Rio Grande Community **Trust gains** on affordable housing goals CONTRIBUTED

DEL NORTE — It has already been a busy year for the Rio Grande Community Trust (RGCT), a nonprofit formed in 2022 with a mission to sustain vibrant, durable communities in the San Luis Valley by creating homes that remain permanently affordable.

As part of this mission, RGCT is partnering with the Sawmill Meadow Village Housing Development in South Fork, which will create 30 affordable workforce housing units in the area, immediately addressing the need identified in the 2021 SLV Housing Needs Assessment. To ensure that the first 10 homeownership units remain affordable in perpetuity, RGCT will steward deed restrictions. homeowners buy the land and homes at Sawmill Meadow, these deed restrictions will ensure future buyers also

have access to affordable homeownership. "We started RGCT because we love the San Luis Valley and want living here to be affordable for everyone. We know that many people who are the backbone of our communities are at risk

The joys and hydrology of **Medano Creek**

SAND **NATIONAL** AND PARK PRE-SERVE The recreational fun at Medano Creek and the sandy beaches along it are off to another season. The snowmelt waters have now reached the area near the Dunes Parking Lot with a shallow and gentle flow. The creek is about one inch deep and

between 10-20 feet. Residents and other visitors to the park enjoy the cool water of the creek. Aside from the recreational pleasure, the creek is also of interest to scientists and the familiar pulse of the creek is a rare phenomenon. The "surge flow," of the creek

is one of the few places

on Earth where water

smooth and mobile creek oval-shaped. bed with little resistance which creates a laminar flow, and a sufficient supply of water. These components make dams or antidunes that create temporary small pools in the creek. When there is enough pressure from impounded water, the antidunes break sending the surge of water downstream. The magnitude of the surges depends on the depth (quantity) of water and can be as high as one

The 10th Circuit disagreed with her. McHugh wrote that the government engaged in further analysis on a completely different alternative, meaning Matsch's original order could not be the "law of the case."

Building a huge park is anything but easy

Marc Katz is a retired entrepreneur who lives part-time in Durango, a town of 19,000 people who all seem to love the outdoors. You can't have too many parks, he believes, because the demand seems inexhaustible.

The way he tells it, when he bought the 1,680 acres ad-

Marston jacent to town, he thought it would be a fantastic place for a rural park that included biking and hiking trails and a centralized set of soccer fields. He quickly learned it was "naïve" to think park development would be uncomplicated or

What he started in 2014 has now become a whopper of a park that someday may prepare mountain bikers for the Olympics. Katz, though, only had experience working in the private sector, as CEO of a credit card payments company.

The \$14 million parcel he bought once hosted a coal mine and gravel pit, and it sits atop a steep mesa above the town. Planning for the new park turned into a nine-year effort that involved countless meetings with city and county officials. Then there were road trips to innovative park projects, notably those around Bentonville, Arkansas.

As one of its goals, Katz's project includes an 80-acre "outdoor mountain bike stadium," a BMX track and community events center, which would make Durango the king of U.S. mountain bik-

"We anticipate the 2028 US Olympic Mountain bike team training at the park," said Gaige Sippy, a board member of the Durango Mesa Foundation that's carrying out Katz's vision.

Sippy knows cycling. He was the longtime director of the Iron Horse Bicycle



Classic. Every Memorial Day weekend, the race pits a tourist train against several thousand bikers, who usually win.

Cycling is anchored deep in Durango, with a vigorous youth and adult program involving hundreds of participants. Still, said Moira Compton, who runs Katz's foundation as executive director, "this is a big lift for Durango. But so was Purgatory Ski Resort and our local Chapman Ski Hill."

Sippy agreed. "Those same people who fought the rec center now say, 'It's too small.' This is the biggest philanthropic endeavor for Durango times-ten," Sippy said. "Sometimes I feel like a snake oil salesman, selling something that won't be fully realized for 20 years.'

But the hard work isn't on his plate. "That's Moira's job," he said, as Compton wrangles meetings and talks to residents about what they want in the new

Compton said planning includes leaving "big open space" for what the community might want in 10-20 and even 40 years. "If you told me that the Klunker bikes we made in our garages in Crested Butte would become an Olympic sport, I'd have said, 'impossible."

For today's users, Katz said, "We know we need adaptive sports trails (handbike trails), and we need a dozen ball fields in one place for state tournaments. We also need camping, from primitive to RV hook-ups to go with it."

"Don't forget frisbee golf," he added, and "dedicated walking trails" for the many locals who don't bike or find interactions with mountain bikers intimidat-

"They (bikers) just move so fast," agreed 77-year-old Dave Stiller, an avid

To get things moving, Durango Mesa Park opened last fall with a series of demonstration trails with banked corners, table-top jumps and unlike other area trails, traffic goes in only one direction and e-bikes are permitted.

As a member of the same demographic -- I'm roughly halfway between the two candidates in age -- I can't say I'm enthusiastic about the choice. My own odds have turned rather for the worse since last we met here. Indeed, having recently experienced what felt like a near-death experience -- the doctors seemed somewhat less alarmed than I was -- I feel more qualified to speak to the issue.

Regular readers may have noticed an editorial note to the effect that I've been recovering from an illness. Four illnesses would be more like it -- a succession of maladies that hit me out of nowhere. In retrospect, it seems almost comical. But it didn't feel funny then.

I'm writing this because so many readers sent me messages of support that I've been truly touched. Who knew that my

meandering contributions meant enough I remember thinking that our two sons to people that they'd take time to write? So, thank you, each and every one.

I'd always been one of the lucky ones, rarely sick a day since recovering from chickenpox at age 12. Probably a bit smug about it, honestly. None of the chronic complaints common to people my age had touched me: no back or joint pain, no arskin lesions left over from my lifeguard-

Back when the COVID epidemic began, I joked with my brother that our family's history of living in dirt-floored Irish hovels with farm animals had rendered us immune to disease. Never mind that our maternal grandfather had died in the 1918 influenza epidemic. Other people get sick, not us. All the same, I showed up early and often for COVID vaccines.

Then came year 80. I woke up one morning in February too weak to get out of bed. No chest pain, so it wasn't a heart attack; I could see, hear and move my extremities, so it wasn't a stroke. But I truly felt as if the life was draining out of me.

I told my wife that I was dying. Oddly, I wasn't so much frightened as resigned. The rest of you would have to go on without me. I'd be gone. Off duty. but awkward solution.

could care for Diane. If the idiots wanted Trump, they could have him. I'd no longer be available to bitch about it.

Even so, I told her not to call an ambulance, which she interpreted to mean that I wasn't fixing to die at all. She waited. Eventually, I managed to get out of bed. The rest of the day is a blur, but on the second morning I drove myself to the emergency room at the University of Arkansas Medical Sciences campus about 10 blocks away. COVID. My second infection of the winter. The first had been like a mild cold. This time it had gotten into my heart. I was diagnosed with atrial fibrillation, an irregular heartbeat that can cause strokes. They started me on blood thinners, beta blockers to slow my racing pulse and anti-virals for the COVID. They kept me overnight in the hospital,

a lifetime first. I felt weak and vulnerable. Diane complained that my bitching and moaning had become intolerable. Then my plumbing stopped up. Back to the emergency room for the longest day of my life. "Acute urinary retention" was the diagnosis. Catheterization provided a temporary

Convinced that I was in denial, my wife insisted upon accompanying me to the urologist. After listening to her, he said, "I agree with Diane" -- a big W for her. He thought I showed symptoms of pneumonia, which yet another emergency room

visit confirmed. More pills -- antibiotics

this time. I was still weak as the proverbial kitten, and probably clinically depressed if the truth were known. Definitely done writing columns. I'd drive down to the dog park, sit on a bench and watch while Diane walked her daily laps. I could bare-

Then "Dr. D" did his magic trick. A specialist in cardiac electrophysiology with a long name nobody in Arkansas can pronounce -- brilliant and compassionate like all of the many doctors and nurses I encountered at UAMS -- he stimulated

my heart back into its normal rhythm. And presto! I was back at 100% almost overnight. The A-fib could come back, but so far so good. A humbling, but instructive, experience. Old age is a bitch.

CDOT devoting all available resources to US 50 bridge




