The defendants are also charged with two counts of child abuse.

COVID-19 cases surging in Valley

Highest positivity and one-week incidence rates in state

STAFF REPORT

SAN LUIS VALLEY — The San Luis Valley region is seeing the highest COVID-19 positivity rate and the highest one-week case incidence

On Monday, May 10, there were 163 known active cases of COVID-19 in the San Luis Valley. There have been three reported fatalities related to COVID-19 in the Valley over the past 2 weeks.

This surge in cases has prompted questions by many about quarantine after exposure to the virus, health officials stated. Due to high case rates and the presence of variants in our community, the quarantine period for those who have close contact with a positive case is 14 days.

"If you tested positive for COVID-19 and completed your isolation, there are 90 days of assumed

natural immunity so you will not be required to quarantine if you come into close contact with someone who has a new case of COVID-19 during that 90 days. If you do not have proof in the form of a positive test, you will still need to quarantine," health officials stated.

If it has been at least two weeks since receiving the recommended doses of vaccine (two doses of Moderna or Pfizer, or one dose of Johnson and Johnson), a person is considered fully vaccinated and will not need to quarantine, even if they have had close contact with someone who has COVID-19.

The chances of getting COVID-19 after being fully vaccinated are low, but it is not impossible, health officials stated. While those who are fully vaccinated and later have contact with a new positive case do not need to quarantine, they should still watch for symptoms for two weeks just in case. For those rare few who do develop COVID-19, the vaccine greatly reduces the likelihood of

Among SLV residents aged 65 and older, 68% have been fully vaccinated. This is reflected in lower hospitalizations in this age group. In the past two weeks, there were 15 local hospital admissions related to COVID-19, many of them under the

If a person has symptoms of



COVID-19, officials advise getting tested even if they think the symptoms may be something else, like allergies. Many people have assumed they had allergies, and unintentionally exposed others before their illness worsened and finally prompted testing.

Kevin completed K-12 at Sargent School, graduating in 1997. He attended two Colorado junior colleges before completing his four-year degree at Colorado State University in animal science. After five years working at a Lamar feed lot and gaining valuable experience, he moved home for a short while before continuing his education at Northern Arizona University where he earned his MBA. In October of 2011, he landed a job

at Wilbur-Ellis in El Centro, Calif., where he became their top marketer in the company's forage division. He was their representative to Japan making many trips to that country to market Wilbur-Ellis's animal feed products. He helped develop an alfalfaoat horse-pellet which quickly rose in popularity, both in Japan and locally. He was instrumental in turning the Wilbur-Ellis mill around, making it, once again, a profitable enterprise.

Kevin was loved and respected by his colleagues and his buyers alike. During these difficult COVID-19 times, the buyers would put their trust in Kevin without seeing the products and buy what Kevin recommended.

He was especially knowledgeable about Sudan grass. He has been a member of the United States Forage Export Council since shortly after joining the company and last December he was elected by his peers to serve as the officer for the Southern Region.

Quiet in nature and always thinking, Kevin will leave an empty hole in many lives as well as an impressive legacy. He loved the San Luis Valley and loved to fish, tying many of his own flies. Recently his boss and two young children went on a fishing adventure near El Centro with Kevin where "Kevin knew all the fishing spots." He also enjoyed riding horses and mules in the mountains and hunting with his dad and he enjoyed mom's home cooking.

Your Night Sky

Viewing Mercury

On May 16, Mercury reaches its greatest elongation from the Sun at 22 degrees west of the Sun. This is a perfect time to view it since we don't see it very often. It'll pop up in the west above Venus after the Sun sets and the sky gets dark.

We just can't look too soon or too late. It won't be visible too soon and horizon. So, the best time to look for it is 1-1 ½ hours after the Sun sets.

Since Mercury is the closest planet to our Sun, we don't get to see it very often. It's 36 million miles from the Sun, but from here it appears to be 88 days, and spins on its axis in 58.6 days. It's not a big planet with a diameter of 3,032 miles, and it has no moons.

In March 1984, we finally got a close view of Mercury when the probe Mariner 10 visited it after leaving its visit to Venus. Mercury is covered with craters that look similar to the heavily cratered region of our moon. But its craters are much shallower than our Moon's. Mariner 10 has flown past Mercury 3 times.

Being so close to the Sun makes it follows the Sun down below the mercury the hottest and fastest moving of our planets. It's also the smallest. Although I've only observed it with unaided vision, I think it would be interesting to look at it with binoculars or a telescope. Since it's close to bright Venus this time, it next to the Sun. It circles the Sun in might be nice to observe it with one of those. Venus sets about 65 minutes

after the Sun, and Mercury sets about 115 minutes after the Sun. So, viewing

it after Venus sets would be good.

On May 19 the moon reaches its first quarter, which means that it's half visible. It'll be close to the star Regulus which is the brightest star in the constellation Leo the Lion. Also, the Eta Aquarid meteor shower is active until May 20. It peaked on May 5, but it is still visible. The best time to look for it is early morning in the south-east when the sky is

U.S. Congresswoman Lauren Boebert (R-CO3) met with Mineral County Commissioners last week and discussed several topics, including forest health, county funding and Boebert's infrastructure legislation that she introduced at the end of April.

Congresswoman Boebert visits Creede

MINERAL COUNTY — U.S. Congresswoman Lauren Boebert (R-CO3) and her team visited Creede on Friday, May 7, and met with Mineral County Commissioners to hear about the current issues the county is facing and to update the board on what is happening in Washington DC. Boebert was elected to U.S. House of Representatives last November and has since spent her time working through several issues facing Coloradoans and working to create better relationships in DC.

Rep. Boebert came from Cortez through Creede and was headed to Lake City during her tour of the southwestern part of the state. Boebert began by asking what she could help with and what issues was the county facing at this time.

"Of course, we are here to meet with you, and we are here to learn what the big issues are so that we can introduce legislation to get you the help you deserve," Boebert said.

Commissioner Scott Lamb opened by stating that he sent the Congresswoman a letter about Good Samaritan legislation the county is currently trying to push through due to some of the environmental issues the county is facing.

"How it works is that it holds people harmless if they're doing their best to improve something that even if it goes wrong, they are held harmless, which is why it is called a good Samaritan legislation," Lamb said.

Boebert said she had not seen the letter but that she would find it and look into the issue further.

Commissioner Ramona Weber explained why the legislation would be beneficial to the county.

"It would be phenomenal to this area just because there are so many areas that could be cleaned up, but everyone is afraid to touch them for fear of doing something wrong," Weber said.

Commissioner Jesse Albright also pointed out that the Clean Water Act affects how the county deals with areas such as the Superfund sites throughout the historical mining district and throughout the county.

"It has to change in order to allow us to clean some areas up," Albright said.

Weber also spoke about the Small PILT Parity Act which is formulated by small populations in 49 counties around the state that have 90% of their land owned by the Forest Service and how it affects Mineral County in general.

"What is does, is there are 49 counties in the state that have 90% Forest Service lands and really small populations and when they do the formulation for PILT they hammer us for having a small population but the reason we have smaller populations is because we are 90% Forest Service land, without taking into account that we still have the impact of summer visitors with little funding to do road maintenance and trail maintenance and we don't get the funding we need," Weber said.

Commissioners also spoke to Boebert about the condition of the surrounding forests and the impacts of beetle kill in the area. Albright said there is a need for more logging in the area.

to the group as "Father God", as well as Christopher Royer, John Robertson, Sarah Rudolph, Karin Raymond and Ryan Kramer. The seventh, Ma Obdulia Franco Gonzales, called in for her hearing from a separate location earlier in the day.

Colorado 12th Judicial District Deputy District Attorney Alex Raines was the sole prosecutor appearing on behalf of the state. In contrast, each of the six defendants was represented by a different defense attorney who, in separate proceedings, requested the court release their client from jail on a personal recognizance bond based on the lack of severity in the charges.

In each case, DDA Raines countered that the DA's office is amending the charges from abuse of a corpse, a class six felony, to tampering with a corpse, a class three felony and more serious charge.

Jason Castillo — also known as "Father God" within the group — appeared first, represented by attorney David Hoag. Of the six hearings, Castillo's had the most back-and-forth between opposing counsel. Hoag asked Castillo to be released on a personal recognizance bond, arguing Castillo was not a flight risk, has no criminal history in Colorado, and the group, which owns several pieces of property, has had a presence in the Crestone area for four years.

"Mr. Castillo has nowhere else he could go [outside of Colorado]," said Hoag, adding Castillo plans to stay in the Valley for the duration of the proceedings.

Hoag also argued that the arrest affidavit did not establish probable cause to charge his client, a point raised by several other attorneys that followed. This prompted presiding Judge Ulrich to state she would have to consider the legal ramifications of addressing probable cause after already granted by a judge.

Deputy DA Raines responded that Castillo has no criminal history in Colorado but does in Florida, California and Nevada, going further to ask the court to increase the bond, currently set at \$100,000 cash, commensurate with the class three felony that Castillo and the others will be charged. But, Raines said, if the court chose to release Castillo on a personal recognizance bond, he requested the court prohibit Castillo and other defendants from residing together while the case progresses through the judicial system.

Hoag countered that Raines' request

was a violation of Castillo's First Amendment rights and freedom of association, describing it as a "very serious" request.

Throughout the proceeding, Castillo, wearing a yellow prisoner's uniform, sat without moving and showed little emotion.

Judge Ulrich deferred any decision until a May 12 bond hearing.

With a few exceptions, the hearings that followed ran roughly along the same lines.

Ann Roan, attorney for Royer, echoed Hoag's statement that the lack of severity in the charge requires Royer be released and the affidavit does not establish probable cause. She asked for Royer to be released on no bond. Ulrich set a bond hearing for May 12.

Sam Weihman, attorney for Robertson, also asked for Robertson to be released on a personal recognizance bond, telling the court that his client had served in the United States Marine Corps. He also echoed Hoag—prohibiting the defendants from living together constituted a violation of Robertson's first amendment rights.

Raines countered that Robertson had a criminal history in Kansas that was three pages long, including failure to appear in court. He contested the personal recognizance bond but withdrew the motion that the court increase the amount of bond.

Ulrich set the matter for a bond hearing May 12.

After a protracted technical glitch reminiscent of the "can you hear me now" advertisements, Rudolph and Raymond had their hearings.

Chip Cutler, representing Rudolph, described a scenario where Rudolph, 35,had moved from her home in Salida to Crestone several months ago and joined "Love Has Won" to "enhance her spirituality" and "for the betterment of society."

He stated she did not have a lengthy stay with the group, was not involved in the transport of Carlson's body and had no relationship with the two children related to the child abuse charges.

Cutler said Rudolph also had accommodations in another city with someone unconnected to "Love Has Won" that would allow her to live separately from the other defendants during court proceedings.

Raymond was described by her attorney, Riley Selleck, as a 47-year-old mother with no criminal history and a long and stable employment history in Pennsylvania. Randolph's 13-year-old

daughter, who was present in the house where Carlson's body was being kept, is now living with Raymond's father in another state.

Raines withdrew the request for increased bond and said the state would not contest the request for Raymond to be released on a personal recognizance bond.

In both Rudolph's and Randolph's

In both Rudolph's and Randolph's cases, Ulrich granted the request for reduced bond, setting it at \$2,000 and \$1,000 cash, respectively. Hearings were set in both cases for a return filing of motion, on the more serious class three felony, for May 12.

The sixth defendant to appear was Kramer whose attorney argued for personal recognizance bond based on no criminal history in Colorado and his three-year uninterrupted residence in the Valley.

Raines took a moment to compliment Kramer on his "professionalism" in submitting a letter to the court that contained information the court may not have already known and stated that Kramer does not have criminal history in Colorado. Nonetheless, due to the severity of the pending class three felony charges, Raines contested the request for a personal recognizance bond but withdrew the motion to increase bond.

Ulrich granted Kramer's request for a personal recognizance bond for \$1,000 and set a return filing date of May 12, as well.

The proceedings lasted more than 90 minutes.

At approximately 11:50 p.m. on Thursday, April 28, deputies with the Saguache County Sheriff's Office served a search warrant on a private residence in Moffat due to a report they had received that a dead body was in the house.

Once on the scene, deputies found the "mummified remains" of a woman presumed to be Carlson in a back bedroom wrapped in a sleeping bag with glitter makeup around her eyes and Christmas tree lights wrapped around her body that was positioned "as if in a shrine."

There were seven adults and two children, aged 13 years and 2 years old, in the house when SCSO authorities arrived. The adults were arrested. The children were placed in appropriate settings for the night. The children's presence in a house where Carlson's "mummified remains" were in the back bedroom presumably prompted the charges of child abuse.

One certain thing I have learned in my two Spring seasons on the Rio Grande National Forest is that the wind blows here in the San Luis Valley. I was warned. I hope you are laughing. I am. But, every year, the blowing wind and disappearing snow here in the Rockies makes me reflect on a question that I have been asked nearly countless times over my 28 years as a wildland firefighter. Each Spring, people ask me, "what do you think fire season will be like this year?" I always answer with the same reply: "You can never tell until the year is over." In my mind, this really begs the next two questions, what are my firefighting agencies doing to prepare for the coming wildfires and what should I do to prepare?

Here on the Rio Grande National now on board for the season. We happily welcome them back since we know we cannot do this without them. They play a key role in fire management both here on the RGNF and anywhere in the country they are needed. The trainings and recertifications have begun in earnest. Fireline refreshers, endurance testing, next level fire management courses and terrain and equipment familiarization are all happening

Of course, the fire folks that have been around all year have been diligently executing their roles as well. Coordinating with our local partners is key to a successful response here. As mentioned in local publications last week, we are expecting a "normal potential for large wildfire activity" for the month of May. However, those predictions increase to an "above normal potential for large

wildfire activity" for June. This doesn't mean we WILL have large fires. It suggests that, based on the current and expected weather and fuel conditions, any ignition has a higher probability of expanding into a large fire.

Forest our temporary fire crews are managers are trained to act swiftly to respond to primary life safety needs. We will always work with that premise as our #1 priority. You should expect nothing less. We will order as much help as deemed appropriate to manage the fire to the extent possible. And, our partners and neighbors (local, state and federal) will be ready to respond to ready to assist them.

There may be a need for fire restrictions later in the year. Always check for those before you head out on your adventure. If there are restrictions, understand them fully and plan to bring a gas grill and possibly one of those cool propane firepits. You should also pre-plan for when campfires ARE allowed. Bring your shovel and buckets for water. It makes extinguishing your fire so much easier. Use the drown, stir and feel method to put them out. There is no better way. There When that happens, our fire are many ways to enjoy the forest without risk to starting a fire. The key is to plan for those now, before the summer activities launch into full swing.

While we are prepared for wildfire responses now and will make the necessary adjustments as conditions change, I feel that prevention is a more important activity that will serve us better. 



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
