Moffat citizens defend Gonzalez against false claim

MOFFAT — The Moffat saga continues, with new developments painting a different picture of what Zengxi Gao and his friends have reported to the Sheriff's Office as theft from his marijuana grow located on Mayor Riegel Boulevard in the town.

Sheriff Dan Warwick says he now has received statements from several of the individuals involved in the incident and it is looking more and more like a civil dispute. The paperwork will be submitted to District Attorney Robert Willett soon for a determination, he confirmed.

A group of Moffat citizens (who wish to remain anonymous to avoid any recriminations), are protesting

the false characterization of Ernest Gonzalez, by Gao's spokesperson, as an illegal marijuana grower. Gonzalez was one of several who accompanied Garegin Pogosyan, the man who went to Gao's to collect his belongings

Gonzalez was recently licensed by the Marijuana Enforcement Division to grow retail marijuana in the Town of Moffat outside of Area 420, and as his friends point out, this would not be the case if he was growing illegally or had any history of illegal growing with law enforcement. Group members insist with Warwick that the incident which took place at Gao's establishment was a civil matter

Harland Franklin Smith Jr., 86



- a collection of belongings by a between Mayor Riegel and Potch former employee, (Pogosyan), with assistance from town officials.

Because Gao's property is on Potch land at present, and the town and Potch seem to be at odds, the group behind Gonzalez is questioning the source of the information and report made by Gao. This after months of apparent cooperation between Potch officials and the town to achieve the annexation, now challenged by two attorneys and the county.

They believe Gao's spokesperson may be associated with the Potch, LLC group, and the accusation made against Gonzalez could stem from a comment made by Gonzalez about Potch, LLC during a town meeting earlier this year regarding real estate sales.

Some have objected that although lots are selling in Potch LLC/420, those selling the lots do not have the necessary real estate licenses. This was confirmed by the *Center* Post-Dispatch last year with the Department of Regulatory Affairs (DORA). The website for Area 420 does not seem to have any licenses

While town officials are not talking, some town residents report that all is not well in Potch, LLC paradise. There have been water disputes between the town and Potch/Area 420, and one source says several citizens witnessed an incident where harsh words went down

LLC developer Whitney Justice over the water issue. Another resident has forbidden Potch/Area 420 to transport water across his property.

There are conflicting stories, but the general consensus from the citizens recounting the initial incident run as follows. Gao's operation was shut down by the Town of Moffat and is not operational per the State since December, allegedly after some marijuana could not be accounted for at the facility. Pogosyan was an employee of Gao's at the time, and after the shutdown, could not collect his belongings.

Warwick commented that according to statements he received, it appears that Pogosyan had some financial stake in the equipment removed from Gao's facility. Group members said it was the current lease holder for Gao's property, Matt Litrenta, who finally let Pogosyan, Gonzalez and the town officials in to collect his property, so there was no "break-in" as some reported.

Nor was Canna Valley Consulting (CVC), associated with the town, there to conduct an audit rather than assist in collecting Pogosyan's property since the facility had already closed."All they took were the things that belonged to him [Pogosyan]," one group member noted. The mayor and town officials did not take anything other than the property that belonged to Pogosyan, s/he added.

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


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

Public health report

Mona Lovato and Janet Beiriger delivered the public health report. Beiriger stated an area in the Baca Grande Subdivision is under a boil water advisory.

Several people in attendance at the DSS food distribution in the Center Park last week were without masks and were not in cars as needed; they also were gathering in large groups. Atotal of 750 masks were given out. It will take 2-3 weeks to get someone to come down from the State to help with testing and the investigation.

Road and Bridge

Road and Bridge Supervisor Randal Arredondo presented an agreement from Center Soil Conservation for weed spraying. He suggested having them come in and present their agreement to the Board. Arredondo also presented two bids for a small plow truck. Commissioner Lovato asked Arredondo to have bids submitted to the county administrator in a sealed envelope. The Board agreed to postpone the decision until the next meeting.

County Attorney

County Attorney Ben Gibbons stated he has an opening brief that is due to the Moffat matter on June 9. After that the town has a time period to file their brief, we will see if the court rules on the briefs or if they will require oral arguments. Gibbons forwarded two new bills that are being introduced to the Board. One has to do with suspending any privilege or immunity to police officers. The other is about price gouging.

County Administrator - County Administrator Wendi Maez presented the Public Health Sales Tax Grant in the amount of \$3000 for COVID-19 expenses to the Board. Commissioners unanimously approved the grant to the town of Center for \$3,000. Correction of a motion to award Saguache County Schools 100 percent of the Secure Rural Schools fund was also made by a 3-0 board decision, but there was no change to the amount granted.

Revenues and expenditure through the month of April 2020 were presented to the Board. Maez has been attending several meetings with valley and state

public health directors.

Everyone is willing to step in and help with COVID-19. Commissioner Lovato and Maez met with the Public Health staff Thursday, May 28. A discussion took place concerning Public Health staff wages and increases. Two Public Health employees were not given their three and 5 percent increases, and the Board voted to grant the increases in a 3-0 decision retroactive to Jan. 1, 2020. Commissioners also voted 3-0 to grant a \$4 per hour increase to public health employees, less the one employee, until a public health director is hired.

County Housing

After convening under the board of County Housing, Commissioners entered into executive session but no reason for the session was recorded in the minutes.

Office of Emergency Management Emergency manager Bobby Woelz presented the board with a proposal for his hours. The proposal suggested an increase to 40 hours per week retroactive to January 2020 and use the remaining 87 hours of overtime to be used as comptime in August. In a 3-0 vote, commissioners moved Woelz to 40 hours per week retroactive to March 1 through the remainder of the year. The Board agreed to look at policies before making a decision regarding the comp time.

Land Use

Interim Land Use Administrator Amber Wilson presented proposals for two marijuana businesses to Commissioners. Day Old/Huckleberry Farms LLC requested they be allowed to pay their Reclamation bond to the County Treasurer in cash because the were having problems obtaining the bond. Lowered



The Colorado House passes Law **Enforcement Integrity Act, sent to Polis**

COLORADO - Senate Bill 217, The Law Enforcement Integrity Act passed 52-13 in the Colorado House Friday, June 12.

SB20-217, the Law Enforcement Integrity Act, enacts several provisions that will prevent police brutality and increase transparency and accountability in Colorado's law enforcement system. Outlined below are among the bill's key provisions:

Mandate body cameras, make video of police misconduct publicly available, and hold officers accountable when they fail to record. Officers will have to record interactions with the public and, when they turn off their camera, they will be held accountable. When officers are accused of misconduct, the bodycam footage must be released to the public within 21 days and ensures the victim of the officer misconduct and the victim's family receive the footage 72 hours before public release.

Require data collection and public reporting on policing. All law enforcement agencies will be required to track demographic data of individuals they encounter. This data will include any use of force (both the type and severity), civilian searches, forced entries into homes, and the unholstering and discharge of a firearm.

Rein in use of deadly force by officers. Changes use of force standard to (1) outlaw chokeholds; (2) outlaw deadly force against someone **fleeing the police** who does not pose an immediate risk; (3) outlaw the use of deadly force to arrest people for minor offenses and non-violent offenses; and (3) require officers to use non-violent means before resorting to any force.

Require Officers to Intervene to Stop Excessive Force. Creates a duty for officers to intervene and stop excessive force and makes failure to intervene by an officer a criminal offense.

Decertify bad officers. If a court or internal investigations finds that an officer used unlawful force or officer is convicted of a violent offense, tampered with body camera footage to cover up misconduct, or failed to intervene to stop unlawful use of force that results in serious bodily injury or death, the officer will lose POST certification, thus stopping bad police officers from continuing to put the public at risk.

Public Database to Prevent Re**hiring of bad officers.** Officers who are found untruthful, terminated for cause, or decertified would be listed in a publicly-available database to prevent them from moving from one agency to another.

Justice for Victims of Police

Violence by Ending Qualified Immunity. The bills allows victims of police misconduct to bring a lawsuit for the violation of their constitutional rights. Officers found liable will no longer be shielded by the doctrine of qualified immunity which has served to protect bad officers from accountability and denied justice to victims.

Protect protesters from police use of tear gas and projectiles. In response to incidents at recent protests, this bill prohibits law enforcement officers from shooting rubber bullets indiscriminately into a crowd and prohibits targeting rubber bullets at someone's head, torso or back. It also prohibits using tear gas without first warning the crowd and giving people time and a route to disperse.

Attorney General Lawsuits Against Bad Police Departments. Authorizes the Attorney General to bring lawsuits to force bad police departments to change

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

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

Blood drives scheduled in Alamosa – free antibody testing

SAN LUIS VALLEY -Three blood drives will be taking place in the San Luis Valley, with

social distancing guidelines in effect.

"We are encouraging appointments only at the blood drives right now," said Megan McCarter, donor recruitment rep-



resentative for Vitalant, the company conducting the blood drives. "Walk-ins will not be allowed."

Making an appointment will allow the staff of the blood drive to be able to keep donors at the state-requested six-foot distancing from each other. Blood donation operations such as blood drives are not considered "gatherings" under the current social distancing guidelines, but as essential health care activities.

In addition, for free, donors will learn about their antibody status for COVID-19. Vitalant will use an FDA approved test, regardless if the donors show symptoms. Blood donations are critically low, especially for types O, A-negative and B-negative red blood cells.

Cliff Numark, Vitalant's Chief of Marketing, added, "A positive antibody test does not mean that someone is immune to COVID-19. But they might be eligible to donate plasma in the future to help patients who are battling COVID-19."


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Reining in the facts on Equine strangles

Since the first vaccine was invented in 1796, the practice of immunization has transformed how we view infectious diseases, taking many pathogenic invaders from being maladies. For humans and animals alike, vaccines are important health

Dr. Leslie Easterwood, a clinical assistant professor at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, says the equine strangles vaccine is one that is of particular importance for horse owners in protecting their animal.

"Strangles is the common term for the bacterial respiratory disease caused by Streptococcus equi, subspecies equi," Easterwood said. "Strangles infections most commonly present as an upper respiratory infection that primarily involves the lymph nodes in a horse's jaw. Symptoms include high fevers, thick nasal discharge, depression and a lack of appetite."

The bacteria that causes strangles in horses may sound familiar to their human owners; a cousin of this bacteria, called Streptococcus pyogenes, causes strep throat in people. Though these bacteria are genetically similar and cause upper respiratory symptoms in both species, horses with strangles cannot infect humans, infect horses.

"Strangles is spread via respiratory secretions from infected horses," Easterwood said. "It is highly contagious from horse to horse and is pretty common."

Since strangles is easily transmitted between horses, vaccination is an important tool for minimizing the spread of this disease.

"Although the disease rarely redeadly threats to easily preventable sults in a fatality, it will make horses sick and can lead to loss of production, decreased performance and quarantine, in some circumstances," Easterwood said. "Vaccination does not provide complete protection, as with all vaccinations, but it can help to decrease the chance of contracting the disease in susceptible popula-

> Since horses are often kept in groups—grazing together at pasture, sharing pens or neighbored in stalls—contagious diseases can quickly work their way through a herd. As such, vaccination remains an essential tool for both individual and herd health.

> Ultimately, the decision of whether to vaccinate an animal comes down to the owner, Easterwood says, although there might be situations during which a third party takes interest in a horse's vaccination records.

> "There are no governmentally mandated vaccinations in horses," Easterwood said. "Some boarding and breeding facilities will require vaccination to board at their location, but that is not a legal requirement."

Even if no legal requirement and humans with strep throat cannot enforces the vaccination of horses, owners should still consider consulting with their veterinarian to determine what care is best for maintaining the health of their animal. Reining in the facts on Equine strangles.

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

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Gay Panic or Transgender Panic Defense bill sent to Polis for signature

the Gay Panic or Transgender Panic Defense bill (SB20-221) overcame its final hurdle as it passed out of the House of Representatives on a vote of 63-1-1 and is now headed to Governor Jared Polis for signature.

SB20-221 is a revival of HB20-1307, which had passed out of the House before the coronavirus shutdown. Once reconvening, the HB20-1307 was postponed indefinitely May 26. Through the tireless efforts of Representative Brianna Titone (D-Arvada), Representative Matt Soper (R-Delta), Senator Dominick Moreno (D-Commerce City), Senator Jack Tate (R-Centennial), and Senator Jessie Danielson (D-Wheat Ridge), the bill was reintroduced

The gay and trans panic defense is a legal strategy that cites a victim's sexual orientation or gender identity as the causal factor for a defendant's violent reaction — including murder. In 2013, the American Bar Association (ABA) unanimously approved a resolution to urge governments to ban the use of this tactic, which resulted in 10 states banning the

One of the most recognized cases

COLORADO - Earlier today, that employed the gay and trans panic defense was that of Matthew Shepard. In 1998, Matthew Shepard, a 21-year-old college student, was beaten to death by two men in Wyoming. The men attempted to use the defense to excuse their actions. Despite widespread public protest, the defense is still being used today.

In July of 2008, 18-year-old Angie Zapata from Greeley, Colorado, met 31-year-old Allen Andrade and they spent three days together, during which they had at least one sexual encounter. When Andrade discovered that Zapata was transgender, he viciously beat her with a fire extinguisher. Upon his arrest, Andrade said he thought he had "killed it." While Andrade tried to excuse his bigotry by using the defense, he was found guilty of both first-degree murder and a hate crime and was sentenced to life in prison. In other cases, the defense has been successful.

The defense has been banned in 10 states - California in 2014, Illinois in 2017, Rhode Island in 2018, Maine in 2019, New York in 2019, Nevada in 2019, Connecticut in 2019, Hawaii in 2019, New Jersey in 2020, and Washington in 2020.

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
