

CSP is asking for assistance in a fatal hitand-run crash near Fort **Garland**

COSTILLA COUNTY — The Colorado State Patrol is asking for the public's assistance in a fatal hit-and-run that occurred Wednesday morning, March 27, east of Fort Garland on Highway 160 near Milepost 265.

At approximately 6:20 a.m. on March 27, CSP Troopers responded to a hit-and-run crash on Highway 160 near Milepost 265, about 7 miles east of Fort Garland. An unknown vehicle struck a pedestrian, causing fatal injuries to the 66-year-old nedestrian.

The initial investigation revealed the vehicle was traveling eastbound on Highway 160. The pedestrian was outside of his vehicle and in the roadway, according to CSP. The vehicle struck the pedestrian and left the scene continuing eastbound. The driver and vehicle have not

been identified. Investigators are asking for the public's help identifying the vehicle and driver of this hit-and-run. The vehicle is believed to have damage to the

windshield and hood. Witnesses to the crash or anvone with information on the crash is asked to contact Colorado State Patrol Dispatch at 719-589-9591 and reference case number 5B240265.

Del Norte HS students compete in **Colorado Envirothon Competition**

CONTRIBUTED DEL NORTE — Eleven Del Norte High School students competed in the Colorado Envirothon Competition on March 4-5 at the Colorado State University Spur Campus in Denver. Of the 13 teams in attendance, Del Norte High School was represented by three teams with Team 1 taking home second place.

During the competition, student teams were tasked with developing solutions for a real-world scenario about renewable energy in Boulder.

Students were given three hours to research the scenario and prepare a 15-minute oral presentation to showcase their solutions and how they would affect natural resources and social and cultural considerations.

Following the presentation portion of the competition, student teams rotated through tests on aquatic ecology, forestry, soils and land use, wildlife, and renewable energy to demonstrate their knowledge of each area.

The Del Norte High School teams attended workshops with local experts throughout the fall and winter to prepare for the competition. The hands-on learning workshops were coordinated and facilitated by the Rio Grande Watershed Conservation and Education Initiative (RGWCEI) and included presentations from the Colorado State Forest Service (CSFS), United States Forest Ser-

Colorado Water Conservation Board issues scholarship

Water Conservation Board recently announced that a \$2,000 one-year scholarship is available for a Colorado high school student, or a Colorado college freshman interested in western water issues and planning to attend a public college or university in Colorado.

Diane Hoppe served in the Colorado House of Representatives from 1999-2006 and was the chairwoman of the House Agriculture, Livestock and Natural Resources Committee, the Water Interim Committee, and the Water Resources Review Committee. She also served as the minority whip.

Hoppe was a founding member of the Colorado Foundation for Water Education and served as president from 2002-07.

Governor John Hickenlooper appointed Hoppe to the Colorado Water Conservation Board as the South Platte Basin representative in 2012. She was elected chairwoman of the board in 2015. She passed away on Feb. 27, 2016. Her family worked with the Colorado Water Conservation Board to establish this scholarship in her honor.

– For the past 29 years, public health departments across the U.S. have celebrated a week of public health awareness and events and through those initiatives have reached out to their communities, bringing education, wellness and community involvement to the forefront. Rio Grande County Pub-

lic Health Department is excited to kick off the 2024 Public Health Week and plans to invite the community to join them in community activities that shine a light on the public health facet of the community. Rio Grande County is celebrating its150th anniversary this year, and public health has a lot to celebrate too. From new programs such as the International Travel Clinic to established programs that continue to educate communities here in the San Luis Valley and beyond.

In 2022, Rio Grande County passed a proclamation designating the first full week in April as National Public Health Week to shine a light on the communities of Rio Grande County and on the work and dedication the public health department puts into the communities they serve throughout the year.

The proclamation states, "Since 1995, the American is inviting the public to join

through its sponsorship of National Public Health Week, has educated the public, policymakers and public health professionals about issues important to improving the public's health; and U.S. life expectancy dropped from 2014 to 2017 in the longest sustained decline since the Great Recession and only in 2018 began to increase again; U.S life expectancy then dropped again in 2020 by a full year, which is the largest drop in life expectancy since 1943."

According to the American Public Health Association, this year the focus will be on equality and inclu-

"This year we are 'Centering and Celebrating Cultures in Health' to ensure everyone, in all cultural communities, has a chance at a long and healthy life. To do so, we must address and prevent the underlying causes of poor health and disease risk. 
out for me. She responded: "S-T-I-L-L."

The problem with secret weapons

Down in the polls, facing calls from his own party to step away from the 2024 presidential campaign, and struggling to keep his party together on the Israel-Hamas war, Joe Biden nonetheless may possess a secret weapon. It's the Republicans.

On the surface, the GOP could not be better placed for the fall election. Their rival is 81 years old. The public isn't buying the Biden administration argument that the economy is roaring. Their presumptive nominee actually has been helped, not hindered, by unprecedented post-presidential legal problems. To adapt a phrase from the Democrats' history, the Republicans' happy days should be here again.

But, to recast a phrase from that song, which introduced Franklin Delano Roosevelt at the 1932 Democratic National Convention, the Republicans aren't singing a song of cheer again. In fact, they can't get together long enough to sing in one voice that, once they regain the Senate and the White House, "Your cares and troubles are gone/There'll be no more from now on!"

Instead, their cares and troubles are multiplying. That's what happens when a fractious party turns a legislative triumph into political upheaval — and when resignations transform a 222-213 majority into a dangerous situation where the GOP can afford only one defection in any floor vote.

Moments after the Republican-controlled House approved legislation to avert a government shutdown, the knives were out. GOP rebels denounced the legislation and Speaker Mike Johnson. Rep. Marjorie Taylor Greene of Georgia filed a "motion to vacate" the office of the speaker, prompting fresh worries that the GOP, which has had two speakers in the past several months, might soon dethrone Johnson, presumably on the conviction that the Louisianan, who opposes

gay marriage and abortion rights, isn't

sufficiently conservative.

It is enough to get The Wall Street Journal, no liberal lodestar, to ask, "So what's wrong with Johnson now? Apparently because he's not willing to indulge kamikaze acts like shutting down the government, Johnson is a sellout too."

The kamikaze act Greene contemplates grows out of the view that Johnson shouldn't have allowed the spending bill averting a government shutdown to move to the floor. The critiques: The measure defied the unwritten GOP custom that only bills that are supported by a majority of the Republican conference should advance to a vote. Any bill attracting the support of a majority of the Democrats is the political equivalent of a hip-drop tackle. This is a time for confrontation, not cooperation. So what if the government is shut down? The counterargument, which Johnson employed: The Republicans cannot become the natural party of American governance if they can't govern, or at least let the government go about its normal business. "There's a difference between being in the majority and being in the minority," Rep. Mike Kelly of Pennsylvania, one of the 101 Republicans who voted for the spending measure, said in an interview. "In the majority, you have to govern. You can't just sit back and criticize. There comes a time when you're in the majority when you have to do the responsible thing, not go on TV and criticize and raise an enormous amount of money for your campaign, which is what some of these people are doing." The rebellion on the right isn't over. Most of the Republican rebels oppose more aid to Ukraine. Johnson supports it. The rebels don't want the aid package to go to the floor. The speaker insists on taking it to the floor. That may be the moment when Greene calls for a vote to remove Johnson from office. That also may be the stranger-

the Democrats race to the rescue of Johnson and provide the margin of victory to keep him in power. There would have to be a price for that rescue. The Democrats are discussing that price during the Easter recess. and Independent Susan Collins of Maine endorsed Nikki Haley and all but said she wouldn't endorse Trump if he were nominated.

Eleven months ago, after Trump issued incendiary remarks during a CNN town meeting, Biden gleefully went on Twitter, a tactic he borrowed from Trump. "It's simple, folks," the president wrote on the social media platform now known as X. "Do you want four more years of that? If you don't, pitch in to our campaign."

In recent days, a Morning Consult poll showed Biden making gains on Trump in all but one of the swing states.

For nine years, the Democrats have waited, wondering when and if Trump might finally go too far — and allow them to peel away some of his support. It hasn't happened yet. It may never happen. The problem with secret weapons is that they are not always effective weapons.

Then there is Donald Trump's apparent intention, if he is returned to the White House, to pardon the insurrectionists who mounted a riot at the Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021, and sought to overturn the 2020 election. By more than a 3-to-1 margin, Americans disapprove of the actions of those who forced their way into the Capitol, according to a January CBS/YouGov Poll. And yet Trump in recent weeks has added fresh emphasis to his support of the rioters. He's spoken of them as "unbelievable patriots," described them as "hostages," and indicated he would pardon them "the first day we get into office." The Trump conundrum: He must amplify his rhetoric and radicalize his message to solidify his support. "Trump needs to be controversial to get his free media, which could lead him to do even more of what he is inclined to do naturally — say outrageous things," said Bruce Cain, a Stanford political scientist who believes that this circumstance can erode GOP prospects in House and Senate races. "This is something Democrats can use in every Senate and House race, asking Republican candidates what they would do if Trump does that day one. "My guess," he continues, "is that it further erodes educated Repubsupport." It already is too much for Lisa Murkowski, a second-generation Alaska senator who won as a write-in candidate in 2010 after being toppled in the GOP primary. She told CNN that she would "absolutely" not support Trump in the fall and said, "I just regret that our party is seemingly becoming a party of Donald Trump." Sen.

a problem, Dave has had only one

thing to say: "Cast your care." But I didn't always want to hear this when I was feeling frustrated and upset-but it's exactly what the Bible tells us to do. First Peter 5:7 says to cast, "all your cares [all your anxieties, all your worries, and all your concerns, once and for all on Him, for He cares about you [with deepest affection, and watches over you

very carefully]" (AMP). In the dictionary, the word cast means "to pitch or to throw." I think that description says a lot because if you're going to end your relationship with worry, then you're going to have to get aggressive about it

For example, we don't have to accept every thought that comes into our head. We can cast out the wrong ones and let the right ones take roof. And I find that my whole outlook changes as I say simple prayers: "God, I believe You're working in my life, and I'm expecting something good to happen todav." I'm not saying we should ignore our

problems, wishing they'd just go away. We need to see them for what they are, but we can't let them keep us from choosing a hopeful, positive attitude that says, "I believe God is in control!" I like this saying: "Worry sees the problem. Faith sees the God who can

The question is, do your problems know where they stand in relationship to God in your life?

handle the problem.

I'm reminded of the story of Abraham, who at 100 years of age, believed God would give Him a son and make him the father of many nations. He chose to look beyond his circumstances and believe God. I'm

absolutely amazed by that! The Bible says that God can "do superabundantlý more than all that we dare ask or think" (Ephesians 3:20). So, no matter what our circumstances look like, we just need to keep our eyes

Typically, when we have a problem God will do one of two things. He'll either remove the problem or He'll give us the ability to get through it with positive attitude. I've found that as I've grown in my relationship with God, I've become

more comfortable leaving that choice up to God. Because if He leads me

through something I really don't want

to go through, then I know for sure He has a purpose in mind. As a child I experienced years of sexual and emotional abuse, which was absolutely tormenting. The amazing thing is, everything God has done in my life through that horrible situation—all of the healing and restoration—has prepared me to do what He's called me to do today. I didn't always understand why things were happening the way they did at the time, but I learned how to walk by

It's absolutely wonderful when we can feel completely comfortable not knowing the "why" behind what's happening in our lives.

Colorado lawmakers reject proposed ban on new oil and gas drilling after 2030

A bill to ban new oil and gas drilling in Colorado after 2030 which sparked a spate of industry TV ads with dire warnings — was rejected Thursday by a bipartisan majority of the Senate Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee after a marathon hearing.

The legislation, Senate Bill 159 — sponsored by two Democratic senators, Kevin Priola, of Henderson, and Sonya Jaquez Lewis, of Boulder County — would have required state oil and gas regulators to stop issuing new drilling permits starting in 2030, with those permits to be used by 2032.

Faced with projections of potentially severe impacts of climate change and the Front Range's continuing struggles to curb ozone pollution, the bill was a necessary step to transition to cleaner energy, Priola said.

In an attempt to deal with the growing risk of wells being abandoned, or orphaned, as small companies go out of business, the legislation also included a section giving the state the power to go after former owners of the wells for cleanup

The bill, however, faced pushback at the hearing from the industry, local and country governments, which depended upon severance taxes to fund schools and services, business groups, such as the Denver Metro Chamber of Commerce, and individuals, many of whom live and work in oil and gas areas.

API-Colorado, an industry trade group, had run TV ads prior to the hearing calling the legislation "extreme" and saying it could jeopardize school funding and 300,000 jobs. About 50,000 people work directly in the Colorado oil and gas industry.

The Energy and Carbon Management Commission, which oversees oil and gas activities, also opposed the bill.

"The state is concerned that cutting supply rather than reducing demand will hurt low-income consumers, rather than cutting emissions," Julie Murphy, ECMC executive director testified. She said the commission was concerned about "unintended consequenc-

The bill did draw support from a wide range of environmental and grassroots groups and some public officials. In all, more than 200 people testified over nine hours.

The fiscal note for the bill estimated a loss to the state of \$305 million in revenue annually by 2035, primarily in severance taxes and lease funds. Those taxes make up a significant portion of local funding for schools, fire districts and other services.


