ALAMOSA - A misinterpretation of current state orders concerning COVID-19 led to a few verbal warnings for the Campus Café here Thurs-

Terry and Fidela Gibbs said they and their staff thought they had permission to open with social distancing requirements and did so at 6 a.m. By 11 a.m. calls from the regional environmental health program manager (food inspector) and Alamosa Police Chief Kenny Anderson led the Gibbs to return to take-out orders

only.
"I guess maybe I read the paper wrong," said Fidela Gibbs noting that they were only using three tables to maintain distancing.

She said someone called the restaurant and asked if they were open and said they were going to report them. The next call came

from food inspector Lynnea Rappold.

"She said if we don't close, she'd have to revoke our license," Gibbs said, "but she said she didn't want to. She has always been good to us.'

The long-time owner of the Campus said they've always had a great relationship with Rappold, a feeling also shared by Rappold's boss, Della Cox Vieira, director of Alamosa Public Health.

Vieira said after two phone calls, the Gibbs agreed to go back to carryout only but were allowed to let the customers seated at the time to finish their

Lynnea has created an atmosphere of learning and support for improvements with her clients in the five counties she serves," Vieira said. "She works hard to develop mutual respect and works hard at being a supportive resource rather than be punitive."

Gibbs said Chief Ander-

 $son\,was\,supportive\,as\,well$ but cautioned the couple that if they didn't follow state orders they could be summoned and fined up to \$1,000 per day.

A restaurant in Castle Rock reopened on Mother's Day and eventually was shut down, fined and had their state license removed for a period of time.

Gibbs said people were happy to see them open and the couple was happy to see them as well.

"It's just not fair," Fidela said. "It's very unconstitutional. Polis (Governor Jared) won't let us do anything.

She went on to stay that the Campus is there to provide a service.

"We don't want people getting sick," she said. "If you're sick, stay home.

Gibbs said she and her husband will go along with the orders and hopefully be able to open again soon, noting that other restaurants are impatiently waiting to reopen, too.

"It is with a heavy heart that we are writing to inform you that we will not have Stampede this year," wrote committee president Greg Metz. "As you are well aware, COVID has stolen many of our freedoms and the decision to put on Stampede was never really ours

Center issues mask order

CENTER — Following the sharp rise in Saguache County COVID-19 cases and the death of a Center man from the virus, Center Town Board has enacted an emergency order requiring all citizens entering any businesses in town to wear protective masks at all times. Masks also must be

worn in other public indoor or outdoor spaces where persons are unable to maintain safe social distancing (six or more feet separation) from others not living in their own

household. Local seamstresses are working to provide masks for Center residents. All business establish-

ment employees must also be wearing face coverings during working hours. The order will remain in

place until June 30 unless lifted or extended, Town Administrator Brian Lujan said Wednesday. All those who have tested positive for COVID-19 or any individuals who have been advised by medical personnel to self-quarantine must not leave their homes until cleared by their health care provider. Center parks also are

closed to the public. Appointments for test-

ing can be made at Cesar Chavez Clinic for Center residents beginning Thursday May 21. To reach the clinic, call 719-754-2778. Drive-up testing is between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. by appointment only beginning on Friday and only 60 tests can be done per day. "The town understands

everyone's concerns and frustrations," Lujan said. "This won't last forever; only until we have this outbreak under control."



County, city share opinions on 'Safer at Home'

ALAMOSA-In a joint virtual meeting Wednesday, Alamosa County officials brought members of the Alamosa City Council up to speed on the county's "Safer at Home" variance application submitted to the state early last week.

As Colorado attempts to slowly reopen under Governor Jared Polis' order based on the COVID-19 pandemic, counties are required to submit a variance to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) requesting more lenience which could

allow more businesses to open. Council members asked Public Health

Director Della Cox Vieira to explain the details of the variance which addresses the reopening of restaurants, gyms, movie theaters, places of worship and campgrounds in Alamosa County. Each group of businesses are addressed slightly differently but all call for a spacing of 144 square feet per person, or approximately six feet of separation. A group from one household is considered one person.

The variance also addresses places of worship and other gatherings of 10 or more people.

Approval of the variance by the

state is based on staying below a threshold of positive virus cases per people tested on a percentage basis, Vieira explained. Alamosa County included a 15% threshold in its variance but noted that Rio Grande County was denied 15% and were given a threshold

of 10%.

Councilwoman Liz Thomas Hensley asked what happens if the variance is granted and the threshold is exceeded. Viera said the county would probably have to return to state-ordered restrictions or submit a new variance.

Governor Polis' current "Safer at Home" order expires on Tuesday and no one could speculate what his next order might look like. Some predictions are that he may loosen the rules for restaurants.

Much discussion was held about current testing procedures for the virus with Mayor Ty Coleman speculating that if more tests could be completed and came back negative that it would be easier to keep below the threshold.

Vieira explained that the county is still only testing symptomatic persons, those experiencing symptoms, and healthcare workers, so the likelihood of finding more negative cases is compromised. She said the number of tests being conducted in the past few weeks has increased dramatically and is expected to continue to increase.

She said the goal is to eventually test at least 10% of the county's population, but her department continues to advise residents to all the nurse hotlines for a referral if they are symptomatic. Councilman Charlie Griego said he

has had a lot of inquiries from service organizations that depend on events like bingo and weddings for their revenue. The current state order bans gatherings of more than 10 people, Viera reminded the group.

The variance directs restaurants to use up any outdoor seating first before moving customers inside.

City Manager Heather Brooks said the city is planning to expand the outdoor dining experience by perhaps closing a few city streets and parking lots in areas

close to restaurants to be used for dining.

Discussions were held about the division created when the governor declared only certain types of businesses as "es-

'One size does not fit all," Mayor Coleman said referring to the population of the SLV compared to the front range. "Just because some of our businesses are non-essential doesn't need to lead to being non-existent."

"The county didn't shut anyone down," Commission Chairman Michael Yohn said, noting that all rules set are by the governor's orders.

Commissioner Darius Allen encouraged everyone to contact their state legislators, the CDPHE, the governor's office and even their members of congress.

Yohn went on to remind the 40-plus people participating in the Zoom call that Monday is not just Memorial Day.

'It's also Remembrance Day," he said. "Let's make it a remembrance and not a

Grant provides support to businesses for utility costs

"We have observed that utility costs, especially municipal utilities and communication were not being addressed by other programs and that this was a gap the SLVCOG, with support of the Colorado COVID Relief Fund, could try fill to aid in keeping people employed."

Called the San Luis Valley Business Utility Support Fund, the program will provide direct financial support to businesses to help with their most recent utility expenses. Up to \$500 in combined gas, electric, sewer, water, or communication (internet, telephone) cost can be covered by the fund. Businesses may apply online at www.slvdrg.

org. The application is simple, requesting only basic information about the business and a copy of their most recent utility bills.

The San Luis Valley **Business Utility Support** Fund is made possible by a grant of \$25,000 funding from the Colorado COVID Relief Fund. The utility support program will accept applications until the fund is spent.

Led by an executive committee in coordination with the Governor's Office, the Colorado COVID Relief Fund was developed to raise and coordinate the allocation of funds based on COVID-19 prevention, impact and recovery needs of community-based organizations in Colorado. The fund is organized

to ensure that the most acute community needs across the state are being addressed and that community voice is reflected in all funding decisions made over time.

Less Traffic expected for Memorial Day Weekend

DENVER – Although the summer travel season begins tomorrow, the Colorado Department of Transportation is anticipating lower than normal traffic numbers this Memorial Day weekend due, in part, to Safer at Home directives in many areas of the state.

The Interstate 70 Corridor west of Denver also is expected to see less traffic over the four-day weekend. In 2019, 159,201 vehicles traveled through the Eisenhower/Johnson Memorial Tunnels for the holiday.

"With the warmer weather upon us, this might be a tempting weekend to head to the mountains or to travel farther than usual from home,' said CDOT Executive Director Shoshana Lew. "But this year is unique. We're encouraging people to please follow public health orders, recreate responsibly and do their part to keep each other

Although traffic is expected to be lighter than usual this weekend, all CDOT construction and

maintenance projects will be suspended by noon Friday and not resume their regular schedule until Tuesday, May 26. The only exception is for emergency operations.

BE SAFE - BE PRE-PARED-FOR SPRING DRIVING CONDI-**TIONS**

1. Watch for potholes. Winter's freeze/thaw cycle weather can damage roadways, including the creation of potholes. Spring rain also can make them difficult to see. And they can damage your vehicle, requiring expensive repairs. Keep a safe following distance in case the driver in front of you reacts unpredictably. Avoid swerving if you can

to avoid a pothole. 2. Slow down for spring showers. Roads become slick when it first begins to rain because rainwater mixes with road contaminants, like as oil and grease. Increase your following distance to allow for proper braking.

3. Watch for pedestri-

ans and bikes. Warmer temperatures mean more people are outside walking or bicycling. Slow down and pay extra attention at crosswalks and along roadways.

4. Share the road with motorcycles. Motorcycles may quickly come in and out of your blind spots due to their speed and size. Always take a second look with more motorcycles out

on the road. **5.** Animals are on the move. Animal activity increases during the spring, either due to mating season or because they are waking up from winter hibernation. Deer are most active at dawn and dusk.

6. Inspect your tires. Adequate tire tread is important for safe driving in wet weather because the tread moves water away from the tire. Less tread means reduced traction.

7. Maintain proper tire air pressure. Tires lose air due to the cold winter temperatures and now can be underinflated. Warmer temperatures can cause tires to be overinflated.

Recently, there has been some concern about a COVID-19 related illness in children called Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome (MIS-C). The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and CDPHE alerted health care providers to be on the lookout for this illness and to report any suspected cases to state public health. According to Dr. Sam Dominguez, pediatric infectious diseases specialist at Children's Hospital, "It's mportant to emphasize that this emerging inflammatory syndrome is very rare, and that it is safe to take your child to their doctor or to the hospital, if needed.'

Valdez and Crowder cross the aisle to support SLVSBC



Where Did The Moths Come From

For the last week or two, there has been a large number of moths getting into homes and buildings. The most common moth we are seeing is the "Miller Moth". Miller moth is the name given to any type of moth that gets in and around home in large numbers. The miller moth we see in the San Luis Valley is the adult stage of the army cutworm, Euxoa auxiliaris.


This year, it is appearing in larger numbers that most years while making its annual migration from the eastern plains of Colorado to the mountains. Some moths may be coming from western parts of Kansas, Oklahoma, or Nebraska.

Army cutworm moths have an unusual life history. Eggs are laid by the moths in late summer and early fall.

Most of the eggs are laid in weedy areas near alfalfa or wheat fields in areas with thick growth. Army cutworms have a wide range of plants on which they feed. They prefer broadleaf plants but will feed on grass.

They spend the winter as a partially grown caterpillar. In early spring the cutworms may damage crops, particularly alfalfa or wheat in the plains. They can also be found in garden plants and lawns. The caterpillars become fully grown by spring.

They then burrow into the soil and pupate. Pupation can occur as early as March or into early May, depending



on temperatures

later, the adult, "miller moths", emerge. Next, the migrate to the mountains. There they feed on nectar and rest for a few months. In early fall or late summer, they return to lower elevations and begin to lay eggs, beginning the cycle over again.

Miller moths are a nuisance in the San Luis Valley. They do not cause any harm in an adult stage. They are usually around for two or three weeks. Moths in the home do not lay eggs or eat plants.

Between three to six weeks

They also do not feed on furniture or clothes.

One commonly observed phenom-

enon is that swallows may congregate and eat the moths. This likely occurs because the miller moths seek shelter in automobiles and emerge when they stop at stoplights.

To control the miller moths around the home, seal any cracks around doors. Reduce lighting at night while moths are flying. Plants that provide nectar will attract more moths, reduce flowering plants during the miller moth flight period if they are enough of a nuisance.

The best way to remove the moths once they are in a home is to swat them with a fly swatter or vacuum them up. An easy trap is to put a light over a bowl of soapy water. The moth is attracted to the light and will fly into the bowl as it flies around. Be careful with water and electricity. Make sure the

light is on a GFCI receptacle for safety. Bats can help control the moths. Some noises like jingling keys, or rattling coins disturb the moths. Insecticides are of little use on miller moths.

While the miller moths are here, they will be a nuisance. However, they should be gone in a few weeks. While they are a nuisance, they do not cause much harm. They may leave spots on drapes, floors, or other areas from feces. In the fall, they usually move through the area quickly and are not noticed very much.



Response to Patrick Crowder's Variance Examination

Patrick Crowder wrote a letter to the editor on May 20 regarding the variance that Alamosa County submitted to the Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment (CDPHE).

We would like to clarify the variance process and why we submitted it as written.

This is a stressful time for everyone. As Commissioners, we jointly stand together and want to see our businesses open, operating, and providing the goods and services we want to purchase, use and or support.

On March 26, 2020, Governor Polis issued "Stay at Home" Orders that closed non-essential businesses. State Orders typically take precedence throughout the State. Counties may issue MORE restrictive orders, but they cannot issue LESS restrictive orders. Governor Polis issued "Safer at Home" Orders on April 26, 2020, which allowed counties to apply for variances for the first time.

We met with our 5 neighboring counties and we all considered submitting one variance for the San Luis Valley region. After great discussion, all 6 counties decided it was best if we submitted our

own variance and each of us stand alone. CDPHE decides whether a variance should be approved. The variance had to describe the prevalence of the virus in

should be approved. The variance had to describe the prevalence of the virus in the County, describe our hospital capacity, include a containment plan if cases increase after the variance is granted, be approved by our Public Health Director and Chief Medical Officer at the hospital and then as your commissioners could submit it to the State.

We disagree with Mr. Crowder that

Alamosa County was too timid in its variance request. In reviewing Mesa and Eagle Counties approved variance request, we understood what CDPHE had allowed for campgrounds, RV parks, churches and outdoor gatherings. One of those requirements was appropriate social distancing, thus we included a 144 sq. ft. radius.

We also took into consideration our local resources. SLV Health only has six beds in the negative pressure unit and another six medical/surgical beds. Our Public Health Department has limited employees who can follow-up on potential cases.

The whole organization of the State's

plan was to not overload our local resources.

It is easy to cast stones when one does not attend county commissioner meetings. We have our regular scheduled meetings every 2nd & 4th Wednesday, but we have also been meeting at least once, sometimes twice a week at 2:00 p.m. for timely updates from our Public Health Director and Emergency Manager. We encourage the public to participate. We also encourage you to contact Senator Larry Crowder at larry.crowder.senate@state.co.us and Representative Donald Valdez at donald.valdez.house@state.co.us as they have a direct line to Gov-

City acknowledges possible protest

ALAMOSA — At Wednesday's City Council meeting councilors discussed the possibility of a march/protest on Memorial Day that's been making the rounds on social media. While they don't want to see anyone's holiday spoiled with legal problems, they are beholden to the law.

They wanted to remind all who plan on attending the Monday protest to adhere to state legal statutes, including but not limited to, not obstructing highways without legal privilege. In Colorado, highway carries a wide berth including "highway, street, sidewalk, railway, waterway, building entrance, elevator, aisle, stairway, or hallway" C.R.S. § 18-9-107. That said, city officials also have a responsibility to enforce both state and local health orders, meaning those that would participate would also be required to comply with social distancing and gathering numbers at any possible gatherings.

Dr. Santosh Mathew, who works with a network of 20 hospitals and 40 community health programs in North India.

"Tech answers" are not enough in poverty zones with few resources. Preventative care and aid will have to reach suffering people through flexible programs in their own homes and community groups, said Mathew.

What is our role? Do we tell them what to do or do we come alongside and help them to find the right answers?... We think that we know. I think that they may know better."



CHSAA creates Resocialization Task Force to examine when, and how, to resume sports and activities

The Colorado High School Activities Association has convened a specialized task force to discuss the return of athletics and activities.

The CHSAA Resocialization Task Force will begin meeting in June, and will consist of educational leaders representing all levels of administration, classifications and state geography;

Classifications and CHSAA Sports Medicine Advisory members; as well as the members of the Board of Directors, and the

CHSAA staff.

The purpose of the task force is to explore the many options on if, when or how, activities and athletics can resume for Colo-

rado high schools. Commissioner Rhonda Blanford-Green announced

the purpose of the task force in an email to all schools on Thursday. She has already received an outpouring of interest of educational leaders willing to serve.

"The immediate and overwhelming response speaks volumes to amazing educational leaders across our state, who are committed to Colorado students and working with CHSAA to create this experience, knowing the challenges we will face," said Blanford-Green. "Each and everyone that has reached out to members of our staff would elevate the discussion, so we will have another tough decision to make."

In her email to schools, Blanford-Green wrote: "Every single sports entity from the professionals to little league are currently focused on how to resume participant engagement within a safe environment, free of health threats and liability. If resocialization was easy, we would all be watching current events instead of re-runs of the 2004 Athens Olympics."

She added: "My goal, and that of the CHSAA staff, is to remain laser focused on the next steps for resuming CHSAA

programs in a safe, educational, environment while mitigating operational efficiencies to reduce financial stressors for our membership."

This Resocialization Task Force will not be pressured to commit to definitive dates or timelines, but is assembled to provide guidance to the Association that is consistent

with Federal and State mandates.

"The term Resocialization was coined by the NCAA, I paused at first, but then I realized its overarching meaning, which is beyond just a game or a contest," Blanford-Green said. "It's about coming back to the culture of athletics and activities: teammates and socialization, and the support system that extends beyond. Resocialization embodies all the attributes of education-based participation that we all want and need to safely return."

Blanford-Green will look at keeping this task force in place throughout the 2020-21 season.

The group will have a clear set of

questions and topics to examine beginning in June:

Do students need to be fully engaged with in-person learning before the Association resumes activities and athletics?

Should CHSAA consider offering some activities and athletics if Federal, state, medical and safety guidelines can be met at the local and Association level?

Should CHSAA consider moving some activities and athletics to later start dates, such as September, October, or January, and consider extending the end of the season further than the traditional activities calendar?

Should CHSAA consider adjusting some activities and athletics to be conducted earlier or later than their traditional season?

Should we consider online participation for some activities in place of physical activation?

What safety measures will need to be in place to resume specific and/or all activities?

"Adjusting to the unimaginable impact that the pandemic has had on education and high school athletics will allow us to think outside the box and emerge as stronger leaders for students and programs across the state of Colorado," Blanford-Green said.





STATEWIDE — As Colorado slowly loosens stay-at-home restrictions, the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) and Colorado State Patrol (CSP) want to remind Coloradans to drive sober as Memorial Day weekend approaches. The Heat Is On high-visibility enforcement period kicks off on Friday, May 22, and ends on Tuesday, May 26.

Seventy-five law enforcement agencies will participate in the heightened enforcement campaign with increased patrols across the state. Those enjoying Memorial Day festivities away from home are encouraged to plan for a sober ride if they intend to consume alcohol or other impairing substances.

"Safety on Colorado's roadways isn't just CDOT's goal – it should be a focus for every single person on the road," said Shoshana Lew, Executive Director of CDOT. "Your safety and the safety of those around you are at stake when you drive impaired. All of us want to make it home safely, so don't jeopardize that by driving impaired."

During the 2019 Memorial Day weekend DUI enforcement period, law enforcement agencies arrested 323 impaired motorists. Last May alone, there were 16 impairment-related fatalities on Colorado's roads.

The legal blood-alcohol content (BAC) limit in Colorado is 0.05 percent for driving while ability impaired (DWAI) and 0.08 percent for driving under the influence (DUI). Firsttime DUI offenders can be punished with up to one year in jail, license suspension and thousands of dollars in fines.

"Memorial Day is a day to remember military personnel who died while serving the country. It also tends to be associated with increased travel and alcohol consumption due to the long weekend. We want Coloradans to be safe, maintain social distancing practices, and make the decision to never drive impaired," said Colonel Matthew Packard, Chief of the Colorado State Patrol. "Plan ahead for a sober ride if you are celebrating away from

The Heat Is On will be back with its Summer Blitz DUI enforcement from June 12-22. During last year's summer enforcement, 585 citations were given to impaired drivers with the highest arrests seen from the Colorado Springs Police Department (52), the Denver Police Department (33) and the El Paso County Sherriff's Office (32). The summer months and holiday weekends traditionally show an increase in DUI crashes and arrests. Law enforcement is always on the lookout for impaired drivers and working to keep Colorado

to reduce traffic injuries and deaths.

COVID-19

Safe transportation infrastructure is essential for emergency first responders and freight drivers as Colorado navigates the COVID-19 pandemic. With that in mind, road maintenance and construction continues on CDOT projects with social distancing and other health safety measures to reduce CO-VID-19 exposure on the worksite. The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment announced guidelines for construction activities. The public is urged to join the campaign for #Doing-MyPartCO by practicing social distancing, wearing face masks, staying at home when possible, and avoiding nonessential travel. With fewer vehicles on the roads, CDOT crews will be able to work more efficiently and safely.

The CDOT Highway Safety Office provides funding to Colorado law enforcement for impaired driving enforcement, education and awareness campaigns. The Heat Is On campaign runs throughout the year, with 16 specific highvisibility impaired driving enforcement periods centered on national holidays and large public events. Enforcement periods can include sobriety checkpoints, saturation patrols and additional law enforcement on duty dedicated to impaired driving enforcement. Expect an abundance of millers moths this year

ing insects infiltrating doorways, backyards and gardens the last few weeks miller moth season in Colorado is here.

Following four straight years of below-average numbers for the winged creatures, the insect should be noticeably more abundant in 2020, according to Colorado State University entomologists Whitney Cranshaw and Frank Peairs, both professors in the Department of Agricultural Biology and CSU Extension

specialists. "Flights of the moths crossing through into eastern Colorado on their annual migration to the mountains first became noticeable the first few days of May, much earlier than 2019, when noticeable numbers were first observed in late May," the insect experts write in a fact sheet for CSU Extension.

Familiar to native Coloradans, "miller moth" is the common name for the adult stage of the army cutworm, a.k.a. Euxoa auxiliaris. They originate from fields across eastern Colorado and adjacent areas of western Kansas and Nebraska on a yearly westward migration, ultimately arriving in the mountains to spend the summer, and returning to the plains in September. Peak moth flights may last five to six weeks, generally starting the last week of May or early June. Already, the moths have damaged crops in Colorado, Nebraska and Kansas. If Front Range resi-

dents are swatting more moths than usual this year, they have relatively low moisture conditions in fall. winter and spring to thank, according to the CSU entomology team. It's been drier this year than last, reducing the number of blooming flowers. Plus, a freeze in mid-April killed blossoms from plants that would normally be in peak bloom in early to mid-May. With fewer flowers available to the insects during their migration, they tend to concentrate in areas with larger numbers of flowering plants – usually, irrigated landscapes, including yards and gardens.

Annoying as they can be, the moths won't stick around forever. Flight activity of the moths will accelerate as the night temperatures warm. A warning, though: Cool, wet periods might make the migrating moths stay a while.

And just to confuse matters, Cranshaw adds, there is another moth event happening along the Front Range now – the adult alfalfa webworm, a smaller, mottled-gray moth that is very visible by day when walking across a yard.

Miller moth fast facts

Why are they called "miller moths?"

What was the are any indication, heaviest moth flight in recent history?

Since at least the early 1980s, the heaviest, most prolonged flight of miller moths across eastern Colorado occurred in 1991.

What eats them?

They have many natural enemies, including predatory ground beetles, hunting wasps, and many birds. Grizzly bears in Yellowstone are known to feed on large numbers of the fatrich moths they find under loose rocks.

What are those swallows doing circling my car?

A commonly observed phenomenon during miller time is swallows – which love to eat miller moths - congregating at road intersections. This can occur because moths that had sought shelter in car chassis are warmed by the engine and emerge while the cars are idling at a stop

How do the moths get inside a house?

They avoid daylight and seek shelter before daybreak. Small cracks in doorways, garages and cars are perfect hiding spots. At night, they emerge to resume their migratory flights and to feed.

Why are moths attracted to lights at night?

Moths, and many other flying insects, are confused by lowpoint light sources because they naturally use the moon or stars to orient their flights.

Are miller moths harmful?

The caterpillar stage can be a pest for crops in the spring, and they can kill seedling plants. Mostly, the adults are just a nuisance. Moths in the home do not lay eggs or feed on household furnishings or food. If large numbers die in a home, there may be a small odor problem due to the fat in their bodies turning rancid. Large numbers can leave spots on walls from their meconia, which is waste stored during pupal development.

How do I control miller moths in my home?


Seal obvious openings around windows and doors. Reduce lighting at night in and around homes. An easy trap to make is to suspend a light bulb over a bucket partially filled with soapy water (always use a grounded plug and extreme caution with any electrical device near water). Moths attracted to the light often fall into the water and are killed. Moths are not very susceptible to insecticides.

What is extreme fear of moths called?

Mottephobia.
