Deacon running for RGC commissioner

MONTE VISTA -- Scott Deacon, Monte Vista resident, has announced that he is going to run for Rio Grande County Commissioner, District 1, as a member of the Republican Party.

He said, "I am a Rio Grande Couny native, and have lived and worked here all my life. I have a very strong work ethic: I started working at a very young age at entry level jobs, working my way up to eventually having a successful career at SLV Rural Electric Cooperative where I retired after 35 years.

Deacon said he has developed good communication and listening skills at all of the place he has worked, which are necessities in any leadership position, but especially for a county commissioner.

"I have no personal agenda other than working to better the financial condition of the county, work with municipalities in the county, work with fellow elected officials in all capacities, build upon economic development progress to date, and improve employee morale," Deacon

Deacon has a big heart for his comnunity and has served it in many eapacities both professionally and civically. He served on the board of the Rocky Mountain Electric Meter Association, serving terms as president and vice president. He has served 23 years as a Monte Vista Fire District firefighter and has been on the Monte Vista Fire Protection

District Board for the last 14 years. Deacon also sees the big Valley picture as he served on San Luis Valley Fire Fighters Association for more than 20 years and a term as

president and vice president. He has been active in the SLV Antique Iron and Tractor Club with a term as president, is a current member of Brothers Keepers Motorcycle Club, serving terms as secretary and treasurer.

"I have had experience working with and managing local government budgets in my role as a Monte Vista Fire District Board member, as that board deals with public funds and mill levies," Deacon said. "Budgeting is crucial, and I understand that there are different funds a board has to manage. I was fortunate to be part of a great budgeting team on the fire district to improve its verall financial condition."

Deacon was a member of the .986 group called the Monte Vista .% Sales Tax Committee. He also gained land-use experience when he served on the Mont Vista Planning and Zoning Committee in the early 1990s.

"I want to make Rio Grande County grand again by looking at both the past and current economic development projects in the county to build upon them," Deacon said. "I will bring strong morals, work ethic, integrity and community values to the Board of Rio Grande County Commissioners if I am elected.'



CPW sets elk, lion management planning meeting



Discussion about managing habitat set for Feb. 11

STATE-WIDE — Colorado Parks and Wildlife is seeking input on new plans for elk management and mountain lion management in southwest Colorado.

A meeting to discuss these issues is scheduled for 6:30 p.m., Feb. 11 in Norwood at the Lone Cone Library.

Big game management plans rewritten about every 10 years.

Public input provides guidance to wildlife managers who attempt to balance the biological capabilities of animals, their habitat and public requests for wildlife recreation opportunities.

The management plans drive important decisions, which include the licensesetting process, as well as strategies and techniques to reach population and harvest objectives.

For elk, CPW staff will talk about them evaluate populations and harvest current status of elk, history of the herds and the herd management planning process. CPW wants to hear from local hunters and others interested in wildlife about how they'd like to see elk managed. The presentation will include Game Management Units 70, 71, 72, 73 and 711

CPW wildlife managers also will discuss a new mountain lion management plan being developed for southwest Colorado.

Biologists have been reviewing research on mountain lions from Colorado, Wyoming and Montana that is helping objectives to better meet public desires. The plan could be put in place for the lion hunting season that starts in November.

CPW is an enterprise agency, relying primarily on license sales, state parks fees and registration fees to support its operations, including: 41 state parks and more than 350 wildlife areas covering approximately 900,000 acres, management of fishing and hunting, wildlife watching, camping, motorized and nonmotorized trails, boating and outdoor education. CPW's work contributes approximately \$6 billion in total economic impact annually throughout Colorado.

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Safeguard fragile roofs against snow damage

Snow may delight young children itching for a day off from school. But for many homeowners, the sight of snow means their time will soon be spent clearing paths and plowing driveways rather than building snowmen and sledding

The sight of falling snow also may inspire some homeowners to think about the roofs of their homes.

The Insurance Institute for Business & Home Safety warns that it is important to understand the risk of roof collapse due to the weight of snow on the roof. Roof structures that are in good condition can support roughly 20 pounds per square foot.

IIBHS said this equates to around 4 feet of new snow before a roof will become stressed. Total snowfall is not the only factor to consider. Homeowners also must check the type of snow that has fallen. According to House Logic, 6 inches of wet snow is equal to the weight of about 38 inches of dry snow.

That means it may take much less sodden snow to weigh down a roof.

Roof condition and the shape of the roof bear consideration, as well.

Popular Mechanics said the ideal pitched roof is smooth and steep so that the snow slides off. Closely spaced rafters improve the

strength of the roof. A flat or slightly pitched roof may accumulate snow more

Homeowners are urged to inspect roof

rafters to see if they are cracked from previous snowstorms or damaged from insects or rot.

Snapping or popping sounds while snow is on the roof is not a good sign.

House Logic also said that homeowners can tell if the snow load on the roof is too much by paying attention to interior

If such doors begin to stick, that may be a signal that there's enough weight on the center of the house to distort the door frames.

Houses that had improper renovations or homes in which load-bearing walls were removed may be more susceptible to this problem. Removing snow from a roof is not an

easy job — and may be a task best left to professionals. The safest way to remove snow from the roof is to use a snow rake with an

extension arm that enables users to push and pull off the snow while standing on the ground. One should not climb onto a snowy or

icy roof to remove snow. Shovels, which can damage roof shingles, should never IIBHS says that hiring a professional

roof contractor is one way to safely remove snow from the roof. Licensed and insured contractors will

have the experience to get the job done correctly and safely. Homeowners can expect to pay between

\$250 and \$500 for this job. Roof snow removal is a priority for those who live in mountainous or extremely

snowy areas.

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





"I feel it is important for students to understand that without farmers they will not have food or clothing. My students are from a rural area, many are already involved in

not understand where their food comes from," Pearson said. "I try to give them a glimpse into food production and the rich history of agriculture in our community and our state."


I love my beer as much as the next guy, and over the years have probably contributed a lot of money to AB and others, but give me a break. Those of us in rural

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

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


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
