SAN LUIS VALLEY — Six new cases were confirmed Tuesday in the San Luis Valley, bringing

the total cumulative positive case county to 226. The count for Saguache went from 92 cases to 90 cases due to corrected duplications in the State reporting system. New cases by county: Alamosa: 4, Rio Grande: 4. Eighteen total people have been hospitalized, and 99 have completed isolation. There have been 4 deaths. SLV Regional Epidemiologist, Lilian Coll states, "Currently, antibody tests are primarily for research purposes. CD-PHE does not recommend the use of antibody tests for diagnostic purposes because the results can be misleading. Ideally, antibody tests are given along with a PCR test for diagnosis.'

Although it may be tempting to conclude that the increase in positive case numbers Valleywide is due to increased testing, the concurrent rise in activity in healthcare provider offices and the increase in call-line queries with COVID symptoms reported by healthcare providers strongly suggests that we are seeing an increase in community spread. There is a real possibility that employees who have tested positive for COVID were exposed while not on duty, even in workplaces where there are multiple cases discovered.

To prevent getting sick, please remember to stay close to home as much as possible, as community transmission is occurring in communities across the San Luis Valley. See COVID page 3

Safer at Home and in the Vast, Great Outdoors

DENVER — Gov. Polis signed an Executive Order Monday, transitioning from Safer at Home to Safer at Home and in the Vast, Great Outdoors.

'Our state has some of the most beautiful natural open spaces in the world and we want Coloradans to enjoy our vast, great outdoors. While we are all still safer at home, we are also able to practice greater social distancing in our great outdoors than in confined indoor spaces," said Governor Jared Polis. "It may feel like we are getting back to normal, but the virus is still here, and it could surge back the moment we let our guard down. We are still far from normal. Coloradans have to remain diligent, and must continue staying home or in the great outdoors away from others as much as possible, wearing masks when we leave the house, and washing our hands. Over these next few weeks, each and every one of us has a responsibility to protect ourselves and others, especially as we begin venturingout onto our trails and open space.' "And for anyone experiencing flu-like symptoms, it's extremely important to not go to work or hang out with others and to get tested. Testing is free, easy, and quick at 47 state-supported, community testing sites across the state including at the Pepsi Center in Denver,' Gov. Polis added. 'Colorado has millions of acres of accessible federal land, municipal parks, State parks, State and county open space, and other accessible areas that allow for stronger Social Distancing in our great outdoors. Coloradans should Stay at Home or in the great outdoors away from others as much as possible and continue to limit social interactions, remain at least six feet from others not in their household, and wear non-medical facial coverings in public," the Executive Order reads.

Previously, high-risk Coloradans, those above 65 or with underlying health conditions, were required to stay home unless absolutely necessary. With this ExecutiveOrder, those individuals are now encouraged to also enjoy Colorado's outdoor spaces at a safe social distance, in addition to staying at home as much as possible. This Executive Order also directs the Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) to issue a corresponding Public Health Order. CDPHE is also releasing draft guidance on houses of worship, outdoor recreation, personal recreation, and updatestothechildcareand personal services guidances. Playgrounds and swimming pools can open at limited capacity and the Governor encourages people to have safe fun outdoors away from others. CDPHE is soliciting input from industry and key stakeholders on the draft guidance, and comments are due by Wednesday, at 12:00pm. Final versions will be released Thursday, June 4, 2020. CDPHE also released guidance for shortterm rentals, allowing them to reopen as of June 1, 2020. Guidance issued under Safer at Home is still in effect unless updated by this Executive Order or under CDPHE.

Business owners and operators along Main Street defend their property after property defacement threat creates unrest.

Courier Interim Editor ALAMOSA — It was an eventful evening for businesses in downtown Alamosa on Monday. Alamosa Police Department and the City of Alamosa worked swiftly to identify the individuals intent on vandalism far before their 11 p.m. plans and contact them, resolving the issue with no citations or arrests. According to Captain Joey Spangler of the Alamosa Police Department.

"We contacted them at a local home at around 11 p.m. and discussed their plans and they called it off," Spangler said, noting that there were about seven individuals contacted.

Tips from business owners and others led APD to believe that 10 to 12 teenagers were planning to graffiti Monday night. During a time when the business sector has taken more than their fair share of lumps, owners – backed by friends and family – were in no mood to take another. Businesses along Main street decided that the best course of action was to personally protect their interests. Shop owners up and down Main street stood without opposition to defend their livelihood.

Monday night also saw a peaceful protest just west of downtown. Spangler said around 30 people were protesting at the corner of Main and State about 11 p.m. He said the department got a noise complaint around midnight and asked the group to tone it down at which point they started to disperse.

The gathering appealed to passing traffic, spreading awareness and asking for justice for George Floyd, the victim who lost his life as the result of excessive use of police force in Minneapolis.

Valley Wide draws CARES Act grant

Staff Report ALAMOSA- Valley Wide Health Systems, Inc. is among nine Colorado health centers receiving a combined total of \$20,240,746 in grants from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

A grant of \$1,952,527 was awarded Valley Wide. The funding is provided by the Coronavirus Air, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act and is in addition to the more than \$11.7 million provided by HHS to Colorado Community Health Centers in May and more than \$18 million provided in April.

"We must continue working to ensure doctors, nurses, and other healthcare professionals have the resources they need as we work together to combat COVID-19," said Senator Cory Gardner (R-CO). "This funding from the Department of Health and Human Services will help provide support to healthcare facilities across the state of Colorado, and I will continue fighting to provide additional support for our frontline healthcare workers." 

SLV unemployment faring better than nation and Colorado

SAN LUIS VALLEY – Recently released Colorado unemployment figures from the Colorado Department of Labor and Unemployment (CDLU) for April 2020 indicate that the San Luis Valley is more resilient than most of the state. Rural Colorado counties are faring better than more urban and resort counties. The average unemployment rate for Colorado was 12.0 percent in April 2020 and nationwide the figure was 14.7 percent.

The SLV county with the lowest unemployment rate in April 2020 was Saguache with 7.0 percent unemployment. This number, however, will most likely increase due to the COVID-19 outbreak in the county in May. Saguache county is followed by Costilla county with 8.0 percent unemployment, Conejos county at 8.3 percent, Alamosa 9.4 percent and Rio Grande with 10.7 percent unemployment.

Not seasonally adjusted employment numbers from the CDLU show that the total employed workforce for the San Luis Valley in April 2020 was 19,137, with 1,899 unemployed, equaling 9.9 percent of the SLV workforce being unemployed in April.

According to the CDLU, on May 31, 2020, there were 226 job openings advertised online in Alamosa county, 64 job openings in Rio Grande county, 19 job openings in Conejos county, 14 job openings in Costilla county and 25 openings in Saguache county. If all of these jobs were filled our unemployment percentage would drop 1 percent.

In Colorado, Cheyenne county has the lowest un-

employment rate with 2.4 percent unemployment. Cheyenne county is followed in increasing order by Kiowa county with 2.6 percent unemployment, Baca 2.7 percent, Yuma 3.3 percent, Washington 3.7 percent and Phillips with 3.8 percent unemployment.

The highest rates of unemployment are found in the counties with affluent resort communities. Nationwide other affluent resort communities like Sun Valley, Idaho have the highest unemployment rates in the state. Pitkin County, where Aspen is situated, has the highest unemployment rate in the state with 23.1 percent. Pitkin is followed in decreasing order by Gilpin with 23.0 percent unemployment, San Miguel 22.3 percent, Summit 21.1 percent, and Eagle county with 20.5 percent unemployment.

Volunteers to assemble learning-from-home kits

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — On Wednesday, June 3, volunteers from New Mexico United, The Somos Unidos Foundation, Electric Playhouse, and Heart of America will assemble more than 1,200 education packs at Electric Playhouse in Albuquerque, NM, fornine schools and multiple health centers in the Navajo Nation communities of Pine Hill, Tohaali Community School,

and nearby school districts surrounding Gallup, NM.

Students in grades pre-K through 12 will receive grade level learning-from-home kits with books, STEM materials, a solar lantern, art supplies and a coronavirus 'stay safe' packet containing hand sanitizer, four PPE masks and critical virus prevention information. Led by national nonprofit, The Heart of America Foundation in partnership with state-level officials in the Indian Affairs Department, the work is made possible by nearly 20 corporate sponsors and more than 100 individual donors from all across North America. These partners, including Swinerton Renewable Energy, Goal Zero, and several others are banding together to support families at this difficult time. The goal is to reach more than 10,000

students, through ongoing donations that will make continued distributions possible.

As the top hot spot percapita for COVID-19 cases in the country, the Navajo Nation and Native American Reservations are faced with myriad challenges – including education, as school closures have pushed learning from the classroom to the home, where electricity, education materials and school supplies are sparse. This is the third step in a multiphase initiative that began with the San Juan School District in Utah and Hopi Reservation in Arizona. This phase will continue to reach students of the Pueblos and Reservations of New Mexico through late summer. Mylo Fowler and representatives from New Mexico United and its Somos Unidos Foundation will begin delivery of materials on Thursday, June 4 to ensure kits arrive prior to weekend curfew beginning Friday afternoon.

Floyd's wrongful death has sparked protests and civil unrest across the country, many feared the latter had made its way into the valley. With lines being drawn in the sand across the country, Alamosa struck a nice harmony Monday night with citizens and police working together to help maintain a level of safety and understanding.

Further west, Alamosa's

Walmart was also taking no chances. After having received threats on social media the local store battened down the hatches. Before sending their employees home for the night, the establishment used pallets of product to barricade the doors and windows. Walmart continued operations on Tuesday.

Another group of 20-30 protestors were stationed across the street from the APD offices on Fourth Street on Tuesday afternoon and again remained mainly peaceful, Spangler said, adding that organizers had contacted the department on Monday to discuss their plans.

In a trying year, Ala-

mosa has pulled together time and again facing every challenge as a community. Monday night showed that in a small town that's shared by friends and neighbors that would-be-looters are outnumbered.





neighborhood here in West Hollywood. Last night looters broke into my apartment and spruced it up.



Hello, my name is Hunter. I'm 20-yrs old. I'm writing my story to try and help others who have gone through the same

things with their parents, and as adults, are struggling with drugs as individuals, and how it affects others as well. First, I'll tell you about my childhood and how it led me to do drugs.

When I was 6-yrs old my mom got cancer. It devastated my whole family. At first, I was too young to realize my mom was using drugs which eventually killed her because she didn't stop and didn't listen to her doctor. I was too young to realize she was using, but I knew something was up. Then, I got older and asked questions. Of course, she lied to me at first. Then, she said it was for the pain, but she

got pain meds for the pain. So, every first of the month we'd be out of food and she'd go spend the rent money on crack and would be gone for days

While she would be gone, my brother and I would be struggling to eat. I looked and looked for her but couldn't find her. I'd have to steal so I could eat, as well as my brother. So, I saw this was her routine and would start noticing where she would go. So, I would go steal food before the 1st to be ready for it. That happened from when I was 8-yrs old until I was 15-yrs old. Her drug of choice was meth which a year later, I picked up because I saw her do it and thought it was ok, plus kids were doing it and I wanted to be cool. My mom would beat me while she was coming down [from

her drug-high]. I wasn't the best kid, by no means, but you shouldn't beat your kids because you don't have your drugs. My brother left to go live with

my dad. I stayed because mom was sick and plus my dad wouldn't let me because he didn't like me. And my soon-to-be-wife, later down the line, was 7-months pregnant with my 1st outta 3, now.

I started doing meth pretty heavy and started to always THIŇK I had to have it. So, I'd steal from people, steal from houses, take things outta people's sheds, cars, even things out of my house to sell just so I could have it. My mind had to have it. If I didn't, I'd emotionally hurt the people I love, which is never good.

If there's anyone reading this, going through the same things I went through as a child, don't be dumb like me - tell someone! And, if you're struggling with meth, here's some advice a wise man told me recently that's been manifesting through my head. Meth is psychological - it's all in your head. You THINK about it, therefore you have to have it - well you

think you have to have it. There's no physical withdrawal from doing meth. You don't hurt like you do from opioid withdrawal.

I have some advice for You: surround yourself with better people. Beautiful flowers in Alamosa despite drought and wind

About this time of the year, I often breaking highs). report on the state of our Alamosa garden. It's definitely a mixed bag this year! Crabapples (Malus species) bloomed beautifully in downtown Alamosa by May 1; in our yard by May 5. Usually, they don't bloom until a week or two later. I often felt that Alamosa they bloomed the week AFTER Adams State graduation. This Landscapes year they bloomed just in time, but there was no onsite commencement! I've often associated the height of lilac (Syringa vulgaris) bloom during the yearly festival in Cole Park the first weekend in June. Ours will all be done then – my purple ones were done five days ago, but there are still some white blooms nodding their heads. Of course, there is no festival this year so out of town visitors to the festival

from seeds haven't worked out. Sadly, So what was lost in our garden? My the only ones I've seen so far are rated at zone o -· I only plant zone 5 or zone 4 flowers. Some folks downtown, where plants are more protected, may get away with zone 5 plants. We are on the west end of town and get buffeted by high winds and there are no trees and no close buildings to the west of us so we tend to be colder. What is doing well in this dry, windy year? Reliable red and pink yarrow (Achillea species) seems to be doing very well and bloomed a week earlier than usual as did purple creeping Veronica (Veronica liwanensis?). Also, bush honeysuckle Arnold's red (Lonicera tatarian 'Arnolds Red') did well in all locations in the garden. I added this shrub about five years ago for the first time. It tends to have the earliest flowers and has pleasant leaves the remainder of the season. As far as I can tell, it doesn't sucker and keeps a neat, dense form. I now have six specimens in different locations in the garden and all are doing very well. Wild red roses (Rosa) have bloomed a week earlier than usual as have yellow Harrison roses (Rosa Harrison). I'm seeing more dead branches than I like, but blooms are prolific. I'm wishing you a wonderful summer of gardening, but encourage you to really watch your watering. The city has an ordinance, but be sure to water enough.

won't be disappointed. We are definitely in drought. By the end of May, we've had only .79 inches of precipitation this year compared to 4.69 inches last year – almost four inches of precipitation difference! This is according to Wunderground.com. Some other sites may be more accurate, but I've used this one for many years and want to remain consistent.

It's also been very windy this spring to my mind. On top of this, we had high temperatures of over 75 for the first two weeks of May when average temperatures don't top 68. And three of the days those were record breakers of 80 or above (some weather sources

reported we had a week of record-

biggest sadness is the loss of a wonderful Autumn Blaze maple (Acer x freemanii) that we'd had for 8 or more years. It's just dead and since it doesn't develop suckers from the roots, there is no hope.

We lost a Canada chokecherry (Prunus virginiana 'Shubert') a few years ago, but as it promotes suckers. I now have a healthy Canada chokecherry shrub.

It could be that warm February weather encouraged the sap to come up due to relatively high daily temperatures (most of which were in the 40's and 50's) that plummeted quickly in the night to below freezing. This could have caused the liquid in the cells to freeze and burst rather than drain down to the protected roots. On more than

1/3 of the days the temperature range was more than 35 degrees.

I was also surprised to see that most of our pussytoes (Antennaria dioica natives I acquired outside of Gunnison) and mint (Mentha ?) haven't returned. Both of these have done well in past drought years – have had them for 15 – 20 years. I'm also not seeing much in the way of Shasta daisies (Leucanthemum × superbum) or gloriosa daisies (Rudbeckia hirta ? - these are lusher than the black-eyed Susans along highways) popping up. They are usually small at this time of the year but in abundance. Fortunately, I have lots of gloriosa daisy seeds I harvested from last year – they tend to do well from seed. Shasta daisies I buy from nurseries as my attempts

City and County partner to save trees near the airport

ALAMOSA—Some of the oldest and arguably most majestic trees in the City of Alamosa must be trimmed for airplane approach safety reasons at the municipal cemetery adjacent to the San Luis Valley Airport in Alamosa. San Luis Valley Airport Manager Will Hickman notified the City in early May that six Colorado Blue Spruce trees interfere with FAA minimum landing clearances north of the Runway 20 approach. The height of the trees also prevents circling approaches to land at night.

City Parks Manager Jeremy Arellano estimates the trees are close to 100 years old.


In consultation with the City of Alamosa Tree Board, the decision to trim the trees versus removal and replacement was made given their mature and healthy stature and ability to withstand some minor pruning. Though "topping" an evergreen tree can be problematic; methods will be used to promote continued tree health and traditional aesthetics while removing enough height to allow for at least five years of growth.

The City and County have agreed to split the costs of trimming of the trees; a specialist contractor is being brought in given the height the work must be completed at.

Will Hickman stated "We greatly appreciate the City working with us to address pilot and aircraft safety. The beautiful trees have probably been there longer than the airport and they help beautify the cemetery and airport alike."

"Trees play such an important role in our high desert community" according to City Parks, Recreation and Library Director Andy Rice. "This year, we get to celebrate 30 years as a Tree City USA in Alamosa. That is quite an accomplishment and a testament to

the long-term commitment our community has shown to trees and their importance in Alamosa. We also recognize the absolute crucial nature commercial air service serves in our community. We are pleased to have reached a resolution that will keep the trees and comply with airport safety precautions and we are grateful for the collaboration with Alamosa County.'


