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SLV is 'Safer at Home'

SAN LUIS VALLEY — Monday Colorado transitioned into the Safer at Home phase. It continues to be safest at home, especially for vulnerable populations such as older adults and those with pre-existing medical conditions. When you leave home for groceries, go to work, or prepare your business to re-open, continue to practice the recommendations for wearing a mask, frequent hand washing, and social distancing.

Safer at Home requirements still prohibit public gatherings of ten (10) persons or more in both public spaces and private commercial venues. We'd like to remind religious organi-

zations to continue using live broadcasting options or other technology available to allow members to remain at home. We understand that everyone in our community is ready to congregate, see their church family and friends, but it is important that we follow the guidance to ease the restrictions slowly so we can help keep our community safe and not lose the progress we've made the last several weeks fighting this virus through the stay at home orders.

Local Public Health Agencies are working with school districts on safe graduation plans. We understand that this has been a difficult time for our local High School seniors,

missing the last quarter of their senior year, which includes big events such as prom and spring sports.

Graduation should be a memorable event that keeps graduates and their loved ones as safe as pos-

Costilla County conservancy district receives grant

DENVER – Colorado Watershed Assembly (CWA) announces the Costilla County Conservancy District as one of eight Colorado organizations to receive a Colorado Healthy Rivers Fund (CHRF) grant for the 2019 grant cycle. Colorado Watershed Assembly Executive Director Casey Davenhill expressed, “Congratulations to the Costilla County Conservancy District for bringing together many diverse interests to begin a community-based Watershed Assessment. This project demonstrates the values promoted by the Healthy Rivers Fund: to work collaboratively with diverse interests in communities throughout Colorado, so we can all share the benefits of healthy streams, landscapes and people. This project leverages over \$100,000 for the benefit of watershed health in the Rio Culebra basin. It is the beginning of a larger community effort to protect families, forests, irrigation structures, and livestock. Way to go, CCCD!”



Costilla County Conservancy District will receive \$20,000 from the Colorado Healthy Rivers Fund for their Upper Culebra Watershed Assessment (UCWA). The Rio Culebra Watershed is made up of stream systems and their connected riparian areas that crisscross the western side of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains. Culebra Peak, by its very existence, creates a microclimate that supports diverse plant communities and wooded areas, perfect for settlement of the area’s farms and ranches. There are many environmental challenges

facing the Upper Culebra watershed, including: extended drought, forest fire potential, extensive beetle kill, water quality impairments, endangered species, and degraded habitat. While stakeholders recognize the vital need to implement projects to address these concerns, the current condition of the Upper Culebra watershed is largely undocumented. This assessment will characterize riparian habitat, geomorphology, geology, adjacent uplands, water infrastructure, aquatic habitat, flow regimes, grazing, forest health, and water quality. Stakeholders can use the resulting characterization to prioritize, secure funding for, and implement collaborative projects that improve the health of the Upper Culebra watershed.

The Colorado Healthy Rivers Fund grant program awards annual grants through a competitive application and review process. These funds support on-the-ground projects that contribute to cleaner water, healthier wildlife habitat, improved recreation and vibrant local economies throughout the State of

Colorado.

The program was established jointly by the Colorado Water Conservation Board and the Colorado Water Quality Control Commission, in cooperation with the Colorado Watershed Assembly. The Colorado Water Conservation Board is the state executive branch agency responsible for state water policy and planning. The Colorado Water Quality Control Commission is the administrative agency responsible for developing specific state water quality policies in a manner that implements the broader policies set forth by the General Assembly in the Colorado Water Quality Control Act. The Colorado Watershed Assembly is a 501(c)(3) Colorado organization that supports collaborative efforts to protect and improve land, water, and other natural resources by providing the network to connect a diversity of interests with Colorado’s watershed groups and other decision-makers. Airport board to hear EAS proposals on Wednesday

ALAMOSA – Three airlines will make presentations to the Alamosa County Airport Advisory Board on Wednesday to express their desire to be the essential air service (EAS) provider for the San Luis Valley Regional Airport.

Due to the Covid-19 outbreak, in person attendance will not be allowed in order to protect the public. Each airline presenter has established a virtual conference room for anyone who would like to listen in to comply with the Colorado Open Meetings Law. Accessibility may be limited due to network capacity.

Current EAS provider Boutique Air will make the first presentation and be interviewed by the board and airport manager Will Hickman at 9 a.m. Key Lime/

Denver Air Connection is scheduled to present at 10 a.m. followed by Sky West Airlines at 11.

Following lunch, the airport board will conduct its regular meeting at 1 p.m. via virtual conference room. Anyone wishing to listen in may call 605-313-6288 and use access code 433756#. Persons who wish to make a public comment must email the comments prior to the meeting by 8 a.m. Wednesday to: bramirez@alamosacounty.org.

The airport board is scheduled to discuss the EAS applicants and make a recommendation to the county board of commissioners.

Also on the agenda are updates from Hickman, Boutique Air and Centric Aviation.



U.S. Attorney Dunn Announces \$9 Million Grant to Help State of Colorado Fight COVID-19

Small Grants to Local Communities Also Disbursed

DENVER – U.S. Attorney Jason Dunn announced the state of Colorado will receive \$9 million to support its response to the public safety challenges posed by the outbreak of COVID-19.

“This grant will help ensure the safety of our law enforcement community as

they continue to protect us during this unprecedented time,” Dunn said. “It is part of the \$14 million the Department of Justice allocated for public safety agencies in the state of Colorado that we announced a few short weeks ago, and we are seeing the quick distribution of those funds. In addition to the \$9 million given to the state, local jurisdictions are being awarded grants as well – with Larimer County and the cities of Fountain and Grand Junction also receiving grants in the last week.”

The grants to local jurisdictions were for the following amounts:

- Larimer County – \$51,342
- City of Fountain – \$34,327
- City of Grand Junction – \$91,671

There is a wide range of application for the funds including overtime, hiring, and supplies – such as personal protective equipment and sanitizer. Grand Junction, for example, is using its funds to bring in a hazard mitigation team to sanitize police equipment, such as vehicles, on a weekly basis. The City is also purchasing PPE, masks, wipes and hand sanitizer.

Dunn is encouraging other communities in Colorado find out if they are

eligible and apply for the remaining grant money. Other jurisdictions can find out if they are eligible and apply immediately by visiting this website. The Justice Department is moving quickly, awarding grants on a rolling basis and aiming to have funds available for drawdown as soon as possible after receiving applications. These grants are available under the Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding program, authorized by the recent stimulus legislation signed by President Trump, of which \$14 million was allocated for local jurisdictions in Color

Level 2: Safer at Home

Colorado has been doing a great job following the Stay-at-Home order, and we must keep it up. The virus is still present in Colorado and can re-surge at any time. Everyone needs to do their part for themselves, their loved ones, and our community. We have a responsibility to ourselves and to each other to protect our state and our community. Right now, we are in Level 2: Safer at Home. Coloradans are no longer ordered to stay home, but are strongly advised to stay at home. Critical businesses are open and non-critical businesses are operating with restrictions. People should be prepared for state and local public health orders to be extended, amended, or changed as needed to protect public health. This means we may move between the different levels during this pandemic:

for grocery shopping, exercise and necessary activities. Only critical businesses are open.

Level 2: Safer at home
Everyone is still encouraged to stay at home. Critical businesses are open and non-critical business are operating with restrictions.

April 26
Last day of Colorado’s Stay-at-Home Order.

April 27
Safer-at-Home begins, including curbside retail and real estate showings.

May 1
Retail and personal services can open (if implementing best practices).

May 4
Non-critical offices can reopen (if implementing best practices and lower density).

Safer at Home fast facts
Critical businesses are still open.
Non-critical businesses are open with restrictions.
Stay at home as much

as possible.

Practice good hygiene. Wash your hands frequently and don’t touch your face.

Wear a face covering or mask when you leave your home.

Connect with neighbors and loved ones virtually.

Golden businesses are saving lives
Many Golden businesses are stepping up to help save lives during the COVID-19 crisis. In some cases, the help goes well beyond our city’s borders to the rest of the state and even the world. We realize there are likely many companies doing great things that we don’t know about yet. So, consider this a highlight of a few that can serve as inspiration!

Best practices for all businesses Worksites
Deputize workplace coordinator(s) charged with addressing COVID-19 issues.

Maintain 6-foot distancing when possible, and discourage shared spaces.

Frequently sanitize all high-touch areas. (Additional Guidance)

Post signage for employees and customers on good hygiene.

Ensure proper ventilation. (OSHA guidance)

Avoid gatherings (meetings, waiting rooms, etc) of more than 10 people.

Implement symptom monitoring protocols (including workplace temperature monitoring and symptom screening questions) where possible. (Additional Guidance)

Eliminate or regularly sanitize any items in common spaces (i.e., break rooms) that are shared between individuals (i.e., condiments, coffee makers, vending machines). (Additional Guidance)

Provide appropriate protective gear like gloves, masks, and encourage

appropriate use. (Additional Guidance)

Employees
Require employees showing any symptoms or signs of sickness, or who has been in contact with known positive cases to stay home.

Connect employees to company or state benefits providers.

Provide flexible or remote scheduling for employees who need to continue to observe Stay-at-Home, who may have child or elder care obligations, or who live with a person who still needs to observe Stay-at-Home due to underlying condition, age, or other factors.

Encourage and enable remote work whenever possible.

Minimize all in-person meetings.

Provide hand washing facilities/stations and hand sanitizer.

Encourage breaks to

wash hands or use hand sanitizer.

Phase shifts and breaks to reduce employee density.

Wear appropriate protective gear like gloves, masks, and face coverings and encourage appropriate use. (Additional Guidance)

(Guidance to keep employees & customers safe)

To protect customers
Create special hours for people at higher risk of severe illness from COVID-19.

Encourage and facilitate 6-foot distancing inside of the business for all patrons.

Encourage use of protection like gloves, masks, and face coverings.

Provide hand sanitizer at entrance.

Install shields or barriers where possible between customers and employees.

Be prepared for State and Local Public Health orders to be extended, amended or changed as needed to protect public health. This means we may move between different levels during the pandemic. Our ability to continue moving forward will depend in large part on the public’s commitment to social distancing.

The number of COVID-19 positive cases in the San Luis Valley has increased by one for Alamosa County. Updates will be posted on our website at www.slvemergency.org/slv-covid-19.

Public Health Agencies continue to do contact tracing and follow up with confirmed cases to identify others who may have been exposed to the virus.


Criteria for COVID-19 testing were expanded in the San Luis Valley last week. Those with symptoms (fever, cough, shortness of breath)

should call a nurse triage line for screening. If they are eligible to be tested, they will be given further instructions. Test samples are taken locally and are sent to outside labs for processing. Processing time varies.

How the foods you eat might help you fight cancer

Many people are familiar with certain ways to reduce their risk for cancer. Avoiding tobacco, which the National Cancer Institute notes is a leading cause of cancer and death from cancer, and protecting oneself from the sun's harmful ultraviolet rays by applying sunscreen are two of the most widely known ways to reduce cancer risk. But fewer people may recognize the important role diet can play in fighting cancer.

According to the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, a nutritious diet can reduce your cancer risk. That makes eating right one of the easiest, not to mention the most delicious, ways to reduce your risk for a disease that is often preventable. But how exactly does diet lower cancer risk?

Healthy diets and healthy weights

The American Cancer Society estimates that excess body weight is responsible for about 8 percent of all cancers and roughly 7 percent of all cancer deaths in the United States. A healthy diet full of fruits, vegetables and lean protein can help people lose weight and

keep the weight off once it's gone, thereby reducing cancer risk.

Healthy diets and exercise

Unhealthy foods and oversized portions can contribute to feelings of fatigue. Such feelings can make it hard to get off the couch and exercise. While the ACS acknowledges that more studies are necessary to determine the link between sedentary behavior and cancer risk, various studies have shown links between physical activity and reduced cancer risk. For example, a 2016 meta-analysis of 10 cohort studies published in the Clinical Journal of Sports Medicine found that individuals who were the most physically active had a 19 percent lower risk of stomach cancer than those who were least active. By eating healthier foods and controlling their portions, people may discover they have more energy to get up and exercise, reaping all the rewards that such activity has to offer, including a lower risk for cancer.

Healthy diets and strong immune systems

Another way certain

foods can help you fight cancer is by bolstering your immune system, making it more capable of fighting disease. The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center, a world renowned medical center devoted exclusively to cancer patient care, notes that the fiber, phytochemicals and antioxidants humans get from consuming plants bolster their immune systems. A strong immune system is a vital ally in the fight against cancer.

The old adage "You are what you eat" is rooted in truth. And people who eat healthy foods are more likely to be healthy as a result. AC206980

Real property taxpayer remedies

ALAMOSA — For tax years 2019 and 2020, the county assessor is required by law to appraise all real property at a June 30, 2018 level of value. Notices of Valuation reflecting the 2020 values will be sent to owners of real property by May 1. The information used by the assessor to value your property is available for your review.

From May 1 through June 1, owners of real property may protest the value or the classification established by the assessor. This protest period provides an opportunity for the taxpayers to inform the assessor of errors in classification, property description, or other discrepancies that may result in a reduction in value or a change in classification.

Protests to the assessor must be postmarked or presented in person on or before June 1. The assessor must make a decision concerning your protest and mail you a written Notice of Determination on or before the last working day in June. If you are satisfied with the assessor's determination, the tax bill you receive next January will be based on the value and classification reflected on the Notice of Determination.

If you disagree with the assessor's decision, you may file an appeal with

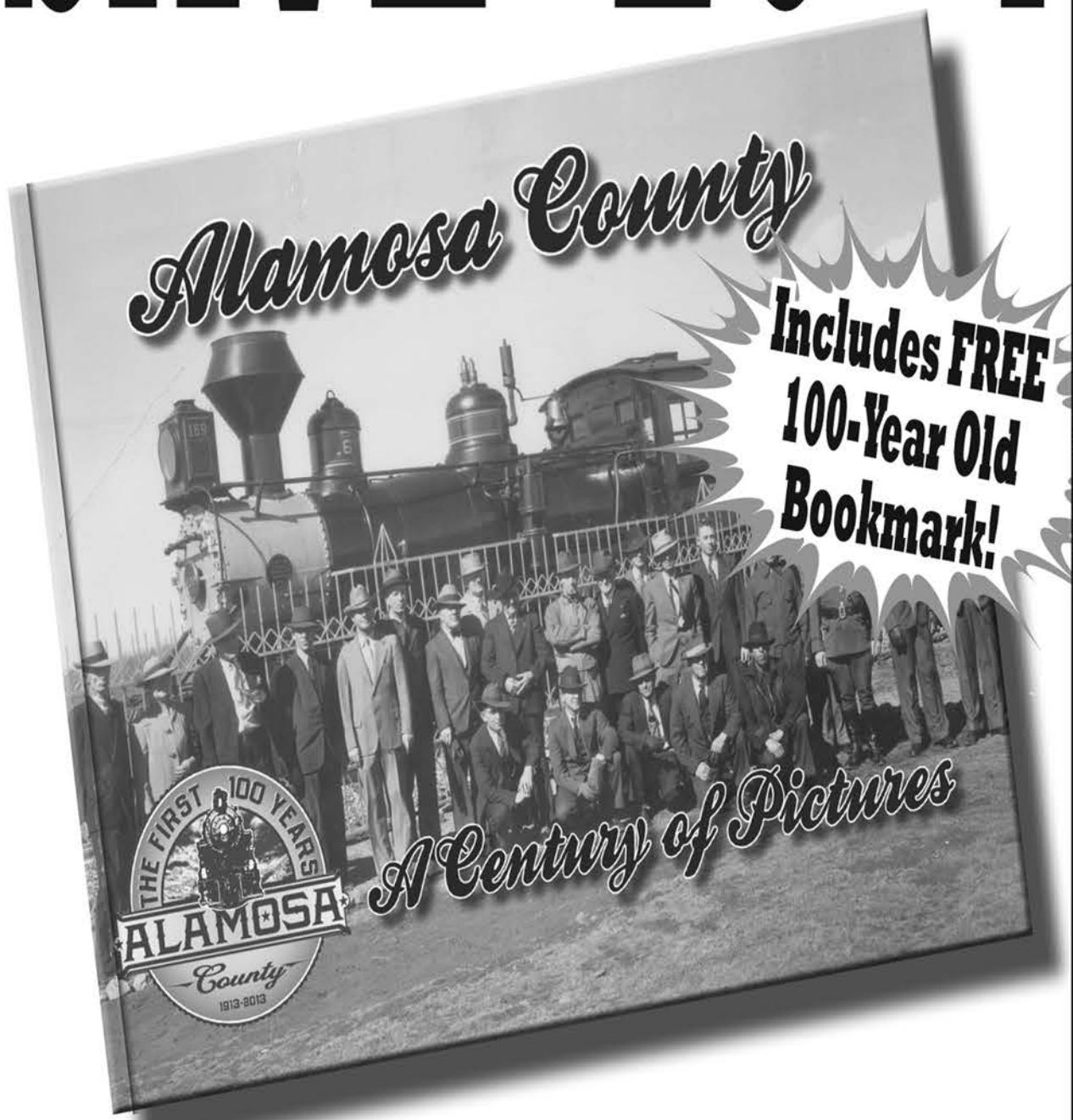
the county board of equalization. An appeal to the county board of equalization must be postmarked or hand-delivered no later than July 15. The county board will notify you by mail of the hearing date, time, and place where you may present evidence to substantiate your case.

Evidence includes documentation such as the sales price of property similar to yours that sold between January 1, 2017, and June 30, 2018. The county board will conclude hearings and render decisions by the close of business on August 5. The county board must mail you a decision within five business days of the date of its decision. If you are satisfied with the county board's decision, the tax bill you receive next January will be based on the valuation and classification reflected in the county board's decision.

If you disagree with the action of the county board, you may file an appeal with the State Board of Assessment Appeals or the district court, or you may request a binding arbitration hearing. Your appeal must be made within 30 days of the county board's decision.

Creating online content and interacting with members through daily challenges for core programs.

As more businesses are planning to open with the Governor's Safer At Home order, the need for childcare for school-aged children will also increase. Slots are available and the staff is well trained in order to ensure the safety of the community and themselves. Necessary modifications to programming have been made, but the Boys and Girls Club is open from 7 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.
