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Mobile health unit is rolling into town counseling and behavioral thera-

SLVBHG announces vehicle will function as a health clinic

SAN LUIS VALLEY — The Colorado Department of Human Services, Office of Behavioral Health (OBH), received federal grants from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to help increase access to treatment for opioid use disorder.

OBH partnered with Managed Service Organizations (MSO) Signal Behavioral Health Network and West Slope Casa to manage the mobile health unit project regionally and work closely with the providers who will own and operate each unit.

The San Luis Valley Behavioral Health Group is excited to announce that they were the recipients of a mobile health unit to service the San Luis Valley. The unit will visit the following communities weekly: Del Norte, South

Fork, Center, Saguache, Antonito, La Jara and San Luis. The mobile health units resem-

ble a large recreational vehicle on the outside and a typical health clinic on the inside. Each unit will have four dedicated staff members: a licensed practical nurse (LPN), a licensed clinician with a strong background in addictions counseling (LPC/LAC), a psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner (PMHNP) and a peer recovery coach. The state-of-the-art mobile clinic was explicitly designed to administer treatment for opioid-use disorders or Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT).

MAT is the use of FDA-approved medications, in combination with

pies, to provide a "whole-patient" approach to the treatment of substance use disorders.

The San Luis Valley Behavioral Health Group uses two main medications, Suboxone and Vivitrol. Suboxone is used to help the cli-

ent through the withdrawal process and break the psychological link between taking a drug and immediately feeling high. Vivitrol is a monthly injection that blocks opioids from reaching

the brain and stopping an individual from feeling "high." Vivitrol also reduces cravings for opioid drugs and alcohol, letting the client focus on their counseling and recovery. Clients must be opioid-free before

starting Vivitrol, using opioids while on Vivitrol can increase the risk of overdose.

Support services offered on the mobile health units, include peer support, brief intervention, a prescription for medication-assisted

Colorado fishing license available, valid on March 1

DENVER — Colorado Parks and Wildlife reminds anglers the upcoming 2020-2021 fishing season is upon us. This year, fishing licenses are available and valid on Sunday, March 1.

New this year, the 2020-2021 fishing license is valid March 1-March 31, 2021. Regulations and pricing for annual, daily and multiday fishing licenses can be found in the 2020 Colorado Fishing Brochure.

For individuals ages 18 through 64, a \$10 Habitat Stamp is required with the first license purchase for the year. Youth under age 16 can fish for free, and CPW provides opportunities throughout the season to learn how to fish.

ident visitors can purchase fishing licenses online, by phone at 1-800-244-5613, at your local CPW office or at any of our hundreds of authorized sales agents state wide. CPW does not receive general tax dollars and fishing license

Vehicle Park Pass price increases

DENVER — Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) announces the Daily Vehicle Park Pass fee for each of Colorado's 41 state parks will increase by \$1 effective March 1.

A Daily Vehicle Park Pass is now \$9 for most parks, \$10 for Chatfield, Boyd Lake and Eldorado Canyon state parks, and \$11 for Cherry Creek — due to the Cherry Creek Water Basin Authority fee. Annual Park Pass and Commercial Park Pass entrance fees will remain unchanged in 2020.

Commission approved the daily vehicle pass fee increase in Jan. of this year to help CPW manage the rise in property maintenance needs and operational costs associated with the growing number of park

As per the Future Generations Act, additional money from park license sales, passes and permits will go towards improving Colorado parks, lands and recreation. The bill also requires annual reporting of how fee increases are used; The Colorado Parks and Wildlife the 2019 Future Generations Act Entrance Pass Information page.



What does this kind of change in caregivers do to the little ones? Some domestic violence survivors report: "My ex was controlling and brutal to me. He nearly killed me when he injured my cervical spine. I wonder what our children lived through while at their father's?' One episode a mother shared was

over a weekend visit.

When the 3-year-old returned to the apartment, his mom stooped down to welcome and hug him.

The mother exclaims, "Oh, I love Then, pouting, the 3 year old shoved

her away, and cried, "Only my Daddy loves me. You don't love me!' She hugged him and explained that

many people love him.

Using a blackboard by his bed, the mom drew stick figures of all the people who loved him: his mom, his dad, grandma from mom's side, grandma from dad's side, his aunts, his other aunt and uncles, cousins, neighbors, his friends, and his friend's mom and his family dog. She reminded him often of who all loved him.

Another woman's 5 year old returned from a stay with his father with a deadly mission.

When she held him in her lap, he slammed against her repeatedly as hard as he could. He carried a knife and declared he would kill her.

Before the divorce, the husband chased the naked woman around the yard so that she hid in culverts while he aimed and shot guns at her.

One mother shared how her daughter was always scared to go to her father's because of verbal abuse by her father and her brother.

Still another story: a child would cry whenever he would have to go to

his father's. When he returned, his behavior was And other good stuff violent with kicking, and punching.

He returned in disheveled clothing, dirty face and body. Still the courts required the child go with his neglectful father. These men were alcoholics who

didn't remember their violence after waking from abuse of alcohol, and then were manipulating their sons despite the court orders not to alienate the other parent.

What becomes of adults when as children they were exposed every two weeks to sociopaths?

As school children to young adult, do they face a mental health issues when they leave the comfort of their schools. activities, friends, and mothers?

How are children growing into civicminded and caring individuals when they are chastised that their music is of the devil, or their guitar was the devil's instrument — as some parents were reported to do?

It's not fair or right to subject children to uprooting them and forcing

two pajama sets, two bedrooms at different locations, or two sets of toys on them.

Most of all, I think it is wrong when children are forced to live with a psychopath or sociopath who ridi-

cules them. Instead, what if courts ordered that children stayed in the home where they knew friends, family, and their bedroom and the adults moved in and

out like Isabella Rossellini's divorced family did? (Finding Your Roots. Season 6 Episode 1, PBS)

What if parenting classes were ordered?

Clearly you were looking forward to getting together with this person. It hurt your feelings that your special day

was dashed. Perhaps it was extreme to go off on your friend, but it sounds like it is not without some cause. You were disappointed.

Yes, it is good to control your emotions, but I wouldn't be so fast to convince yourself that you got angry "for nothing." Being dumped for the day is something. Acknowledge that and accept that it is natural for you to be disappointed, if not also upset. In the future, you can decide not to retaliate in the moment with venomous words. But it is OK to let a person know that you don't appreciate the change in plans at the last minute, especially if the reason doesn't seem legitimate.
