center for Great Sand Dunes National Park. The area has received rain and snow throughout the park and the Medano Pass areas during this storm. Medano Creek has been low this year, however, the recent snow should alleviate this situation somewhat as it melts. The lower sections of Medano Pass received 2 to 5 inches of snow, rendering the pass difficult driving until the snow melts.

Officers seized 410 grams (nearly a half kilo) of methamphetamines, .222 grams of heroin and an additional 60 grams of fentanyl (nearly 700 pills combined) during the search of the residence.

"This is a significant seizure, especially with the lethality of such small amounts of fentanyl," Meek said.

Munoz was charged with the additional charges from the search warrant of:

•unlawfuldistribution, manufacturing, dispensing, sale or possession (methamphetamines) a drug felony first-degree offense.

•unlawfuldistribution, manufacturing, dispensing, sale or possession (heroin) a drug felony first-degree offense.

•unlawfuldistribution, manufacturing, dispensing, sale or possession (fentanyl)

Munoz was initially given a \$100,000 bond but it was reduced to \$25,000 after he appeared in Saguache County court. The original trafficking charges from May 21 also were given a \$25,000 bond in Rio Grande County.

"We are continuing to follow up on the sources of these narcotics that Munoz was selling," Meek said. "I want to commend our officers. They were out in force with the Saguache County Sheriff's Office on an operation targeting bad driving when the original traffic stop was conducted. The officers did an excellent job identifying the signs of narcotics trafficking. They were persistent at gathering the necessary evidence for the arrest, the subsequent search warrant and gathering more evidence for additional charges. I am confident they will continue to make our town safer whether it is targeting reckless driving, enforcing laws against violence or attacking the narcotics problem in the area."

Norte Prospector.



CENTER — The Center community gathered Thursday, May 12, to celebrate the opening of a state-of-the-art wastewater treatment plant with a ribbon cutting and tour of the facility.

This facility has been a longterm project that has finally come to fruition. The facility is not finished, but it will be fully operational soon.

The ribbon cutting was followed by a small lunch and a tour of the facility. This facility, according to officials, is the first of its type here in Colorado, and is using the latest technology to handle the wastewater needs of Center and the surrounding areas.

According to Moe Jones, who is on the Sanitation Board, "We've Got to clean up our environment and this is one great way to do it.'

The new facility can handle a greater amount of wastewater while functioning at a more efficient level.

This new facility comes as the addition of the North 90 acreage will be adding homes and businesses wastewater that will need treatment, as well as any future expansion in the town.

The ambitious \$11.791 million project was made possible through numerous grants by the USDA, DOLA and other entities.

The facility will be run by Town of Center employees when it is completed and is an example of what can be accomplished through the considerate and careful use of grant funding in rural communities, officials stated.

Bird count helps raise funds for threatened bird species



The Colorado Birding Challenge is a statewide effort and was created to provide an annual flow of funds to support specific bird conservation projects.

This year's challenge funds will primarily support sagebrush habitat restoration in the Gunnison Basin which hosts 87% of the world population of Gunnison Sage-Grouse, which is a Threatened spe-

day or in a flat amount.

The count tallied a total of 112 species for Rio Grande County. Best birds were Virginia's Warbler, Cassin's Finch, Black-necked Stilt, Peregrine Falcon, Forster's Terns, Black Phoebe, Western Tanager, Black-headed Grosbeak, Long-billed Dowitcher, Canyon Wren, Mexican Mallard and Osprey.

The team raised over \$1,100 toward habitat work for the Gunnison Sage-grouse. The team ranked

seventh for donation amounts among more than 100 teams in the state. 'It was amazing to see the local Valley birders step forward to help in this important endeavor," John Rawinski said. "It shows that people are committed to a healthy and sustainable environment for birds, even amidst the daunting challenges birds are facing. The fact that we are down 3 billion birds in the last 50 years in North America should be a wake-up call for all of us to better conserve the

earth's resources amidst the increasing challenges. I am very proud



MONTE VISTA - The Rio Grande National Forest is implementing Stage 1 fire restrictions effective at 12:01a.m., on Friday, May 20. The persistent drought, and the lack of spring rains have led to the dry conditions that elevate fire danger in the San Luis and Upper Rio Grande Valley's, RGNF officials stated.

"The relentless spring winds have accelerated the snow melt and drying process this year," said Forest Supervisor Dan Dallas, of the Rio Grande National Forest. "With the increasingly dry conditions, unfavorable long-term forecast, and the beginning of the summer recreation season, we feel this is a prudent decision."

RGNF implements Stage 1 fire restrictions Stage 1 fire restrictions prohibit:

> • Igniting, building, maintaining, attending, or using a fire (including fires fueled by charcoal or briquettes) outside of a permanent metal or concrete fire pit or grate that the Forest Service has installed and maintained at its developed recreation sites (campgrounds and picnic areas). 36 CFR § 261.52(a).

> • Smoking, except in an enclosed vehicle or building, a developed recreation site, or while stopped in an area at least three feet in diameter that is barren or cleared of all flammable materials. 36 CFR § 261.52(d).

· Operating a chainsaw without an effective and properly installed USDA- or Society

of Automotive Engineers (SAE)- approved ets, exploding targets, tracers, and incendiary spark arrestor, a chemical pressurized fire extinguisher (with a minimum 8 oz. capacity and rating of 2A) kept with the operator, and a round point shovel with an overall length of at least 35 inches readily available for use. 36 CFR § 261.52(j).

· Blasting, welding, or operating acetylene or other torch with open flame without being in a cleared area of at least 10 feet in diameter and keeping a chemical pressurized fire extinguisher (with a minimum 8 oz. capacity and rating of 2A) with the operator. 36 CFR § 261.52(i).

• Using an explosive. This includes but is not limited to fuses, blasting caps, fireworks, rock-

ammunition. 36 CFR § 261.52(b).

As a reminder, the use of explosives and incendiary devices, including fireworks, are always prohibited on all federal lands.

Fire restrictions will be in place until further notice. In addition to criminal penalties, those found responsible for starting wildfires may also face restitution costs of suppressing the fire.

The San Luis Valley Field Office is also in Stage 1 fire restrictions on Bureau of Land Management lands in six San Luis Valley counties. For more information about BLM Colorado Fire restrictions visit BLM Colorado Fire Restrictions.

Taking on this role, she did not foresee the ensuing COVID-19 pandemic, where clear communication and collaborating with community partners


