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APD detective testifies in Brandt trial

ALAMOSA — The trial of Daniel Brandt continued this past week, beginning with opening statements presented by the prosecution and defense on Wednesday and followed by witness testimony on Thursday and Friday.

Brandt, 17, has been charged with two counts of conspiracy to commit murder in the first degree for his alleged shooting of Alamosa Police Department Officer Mollee Heeney and a private citizen, Ricardo Rangel, on Oct. 27, 2022. He has also been charged with three counts of first-degree assault, one count of illegal

discharge of a firearm and one count of criminal mischief related to that same event. He is being tried as an adult.

What does not seem to be contested by anyone — neither the prosecution nor the defense — is that Brandt shot APD Officer Heeney and Ricardo Rangel, a man who was visiting a relative when the

shooting occurred and intervened in the situation. Where counsel disagrees is what Brandt intended to do.

Deputy DA Carle Tarnutzer-Decker, assisting 12th Judicial District attorney Anne Kelly in the prosecution, contended in the opening statement, “Daniel Brandt tried to kill two people. [His] ac-

tions were intentional and with deliberation, and the intention was to kill.”

Cobea Becker, defending Brandt, contends, “Daniel Brandt was a drunk kid who never intended to kill anyone.”

As of Friday morning, much of the testimony was made by witnesses

Valley-wide power outage

Storm causes transmission line failure on Poncha Pass

SAN LUIS VALLEY — A winter storm caused a large power outage and impacted the entire San Luis Valley when a power line tripped and failed on Poncha Pass at about 7:40 a.m., on Friday morning.

Lee Boughey with the electricity distribution cooperative, Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association told the Valley Courier that, “Due to the heavy, wet snow, both the 115kV transmission line operated by Xcel Energy and the 230kV transmission line operated by Tri-State and Western Area Power Administration tripped, resulting in the outage in the valley from 7:40 a.m. to 9:50 a.m. [power to most of Alamosa was restored at 11 a.m.]

“Tri-State’s 230kV line is back in service, but at this time, [1 p.m. Friday] the 115kv line from the north remains out of service. The utilities are all coordinating on this issue.

“Notably, Tri-State is providing crews, poles, and equipment to help replace structures damaged on the

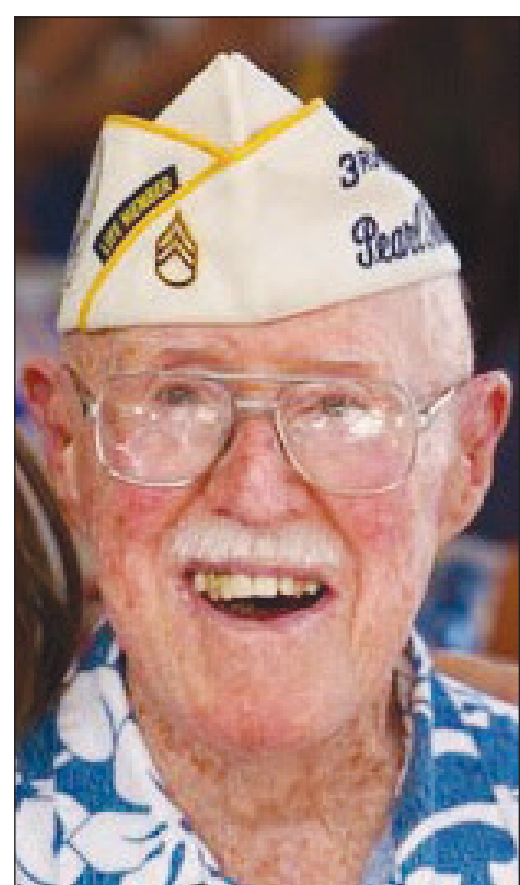
A snowstorm caused an electric transmission line to fail on Friday morning that resulted in the entire San Luis Valley without power for several hours.

SLVREC system.”

Shortly after the Valley lost power, the San Luis Valley Rural Electric Cooperative (SLVREC) posted this to Facebook, “We have 21 transmission structures down affecting members from Waverly to San Acacio. Crews are working on

distribution backfeed to restore power to our members. The hope is to have members back up by late morning if there are no issues with the main distribution line. Tri-State crews will arrive later today to assist.”

Pearl Harbor survivor Blake dies at 103

Lived at Homelake Veterans Center in MV

MONTE VISTA — George Blake, a Pearl Harbor survivor, passed away on May 8, 2024, at Homelake Veterans Center in Monte Vista at the remarkable age of 103.

His life was intertwined with the historic events of Dec. 7, 1941, when Japan attacked the naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Blake served almost 5½ years in the Army during World War II with over 3 years of his service overseas. He was assigned to an Artillery Unit for the Harbor Defense of Pearl Harbor, T.H.

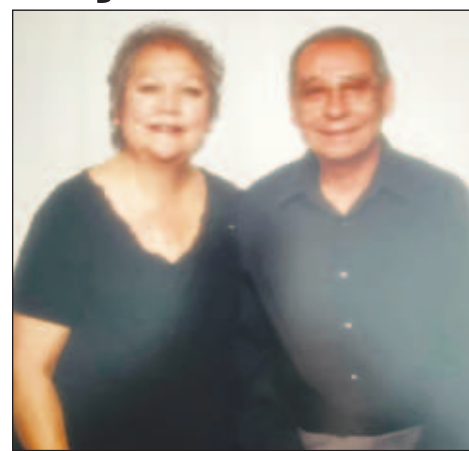

Trees planted at Sunset Ball Fields in honor of Arbor Day

ALAMOSA — Despite the rain, a group of people gathered Thursday afternoon planting trees in the Sunset Ball Fields off Highway 285 in Alamosa. The planting was done in recognition of Arbor Day, proclaimed as May 9 by the City of Alamosa, and the group of folks included staff with the City of Alamosa, members of the Rotary Club, Andy Rice, director of Alamosa Parks and Recreation, and Adam Moore, Communications and Communities Supervisor with the Colorado State Forest Service (CSFS).

With funds made possible by a Colorado Tree Coalition grant in partnership with the CSFS, 30 trees will be planted. The plan on Thursday had been to plant 11 of the 30 but nature had other plans, such that only three have made it into the ground, so far, including a Blue Spruce, a Chokecherry and a Hackberry. Once the project is completed, there will also be Elm, Honey Locust and Crabapple trees.

According to Andy Rice, trees will be

planted along Highway 285, providing improved city "gateway aesthetics" for those coming into Alamosa. The trees will also create shade for t-ball families and spectators attending the games and will block blowing wind and dust. Trees will also be planted on the playground in a park near the SLV Boys and Girls Club.

"These are all benefits of trees," Rice said.

Celebrating Arbor Day — especially when it involves planting of more trees — is one of the requirements for Alamosa continuing to be designated as a Tree City USA.

Glen was a sergeant in the United States Marine Corps when he and three other Marines were killed in action on May 2, 2008, while on a combat mission. The Humvee they were riding in hit a roadside bomb in the Al Anbar Province of Iraq.

Glen knew the value of education and the value of physical fitness. Growing up in Monte Vista, he participated in nearly every sport available including football, wrestling and baseball. He played in the band and was an excellent student. He was quarterback for the Pirate football team for three years and competed four years on the state wrestling team and played baseball all four years. Glen chose to play baseball for Ottawa University in Ottawa, Kan. on an academic and baseball scholarship where he earned his bachelor's in mathematics.

Glen subsequently earned a surveying degree from Westwood College and was going to work on his master's in Hydro-Engineering at Boulder, CU when he made his decision to join the Marine Corps. Living in Boulder, he explained, "he got tired of hearing people cutting down his country," so he

decided to do something positive. Glen could have gone directly into officer candidate school but chose to start at the bottom like all the other recruits. Should he go on to command, Glen said, he wanted to have hands-on experience rather than classroom philosophy. "I want those I command to know that I have been where they are," he said in an interview just after basic training. Glen was ready for whatever came. After a childhood filled with the challenge of athletic competition, staying in peak physical shape was second nature to him and he strongly supported the discipline and leadership skills learned on the mat, football field, baseball diamond and the school room.

 1941. He was trained as a Morse Code radio Operator and later was in charge of a Radar installation for Artillery Fire. At the end of the war, he was discharged with the rank of Staff Sergeant. Following his discharge he joined the Air Force Reserves.

On that fateful Sunday morning, Dec. 7, 1941, Blake was headed to the gym to play basketball when the attack began. Initially, he thought it was a drill, but the reality soon set in as explosions echoed and planes filled the sky. Rising suns adorned the wings of the attacking aircraft.

Despite the chaos, Blake survived the Pearl Harbor attack and continued to serve in Harbor Defense at Pearl Harbor.

At 15 years of age, he met Helen, the love of his life, and except

for his military service overseas during WWII they were together for the rest of their lives. After almost 70 years of marriage, Helen passed away in 2013.

Upon his discharge from the Army, Blake became employed by the Research Department of Bell Telephone Laboratories in NY. Due to the nature of his assignments and the expansion of Bell Labs, George and Helen moved several times and have lived in five states: Virginia, New York, New Jersey, Illinois, and Colorado. In 1983 after 37 years with the company, he retired from the Bell Labs in Denver and moved to Salida.

Blake lived in Salida for 40 years before moving to the Colorado Veterans Community Living Center at Homelake. In January, he celebrated his 103rd birthday.

He was the only child of Florence Rosa (Sears) of London, England and George W. Blake

of Plymouth, England. George Jr. was born on Jan. 29, 1921, in the Bronx, NY. Shortly after his birth, the family moved to Flatbush in Brooklyn, NY. He grew up in Brooklyn attending P.S. 119 and then graduated from Textile High School in Manhattan.

Blake is survived by his three daughters, Margaret Glaser (Andrew) of Annandale, NJ, Barbara Swift of Maple Park, Ill., and Colleen Trinko (Paul) of Glen Ellyn, Ill.; five grandchildren Drew Glaser, Jeff Glaser (Jen), Amy Glaser, Kari Soprych and Megan Loebbaka (Cale) and 10 great-grandchildren Jack and Lucy, Eve (Arthur), and Indra (Andrew), Ella and Emma, Sawyer and Charlotte.

Funeral Service is set for 10 a.m. on Friday May 17, 2024, at Lewis and Glenn Funeral Home in Salida. Interment will follow at Fairview Cemetery.

 who were with law enforcement. APD Detective Brandon Bertsch testified as to how Brandt was behaving after having shot Heeney, characterizing him as someone who was showing no remorse.

When asked, Bertsch recalled Brandt making statements such as, "I wish I had shot her in the head" and, when he was in the vicinity of other police officers, saying, "F**k the others." When asked about Brandt's demeanor in the hospital when defense was contending that Brandt was drunk, there was testimony that Brandt spoke to police officers one way but, when speaking to health care providers, was respectful and answering questions with "yes, ma'am" or "no,

ma'am."

Adams State University Chief of Police Erika Derouin, who lives in the neighborhood, also testified as she was an eyewitness to the event. In her testimony, she described a situation that fit the prosecution's narrative.

In presenting her case, Kelly has frequently used evidence such as photos, bodycam footage and copies of statements made by witnesses immediately after the shooting.

The goal of the defense has been, up until Friday, to portray Brandt as a young man who was drunk - supported, they stated, by video from a bus he was riding that showed he "could not walk down the aisle without holding on to the seats."

The defense has frequently described Rangel as the instigator of the argument that led to him

being shot by Brandt, including walking up the street "waving his gun." That was not corroborated by Chief Derouin when she said she did not see him approaching Brandt in that manner.

Defense also described Rangel as much larger than Brandt, which was evident in court and hitting Brandt repeatedly in their physical altercation. But Chief Derouin stated that she saw Brandt and his friend actually beating up Rangel.

On Friday, the defense was expected to call an expert witness whose testimony may address some facts the prosecution has established. Following the expert witness, Rangel was expected to testify.

There will be continued coverage of the trial in Tuesday's edition of the Valley Courier.

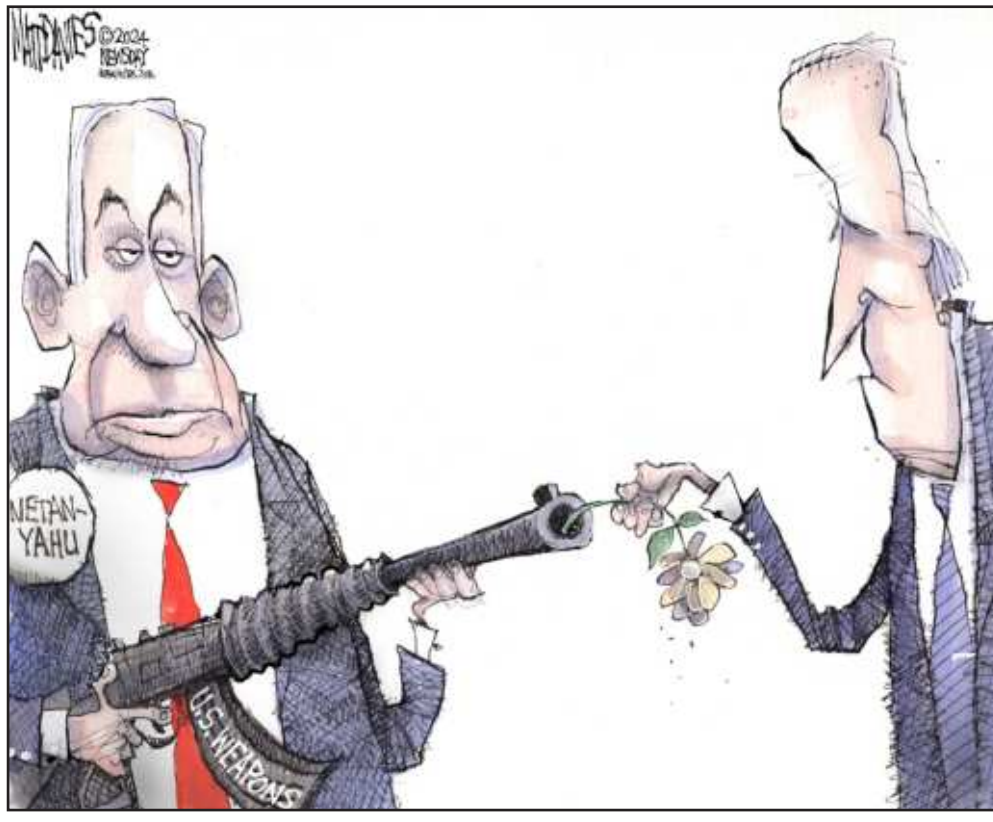

Police officer stuck in BLM nightmare

It must be a shock to police officers busting up campus protests to be cheered, rather than jeered, as they have been since the police shooting of Michael Brown in Ferguson, Missouri, a decade ago -- a completely justified shooting, according to President Obama's Justice Department. The anti-Israel demonstrators seem kind of surprised, too. They thought they were going to get the BLM treatment.

I don't know how many times we have to go over this, but you're not black, Palestinians. No offense! Nor are gays or illegals or Jews or womyn, etc.

There are different rules for black people, some for good and sound reasons (the legacy of slavery) and some for moronic reasons (we can't possibly expect black people to obey police commands).

So while you applaud the cops arresting pro-Hamas agitators, remember that a lot of brave law enforcement officers are still living the nightmare of BLM's cop hatred. This column is about one of them.

Last week, the lunatic progressive attorney for Hennepin County, Minnesota, Mary Moriarty, announced that she will spend at least a million dollars in taxpayer money to have Steptoe, a white-shoe law firm in Washington, D.C., prosecute Minnesota State Trooper Ryan Londregan for murder.

Londregan's crime was to save his own life and that of another officer last summer while trying to arrest Ricky Cobb II, repeat felon and father of five by at least three different mothers. (Insert first communion photo here.)

Cobb was pulled over at around 2 a.m. last July for driving with-

out taillights. The troopers checked his record and found that Cobb was wanted for violating a felony order of protection in a neighboring county. The officers called it in and asked if the county wanted him arrested. Yes, they did.

Hang onto your hats, readers, but Cobb resisted arrest. He refused to get out of his car, refused to hand over his keys, and then, with two officers half-inside his vehicle, moved the gearshift to "drive." As the car lurched forward, throwing the officers to the ground, Londregan shot Cobb.

The troopers ran after the car, pulled Cobb out, and engaged in frantic efforts to keep him alive, including giving him CPR. But he died.

When the monster Moriarty first got the case, she: 1) met privately with Cobb's family, showing her absolute impartiality, and 2) hired a use-of-force expert to conduct an independent review, saying she wanted to "get this right."

But when her own hand-picked expert found that the shooting was lawful, she blew off his report, refused to show it to the defense, and proceeded to indict Londregan for murder anyway. That's how you "get this right" as a progressive.

Even the Democratic governor, Tim Walz, criticized Moriarty, asking: "Why would you not listen to use-of-force? Why would that not be central to something you do?"

For her next trick, Moriarty's office lied about what the Minnesota State Patrol's use-of-force expert had said. Sgt. Jason Halvorson, who created the use-of-force training program, concluded that the shooting was lawful.

But Deputy County Attorney Mark Osler quoted Halvorson's response to a hypothetical that had nothing to do

with Cobb's shooting -- as Halvorson revealed in a subsequent affidavit that was quickly put under seal. The shooting in the hypothetical: not reasonable. The actual shooting: reasonable.

Moriarty is such a wacko that even the progressive, Soros-backed Minnesota Attorney General Keith Ellison had to take another case away from her -- the first time in 30 years a state AG had done so. Two brothers, 15 and 17 years old, had shot and killed a 23-year-old black woman, Zaria McKeever, execution-style, during a home invasion. Moriarty offered the killers a plea deal, sentencing them to a couple years in a juvenile facility. This, she said, was based on the "science."

She denounced Ellison for even making the request, calling it "deeply troubling." The next day, Gov. Walz reassigned the case to Ellison.

At least Moriarty learned her lesson! A few months later, she gave a slap on the wrist to two other teen-aged murderers. This time, the victim was white, so the governor and AG declined to intervene. It's almost like there are two systems of justice.

How did this nut become the prosecutor for Hennepin County? Moriarty was elected in 2022 with cash infusions from a bunch of left-wing organizations flush with money from the BLM gold rush. (In the Year of Our Floyd, corporate America gave \$50 billion to BLM and related organizations, according to The Washington Post.) She defeated a far more experienced black judge, Martha Holton Dimick, who was endorsed by the Minneapolis Star Tribune in an editorial noting that Dimick "understands from personal experience that communities of color with higher crime rates want prosecutors to bring

offenders to justice."

But the white lesbian knows better! (At least Moriarty doesn't have a "white savior" complex.)

Study shows most Southern Baptists back the first amendment

At a pivotal moment in world history, the president of the United States asked citizens to join him in an urgent prayer.

"Almighty God: Our sons, pride of our Nation, this day have set upon a mighty endeavor, a struggle to preserve our Republic, our religion and our civilization," he said. "Lead them straight and true; give strength to their arms, stoutness to their hearts, steadfastness in their faith. ... Some will never return. Embrace these, Father, and receive them, Thy heroic servants, into Thy kingdom."

That was Franklin D. Roosevelt on D-Day, as Allied troops entered northern France.

"FDR said things about God and America that, if anyone spoke those words today, people would have heart attacks," said Daniel Darling, director of the Land Center for Cultural Engagement at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Barack Obama, Darling noted, "quoted scripture more often than George W. Bush, who may have avoided that since his critics screamed 'THEOCRACY!' whenever he did."

In recent years, academics and journalists have been especially critical of "Christian nationalism," a concept that has become hard to clearly define and monitor in political life.

Researchers with Neighborly Faith -- a group that helps evangelicals build stronger relationships with other religious groups -- studied academic publications addressing this issue and created a detailed, 14-point compromise definition stating, in part: "Christian Nationalism is a movement advancing a vision of America's past, present, and future that excludes people of non-Christian religions and non-Western cultures. Christian Nationalists romanticize Christianity's influence on America's development, attributing the nation's historical provenance to God's special favor."

Some researchers add "white" before "Christian nationalism" and stress that adherents believe America is increasingly threatened by immigration, Critical Race Theory, feminism, LGBTQ+ rights and other factors.

Neighborly Faith concluded that 5% of Americans self-identify as Christian nationalists, and 11% can be considered "adherents."

Debates about these topics led to a new Lifeway Research survey, working with the Land Center, of self-identified Southern Baptist churchgoers and many congregational leaders. Darling stressed that -- while conflicts exist -- most Southern Baptists are politically conservative, but strongly support the First Amendment rights of all. Survey takeaways included:

-- It's crucial that 92% of laity and 95% of key leaders affirmed that "religious liberty should apply to all persons and religions." Also, 80% of members and 86% of leaders said government officials must allow citizens to freely practice their religious faiths, including what Southern Baptists consider "false religions."

-- While 58% of members and 62% of church leaders think the government should not support a specific religion or religious belief, 36% of members and 33% of church leaders disagreed.

-- In defense of religious liberty, 94% of the laypeople and 97% of church leaders affirmed the right

of Americans to choose their own religious beliefs. Also, 88% of the laity and 97% of church leaders said citizens must retain the right to "practice principles" of their faith "in everyday life."

-- Also, 67% of members and 77% of church leaders said politically active Christians can "fight secularism" by supporting legislation that encourages Christian principles and practices in the public square.

-- While 56% of church members believe politics is "a way for Christians to love their neighbor," 31% disagreed and 13% were not sure. Also, 70%

said Christians are "obligated" to vote in elections to select political leaders, while 26% disagreed.

Darling acknowledged that a few evangelicals and Southern Baptists may be ready to "scrap the U.S. Constitution," while rejecting what has long been called a "classically liberal" approach to First Amendment rights. But the "vast majority of Southern Baptists are not pining for the beliefs" that most researchers link to Christian nationalism, he said.

"There are lots of people in our churches who think we've gone too far while changing some parts of

American culture," Darling added. "They're worried about trends they see around them, but that doesn't make them Christian nationalists -- even if they quote a Bible verse or two when they talk about politics. ... The last thing Southern Baptists want is the government telling folks what to believe."

Freedom scares us because many of us have the idea that God is in heaven with His hammer saying, "You better do this exactly because if you don't, you're going to be in big trouble."

We start to worry, thinking, "What if I miss God?" because we're afraid

to make a mistake. Now I'm not suggesting that we start doing stupid stuff, but 95 percent of what we're supposed to do is in the Word. The other five percent is ours to freely pursue what God has planned for us.

So, let's make a commitment to make progress by faith. Maybe we've been doing something for a long time, but then we start to sense that God is changing things in our life, even though what we've been doing is good. The possibility of change can scare us and also be the reason why we sometimes feel like we're being pulled apart, not knowing what we're supposed to be doing. But faith propels us to take a chance--to step out and find out. We need to be willing to try and risk being wrong if that's what it takes to find out what God has for us.

Scripture tells us that even if the righteous fall seven times, they rise again (Proverbs 24:16). You and I need to dare to be passionate and purposeful...and move forward in the life God has planned for us.

National park celebrates Jicarilla Apache culture

members, including elders, artists, and Great Sand Dunes Park Ranger Jaiden Garcia of the Jicarilla Apache Nation. Rocky Mountain PBS filmed the field trip as part of the creation of a curriculum about Jicarilla Apache culture, ecological practices, and history for Colorado fourth grade students.

- Whisk together the first 6 ingredients. Place bread cubes in a 13 x 9-inch or 3-quart baking dish coated with cooking spray. Pour egg mixture over top. Refrigerate, covered, 8 hours or overnight.
- Preheat oven to 350 F. Remove berries from freezer and French toast from refrigerator and let stand while oven heats. Bake French toast, covered, 30 minutes.
- In a small bowl, cut butter into brown sugar until crumbly. Top French toast with berries; sprinkle with brown sugar mixture. Bake, uncovered, until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean, 15 to 20 minutes. If desired, dust with confectioners’ sugar and serve with syrup.

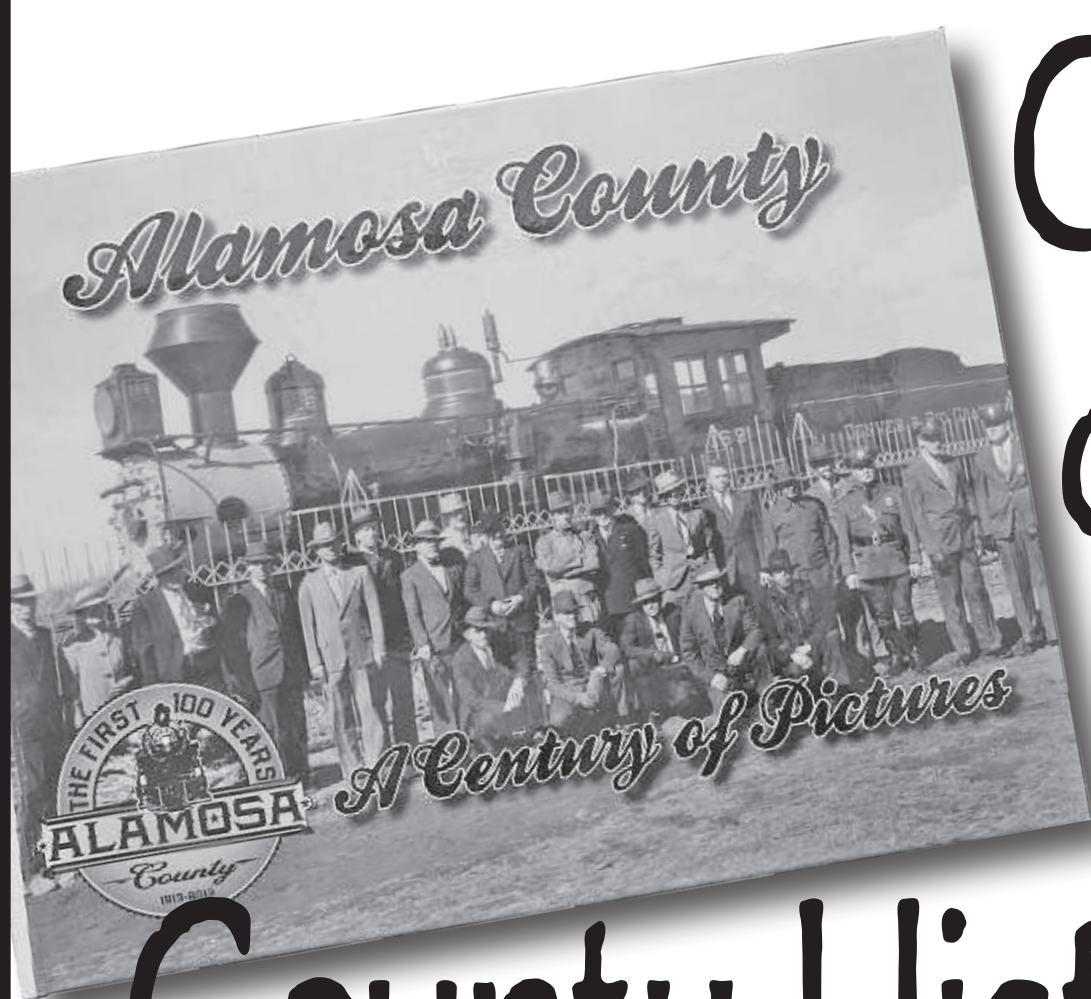
