Nearly \$1 million in CARES Act **Funds available to Colorado farmers**, ranchers and processors

COLORADO - The Colorado Department of Agriculture is making up to \$1 million in grant funding available for Colorado farmers, ranchers, food hubs and processors to support them in adjusting to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the food supply chain.

Colorado agricultural producers are eligible for grant awards up to \$12,500. Farmers' markets, food hubs, processors, and other intermediaries that support producers are eligible for up to \$50,000. Grant dollars were made available through CARES Act funds.

"COVID-19 has had serious impacts on agriculture and underscored how vital our food systems are," said Colorado Commissioner of Agriculture Kate Greenberg. "It is critical that farmers, ranchers and processors receive financial support to ensure their operations continue in the wake of this unprecedented pandemic. The Department of Agriculture has been fighting for them every step of the way and will continue to do so as we build a more resilient future."



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

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Colorado finalizes guidance for ski areas and resorts

COLORADO - The Colorado is in and what that means. Out-of-state Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) finalized its guidance for ski areas and resorts. The guidance goes into effect immediately. After releasing a draft of the guidance on Oct. 14, the state reviewed feedback from community members and organizations from across the state, and incorporated feedback into the finalized guidance.

Ski areas are a vital driver of the Colorado economy. During the COVID-19 pandemic, these areas also present unique challenges for controlling virus transmission. A successful ski season will require a strong partnership between ski areas, local governments, local businesses, and the state.

Process

Ski areas should work closely with their Local Public Health Agency (LPHA) and home community to develop their individual plans.

Ski areas should include the categories outlined in "Ski area and LPHA planning" within their ski area-specific plans. Ski area plans can and should go into further detail to address area- or local-specific issues in their plans.

Ski areas must submit their plans to their LPHA for approval. Ski areas that exist in multiple jurisdictions (city and county, multiple counties, etc.) should consult with their home LPHA about including additional jurisdictions in the planning process.

Once approved, the LPHA will submit the plan to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) for final sign-off.

Ski area-specific state guidance In general, communication with skiers and visitors should start before they arrive at the ski area to the greatest extent possible. State and local COVID-19 requirements should be prominently displayed on ski area websites and shared when reservations are booked, when arriving at the resort, in lodging facilities, etc.

Areas should communicate:

Expectations to wear masks and physically distance.

Requiremask-wearing in accordance with the ski area's plan, encouraging mask-wearing in all indoor and outdoor public spaces, recognizing exceptions for safety, dining, and while individuals are actively engaged in skiing, riding, or other distanced outdoor activities.

Ensure physical distancing in all public indoor and outdoor areas.

How to use prevention tools like Exposure Notifications.

Ski areas should adopt, promote, and coordinate on enforcing the statewide COVID-19 Commitments to Containment:

Wear a mask in public places.

- Physically distance. Limit group sizes.
- Isolate yourself if you have
- symptoms or test positive.
- Regularly clean high-touch surfaces. Screen for symptoms.
- Protect at-risk people.
- Slope operations, including
- gondolas, chairlifts, and staging areas Promote remote purchasing of lift tickets online or by phone, instead of

in person. Symptom and exposure screening questions (in person) or agreements to self-monitor (remote) prior to patron arrival at the ski area is encouraged.

Requiremask-wearing in accordance with the ski area's plan, encouraging mask-wearing in all indoor and outdoor public spaces, recognizing exceptions for safety, dining, and while individuals are actively engaged in skiing, riding, or other distanced outdoor activities.

Require masks in lines for and while riding on chairlifts and gondolas.

Display signage reminding guests of distancing and masking policies.

Ski area guests will not be required to ride on a chairlift or gondola with people outside of their party. Individuals who are not from the same party may ride a chairlift together with a minimum of one seat separating the unrelated individuals or parties; however, ski areas should generally encourage more space between different parties when possible.

Gondolas should keep windows open, even in inclement weather. Gondolas should be limited to no more than two separate parties with adequate spacing, and not more than 50% capacity if more than one party rides a gondola together (single parties may reach full capacity). Specific spacing configurations and requirements should be addressed with the LPHA in the ski area plan. Consider posting reminders of these requirements within gondola cabins.

Ensure 6-foot spacing between separate parties, in all directions, in chairlift and gondola lines by employing tactics such as extending staging areas and marking 6-foot increments for suggested standing. Instances where this requirement is unworkable should be addressed in the ski area's plan and discussed with the LPHA.

YOUR NIGHT SKY

Bright Star Capella

By Darlene Danko

Tonight the moon visits just to the south of Jupiter and Saturn. The first quarter moon is Oct. 23, and the second full moon this month is on the 31st for Halloween! Oct.27 the moon passes just south of Neptune. Uranus is in the east to the SW of big bright Mars, which obviously is in the ESE. Then the moon visits Mars Oct. 28, 29, and 30.

Capella is the sixth brightest star in our sky, and is highly 索 visible in the dark morning high up in the NE. In the evening it's the brightest star low in the NE, so you have to be able to see that part of the sky without mountains blocking that area. Unfortunately I have big mountains close to our house in the NE, so we can't see it in the evening.

When Capella is low in the sky, atmosphere before it reaches our eyes. Our atmosphere splits or refracts the star light making it flash. That makes Capella twinkle red and green, and makes it flash low in our sky. That is supposed to make it wonderful to observe. Unfortunately, I've never been able to see that.

The San Luis Valley is experiencing a rapid increase in COVID-19 cases. Two weeks ago, we had 15 known active cases in our region, and Oct. 19 the SLV has 69. The high number of contacts represents potential for much higher spread of COVID-19 illness in the coming weeks.





Dr. Lori Teller, an associate professor in the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, says that lymphoma is the most common cancer in domestic cats and that, prior to the development of a vaccine, feline leukemia virus (FeLV) was recognized as the most common cause of feline lymphoma.

it was believed that FeLV was responsible for 70% of lymphoma cases in cats," Teller said. "Current estimates are that 10 to 20% of infected cats will develop lymphoma or related cancers."

In addition to causing cancer, FeLV may also cause various blood disorders and may weaken the cat's immune system, opening it up to secondary infections that would normally be able to fight.

"FeLV can cause a sixtyfold increase in the risk of lymphoma," Teller said. "The development of cancer secondary to FeLV is complicated. Much has to do with than 50%. the interaction of the virus with the cat's immune system"



Teller says that all cats who spend time outdoors, even indoorsonly cats who occasionally escape, should be vaccinated against FeLV. When adopting a new feline friend, owners should also test their new pet for FeLV before introducing them to their full fur family.

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Best methods to repair damaged driveways

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Mineral County approves SLV MOA for emergency management

SAN LUIS VALLEY - Mineral County Commissioners under the advisement of Mineral County Emergency Manager Terry Wetherill, signed a Valley-wide Memorandum of Agreement(MOA) to form the new Emergency Manager Coordination Committee Monday, Oct. 5.

According to Wetherill, the committee agreement has been a work in progress for the last year and was the result of a previous committee that was formed around the time of the West Fork Complex Fire. "We had a committee that consisted of about 11 people from all over the place. The purpose of this was to pare down the members and include more people who represent the six counties here in the Valley. This will allow us to have more opportunities for funding and to better represent the Valley as a whole," said Wetherill.

The MOA is currently being signed by all six SLV counties, plus Hinsdale County and will be implemented in the new year. "We wanted to have equal representation from all of our counties so that we can better serve our communities and have the ability to help each other during times of emergency situations. This MOA will do that and will greatly aid in the main goal of protecting our rural counties to the best of our ability," said Wetherill.

•The purpose of this Memorandum of Agreement is to establish a policy group for the purpose of governing a SLV Regional Emergency Coordination Group (ECG) that may manage any emergency that affects multiple or all counties in the region and whose management exceeds the designated local response authority's capacity; and,

•The policy group will include one (1) County Commissioner from each political subdivision chosen agement supervising authorities.

by each counties Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) on an annual basis during the first regularly scheduled meeting in January during the formation of the Board; and,

NOTE: The Chair of the SLV Commissioners will serve as the Chair of the Policy Group while also representing their jurisdiction. The SLV Policy Group will include seven (7) members total and will convene as a 7-member policy group for regional incidents or partially if all counties are not involved/activated. EXAMPLE: Two counties affected by wildfire disaster; the two Policy Group Commissioners would be the extent of the activation.

•This policy group will activate within 24 hours of request made to the Chair of the San Luis Valley Commissioners and Chair of the Hinsdale BOCC; and,

•Within 48 hours, the policy group will identify a fiscal agent and Finance Lead (if applicable) for incident activation or develop a finance strategy and provide this guidance to ECG; and,

•The policy group will create a DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY as applicable for the ECG Incident Commander; and,

•The policy group may provide incident spending parameters to order and deploy needed resources from within the region and outside of the region; and,

•The policy group may provide In the MOA is outlined in the incident situational awareness to their BOCC and county leadership including budgetary ramifications and the need to declare a local disaster to the State of Colorado; and,

•This MOA becomes effective on the date of execution and shall remain in effect unless terminated by written notification and thirtyday notice to all participating counties; and,

•This MOA may be amended by written mutual agreement and as approved by the Emergency Man-







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Appropriate E-Bike usage in RGNF

SAN LUIS VALLEY - An increase in the use of electric bicycles, or e-bikes, has prompted Rio Grande National Forest (RGNF) officials to remind visitors about appropriate e-bike use on the National Forest. Forest visitors are encouraged to "Know Before You Go" and determine where, when and how e-bikes may be used and when their use is appropriate.

Where to ride:

- E-bikes may be ridden on designated motorized routes shown on Motor Vehicle Use Maps including on National Forest System (NFS) roads open to all vehicles: and National Forest System trails open to all vehicles. Please note that some roads and trails are only open during certain times of the year.
- The best source of information for knowing when and where e-bikes are allowed on the Rio Grande National Forest can be found on the RGNF Motor Vehicle Use Maps (MVUM). Hard copies are available at all RGNF offices. MVUMs are also available online at: https://www.fs.usda.gov/ main/riogrande/maps-pubs

Displaced Voters - Voter registration information for voters experiencing foreclosure, eviction or homelessness

COLORADO - Colorado law protects the right of all Coloradans to register and vote in the upcoming election. This protection includes voters who may be going through foreclosure, eviction or homelessness. Voters who are going through any of these situations should be aware that they can still register and vote in the upcoming election. The following is intended to help answer normal questions and clarify the law for these voters. Voters are also encouraged to visit the Secretary of State's website, www.sos.state. co.us for more information.

VOTERS GOING THROUGH FORECLOSURE OR EVICTION

Just receiving a foreclosure or eviction notice does not affect how or where you vote:

If you are still living at your address when you vote, you do not need to alter your voter record in any way. Voters are always encouraged to check their voter record before the election by visiting www.govotecolorado.gov

If you must leave your current residence before the election: Voters in this situation should update their voter registration record to reflect the address where they currently regularly return to. This will help to ensure that the voter receives their ballot in they consider their "home base."


"Home base" means a location the voter regularly returns to and intends to remain.

This can include a park, vacant lot or homeless shelter.


It's important that a voter who is registered at a location that does not receive mail also designates a mailing address where they can pick up their ballot. This mailing address can be anywhere that the voter has the ability to access their mail on a regular basis and can include a post office box.

Voters in this situation who miss or are not able to access their mail ballot may always visit a polling center located in their county to vote.

migration increases wildlife-vehicle collisions

COLORADO – As spring and summer fade into fall and winter, the migration of wildlife can lead to an increase of wildlife-vehicle collisions during the fall and winter seasons.

Motorists should be aware that wildlife can crossroads without warning at any time of day or night, but drivers should pay particularly close attention in early morning and evening hours. A majority of wildlife-vehicle collisions occur from dusk to dawn, when wildlife are more active and unfortunately more difficult to see.

The following precautions are advised to travelers:

- Slow down. Traveling at high speeds increases the danger of a crash. Moderate speeds maintain a driver's reaction time and allow an appropriate response to animals on or near roads.
- tay alert. Pay close attention to the roadway, particularly while driving between dusk and dawn. This is when deer and other common wildlife are most active and more likely to be crossing roadways. Flickering headlights from oncoming cars or taillights of the vehicles in front of you, may indicate an animal crossing the road.
- Scan ahead. Watch for movement and shining eyes along roadsides. If you see one animal, you should expect it will be accompanied by others.
- Obey traffic signs. Many highways have wildlife warning signs intended to alert motorists of known wildlife movement areas. Though incidents can happen anywhere, transportation authority's attempt to reduce the number of wildlife-vehicle collisions by posting signage and lowering speeds in areas where wildlife are active.
- Give warning. When animals are seen on or near the road, slow down or stop (if no other cars are behind you), honk the horn and flash headlights. This warns the animal to avoid the road and alerts other drivers in oncoming vehicles to the potential hazard.
- Always wear seat belts. Unfortunately, not every collision is avoidable, and the National Highway and Traffic Safety Administration state that the risk of serious injury and death in a crash is reduced by half when seat belts are worn.

Drivers involved in a wildlifevehicle collision should report the accident to the Colorado State Patrol by calling *CSP (star key and 277). Should a crash with wildlife occur, remember to slow down and concentrate on retaining control of the vehicle, be aware of your surroundings, especially other vehicles, and move your vehicle to a safe position off the road.

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
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COVID-19 outbreaks reported at hunting camps in remote areas

Parks and Wildlife encourages hunters to be safe and especially careful during the COVID-19 epidemic. Though recreating outdoors is relatively safe, COVID-19 precautions still are necessary, especially when a hunting trip involves close contact with non-household members.

So far this year, two COVID-19 outbreaks were reported at hunting camps in remote areas. Stay home if you are sick, if you're isolating or if you have been exposed to COVID-19.

"Even when folks are outside they must be careful. Know who you're hunting with and be careful when you come in contact field," said Cory Chick, CPW's Southwest Region manager. seek medical attention. CPW and state health authorities offer these tips for safety while hunting:

It's best to hunt with people you live with, but if you are hunting with people outside your household make sure you are comfortable with routine precautions your hunting partners take to protect themselves against COVID-19.

Keep groups small -- the smaller, the better.

Many people who have CO-VID-19 don't have symptoms, but before you travel be sure to know the symptoms of COVID-19: Cough, shortness of breath or dif-

Stay outdoors as much as possible.

Always wear masks when indoors with non-household members; wear masks outdoors when you cannot stay 6 feet apart. Masks should fully cover your nose and mouth.

Wash your hands frequently or use hand sanitizer that has at least 60% alcohol.

> If you are having a medical emergency, call 911 or seek emergency care as soon as possible.

Make sure someone in your family knows where you'll be hunting. Remember that cellphone service is not available in most remote hunting locations.





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
