# Man fatally stabbed in Fort Garland



Woman in custody, charged with murder

FORT GARLAND — A 52-yearold man was fatally stabbed in Fort

Garland on Sunday, leading to the arrest of a woman by deputies with the Costilla County Sheriff's Office

According to Costilla County Sheriff Danny Sanchez, a 911 call came in at about 4:15 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, with the caller stating that a woman had stabbed a man.

CCSO deputies responded to a residence in Fort Garland where they found a man, later identified as Jeffrey Segura, 52, in a car, the victim of an apparent stabbing.

Segura was declared deceased on the scene.

Deputies took a female suspect, identified as Jessica Medina, 49, into custody for her alleged involvement in the incident and transported her to the CCSO jail where she was in custody until scheduled to appear in court for a hearing on advisement Monday afternoon.

Judge Jason Kelly, who presided in the hearing, said Medina is facing a charge of murder in the first degree

## 2024 Colorado Byways awards presented at symposium

The first award, for Protection, was given to Keep It Colorado, for their outstanding stewardship of statewide resources. Their efforts included releasing "Conserving Colorado: A 10-year Roadmap for the Future of Private Land Conservation," a statewide plan to help prioritize preservation efforts. Keep It Colorado focuses on five areas,

Fourorganizationshavebeenrecognized health and sustainability solutions, vehicle owners. coalition-building, and advancing a conservation culture.

Colorado Electric Byways, a collaboration between the Colorado Energy Office, Colorado Department of Transportation, and Colorado Tourism Office, received the Partnership award. These agencies collaborated to engage communities along the Byways to apply for grants to install Electric Vehicle Charging Stations. Once a Byway corridor has met specific guidelines, the team then recommends the Byway be approved by the Byways Commission to be a designated Colorado Electric Byway. Colorado has 17

Multiple agencies responded to the call, including the Costilla County Fire Department, Alamosa Fire Department, Colorado Division of Fire Prevention and Control plus three fire stations from New Mexico, including Amilia, Cerro and Cuesta Fire Departments.

Sanchez stated that the fire started in the house and then spread to the church, destroying both buildings. The structures were occupied at the time the fire broke out, with an "elderly lady and an adult male" in the house and "an adult male" in the church.

ternoon along with the house, located in time, and no one sustained any injuries. Within just a few hours, the Red Cross was providing services to those who were impacted.

When the Valley Courier reached Sheriff Sanchez at about 5 p.m. Wednesday evening, he reported that several of the fire departments were still on the scene, and the fire was under control but still smoldering. The fire's cause is not known yet.

The church, located at 10516 County Road 21 in San Pablo, is on the south side of Culebra Creek and, according to a real estate listing, was built in 1897. Sanchez could not confirm the age of the building or if it was recognized as a historic site but said it looked "very old."

"I was there when it came down and you could see the adobe bricks," he said. "It was very sad."

# Haven't had a bath in 40 years

This past week has been a whirlwind of activity, par for the course when you are in close proximity to Miss Trixie. Those of you who know her at all understand her constant movement.

Ol' Dutch has almost gotten used to the beehive of her lifestyle and even though it drives me to distraction some days, at least there won't be any moss growing on her north side from lack of movement, which is a

Living in an RV has its challenges and Miss Trixie and I have somehow managed to live together for 12 years in just such accommodations without one of us losing our ever-loving mind. And that is a miracle in and of itself for anyone in such close proximity to another human being.

I think the biggest challenge is the almost constant repairs that the big Conestoga requires. I have lived in houses down through the years and of course there are repairs that have to be made there but not like the amount that occurs in an RV.

Just this past week we had just such an event as we came home from a nice evening drive to find water pouring out of the sidewall like Niagra at peak flow. Trixie's cousin Susie Q and her husband Dartman, who are staying next to us in the park, quickly shut the water off and Ol' Dutch let out a low, sad moan as I knew what lay ahead.

Faced with the prospect of no water overnight which also meant no showers, Ol' Dutch began the tedious process of finding the leak and fixing it. Luckily, it was just a loose connection under the sink, and I was able to get us back in business without too

Remembering other times when we had no water due to boondocking or a leak, we've actually taken showers with a gallon jug of water. Although it sounds impossible, you can actually get by with a lot less water than we normally use.

In Miss Trixie's mountaineering days, her baths consisted of a thimble of boiled snow and some disinfectant gel. And you wonder why she never

There was a comedy sketch one time on TV where a grizzled old prospector's only line was "I haven't had a bath in 40 years." He kept repeating this line to which the reply from anyone he met was "I know."

There is even a world record for the amount of time someone has gone unbathed and as far as I can tell that record is somewhere north of 60 years. odiferous record.

## Wyoming road failure reveals a housing crisis

Jackson, Wyo's, bedroom communities. Every day roughly 3,400 Idaho residents drive over Teton Pass to work in Jackson. Only about 11,000 of us live on this side of the pass -2,000in Victor — so commuters make up a significant portion of our population.

Commuters include nurses, teachers, police, waiters, cooks, motel housekeepers, construction workers, landscapers, fishing and mountain guides, and salespeople. All are Jackson Hole's economic lifeline.

On June 8, the highway over Teton Pass failed catastrophically, part of it collapsing into an impassable cliff of rubble. The failure made national news, and now you can spend hours on Facebook reading everyone's opinions about what should be done. Calls for building a tunnel through the mountain are resurfacing, although the tunnel that was previously proposed would not have bypassed the section of road that failed.

The Teton Pass highway is vital to Jackson's functioning as a tourist mecca. In good conditions, driving the 24 miles from Victor to Jackson over

Teton Pass takes about 35 minutes. Now, a detourmeansthatworkers haveto drive roughly 85 miles to get to their jobs, adding about two hours to the daily commute.

Jackson town councilor and economist Jonathan Schechter estimates the road closure is costing the local economy roughly \$600,000

a day, and he says that's a conservative figure. Using IRS numbers for mileage reimbursement, the cost for drivers is \$88 a day, while the mean hourly wage in Jackson is \$40. Not only has the commute become nearly four times longer, but workers also have to put in an extra two hours to cover the cost of that drive time.

Jackson residents have responded to the crisis with compassion and financial aid. Homeowners have opened their houses in Jackson, and many are allowing people to pitch tents in their

yards. Businesses are offering parking lot space for RVs. Teton County, Wyoming, eased its temporary shelter regulations, and the daily commuter bus altered its schedule and waived its fees until June 30 to accommodate riders. The Teton Valley Community Foundation set up a fund that accepts donations for affected workers. I am sure there are many other services and resources as well.

But camping in Jackson means you aren't going home after work. It means you may not see your children, partner or friends for days on end. It means you need to get someone to feed your dog or check in on your cat, horses, gardens or plants. It means you cannot enjoy the natural world — why most of us

livehere—because you're driving a car. Most of us have a love-hate relationship with Teton Pass. There's an Instagram page called Teton Passholes, dedicated to showing people doing

stupid things on the road. Most of the time it's video clips of truckers ignoring the winter trailer ban; sometimes it's pictures of people driving recklessly. We snarl and complain, but we still drive the road because it gets us where we need to go.

The average list price for a singlefamily home in Jackson reached \$7.6

million at the end of 2022, according to the Jackson Hole Report. In the first months of 2024, 56 homes were on the market, with only three listed for less

than \$2 million. In Victor, Idaho, the median price for homes was \$537,000, an asking price that's not reasonable for most working people. Housing is in short supply in

For years, affordable housing has been a hot-button topic on both sides of the pass, as well as an hour south of Jackson in booming Star Valley. Now that the funnel that allows Jackson to prosper has been blocked, we can see more clearly than ever that our current model — housing the rich in one town, workers in another — is not sustainable.

Wyoming Department of Transportation has indicated that it hopes to open a temporary bypass around the landslide in as little as two weeks. A long-term solution will undoubtedly take months, if not years.

In the meantime, I hope our community leaders take this as a wake-up call and address the absolute need for workforcehousing. A temporary patch will not address the crisis that this road failure has dramatized.

The program includes instrumental arrangements of "Stormy Weather," the 1933 torch song written by Harold Arlen and Ted Koehl; "Stardust" by Parish and Carmichael, and "Milonga del Trovador" by Astor Piazzolla and

Sarah Off, who comes from a musical family in Del Norte, completed her doctoral studies in music at Arizona State University with a thesis on "Building Musical Communities in Rural Areas." She currently teaches violin and music at University of Northern Colorado in Greely and has established herself as an innovative and passionate performer both as a soloist and chamber musician in the United States and abroad. Her performances abroad include the International Kondo Festival, which showcased the work of Japanese composer Kohei Kondo; Iceland's Harpa International Music Festival; and the world premiere of Dylan Fixmer's Concerto for Violin in London in September 2022. 

# Free seed packets available for pickup across Colorado

**DENVER** — Generation Wild, a movement from Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO) that seeks to reconnect kids with nature, is calling on Colorado's kids to help Save the Bees

Generation Wild is distributing over 100,000 free packets of "Wilderflower" seeds — a nod to Generation Wild's friendly spokescreature, Wilder — and is encouraging kids and families to plant the seeds in their backyards. Wilderflower packets are now available for pickup at local libraries and more partner locations across the state.

This initiative aims to make our state more beautiful, more ecologically diverse and more friendly to pollinator friends — all while rewilding Colorado's kids.

"The Western Bumblebee population has declined in Colorado by 72% (CBS News), and we're calling on kids across Colorado to Bee the Change!," said GOCO Executive Director Jackie Miller. "Through this effort, kids will be empowered to improve the environment and learn firsthand what helps our local ecosystems thrive. Most importantly, they'll be outside engaging with nature in a fun and personal way— and Generation Wild knows that 'Kids Grow Better

The Wilderflower mix was developed in partnership with Applewood Seed Co. and packets are now available for pickup at local libraries and designated partner sites including more than 80 Little Free Library boxes.

By distributing 100,000 Wilderflower packets, Generation Wild is providing more than 56 million seeds for planting in every nook and cranny of the state. All seeds are regionally-native to Colorado, which is important for sustaining the living landscape of bees, birds and other

Additionally, Wilderflowers use less water than non-native plants. This is especially important as we strive to conserve Colorado's precious water


"Applewood Seed Co. was excited to jump in and help Generation Wild identify a seed mix that is native to the Colorado region and the American West, containing a diversity of flower species to attract and support Colorado's pollinator populations," stated Norm Poppe, CEO of Applewood Seed Co. "We hope efforts like this continue to educate the public on pollinator conservation and the need to protect our native bees and

According to a new report from the Colorado Department of Natural Resources, 20% of Colorado's bumblebees are now at risk of extinction. Even in a small area like a backyard, planting Wilderflowers can make a positive impact on the local ecosystem and provide native bees a healthy place to live.

Wilderflowers are native Colorado wildflowers, which means they have adapted to our climate and soil, and don't need pesticides to survive. (Pesticides are another key cause of the decline in bee populations.)

With this initiative, Generation Wild is introducing the Bee Team, which will join Wilder out in the community this summer at various events for kids and families. Kids can join the Bee Team movement simply by spreading Wilderflowers in their own backyards and in public areas with approval.

## Freedom from Struggle

I've been asked, "Joyce, how do you live the Christian life?" My answer live the Christian life?" My answer surprises a lot of people. I tell them, "You can't live the Christian life." I then say, 'Only God can live it through you!'

Years ago, when I first started reading the Bible and getting serious about God, I began seeing all of the things I needed to change—there were so many! I needed to clean up my mind and my mouth; I had to overcome being so negative and judgmental, and my behavior toward my husband Dave also had to improve.

I immediately went to work trying to do it myself. However, I ended up very frustrated and made little progress. Why? Because I was spending all of my own energy trying to something only God can do!

Maybe you're in the same place. You want to break a bad habit or change your behavior in some way, but you are frustrated and discouraged by a lack of progress. Here's the good news: God never intended for you to do it alone. In fact, there's nothing worse than trying to fix something only God can fix!

So, what is our part? Our part is to study God's Word, especially in the areas where we have a weakness, and spend as much time with the Lord as we canwhether it's talking to Him in prayer or even just sitting quietly in His presence.

As we do, the Bible says we will

change into His image "from glory to glory" (2 Corinthians 3:18). Our part is to diligently and humbly seek the Lord and receive His grace, which is the power of the Holy Spirit to change us and meet our every need.

The Apostle Paul discusses this very thing in Romans Chapter 7. Paul, who wrote a large part of the New Testament and is widely regarded as one of the great

men of the early Church, realized he

could do nothing without God's help. He says, "I do not practice or accomplish what I wish, but I do the very thing that I loathe [which my moral instinct condemns].... I can will what is right, but I cannot perform it. [I have the intention and urge to do what is right, but no power to carry it out]" (Romans 7:15,18 AMPC).

Does this sound familiar? Have you ever intended to do the right thing but still struggled and couldn't make it happen regardless of how hard you tried? Paul was going through the very same thing, and he provides us with the answer in verses 24 and 25:

"Who will release and deliver me from [the shackles of] this body of death? O thank God! [He will!]'

Paul is saying we can't do it on our own. However, God will do it through us if we let Him.

This same principle applies to our relationships with other people—we can't change them! The greatest thing we can do is pray for others, love them, and allow God to change them Himself.

When my children were young, I was certain that a couple of them would never make it on their own. My daughter Laura was extremely messy unorganized, and couldn't keep track of anything. My youngest son, Daniel, struggled his way through school, and I was convinced I would be taking care of him the rest of my life.

I spent so much time worrying and pestering and trying to change them on my own. Most of the time my efforts only seemed to make things worse! Yes, I needed to be a good mother and help them in every way I could. However, instead of worrying, struggling, and making us all miserable, I could have been praying, trusting God, and choosing to believe everything would work out well in the end.

You see, whether it's ourselves or someone else, the Lord wants us to seek His help, then rest in the knowledge that He is on the case. God doesn't want us to struggle; He wants us to believe. He



wants us to relax and enjoy our lives even

while we're waiting to see things change. Today, my daughter Laura is so organized that one of her jobs is to help keep my life organized! And Daniel? The boy who barely made it through school is now the CÉO of U.S. Operations for Joyce Meyer Ministries, and he does a fantastic job! Now I look back and realize how much time and effort I wasted worrying and struggling when God had things under control all

So, what are you struggling with today? Your behavior, your finances, your kids, or maybe other people? Here's the best advice I can give you. You can't

Run to God for help, receive His grace, then make a firm decision to relax and enjoy your life while you trust Him to change things. As you do, you will find freedom from struggling...and discover a new level of God's peace and joy in the

This includes the Adams State Promise, free tuition, and fees for up to four years for qualifying students, and the Grizzly Partner Scholarship for San Luis Valley high school graduates, \$2,200 for room and board; or \$300 a year for SLV students who commute to campus.

MOSCA — Agriculture and farm lovers, are you looking for something fun and exciting to do this summer? Valley Roots Food hub has you covered.

Valley Roots Food Hub will be hosting exciting San Luis Valley Farm Tours that will begin in June and go through September. Tickets for the tours are available online for \$35 each and include lunch and transportation to the farms.

There will be three different areas where the tours will take place. June tours will take place in the west part of the Valley. July tours will take place in the south part of the Valley. September tours will take place in the north part of the Valley.

The first set of tours will take place on June 22, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Farms that Colorado Fresh Farms, and Three Guys Farm in Monte Vista.

The second set of tours will take place on July 27 from 9 a.m., to 5 p.m. Current farms that are scheduled for that day are White Rock Specialties in Mosca, Rio Grande Farm Park in Alamosa, and Elevation Farm and Orchards in Alamosa.

The third set of tours will take place on Sept. 21, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Current tours schedule for that day are to Jones Farms Organics in Hooper, San Juan Ranch in Saguache County, and Alpine Valley Mushrooms in Saguache.

More farms may be added to each

Nick Chambers spoke about the Valley Roots Food Hub, "Valley Roots

Bar Goat and Dairy Farm in Del Norte, have over a hundred producers in our producebefore it is harvested. Chambers network statewide, and that's across produce, meat, dairy, and value added. You know we run online markets, where customers place orders. We are a project of the nonprofit in Alamosa called the San Luis Valley Local Food Coalition. We operate in Mosca, and we operate out of White Rock Specialties, which is a potato and quinoa plant. We are all about just small, medium, and large-scale Colorado local foods. We essentially aggregate all the products from those hundred producers that we have in our network. We put them all together for buyers to see. Buyers will get one invoice representing over 100 producers. This is again across, meat, dairy, produce, and value added, all those categories."

explained that this gives farmers fresh numbers to know exactly how much to harvest.

"When the food is harvested, it is picked up and aggregated in our warehouse in Mosca, and then it has a very quick turnaround time to our customers, since it's already sold, of about 24 to 36 hours from warehouse to customer establishments," he said.

Chambers said that the customers in network include, grocers, restaurants, buying clubs, hospitals, dude ranches, dude trucks, caterers, and wholesalers. Chambers also said there is a CSA market specifically for people who like shopping from home.

"We do home deliveries for them. We Chambers said they operate on a also have a bunch of pick-up locations in

up their goods once per week," he said.

Chambers said that for as many stakeholders and moving parts as Valley Roots has, they are mission driven as well.

"We come out of the pioneers for organic food, are some of the founders of our board. We really want to promote soil health and growing food. We really wanted to bring that to the forefront of consumers' buying choices. We really try to encourage the development of the economy and community. It really starts with the buying choices that all our community members have. We really want to be the ones that people buy from. We also know that if we keep the buying local, that's how we create wealth and abundance in our community," he said.
