SAGUACHE — The regularly scheduled Saguache County Commissioners meeting on July 20 covered a variety of topics, including auctions, repairs and future goals. It was held in person and via Zoom.

On the schedule was the Commissioner's reports, County Administrator's report, needed repairs to the Saguache County Museum, and a request for office design ideas by the Department Heads.

Ski-Hi Stampede ready to celebrate **99** years

STAFF REPORT

MONTE VISTA – Colorado's Oldest Pro Rodeo is celebrating its 99th anniversary in 2021. The San Luis Valley Ski-Hi Stampede will return to Monte Vista July 22-25. Described as having "roots as deep as the San Luis Valley itself," the event continues to be a key feature of the Professional Rodeo landscape in Colorado and beyond.

Founded in 1919, the Ski-Hi Stampede has continued for nine decades with three years deducted two during World War II and one during the COVID-19 pandemic. According to old newspaper reports, the first Stampede was held on Aug. 11-13, 1919, with more than 10,000 attending the event. Since that time, the Ski-Hi Stampede has received four nominations for PRCA Small Rodeo of the Year and has come to be recognized as a mainstay of San Luis Valley history and culture.

Cuevas found guilty of first-degree murder of mother

PUEBLO – Anthony Cuevas, of Monte Vista, was found guilty on July 15 of first-degree murder in connection with the gruesome death of his 58-year-old mother, Maria "Mary" Cuevas Garcia, in October of 2019.

He was immediately sentenced by Judge Allison Ernst, who sentenced him to life without parole for murder in the first degree. She gave him concurrent prison sentences for vehicular eluding and identity theft. The trial began on July 9, and he when authorities with the Pueblo

During the trial, the defense stated that Anthony Cuevas did dump the suitcase with body parts inside in a Pueblo dumpster after site, authorities towed the dumpster his wife Melanie Cuevas had killed his mother.

The story, initially reported by the Pueblo Chieftain and subsequently covered in a series of articles by the Valley Publishing, first made headlines on Oct. 17, 2019,


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

Your Night Sky By DARLENE DANKO

Spectacular Sagittarius

The arms of the Milky Way are named for the constellations they pass through: Perseus, Sagittarius, Centaurus and Cygnus are the major arms. Sagittarius is the most spectacular because the center of the Milky Way lies behind it, and that's where it's the densest and brightest.

You may recognize Sagittarius at the Teapot asterism. Look to the south and you will see the Teapot in the Milky Way sitting close to the horizon with the handle on the left and the spout on the right. The Milky Way appears to be steam coming up from the Teapot!

The actual constellation is Sagittarius the Archer with its bow aimed west towards Scorpius, the scorpion. Scorpios has a distinct "J" shape also

described as a fishhook. The bright orange star Antares lies in the long arm of the "J". The Sagittarius arrowhead is the tip of the Teapot sprout. The Archer is pictured as a centaur creature with the upper torso of a man and the body and legs of a horse. While you're looking at the Teapot, see if you can identify the Archer.

Many constellations are difficult to identify. When the ancient Greeks and other civilizations first named them more than 2,500 years ago there were no lights. So even the fainter stars were easy to see. Now we can't see as much, plus many stars have changed position in relation to Earth and the constellations no longer appear to be the same image they were back then. That's why asterisms have become more common and easily identifiable. In that area you should also be able

to see four "naked-eye" star clusters. They may just look like fuzzy blobs in the sky. Binoculars will clarify the blob and identify the stars. They also help you to see more of the clusters.

Star clusters are groups of stars that are sometimes quite dense while others are more openly scattered.

Some may glow more because they contain a lot of gas and dust which reflects more light. They are consolidated toward the galactic center where most stars are born in clusters of tens to thousands in the great dark clouds that permeate space.

was removing it from the back of a dark blue 2018 Nissan Versa around 6:42 a.m. on that Thursday morning. Roughly three hours later, authorities received the call about the suitcase. Unable to identify the victim and seeking the public's assistance, police released the video along with photos of a clown tattoo on the victim's body Thursday night.

According to a 2019 KRDO exclusive interview, family members were gathered at their home in Monte Vista watching football when the video came on the television. They immediately recognized the car as belonging to Maria "Mary" Cuevas Garcia, but "it was the victim's tattoo that confirmed their suspicions."

The Chieftain reports that Destia Rane Hamilton, Cuevas Garcia's granddaughter, said her brother saw the surveillance footage first.

"He told me to look at it and I did. I recognized the car, the way he walked and how he dresses and the tattoos he has on his neck. We all knew it was him," Hamilton said. "We were in such shock. We knew my uncle and grandma had fights, but we never knew he would go this far," she told KRDO.

Cuevas Garcia's car was found later in the morning of Oct. 17 after having been taken to Dionisio Metal and Iron in Pueblo.

Anthony Cuevas, 37, had a warrant out for his arrest on a parole violation after being sentenced in 2014 in Rio Grande County to 10 years for possession of a schedule II controlled substance in connection with a conspiracy charge.

In October of 2019, after getting several tips from the video and locating Cuevas Garcia's car, police executed search warrants around the city looking for him, according to Sgt. Franklyn Ortega of the Pueblo Police Department.

Value Your Business

This is perhaps the most critical step in business transition planning. Work with a business broker, your banker, or your accountant to do an estimated valuation of your business. A valuation early in the process will give you an idea of the value of your business and give you time to address issues.

In determining the value of your business, consider more than the value of inventory and real estate. "Try to monetize the reputation, respect, and good name your business has earned over the years," advised Medina. "They are valuable to you and the buyer."

Determine Personal Financial Needs Decide how much money you need to meet your financial goals after the business sale. Do expected net proceeds

meet those goals? Include tax obligations in that calculation.

"It is really important, years ahead, to plan your retirement. Don't sell yourself short," Medina offered.

Let your family know you plans as soon as possible. Especially if family members are involved in the business. Failure to keep them informed can cause lasting conflict in the family.

Restitution awarded in Last Chance Mine theft case

According to Last Chance Mine owner Jack Morris, he was awarded restitution for damages and loss of property as a result of a theft case in 2020. The case has undergone several changes from the initial charges that were brought against Ken Love who was identified through video surveillance recovered from the day of the theft.

Morris stated that a judge ruled to have restitution in the amount of \$3,700 be paid to him for the claim filed after the case was dropped by Colorado 12th Judicial District Attorney Alonzo Payne in February. Morris sought restitution to cover costs of having to replace locks and keys on the property and for the amethyst geode that was stolen during the incident.

In an update on Feb. 4 printed in the Mineral County Miner, the case Morris.

was headed to jury trial because the suspect, Love, had not accepted a County Court documents.

It was at this point that Morris learned that the three felony charges, including third-degree burglary, sixth-degree burglary and felony theft were dropped per recommendations and a plea deal reached between Love and DA Payne's office. According to Morris, the charges were dropped to a misdemeanor trespassing charge.

"The verdict was reached on February 17, and I was not notified or consulted before hand. Despite the video surveillance, admission of guilt by Love and the return of a portion of the property that was to drop all charges without my knowledge or involvement," stated

According to Morrisan unidentified party, who was later identified plea deal or that a plea deal had not through video surveillance as Love, been offered according to Rio Grande broke into the main shaft during the business's off season and removed a rare amethyst geode from the wall of the mine and used tools to try to remove pieces of one of the most prominent amethyst veins that is shown during tours.

The theft was reported at the beginning of July of 2020 and by July 15. Morris had recovered video footage of Love entering the mine and leaving with material. Morris also stated that Love had brought some of the material to the Mineral County Sheriff's Department after he was formally charged with several counts of theft.

"Even though restitution in the stolen, they made their decision case was awarded, it will never pay for the geode that was taken. It was one of a kind and can never be replaced," said Morris.
