

Alleged arsonist slated for hearing

Joergensen will be appearing in court today

SAN LUIS — Jesper Joergensen, a 53-year-old immigrant from Denmark who is in the U.S. illegally and accused of more than 200 charges of felony arson is again slated for a hearing in Costilla County District Court.

He will appear at 1:30 p.m. today. During June 2018, he was declared incompetent and was admitted to the Colorado Mental Health Institute in Pueblo, which didn't have a bed.

Then-12th District Attorney Crista Newmyer-Olsen, said a hearing was required to admit him for restoration and the courts were waiting for CMHIP. Until then the local courts

could do nothing with him.

He was housed briefly in the Arapahoe County Detention Center's Restoring Individuals Safely and Effectively program, but has been back in the Costilla County jail for a while, according to Sheriff Danny Sanchez, who said he wasn't sure what Thursday's hearing would entail. In June 2017, Joergensen alleg-

edly started the Spring Fire, which destroyed thousands of wooded acres and numerous homes in Costilla and Huerfano counties. He was arrested June 27, 2017 near Mountain Home Reservoir and report-

edly admitted he built a fire pit and cooked some meat in the area where the fire started.

He also reportedly claimed to have burned some trash, while a burn ban was in place.

Joergensen appeared to be irrational at a 2018 preliminary hearing when he waved a sheaf of papers and handwritten materials before presiding 6th Judicial District Judge Gregory G. Lyman of Durango, presiding after all judicial employees were recused due to the fact that some lost homes and cabins in the fire.

An illegal national who stayed in the United States after his work visa expired, Joergensen turned the preliminary hearing into a forum in which to enter his own motions and voice his own opinions.

He was bound over for trial on the arson charges, all felonies.

The Department of Homeland Security Immigration and Customs Enforcement has an immigration detainer on Joergensen, who had an expired worker's visa when arrested.

These detainers are placed on immigrants who are likely up for deporting, as well as immigrants who have allegedly committed a crime. Basically, the detainer means ICE would likely take custody of the person if and when they are released from jail for any reason.



Rio Grande snowpack about average

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M.—In its first forecast of 2020, the Natural Resources Conservation Service predicts that Rio Grande flows at Otowi Bridge (located just northwest of Santa Fe) will be 90% of average. While snowpack remains at or above average in the Basin, dry conditions this past summer and fall led to drier soils and aquifers in need of recharge which means less water available for the rivers and streams. Last year, 2019 was the 3rd hottest and 9th driest monsoon season for the Southwest, with a record extend-

ing back to 1895. 'It may be a relief that the mountains are covered in snow, but that is only half the story," said Jen Pelz, Wild Rivers Program Director and Rio Grande Waterkeeper. "This hotter and much drier world we live in is the reality going forward and average snowpack years will not yield average river flows. We need to start changing our mindsets and learn to manage water differently for

both people and the environment."

Dry conditions heavily impacted the soil moisture and groundwater levels in the upper Rio Grande Basin in Colorado and New Mexico. The San Luis Valley in southern Colorado is experiencing severe to moderate drought conditions as of January 9, 2019. Similarly, northern and central New Mexico are also facing severe to abnormally dry conditions. When soil moisture is low and aquifers are drawn down, much of the water from snowmelt is needed to replenish the water content of soil and to refill the aquifer resulting in lower spring river flows.

ALAMOSA — The Alamosa

County Commissioners signed a proclamation declaring youth vaping to be a public health crisis on Tuesday morning. The document recognizes that to-

bacco use remains the leading cause of death in the U.S. and Colorado.

Also, electronic smoking-device use has increased at an alarming

rate. In 2017, ESD use among San Luis Valley was estimated at 49.2%, higher than the state average of 44.2 %. Furthermore, vaping was recently linked to a new condition known as Acute- Onset Lung Dis-

The board heard a presentation from AHS students, Reese Canaan, Chenoa Candy, Kaidence Boehm and Jaimey Turner. As members of the SADD (Students Against Destructive Decisions) Council, each addressed the difficulties that students face when it comes to peer pressure and advertising campaigns. The group was in attendance to show their support for the measure.

The proclamation cites the Colorado Public Health Act of 2008 as a basis that requires the Public Health Department Board to promote policies that are deemed necessary for a

healthy community. "I wholeheart-

edly support this measure," said Commissioner Helen Sigmond. She went on to express her concern over the issues and health risks that vaping is causing for Valley youth. Commissioners Michael Yohn and Darius Allen also expressed their full support for the measure. The county is hopeful the act will

help to foster change within local government policies and the sale of tobacco-related products.

repeatedly on social media about anarchy and hatred of government and now faces trial on more than 200 felony charges.

He was bound over for trial Feb. 14, 2019 in Costilla County and faced charges from

On April 23, 2019, Joergensen was back in the courtroom for a status update on the motions filed by both the defense and pros-

Disputing the charges, Joergensen claimed his attorney wasn't giving him information on the case and asked the judge for new representation.

While evidence taken didn't support any deliberate action by Joergensen to start the raging wildfire, the inspector said he did start an initial fire by open burning when a Stage One Burn Ban was in effect.

Inspector David Chadwell, tasked with primarily enforcing fire and building code compliance, said he was told to determine the origin of the wildfire.

He said a four-man team including himself and inspector Balthazor began working in an area east of Fort Garland on a road identified by other authorities at the command center, following the rustic road, then a small path of a road to a dry creek bed, they studied burn patterns to determine a location near a burned camper.

His defense attorney refuted these claims

and Lyman accepted his explanation. Joergensen then asked for a change of venue and a different judge, claiming he did nothing wrong and is being treated unfairly.

On April 23, 2019, Joergensen was back in

the courtroom for a status update on motions filed by both the defense and prosecution.

In his arrest affidavit, however, Joergensen changed his story on how the fire started multiple times, claiming it was an accident.

Topping the list was the story of how he cooked meat to eat and didn't watch the burn pit in which the fire was started. Another explanation of burning trash was also questioned, since he admittedly didn't ensure the fire was out before going into his RV camper home and falling asleep.

When he awakened, he called to report the fire, which had spread to some bushes next to his place and then tried to quell the flames with towels and a blanket, suffering facial burns and scorched clothing.

He drove to nearby Mountain Home Reservoir, where he was taken into custody.

Still confined in the Costilla County Jail, Joergensen spends his days writing about and declaring his innocence. A gag order bars jail staff from communication with him about anything other than his basic needs. Since Joergensen is not a citizen of the

United States, he will be turned over to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement after the arson case concludes, according to the Post. ICE has a detainer hold on him and will wait on action until the local charges are satisfied.

According to ICE, Joergensen is a deportable alien, "admitted to the United States subject to any grounds of removal specified in the Immigration and Nationality Act. This includes any alien illegally in the United States, regardless of whether the alien entered the country by fraud or misrepresentation or entered legally but subsequently violated the terms of his or her nonimmigrant classifica-

DEL NORTE—Emotions were palpable in the meeting room located at the Del Norte Town Hall Wednesday, Jan. 8, as residents, guests, family members and business owners gathered for the monthly Del Norte Town Board meeting.

As temperatures dropped outside, the feelings of those in attendance to show support for Police Chief Robert Fresquez set the stage for an emotional goodbye as the chief prepared to give his final speech to the board that chose not to renew his employment contract.

According to Fresquez, he and his family came to a final decision in light of the news that his contract with the town of Del Norte was not to be renewed. He would follow the advice of their lawyer and resign from a 32 year career in law enforcement, most of which was spent in the town of Del Norte. "I cannot speak to the agreement that was made between myself and the town but it was in the best interest for me and my family, as well as, my future career in law enforcement to resign and so that is what I am here to do," said Fresquez.

The meeting began with the approval of the minutes from previous meetings before Mayor Chris Trujillo opened the floor for the public comment

and Del Norte Resident Lyle Tuoti took a moment to speak. "I know Robert and Frank Archuleta have spent a lot of time working without being paid and I watched these guys put in 16 hour days. I would beg, plead with them to take a break. Tell them you're sick. Tell them you're exhausted. But every time I did, both of them would say that they just couldn't do that and that their community needed them. I am a bit appalled and embarrassed that they didn't get any compensation for that," stated Tuoti.

He continued, "The amount of time and effort that these gentlemen put in for you? To keep you protected. For them not to be compensated for what they did. I am mad at this board for not paying these gentlemen for what they are worth especially when they were doing it for you. It's not too late for you to compensate these men for the time and efforts they put forward away from their families for this community.'

It was at that time that Mayor Trujillo cut Tuoti off and moved forward with the meeting after a brief comment by board member Sam Scavo that the board had made an agreement to compensate for some of the hours in question during an executive session held in a previous meeting. Trujillo did not allow for any further public comment.

the approval of the consent agenda and after a progress report made by Officer Frank Archuleta, Police Chief Fresquez stood up and addressed the board.

"This is the hardest thing that I have ever had to do. I put in service here for 32 years, and this is the way that I am going to be treated? I at least deserve the respect to be able to say something. I turned in my resignation, signed the agreement and you received that, but this is not how I wanted to get out. This town is changing, projects going on in this town that two officers had to take care of. I have come to meetings countless times asking for additional officers and the reason I get for not renewing my employment is that I can't find more officers but there are no officers. Departments across the state are struggling to find officers right now."

"Last thing I heard from you as a board was that it was time for change, and you know what, maybe it is. I will move forward. I will continue in law enforcement because it is in my blood. I hope you have a plan in place for the future. When I was presented with the agreement to resign, my heart just sank. I dedicated my whole entire life to this community. If I had been doing something wrong, I would have loved to have been told that. I did nothing wrong. I came to do something that is just going to kill me,

this right here is the worst thing that I will do. But you know what? It is not forever.'

Audience members at that point gave a standing ovation to Fresquez and began to speak out about not wanting to see the chief leave, how much the community is in need of law enforcement officials. all of which was ignored by the board who moved on to the next item of the agenda.

In a statement made later Town Manager Bernadette Martinez stated, "It is always hard for everyone when any employee who has been with their current employment for so many years to accept change and change sometimes is for the best interest of all. I personally accepted the resignation and accepted the fact that he closed this chapter in his life and he wanted to try something new and reach new goals. And he did this with no regrets, as he stated in his letter of resignation. Robert's dedication and commitment was never unnoticed as those attending Wednesday's night Town Board meeting may have thought it did."

There will be a dinner and honor ceremony held for Fresquez on Saturday, Jan. 18, at 4 p.m. at the Gateway Church in Del Norte. Fresquez will be recognized for his many years of service and the event is open to the public. Those who are planning to attend are asked to bring a dish to share with everyone and to RSVP via text to 719-849-8506.

I found a story I want to share with you, about a 7-yearold boy who was living with his mother in a temporary shelter due to his father's domestic violence at home (typical life for kids like me). He asked Santa for books and a "very good dad." The story was written by Alisha Ebrahimji,

"A 7-year old Texas boy temporarily living in a domestic violence shelter with his mom wrote a letter to Santa, the shelter shared, with a heartfelt plea for presents and something money can't buy.

The boy asked Santa for chapter books, a dictionary, a compass and a watch but perhaps the biggest ask for the man in red was for a "very very Very good dad."

His mom found a handwritten letter in his backpack a few weeks ago and shared it with SafeHaven of Tarrant County staff, a shelter for domestic violence victims in Fort Worth, Texas, its president/ CEO, Kathryn Jacob told CNN.

SafeHaven shared the letter on social media Wednesday morning, noting they changed the boy's name to Blake for his

Children Need Help Too!

Children in families experiencing alcohol or drug abuse need attention, guidance and support.

These children need to have their ex-

periences validated. They also need safe, reliable adults in whom to confide and who will support them, reassure them, and provide them with appropriate help for their age. They need to have fun and just be kids. Families with alcohol and drug prob-

lems usually have high levels of stress and confusion. High stress family environments are a risk factor for early and dangerous substance use, as well as mental and physical health problems. It is important to talk honestly with

children about what is happening in the family and to help them express their concerns and feelings. Children need to trust the adults in their lives and to believe that they will support them.

Sometimes, kids like me have horrible social anxiety and can't participate in groups, but it's crucial they have a trauma informed counselor for individual counseling to help them understand that parental addiction is not their fault, to help them learn coping skills and help them identify personal strengths/talents.

Sometimes kids/teens are encouraged to get together and figure out solutions about our addict parents and the abuse/ neglect dumped on us. What people don't understand is that if kids like me get together to solve our problems, the end result will be addiction (just like our addict parents), cutting, and/or suicide. We're kids. We need help from trauma informed professionals, but we can't accomplish this by ourselves.

and my baby sister in Alamosa, Alamosa Elementary fourth grade was my 16th school. I was so hungry I ate my hair and fingernails and pulled food scraps from trash cans and off the floor at school and at the Boys and Girls Club after school. People saw me doing this, but no one ever asked me if I needed help or if anything was wrong. This needs to change, now. If you suspect something is wrong, ask the child if he/she needs help.

DEAR NO MORE ALIENS: Schedule together time and alone time. Let your husband know that you realize that you don't share the same interests in TV programming. Rather than feeling that you are being held hostage watching and responding to something that irritates you, recommend that each of you enjoy alone time when you want to watch your separate TV shows. When you come together, consider turning off the TV and talking to each other or engaging in other activities that do not have the television as a distraction.

As far as watching something together, figure out what you both like and agree to watch that during those together moments.

DEAR HARRIETTE: I just graduated from college this year, and I got a credit card for the first time. I was told that I have to build up credit in order to be able to buy

property or even get an apartment. I can't get a lease for my own place without proof that I have good credit. Nobody ever told

me that before. I don't want to ask anybody for help. Plus, my parents really can't afford it. They did tell me I can live with them until I get it together. I feel like a failure. I did very well in school, have almost no college debt and recently got a job, but it's still not enough. What should I do? -- No Credit

DEAR NO CREDIT: It is true that you generally need to have established credit in order to be able to do many things, including renting or buying an apartment -- unless you can pay cash upfront for an extended period of time.

Take your parents up on their offer for you to live with them while you build your credit. Be disciplined about using your new credit card. You must use it, though. Each month, make some charges on your card, preferably using less than 30% of the total amount of credit. Always pay your bill on time. You can pay the total balance in full each month, either on time or early, or you can pay a portion of the bill on time. Either way will help build good credit. If you pay it off in full each month, your credit score will rise higher and you will not incur interest charges.

Sign up for a credit monitoring app, like Credit Karma, so that you can immediately access your credit score. A year's worth of good credit plus some dollars in the bank

should make you ready to get your own place.







Keeping up With the Grizzlies

Adams State grapplers last saw action in the San Francisco State duals last weekend, going head to head with Minnesota State – Mankato, Simon Fraser University, and San Francisco State and ending at 2-1 on the day. Minnesota State – Mankato came first and earned their way to a single-point win over the Grizzlies.

Grizzly grapplers were faced with foes from North of the border, going head to head with Simon Fraser University and earning a blowout victory to bounce back from the early morning loss. Adams State would only allow the Clan nine points on their 36 to earn their first victory on the season.

Grizzlies are 2-1 on the season and look to earn their first conference win of the season.

Update on Colorado Department of Public Safety Investigations into Reports of Suspicious Drone Activity

Jan. 10-12, the Colorado Department of Public Safety (CDPS) continued field investigations into reports of suspicious drone activity in northeastern Colorado. The investigations involved both air and ground-based resources deployed during the evening to search for suspicious activity and to respond to suspicious drone reports.

In response to public concern over reports of unusually large-sized drones flying patterns in groups, CDPS has been gathering and analyzing information since November 23 and has conducted field investigations since January 6. Personnel from the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (DHSEM), Division of Fire Prevention and Control (DFPC) and Colorado State Patrol have participated in these

operations. On Jan. 10, field investigations increased due to the report of a drone in close proximity to a Flight for Life helicopter. After speaking to Flight for Life, the incident does not appear to be related to the northeastern drone activity. This determination was made based on the information shared directly with CDPS staff, including the incident occurred during daylight hours, involved one drone, and the pilot cannot identify a specific location. Unfortunately, this type of drone incursion is an alltoo-frequent event with medical helicopters and serves as an important reminder to drone operators to follow FAA operations guidance.

To date, CDPS has confirmed no incidents involving criminal activity, nor have investigations substantiated reports of suspicious or illegal drone activity. The Colorado Information Analysis Center (CIAC) will continue to receive and analyze suspicious drone activity reports.

Investigative facts and findings from the CIAC as of January 13:

Overall:

- From Nov. 23 to Jan. 13: 90 reports of drone activity received by the CIAC
- ▶ Of these, 14 were visually confirmed to be hobbyist drones by law enforcement.
- ▶ The 14 individual drones and operators were not identified. Nor did they fit the description of large wingspan drones traveling in groups.
- ▶ Confirmed instances of illegal drone activity: 0
- ▶ One instance of a drone flying close to a helicopter during the daytime was reported but has not been confirmed and/or identified as a violation.

During field investigative operation period:

- From Jan. 6 to Jan. 13: 23 drone activity reports received by the CIAC
- ▶ Sightings determined to be planets, stars or small hobbyist drones not meeting the description of large wingspan drones traveling in groups: 13
- ▶ Sightings ruled out as atmospheric conditions or identified commercial aircraft: 6 reports
- ▶ Sightings confirmed by law enforcement but unable to identify: 4 reports

"The public has been worried about the reports of strange drone activity. Our duty is to be responsive to community concerns and to investigate suspicious activity, and so we mobilized our teams to look into this," said CDPS Executive Director Stan Hilkey. "Despite all of the reported activity, we are still unaware of any crime being committed. While I can't conclusively say we have solved the mystery, we have been able to rule out a lot of the activity that

was causing concern. We will continue to remain vigilant and respond as new information comes

Hilkey added: "The efforts we have put forth on this issue have been


valuable. In addition to gathering information, this past week's operations have been an excellent opportunity for our teams to collaborate and hone their skills with new and emerging technologies."

Faint constellations alongside Orion

Winter is a great time to look at the night sky with long dark nights.

If people are bold they can go out on a clear dark evening or just turn off their house lights and look out a window. Orion the Hunter dominates the evening sky this time of year. Maybe that's why it's a favored constellation.

There are two fainter constellations that are next to Orion. To his lower right is the fainter Eridanus constellation in the southern sky, which was touched on in November. On his left is Monoceros the Unicorn which also sits in front of the Milky Way in the SE. Since the last quarter moon is on the 17th and the New Moon is on the 24th, this is a good time to look for these winter constellations.

Eridanus is a wiggly river shaped constellation that meanders just to the right of Orion's

of any constellation. Despite the large size, the 33 stars are mostly faint.

It contains a few bright deep sky objects. There are a few galaxies and one planetary nebula NGC 1535, which can be seen with binoculars or a telescope on very clear nights. Its brightest star Acherner is also called Alpha Eridani and it's a large blue white giant 140 light years away. Even though it's the ninth brightest star in our sky, it may be too low in the sky for us to see.

Episilon Eridani is one of his highest stars and is one of the closest Sun-like stars to Earth. It's just a little cooler and fainter than our Sun and is 10.5 LY away. Omieron-2 Eridani is a triple star system 16 LY away and hosts the most easily seen white dwarf star in our sky. The primary star is a red dwarf and its companion is the white dwarf. There's also another red Its range is 58 degrees, which is the largest dwarf partner. It's also near the top and to the

left of Episilon.

Monoceros is to the lower left of Orion and is 'W' shaped. It sits between Betelgeuse in Orion, Procyon in Canis Minor and the bright star Sirius. Since it sits in front of the Milky Way, it's rich in star clusters and nebula. Like Eridanus it mostly lacks bright stars. Alpha Monocerutis is a bright orange star

175 LY away. Beta Monocerutis is a beautiful triple star with three blue white stars. M50 is one of many open clusters. Rosette Neovia is a glowing gas cloud, which is part of a huge star forming complex and can be seen with binoculars. This is a more recent constellation and has no

mythology. It was created in 1624 to fill a gap in the sky. The two stars closest to Betelgeuse represent its head. When there is a clear, dark sky, that is a good time find these constellations in the SE.






