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Fire ravages portion of large, rural home By KEITH R. with four trucks and 14 cation rental received

ALAMOSA — Fire

of undetermined origin caused serious damage to a large home just before 4 p.m. Thursday on Del Viento Drive just west of Alamosa. Firefighters from the

Alamosa and Monte Vista Fire Departments and Colorado Division of Fire Prevention and Control (DFPC) were on scene for nearly three hours due to the fire spreading into the attic of the one-story side of the structure, according to Fire Chief Don Chapman. That portion of the home suffered severe fire and water damage but may eventually be inhabitable, he said.

The attached twostory structure which was registered as a vasome smoke damage, Chapman said. The property is owned

by Shawn and Karen Studer of Pagosa Springs. Chief Chapman said the one-story portion was rented to Jane McCoy.

Chapman said the fire originated on a wood patio on the back of the one-story structure, spread up the exterior wall and into the attic, with the cause still under investigation. Firefighters fought the blaze from inside and out, pouring water and foam into attic vents and a hole cut in the roof by firefighters.

The single-story portion suffered severe roof damage, Chapman said, and inside due to ceiling collapse and water.

Alamosa responded

firefighters, assisted by DFPC with two trucks and three crew members as well as two Monte Vista units and nine personnel. Chapman said.

With some firefighters in other parts of the state fighting Covid-19 virus symptoms, Chapman said fires make it pretty hard to "socially distant."

"But you've got to do what you've got to do."

Vote passes to re-open Cattails

ALAMOSA — Things were a little different for city council members on Wednesday night. With COVID-19 continuing its march across the country and the state, health was the top priority for all.

Rather than meet in person, the council elected to tune in via Zoom. There was plenty of acknowledgment for the hard work that the city information technology department (IT) went through to make the meeting possible.

There were three major aspects to regular business; two ordinances and an overview of COVID-19's impact on the city.

City Manager Heather Brooks delivered an update to how the city was dealing with the crisis. She discussed the current amount of work and the exchange of information that is taking place before



Blood drives scheduled in the San Luis Valley

Four blood drives will be taking place in the San Luis Valley, with social distancing guidelines in effect, in the coming weeks.

"We are encouraging appointments only at the blood drives right now," said Megan McCarter, donor recruitment representative for Vitalant, the company conducting the blood drives. 'Walk-ins will not be allowed.' Making an appointment will allow

the staff of the blood drive to be able to keep donors at the state-requested six-foot distancing from each other. Blood donation operations such as blood drives are not considered "gatherings" under the current social distancing guidelines, but as essential health-care activities.

In addition, due to COVID-19, the company is requiring that people SHOULD NOT donate if in the past four weeks: They have been outside of the United States or traveled via a cruise ship; they have lived with or been in close contact with individuals diagnosed with or suspected of having the COVID-19 infection; or they themselves have been diagnosed or suspected of having the COVID-19 infection. Please do not donate blood if you do not feel well.

For healthy people looking to volunteer or help out in the Valley during this time, donating blood is a quick and easy way to contribute. A blood donation only has a shelf life of 42 days, so constant donations are necessary. McCarter said the phones are busy

with people calling in to make appoint-"It's amazing the number of people

who have come forward to donate blood," McCarter said. "When you call in, don't get discouraged if you don't get through right away. Please try again."

The company will be back in June for another round of blood drives.

is anonymous. Though it will help us track the spread, it will not help us answer the question of how many people have recovered from COVID-19 here in the SLV. There have been no new positive cases of COVID-19 identified today. The San Luis Valley still stands at 17 positive cases Rio Grande 5, Alamosa 4, Costilla 3, Saguache 3 and Mineral 2 confirmed by both testing as well as diagnosis. Local numbers are updated daily at www.slvemergency. org/slv-covid-19.

The best thing everyone else can do is to follow the state and local

public health orders to stay at home. Businesses and health care workers are making some serious sacrifices during this pandemic. Budget discussions were raised regarding hygiene facilities that could be placed in the park including hand washing stations and a mobile shower station. The handwashing station was explained as only being needed until public restrooms could be opened for the coming season while reimbursement from the coming stimulus package (CARES Act) was explored for the mobile shower station.

Brooks then covered some projections on the financial blackeye that COVID-19 would leave on the local economy. The city anticipates a 25% reduction in sales tax for 2020, which would translate to a \$2 million hit to the general fund along with a \$360,000 hit to the recreation fund, street fund and enterprise debt fund each,

excluding plans funded by grants. She stated that the current projection is that sales tax may not normalize until 2023. The general fund will operate as normal with some department heads tightening their belts.

Brooks stressed the plan would not include large department budget cuts but would likely decrease the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) by 20%. A decrease in the CIP may shelve 2020 projects such as wayfinding signage, a multitool loader, a PDA pack and the plan

to update street lighting to LED.

In addition, funds for the recreation center upper track and tennis court resurfacing would possibly be frozen in the recreation fund for a time. None of the projects are being eliminated. A possible lowering of the CIP along with all postponements would be revisited in July or August.

With that, the council discussed the closure of the golf course and voted 6-1 to reopen Cattails.

Brooks prefaced the discussion by highlighting all the different things that went into their decision to close the course including the city providing a unified front with the governor's message to stay home and the risk it pre-

The argument was made by multiple council members that the golf course holds no more risk to people than trails around the city. That along with the fact that Governor Jared Polis has made no such decision on golf courses as well as the precedent set by other courses including Salida, Walsenburg, Redtail, and HollyDot all remaining open as well as other states like Ohio stating courses can stay open. A stance they just recently reversed from a 'no'.

Those in favor of a reopening also covered all the possible stipulations and safety standards that could be put in place to ensure health and safety.

The discussion was had, that despite all that, it may not be worth the risk, Mayor Ty Coleman stating, "To me, revenue is not the concern right now, the concern is the safety of our citizens, the safety of our staff, (not) exposing additional people to the COVID virus... If one person gets infected because of the action that we take, that's one person too many.' Coleman thanked the outpour-

ing of comments he'd received from the public before reiterating his disagreement. After Councilor David Broyles

presented the motion to reopen the golf course immediately with stipulations on attendance and safety standards the motion carried by a 6-1 count with the lone dissenting vote coming from Mayor Coleman.

Regular business also included the second reading of Ordinance No. 6-2020, which essentially modernized Alamosa's ordinance that deals with orders for restitution upon conviction of an ordinance violation, making the city

more in line with state statute. As explained by City Attorney Erich Schwiesow the ordinance was two-fold, "One, is to provide a process in our Code of Ordinances

for how we pursue restitution in

cases in front of a municipal judge,

"and the second is to make that process nearer a process that is set forth in state statute for pursuing restitution in the state, county, and district courts in the state of Colorado.

Schwiesow notified the council that after conferring via email that there were minor changes to wordage along with taking out a few references to state code. The state code was in relation to pain, suffering and hardship which are not compensable in restitution.

There was also a simplification of interest calculations and payment plans. Government service animal costs, government and private investigation costs and insurer's use of a subrogation claim as a restitution claim were removed because it was felt they weren't appropriate in municipal court. Following a public hearing the council voted and passed it unanimously.

City council also completed the first reading of Ordinance No. 10-2020 which similarly sought to make Alamosa's code more closely related to the state code. The current city code on false reporting does not include benign calls such as requests and questions on the emergency line as false reporting., which Schwiesow felt opened the city up to cost and aggravation. What the new ordinance would

do would be to seek to limit the abuse of the 911 system. There was concern about where the discretion would fall in each case which Schwiesow said that it would be an ordinance violation that would be handled by a judge. The motion passed unanimously, and the second reading was scheduled for April 15.

The city council meeting was adjourned with each speaker offering words of positivity and encouragement to the public and plenty of appreciation being expressed for all the essential per-

sonnel on the front lines keeping things running.

The damage of the COVID-19 pandemic to the American medical and economic health is a glaring example of the fragmented, chaotic nature of our free enterprise medical system.

Our system is designed for the benefit of a few at the cost of the many. I have worked as a family doctor for 30 years, 16 of them in Colorado. This experience has led me to the conclusion that Medicare for all is our best hope for the future.

Medicare for all would build an infrastructure that would protect all our citizens. Rather than the commercially-driven computer fire-walls -- which prohibit the smooth transfer of medical information -- a Medicare for all system would include everybody. This would allow us to track patients and make timely interventions.

For example, Taiwan -- only 81 miles from mainland China -- has been able

to contain the pandemic through tracing contacts and testing. They developed this plan after the 2003 SARS epidemic and, instead of having the second-highest CO-VID-19 cases, have only had two hundred.

Current problems with testing for such a virus as COVID-19 could be addressed by a widespread network or regional laboratories, such as in Germany which has also controlled the early spread of the virus.

Although this crisis highlights our need for Medicare for all, there are other important reasons for single-payer: problems with access, comprehensiveness, racial disparities, long-term care of the elderly, and poor rural health care. Each of these could improve significantly under Medicare for all.

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Coronavirus creates legal minefield for priests, flocks

Every now and then, while a priest is traveling or out running errands, a stranger will approach and ask: "Father, will you hear my confession?

This can happen on a city sidewalk or in a quiet corner of a big-box store. Often the question is urgent -- because something disturbing has shaken someone's faith.

"I've been asked for confession in a taxi. I've been asked while on a train, said Father Fergal O'Duill, part of the Dallas-Fort Worth branch of the Catholic movement Regnum Christi. His name is pronounced "O'Doul," and he is originally from Dublin, Ireland.

These requests happen, he added, because people see you and they know you're a priest. We're priests no matter where

to go to confession during Lent, before receiving Holy Communion on Easter.

The irony, right now, is that O'Duill can hear confessions during chance encounters, but not during scheduled times at the school where he serves as a chaplain.

The evolving coronavirus pandemic has turned Lent into a confusing minefield of legal and doctrinal questions for pastors and their flocks. In many communities, but not all, state or local officials have ordered people to "shelter in place" -- staying home unless they where. This has raised an obvious question: Is going to confession "essential, even if Catholics are preparing for Holy Week and Easter rites they will have to watch on digital screens at home?

For most of March. O'Duill was one of several priests who heard confessions in a giant parking lot, or in a pair of tents, near the Highlands School in Irving, Texas. Every effort was made to provide enough privacy to maintain the "dignity" of the sacrament, he said, while priests remained a safe distance from the penitents. Priests offered similar "drive-through" confession opportunities in a few other parts of America.

Then, on March 22, Dallas County Judge Clay Jenkins issued a shelterin-place order effective through April 3 and, perhaps, beyond.

The ground rules changed. While Dallas Bishop Edward J. Burns had welcomed the "drivethrough" confessions, said O'Duill, he canceled all

scheduled confessions -even outdoors -- because that would require Catholics to leave their homes and could create crowds. Priests can still travel, during emergencies, to hear confessions or perform baptisms. Funerals are allowed, with restrictions on social distancing.

Orders of this kind fueled heated debates on Catholic social media.

In one case, the Catholic writer Eric Sammons tweeted: "If your parish priest has not found a way to continue hearing confessions during this pandemic, I'd say that's a sign that you need to find a new parish when this is all over. (And if your bishop has forbid the hearing of confessions, perhaps you need to find a

new diocese.)"

Another popular Catholic writer, Father Dwight Longenecker, replied: "As a priest in a diocese where hearing confessions has been suspended, are (vou) recommending that I disobey my bishop? ... I can think of some ways to minister while still observing the distancing rules, but we not only obey the bishop, we work in solidarity with our brother priests. If one person breaks ranks there will be chaos.

It's possible the rules could change again, said O'Duill. At the moment, Regnum Christi priests are exploring whether it may be possible to celebrate Easter in an outdoor drivein theater -- even if shelterin-place orders continue.

Also, he said he will keep his eye on Rome to see how Pope Francis stages the traditional outdoor Stations of the Cross rites on Good Friday.

I believe that this crisis is becoming a time of grace," said O'Duill. "One of the last confessions I heard the other day was one of the most amazing that I have

people are really digging deep and thinking about what matters. I think that will continue when this is all over. ... The Lord isn't going to let us down. He is with us as we go through all of this, no matter what."

Unfortunately, scammers haven't taken a break during this public health crisis, and utility customers may be especially vulnerable. It is important for consumers to know that, in response to Gov. Jared Polis' March 20, 2020, Executive Order D 2020 012, all Colorado electric and gas utilities have ceased disconnections during this time. If a utility customer receives any call threatening an immediate shutoff, it is

Signs of a Scam:

Disconnection Deception: Scammers call threatening disconnection of your utility service, demanding immediate payment by prepaid cards purchased at a local retail store (or credit card, debit card, bank draft, wiring money, etc.) and insisting you call them back. This may also be done in person or via email.

Contractor Con: Scammers posing as utility workers or contractors affiliated with your utility may knock on your door claiming to be employed or hired by the utility company to read, upgrade, reset, repair, replace, or inspect your utility meter

or other utility-related devices. Bogus Bills: Scammers send suspicious emails that appear to be a bill sent

by your utility company, potentially featuring your

utility's logo and color

How Customers Can

Protect Themselves: Customers should never purchase a prepaid card to avoid service disconnection or shut off. Legitimate utility companies do not specify how customers should make a bill payment and always offer a variety of ways to pay a bill, including accepting payments online, by phone, automatic bank draft, mail, or in person. Utilities do not demand immediate payment over the phone. Further, companies never send a single notification one hour or

less before disconnection. At this time, utilities are not sending employees into homes to read inhome meters in an effort to promote social distancing to prevent further spread of the virus. Anyone claiming otherwise is not le-

gitimate

Do not click on any links or attachments in any email unless you have verified the sender. You may be directed to a scam website designed to steal your personal information or you might install malicious software onto your computer without ever knowing it. Utility companies typically send bills via mail, unless you have opted to receive your bill electronically.

Customers who suspect that they have been victims of fraud, or who feel threatened during contact, should alert local law enforcement authorities immediately. The Federal Trade Commission is also a good source of information about how to protect personal information. The Colorado Attorney General's Office Consumer Protection Section also provides consumer protection information for victims of fraud.

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

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Spring activities and sports now suspended until April 30
