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ASU's Mortensen retires

Durier

Grizzlies' AD will step down after his 14th season

ALAMOSA — Athletic Director Larry Mortensen will retire from Adams State University at the end of the spring semester in May, leaving behind a legacy of devotion to the significant student-athlete population on

A national search for Mortensen's replacement will begin immediately, said Adams State President Cheryl D. Lovell.

"Adams State is a special place that serves a unique mission, and I'm proud to have served that mission for nearly a quartercentury," said Mortensen, who was appointed athletic director in the 2006-2007 academic year following 11 years as Adams State head men's basketball coach.

"Adams State has been life-

changing for me," Mortensen said. "I hope I have contributed, in some small part, to the betterment of the institution and the student-athletes Adams State serves. Adams State fields 18 NCAA

Division II teams that compete in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. The student-athlete population

represents more than a third of the total student population at Adams State, an emphasis Adams State will make in its search for a new athletic director.

"Larry has been an invaluable part of Adams State and I have grown to trust and value his opinion and leadership," Lovell said. "The athletic director role is a critical position for the university. The student-athletes are a vital part of Adams State and our commitment is to build on the work Larry has done in growing and serving a diverse studentathlete group.

San Luis man found dead in his backyard

SAN LUIS — A suspicious death was discovered in San Luis early Saturday Dec. 21 in the 700 block of


Reports from the Costilla County Sheriff's Office said Dennis Valdez was found deceased in his backyard, triggering an investigation that is still ongoing.

The sheriff, 12th Judicial District Attorney's Office and Colorado Bureau of Investigation are all part of the probe.

Sheriff's Sgt. Clark said there are some items and materials, but nothing concrete as to the manner of death, who may know about it or be involved with it.

'As of now, we are calling it a suspicious death,' Clark said. "At this time there is no threat to the gen-

Serving veterans

Alamosa clinic handles 6,200-plus outpatients per year

ALAMOSA — The San Luis Valley is a beautiful region in south-central Colorado with an average elevation of 7,664 feet and a cold desert climate.

The Valley is picturesque, with the Great Sand Dunes National Park and Preserve nestled at the foot of the usually snow-capped Sangre de Cristo Range. Just down the road from the park is the City of Alamosa, featuring a VA Clinic that is small but mighty.

During fiscal year 2019, more than 1,100 veterans used the Alamosa clinic, completing 6,200-plus outpatient visits.

Good things are happening at the Ala-

mosa clinic, and the team of dedicated

employees is at the heart of that progress.

The in-house Alamosa team consists of a primary care provider, a registered nurse, a licensed practical nurse, two telehealth technicians, a medical support assistant and a licensed professional mental health counselor. The clinic also has remote staff, like audiologist Diane Brady, who serves veterans from her home office.

Because Alamosa is a small city, the staff are well known and often run into their veterans at the local grocery store or gas station. Most of the staff even grew up in or near Alamosa. Telehealth tech Debra Martinez said, "I've had veterans come up to me at the store and ask me to make them an appointment. It feels like family here.' Two of the staff members, telehealth

ALAMOSA — Travellers looking to fly out of the San Luis Valley Regional Airport can now get the Transportation Security Administration's Precheck

Gigi Dennis, Alamosa County Administrator, was quick to point out that this new addition to the area

is a big step forward for local flyers. "A person used to have to go to DIA or Colorado Springs to get this done, but there is a local company

that will send in the paperwork and does the fingerprinting in Alamosa," she said. Dennis further noted that the TSA's Colorado Springs

branch recently closed its office, so this is added convenience for anyone in Southern Colorado."

To apply, an individual can fill out the paperwork at https://www.tsa.gov/precheck, then proceed to make

an appointment or walk into the local office. The cost for Precheck is \$85 and covers membership

Dennis said, "It speeds up security, and you don't

have to remove your shoes, laptop, liquids, etc.'

She called the process "Fast, easy, and convenient."



Donald Romero, are veterans themselves, and most of the others have veterans in their families. Everyone is dedicated to their work and really enjoy what they do.

Šnow, a former Navy corpsman, said, "I love being able to help other veterans, to get to know them. It's a different kind of relationship because we're so small here."

Snow recently started traveling to the nearby State Veterans Community Living Center on Monday mornings to offer hearing aid services. "I pack up my gear and take our audiologist with me remotely. We help an average

of five veterans each Monday, which saves them from having to travel to "I love working with fellow vets," Romero agreed. "It doesn't really feel

like work, if that makes sense."

He was an Army infantryman, and now uses that experience to connect with his mental health patients. "We went through a lot of the same things, and that helps build trust. I know what it's like to eat MREs all the time. I know what it's like to be deployed. They know I get it."

Romero went on, "I enjoy working in Alamosa because it's my hometown."

For those that don't know, telehealth is much like a traditional health care appointment. If a veteran has a telehealth appointment at Alamosa, they would go to the clinic, sign in and have a seat in the waiting room. A nurse would come to greet the vet and take them to one of four exam rooms to check vitals and talk about the reason for the visit, but that is where traditional ends and progressive health care begins.

A telehealth tech enters the exam room and outlines their role in the appointment, connecting the veteran online with the telehealth provider,

who appears on a screen.

From there, the tech essentially acts as the provider's hands and assists with the instructed care from the monitor. These techs and the nurse use a variety of tools to help the provider see inside ears and throats, listen to hearts and lungs, check blood pressure and other tasks, just like an in-house provider does.

The provider looks at the results on screen and then instructs the tech and nurse what to do next, until the end of the appointment.

The process may seem strange to those who've never had a telehealth appointment, but many veterans said it's not much different than having a provider in the room. Romero said, "I provide mental health counseling to veterans in remote locations via something like Skype or Facetime on a screen. I can see and hear the vet, and he or she can see and hear me.'

Romero thinks more appointments will be done via telehealth in the future. "It's a great tool, especially since we live out in rural Colorado, and the weather can be bad," he added.

Whether veterans come to the Alamosa clinic for an in-person visit or a telehealth appointment with a remote provider, they will be met with a friendly health care experience, where sense of community is proud and prevalent.

From time to time, veterans on vacation in the San Luis Valley stop into the clinic with questions or requests and the staff does what they can to help. It's all part of that small-town charm. If you'd like to learn more about the VA Alamosa Outpatient Clinic, visit

La Sierra opens at Adams State Cloyde Snook Gallery

ALAMOSA — In the fall of 2019, visual artist Shelby Head worked alongside San Luis Land Rights Council members collecting stories from the beneficiaries of the 1843 land grant issued under the Mexican land grant system.

These seven recorded stories will become large wall projections in the 2020 exhibition titled La Sierra at the Cloyde Snook Gallery on the campus of Adams State University from Jan. 13 through

An opening reception for the exhibition will be from 5 p.m. until 7 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 17, and will include the grant heirs' personal stories concerning the historic land rights to La Sierra.

The centerpiece for the exhibition is a large-scale shrine designed and installed by San Luis sculptor, Huberto Maestas,

Adams State Class of 1984, from donations made by Costilla County residents. The shrine is dedicated to the spirit of La Sierra and to the generations of families who have used the mountain range for water, grazing, logging, wood, hunting and fishing.

The exhibition will travel to universities and museums in Colorado before finding a permanent home in San Luis.

This art project was made possible due to a National Endowment for the Arts Challenge America Grant awarded to the Adams State University Department of Art and Theatre for the Social Practice Arts Residency in the San Luis Valley.

Colorado No. 1 in aisasters

Colorado has experienced its share of misfortune during the last 20 years.

The state has seen its rate of natural disasters increase by 1350% over the last four decades, ranking it the No. 1-highest rate increase in the nation.

QuoteWizard analyzed FEMA natural disaster data to find states that have experienced the highest rate increase of natural disasters from the year 1980 to 1999 compared with 2000 to 2017.

Other key findings:



The goal is for San Luis Valley gardeners to share seeds and information. Since our Januarys are usually so cold, I find meeting with others to exchange seeds and ideas gets me excited about the upcoming gardening season that can seem so far in the future. It's not too early to plan. Hope to

SLV." The tag line is "Borrow seeds, grow 'em, then harvest and return some seeds for future gardeners." Visit the website: libguides.adams.edu/ seedtoseed/exchange. If you can't make it to the exchange, you can check out seeds at the library. They now have 100% community provided seeds. I think this is a great accomplishment. Co-sponsors include the SLV Local Foods Coalition, Valley Educational Gardens Initiative and the Alamosa Community Greenhouse.

Perhaps you're contemplating growing vegetables or flowers this summer but aren't sure what to plant when and where. There are some handy resources available online. For example, from the Seed Library homepage, click on the Flyers and Handouts tab and then on the SLV Planting Guide link.

This takes you to an elegant and easy to comprehend one-page, downloadable pdf file created by VEGI regarding when and where to plant herbs and vegetables. VEGI also has a Facebook page with an events link. Last year's events included a how to backyard compost presentation and a microgreens

If you're interested in planting a SLV-

hardy flower garden, visit my Alamosa Flowers website (alamosaflowers.net) and click on the Hardy Garden tab. It gives details on 25 flowers that grow easily in our Valley. All photos are of specimens from our garden, not from a catalog.

The SLV LFC (slvlocalfoods.org) mission is: "To foster an equitable local food system that restores the health of the people, community, economy and ecosystem." The Rio Grande Farm Park (riograndefarmpark. org) is under its direction and has monthly hands-on workshops. Past workshops included helping plant (and learn about plants) at the Farm Park during the summer and constructing birdhouses during the winter.

There are several good websites that are not specific to the Valley. You have to be careful as our climate is unique and not the same as the rest of the state. However, in general, our state is higher in altitude than most others with an average elevation of 6,800 feet above sea level. Alamosa is 7,536 feet and has an average of 95 frost-free days. Monte is higher at 7,665 feet and has 97 frost-free days. I was surprised at this as I think of Monte Vista as being a fair amount warmer. In comparison, Denver's altitude is 5,280 feet and it typically has 155 frost-free days.

The United States Department of Agriculture has a plant hardiness zone map for Colorado. The Uncover Colorado website (uncovercolorado.com/gardening-in-colorado) has a link to the USDA zone map, as well as tips for gardening at high altitudes. It lists Alamosa as 4b, meaning our average annual extreme minimum temperature ranges from minus-25 to minus-20 degrees. I tend to consider our yard to be 3b with minimum temperatures ranging from minus-35 to minus-30. I do OK in the warmest and most protected parts of the garden with zone 4 plants.

I also frequently refer to the Colorado State University Extension's website (extension. colostate.edu) for guidance. If you're new to Colorado gardening, I encourage you to search for their pdf fact sheet "Challenge to Newcomers -7.220". One of the surprising

facts is that while our state name, Colorado, comes from the Spanish words "color rojo", meaning color red due to the iron in our red soils, that iron is not available to most of our plants. According to the website, "Colorado's highly calcareous (chalk or limestone) soils tie up the iron in a form unavailable to the

plant. Writing this column has given me the idea that I need to add a Resources link (with caveats) to the AlamosaFlowers.net and AlamosaTrees.net websites. I'll keep you updated. Meanwhile, Happy New Year and garden planning.

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

Safe2Tell conduit for students

Tips continue to increase since last December

DENVER—Safe2Tell released its monthly report for December. and although fewer tips were submitted than last month, monthly tip volume continues to rise when compared to the previous school year.

In December, the program received 2,100 tips, an 8% increase in monthly tip volume compared to December 2018. To date for the 2019-20

school year, Safe2Tell has received 11,485 tips, a 25% increase over the 2018-19 school year. Suicide threats (403), drugs (150) and bullying (141) continued to be the top categories of tips reported to the program.

"Although Safe2Tell reports decrease during the holidays when many of our Colorado schools are on break, the continued increase in monthly tip volume when compared to last year shows our students and families are remaining vigilant," said Attorney General Phil Weiser. As we move into 2020, it is important that students continue to report anything they deem suspicious or cause for

concern. False tips remain at approximately 2.5% of all tips submitted. False tips are those that contain untrue information and are submitted with the intent to harm, injure

or bully another person. In November, the program received 2,595 tips, showing only a slight decrease to 2,100 during drops in reports during the spring, summer and winter school breaks.

often decreases during the month of December. Even though most schools are closed for a time during this month, the holidays can be difficult for those dealing with mental health issues. We want to remind students that they can anonymously report any safety concerns they may have, day or night, to Safe2Tell," said Essi Ellis, director of Safe2Tell.

In December, anonymous tips from students and other individuals successfully helped prevent incidents of selfharm and illegal activity. For example:

A Safe2Tell report was received regarding animal cruelty. Police investigated and forwarded the information to the animal control unit.

A report was made to Safe2Tell about underage drinking. Police investigated and issued citations.

A Safe2Tell report was made about a student's welfare. Police conducted a welfare check.

The following is an example of misuse of the Safe2Tell system:

A person reached out to the Safe2Tell tip line requesting advice about how to report a co-worker to human resources.

Safe2Tell is a successful violence intervention and prevention program for students to anonymously report threats

Safe2Tell will experience to their own and others' safety. Safe2Tell is not an emergency response unit; it is a conduit of infor-"Safe2Tell tip volume mation for distributing anonymous tips to local law enforcement, school officials and other appropriate responding parties according to state law.

To make a report, individuals can call 1-877-542-7233 from anywhere, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Reports also can be made at Safe2Tell. org or through the Safe2Tell mobile app which is available on the Apple App Store or Google Play.

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December. Historically, Wolf packs already roaming in Colorado

CRAIG — Tuesday, the Craig Daily Press reported that Colorado Parks & Wildlife has confirmed the presence of a wolf pack in Northwest Colorado.

ALAMOSA — In recent years, it's become a common sight to see the Alamosa Mean Moose hoisting a Class 3A state wrestling championship trophy.


In 2019, the Moose claimed a second straight state wrestling title and their 13th overall. The program soared to extreme heights under coach Gary Ramstetter. But he has since moved on and it's on one of his former assistants, Rusty Johnson, to keep the program performing at the high level it has grown accustomed to.

"There's pressure, and there's quite a bit of it," Johnson said. "I try not to think about it because that just brings on more pressure. I've been an assistant under Ramstetter for 27 years, so I knew there'd be pressure, just not to this extent."

The way he's alleviating that pressure is relying on those competitors that have thrived at Alamosa.

The Mean Moose return four state placers from last year's team and each one will be vital in helping Johnson ease into his role and keep the team compet-

ing as a state powerhouse. Of those four returners, Davion Chavez brings the most experience. He finished second in the 106-pound bracket and claimed a state title as a fresh-

"I lean on him pretty hard," Johnson said. "I also have three other seniors that placed at state last year that I push a lot off on to them as well.

Those finishes along with the state championship claimed by then-senior Joe Chavez at 126 was good enough for Alamosa to hold off Eaton and claim a state title.

"There's always work to be done," Johnson said. "Just at the tournaments we've competed at so far, they've competed well."

Colorado will join state-to-state verification service Process will ensure driver license, ID card holders have only one credential

DENVER — On Jan. 27, Colorado is expected to implement the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators' (AAMVA) State-to-State (S2S) information sharing program, joining 26 other participating

states.

By joining the program, Colorado's Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) is helping to protect our customers against identity theft and ensuring Coloradans only have one REAL ID-compliant driver license

or ID card.

S2S provides a means for states to electronically check with all other participating states to determine if the applicant currently holds a driver license or identification card in another state.

State participation in the program is voluntary. Unexpired, out-ofstate credentials, which are often no longer in use, could be used for identity theft if they fell into the wrong hands. Two separate credentials also means two separate records, which can make it more difficult to identify or act upon serious driving violations.

With this implementation, those with credentials in more than one participating state will retain only the most recently-issued credential.

Colorado's participation in the S2S program

is part of the state's REAL ID compliance plan.

In implementing the S2S program, the DMV is proactively protecting Coloradans and the identities of those who transferred or are transferring credentials to another state.

Prior to S2S, Colorado and other states relied on an applicant's selfattestation when signing a license or ID card application, with no ability to verify information beyond what a person offered voluntarily.

The information exchanged between participating states in the S2S program is only enough to point inquiring states to the jurisdiction with the applicant's record.

This information includes name, birthdate, customer identification number and the last five digits of an applicant's Social Security number.

The federal government does not have access to the S2S service and the law that funded the development of S2S prohibits the creation of a new means of access for federal agencies.

Census ramping up its recruiting efforts

Bureau plans to hire up to 500,000 workers

ALAMOSA - The U.S. Census Bureau is ramping up its recruiting efforts across the country to hire temporary, part-time census takers for the 2020 Census in communities across the country, including in Colorado and the San Luis Valley.

Nationally, the Bureau plans to hire up to 500,000 workers from a goal of more than 2 million applicants. The positions offer competitive pay, flexible hours, paid

training and weekly paychecks.

"Whether you're looking to earn some extra cash, pay down your student debt, or offset holiday season spending, our part-time positions are a great way to do that,' said Census Bureau Director Steven Dillingham. "What better way to earn some extra money and help shape the future of your community for the next 10 years than with the 2020 Census?"

The Census Bureau needs more applicants in all 50 states and makes every effort to hire locally so census takers are familiar with the neighborhoods and areas they are assigned to work.

"Aside from Puerto Rico, that has already received enough applicants to fill all jobs in the Commonwealth, every other area throughout the nation needs more applicants right now," said Timothy Olson, Census Bureau associate director for Field Operations. "With low unemployment, the Census Bureau is taking extraordinary efforts to attract enough applicants to fill nearly 500,000 positions this spring.'

The Census Bureau needs more applicants in all six counties of the San Luis Valley.

As of Jan. 6, all counties in the Valley are short of the Bureau's goal for applications. A breakdown of each county shows Alamosa County has reached 55.9% of the Bureau's applicant goal; Conejos County is at 57.3%; Costilla 68%; Mineral County only 30%; Rio Grande County has reached the highest level at 87.4%; and Saguache County is at 64.9%.

Anyone age 18 and older, such as recent high school graduates, college students, veterans, retirees, military spouses, seasonal workers and people who are bilingual are highly encouraged to apply.

People who already have jobs and want to earn extra

income evenings and weekends are also encouraged to apply. The selection process begins this month, with paid training occurring in March and April. After paid training, most positions work between May and early July. Census takers are critical for their communities during

the 2020 Census — going door to door to collect responses from households who have not responded online, by phone "Our aim is to reach interested applicants right now,

inform them of updated pay rates in their area, and get them into the applicant pool to be considered for these critical jobs," said Olson. "The hiring process occurs in stages, and we are encouraging everyone to apply right now before selections begin in January and February. Most census taker jobs begin training and work this spring.'

The U.S. Constitution mandates that a census of the population be conducted every 10 years. Census statistics are used to determine the number of seats each state holds in the U.S. House of Representatives and inform how state, local and federal lawmakers will allocate billions of dollars in federal funds to local communities every year for the next 10 years.







Beat winter blues

Most areas in Europe and North America observe daylight saving time. Daylight saving time is often welcomed in spring, as it helps to extend daylight hours well into the evening. But few may welcome turning the clocks back in fall.

Coupled with the natural shortening of daylight hours as winter approaches, the end of DST facilitates a sudden shift in the ratio of sunlight to darkness.

As autumn transforms into winter, the number of available hours of daylight

slowly dwindles. Some areas of Alaska and Canada see only about three or four hours of daylight per day in the winter months. Conversely, those who

live in Key West, Fla., the southernmost point of the contiguous United States, may enjoy around 10 hours of daylight.

Fewer daylight hours can adversely affect mood and productivity. Seasonal affective disorder, often referred to as "SAD' or "the winter blues," has been recognized and included in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual for Mental Disorders.

Clinicians say that, as days become short and dark, a predictable set of symptoms of SAD may emerge.

Individuals with SAD may experience a host of symptoms, including difficulty waking in the morning; diminished energy levels; a tendency to eat more; an inability to concentrate; and depres-

The Cleveland Clinic advises that approximately half a million people in the United States suffer from winter SAD, while 10 to 20% may suffer from more mild forms of winter blues. The Canadian Mental Health Association states that between 2% and 3% of Canadians will experience SAD in their lifetime. Another 15% will experience a mild form of SAD that leaves them only slightly depressed. Similar symptoms can occur for those people who live in cloudy

regions or high latitudes. Evidence strongly suggests SAD is linked to sunlight. This lack of sunlight may trigger production of melatonin in some individuals.

Melatonin is a hormone made in the pineal gland that regulates sleep onset and sleeping patterns.

A combination of selfcare strategies, as well as professional medical treatment may help those with winter blues or more severe SAD.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services said that these strategies can help people coping with SAD.

Get out of the house into sunlight or brightly lit spaces early in the day

when the sun is out. Increase time spent outdoors. Take a break midday and enjoy lunch outside or take a walk, even if it's chilly.

Try to spend time with other people and chat with


friends and relatives. Avoid overloading on

carbohydrates like cookies and candies.

Talk to a doctor about using light therapy, which is the first line of SAD treatment, according to the University of Maryland School of Medicine.

Consider cognitive behavioral therapy or talk therapy with a licensed mental health provider. He or she also can make recommendations about the use of medication to alleviate symptoms if other treatments do not

provide results. There are many ways to mitigate the symptoms of winter blues. TF19B429
