## SLV receiving 1,750 COVID-19 vaccines

Saguache County

SAN LUIS VALLEY - The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) announced Dec. 11 that it has "collaborated closely with local public health agencies across the state to prepare health care facilities to receive the COVID-19 Moderna or Pfizer vaccines. These health care facilities will then distribute the vaccine to frontline health care

temperature freezers to receive the first shipment of the Pfizer vaccine. remains at Level Yellow These locations were chosen for their unique abilities to store, monitor, and handle vaccines in ultra-cold temperatures (-60°C to -80°C), as well as their willingness to redistribute COVID-19 vaccine(s) to other providers in their regions." The only San Luis Valley (SLV) public health organization to receive the Pfizer vaccine in the first two allocations is Rio Grande Hospital which will be receiving 50 dosages. 



## Your Night Sky

#### **The Northern Cross** By Darlene Danko

This asterism is part of the constellation Cygnus the Swan that sits in front of the Milky Way. Its peak time is actually August and September, but it's still visible in the evening. It shines fairly high at night fall, and then begins to sink down as the evening progresses. The bird's wings span across the Milky Way in a location that's packed with stars and an assortment of deep sky

Cygnus is one of the most prominent constellations in our sky because of all the things it's packed with. It represents a swan flying down the Milky Way and contains 13 stars. The 5 center stars are what's known as the Northern Cross.

tail of the bird and is also the top of distinctive feature is the Great Rift. It's

the Northern Cross. You might remember that it's also part of the Summer Triangle. Deneb is also known as Alpha Cigni. It's 1500 LY from us and is the brightest star in Cygnus at nearly 160,000 times brighter than our sun, and it's a white

The star Albiero marks the bottom of the Northern Cross. This star is blue-yellow and is also known as Beta Cigni. It's a beautiful double star with 2 colors that also marks the bill of the swan. If you look at it with binoculars, you'll be able to see the 2 stars.

Dec. 21 is the start of winter, and Jupiter and Saturn will have their conjunction. This will be their closest meeting since July 16, 1623. So, they will meet up in our sky. The next time this will happen is 60 years from now March 15, 2080. You may be able to view them together with binoculars, but

## Mountain Valley dishes out five-star food

**SAGUACHE** — Since Nutrition and Food Services Director Julie Leathers joined Mountain Valley School District in July 2019, the crew has been creating meals that are at least 50% scratch-made and packed full of fresh vegetables, fruit and other healthy ingredients.

Working with Charlene Hammel (a dedicated employee of five years) and new team member Amber Ormsby, Director Leathers rounds out a trio that appreciates administrative support.

"We have an awesome leadership team — the principal, superintendent. And the teachers are just amazing and so supportive,"Leathers said. "It's been a wonderful experience."

Opened in October 2019, the new kitchen features state-of-the-art equipment, which has really helped improve quality. In response to the pandemic, MVS feeds students in the building and at home. In addition to serving breakfast and lunch in the classroom, Food Service staff prepare grab-and-go meals for remote students. The three-person team is truly grateful for the amazing help from the AmeriCorps volunteers who helped produce and share the food.

"We have kids and teachers come up and say, 'this is really yummy!"" Leathers said. "We're trying to provide quality home cooking for our kids and staff." Meals include homemade turkey subs, grapes, carrots, oranges; homemade chicken burritos; homemade Waldorf apple salad; scratch spaghetti; pulled pork hoagies; ham mac and cheese with homemade dinner rolls; Cowboy caviar; Banana and cornbread; Spanish rice; Southwest Chicken salad (everyone's favorite); potato salad;





and Valley Wide Alamosa Pharmacy will receive 500 vaccinations. Rio Grande, Saguache, Mineral, Conejos and Costilla County Public Health Departments will each receive 100 Moderna vaccinations. Rio Grande Hospital will also receive 100 Moderna vaccinations.

CDPHE announced Dec. 11 as part of the Phase 1 vaccination plan, "The federal government will deliver shortly after the first shipment of the Pfizer vaccine. The Moderna vaccine does not need to be stored at ultra-cold temperatures, allowing it to be distributed even further, especially to rural areas. Because of supply chain limitations, we expect we will receive regular COVID-19 vaccine allocations from the federal government on a weekly basis. To be as fair and efficient with distribution as possible, the state has developed a phased approach to vaccine distribution to save lives and end the crisis that has been brought on by the pandemic as quickly as possible. The federal government is determining the allocation amount by the size of every state's total population and the quantity of ready-to-ship doses from the manufacturer(s). The first Colorado shipment will be 46,800 doses of the Pfizer vaccine. The second shipment will be 95,600 of the Moderna vaccine. Colorado determined the number of doses going to each location by

surveying facilities' needs for Phase 1. Many of the doses allocated to local public health agencies will be administered to health care workers at local hospitals that do not have the capability to store vaccine."

sneeze, sing or even just talk. This is why the use of facial coverings (masks) is so effective in reducing the spread of this virus! Everyone that wears a mask and follows social distancing guidelines when around other people is not only showing proper respect for those around them but is also participating in the most effective (and easiest) preventative measures we know of.

And, as you may have heard in the past, wearing that mask is most effective at protecting others from you. And this is especially important because some cases of COVID-19 don't produce noticeable or significant symptoms but also because people that are infected with this virus start shedding the virus up to 2-3 days before they develop symptoms. So, even though you may feel well, you could be infected and not know it or could merely be in the early phase of an infection before you start feeling unwell and be unknowingly spreading the virus to others. Please, for everyone's safety, wear a mask.

Although some that become infected with this virus will experience only mild symptoms, the vast majority of people that get COVID-19 will experience symptoms similar to a bad flu (fever, malaise, fatigue, cough, etc.). And some, especially the elderly, and those with underlying health conditions including diabetes. high blood pressure, obesity, and/or underlying autoimmune disorders, are at risk of experiencing much more severe symptoms and can even die from an infection.

The most severe and debilitating symptoms of this disease stem from what this virus can do to our lungs. As the infection progresses in our system, it can sometimes cause severe pneumonia. On chest x-rays or CT of the chest, this manifests as multiple white areas within the periphery of the lung tissue. This appearance is most commonly diffuse, affecting both lungs and often all lobes of the lungs.

This appearance is caused by the buildup of fluid and cellular debris in the small air sacs that make up the lung tissue called alveoli. The alveoli are the part of the lung where gas exchange occurs (oxygen is absorbed and carbon dioxide is released by the blood stream). When enough of these sacs are damaged and fill up with fluid, the person becomes very short of breath and is unable to maintain their blood oxygen saturation which can lead to other problems such as organ damage, stroke and heart attack.

Unfortunately, as this virus continues to spread, its most severe effects become more and more common (we've all seen the soaring infection rate and death tolls reported recently). Fortunately however, it is within our power, individually and collectively, to protect ourselves and our communities by adhering to a few simple guidelines:

- 1) Wear a face covering whenever
- around others. 2) Avoid large indoor gatherings.
- 3) Maintain a distance of at least 6 feet from others whenever possible.

Together we can bring this virus back under control and help bring an end to suffering and sadness that it continues to cause as it spreads.

## Deck the paws: Ensuring a Pet-Safe Holiday home

The holiday season is a favorite time of year for many who transform their homes with festive decorations, bake winter treats, and open their doors to guests. Because these traditions introduce new variables into their furry friend's environment, pet owners should be aware of any potential hazards that might arise.

Dr. Lori Teller, an associate professor in the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, says that owners adding a floral touch to their holiday decorations should be mindful of which plants they select. Lilies, European mistletoe, amaryllis bulbs, and pine needles can all cause serious health complications

"In general, they can cause oral irritation and may cause your pet to salivate and drool. Excessive quantities can lead to gastrointestinal upset," Teller said. "It is a myth that poinsettias are toxic to pets."

Other holiday decorations pet owners should avoid include candles, which may burn pets or cause a serious fire if knocked over, and liquid potpourri, which is extremely toxic to cats. If your pet is a curious climber, consider anchoring your Christmas tree to a wall or ceiling to avoid falling and sharp broken ornaments.

When opening gifts, keep in mind that batteries are toxic to pets and should be kept out of reach. Any decorative elements containing string, such as ribbons or tinsel, may also cause an obstruction if ingested.

"Ornaments made from food, like popcorn balls, can also be a source of danger. Hang these ornaments well out of reach," Teller said. "When putting presents under the tree or around the fireplace, make sure that any giftwrapped food items are out of reach."

Pets hunting for a holiday snack may also be at risk. Chocolate, especially dark and baking chocolates; raisins; bones; alcohol; and fatty foods can all cause serious issues. Macadamia nuts can cause neurologic problems in pets as well. Anything that contains xylitol, an artificial sweetener found in many foods from gum to peanut butter, is toxic to dogs, leading to acute liver failure and death if not treated immediately.

"Normally, raw dough is a seasonal problem during the holidays, but this year there has been an exponential increase in the number of yeast and dough intoxications because so many people have been perfecting their baking skills during the pandemic," Teller

wants to convince us their money would be more worthwhile than our livelihoods. Drying up the Valley and turning it into a dust bowl is not their concern.

Water is our lifeblood in the Valley. The agricultural community comprises 95% of the Valley economy and as gas is to a car, water is to food production. The farmers and ranchers already don't have enough water to sustain their current production. They are working to try to balance this scarce resource and also meet longstanding commitments to downstream states.

RWR claims that "water needy citizens" on the Front Range want our water. Our response is that we need our water and we are currently facing shortages and a serious decline in our water aquifers. We could use much more water than we have! Their proposal involves moving water from the Valley aquifer in a massive pipeline to the Front Range to serve 66,000 homes. There is no way our water could ever meet their ever-increasing need. The Front Range communities need to figure out how to LIVE within their natural resource limits and not continue to grab water from other thriving communities. This proposal needs to disappear.

We will not be fooled by RWR's bribes and misleading surveys as they attempt to misdirect Valley residents! Val Alto doesn't think that the Valley is responsible for the water needs of the Front Range, especially when we can't meet our own needs.

Val Alto was organized in 1953 as a women's community service group. We conduct fundraising activities and make donations for local college scholarships and community programs such as La Puenta food bank, HVCC children center and the Del Norte library.

Our membership includes many of the ranching families that settled this region, continue to operate their ranches and provide food to our


