Fire departments respond to hay trailer ablaze

VALLEY – Alamosa and Monte Vista firefighters both responded to a goose-neck trailer of alfalfa hay on fire about 7:30 p.m. Sunday at the intersection of the 10 South (Waverly Road) and Alamosa-Rio Grande County line.

Alamosa Fire Department Capt. Zach Cerny said the trailer and load of hay were a total loss. The truck towing the trailer was unhitched and unharmed. Firefighters were on scene for about three hours, but the cause of the fire is unknown.

Cerny said both departments responded with seven personnel each, Alamosa with four fire trucks and Monte Vista three.

Alamosa also responded to two fireworks-caused fires on Independence Day, Cerny said, one at the public display at the fairgrounds and another at a personal residence.

CENTER – In a ceremony that was held on June 25, at a Center Board of Trustee meeting, beloved recently retired United States Postmaster Paul Arellano received a plaque and was thanked by the town for his years of dedicated service.

Town Trustee Bill Mc-Clure handed the plaque to Arellano and read the plaque as he handed it to

read, "Postmaster for Center Colorado. Service from 1995-2024. The Mail Goes On." With emotion filled eyes, Arellano shook Mc-Clure's hand and thanked him, while posing for a picture with his plaque. Arellano began his ca-

reer in the Postal Service after being a real estate agent, and a carpenter for 10 years. Arellano was looking for something that would provide more for his family, and something that he might do until he was ready to retire.

"I was looking to try to get into the Post Office. I got hired in 1990 and began working at the Post Office in Alamosa. I worked all shifts because they ran 24 hours. I worked there for 5 years before I decided to apply for a job in Center at that Post Office," he said.

Arellano's daughter, Analisa, said that she recalled when her dad was working night shifts, because she was little, and she remembered her mom watching her brother and some other kids in the day and always telling them to be quiet because their dad was sleeping.

"Looking back on that, I know that we were noisy ioved having dinner with our dad though, that was about the time he would get up, was around dinnertime. We had a few hours with dad and then he would go to work. I look back now, and I am so proud of my father for being such a hard worker, even though I was such a noisy little kid," she

said with a smile. Arellano said that although he enjoyed his job at the Alamosa Post Office, his reason for applying to the Center Post Office was to see if there was a way to advance in his position, as the Center office was smaller.

"I felt like I might have a better chance of moving up in a smaller office. Being in Center, I also had the opportunity to be able to work in different offices. I worked in Saguache, Moffat, Crestone, Manassa, and Hooper," Arellano said, adding that the offices had that interconnection, and he was able to go where he was needed.

For a time, Arellano was also the Postmaster in Hooper.

Center though. I was also hired to be the interim Postmaster in Crestone for a while. I thought I might just stay in Crestone when the position for Postmaster came up in Center. Since I already knew the office because I had been in and out of there I went to Center. James Sanchez was the Postmaster at the time, and he was retiring. He encouraged me a lot through the process. I applied for the job, and I was able to take over the office, when he retired.

Arellano said he can recall when he first got started that they didn't have computers and that everything was done with paper.

"There were reports due, and they were all through the mail. We didn't have computers. Then computers came in and point of service systems came in. I moved up from paper to technology," he said.

Arellano said that after taking over the office he worked hard.

"I wanted to maintain the service that we had provided to that point. I wanted to make sure that we were providing excellent service, and that's what we did. My responsibility was to make sure that the office was running according to postal standards, and that everything that was required of that office was done daily. My job was to make sure ary is in care of arrange- little kids. We always en- that all the packages, the flats, the letters, arrived where they were supposed to," he said.

Arellano said that there were times he would get calls from other Post Offices, and calls from people about their packages and he always did his best to find out where the packages had gone and to get them where they needed to

"Sometimes a package would go to Texas or somewhere else, things like that just happen, but I was always helpful. I had my phone on me for work, day, and night, even when I wasn't at work, I was willing to help everyone. My employees knew they could depend on me and knew I could depend on them," he said.

Arellano said that throughout his years as a Postmaster he enjoyed the support that was given to him, and he enjoyed giving support to everyone. He said the people he worked with were more like family members than coworkers.

"We all worked hard together. They were dedicated and worked so hard.

I was still in and out of We always got the job done together," he said.

> Arellano's wife, Peggy, said that when she thinks of how hard her husband has worked the thing, she is most proud of in his work was his commitment to his job and to people.

"He was always working even here at home, if anyone needed him, he was available for anything that they needed. He's a hard worker. He made his family proud," Peggy said.

Arellano is excited about his retirement and looking forward to traveling with his wife. Arellano said that he will miss his job but what he will miss most is the people. "I will miss the people

that I worked with. I will miss the people that I helped," Arellano said with tear-filled eyes. "You know every morning that I drove to work I prayed for that office. I prayed for the town. I think that what happens when you do that is you become a part of that community and you take ownership for that office, and you always want to do the best that you can do for everyone. It wasn't an easy job, but I loved it. Although I live in Alamosa, the community of Center will al-

ways be a part of me." Center Post Office employee Martha Medina said that Arellano was really going to be missed.

"He made so many con-

tributions to Center, not just as the Postmaster but also being who he was. He was always smiling, always helpful, he put his whole heart into his job and everything he did. We are happy for him, but he will be dearly missed," Medina

Community meeting on 8-foot fence on La Sierra

SAN LUIS - In connection with a visit from Colorado Attorney General Phil Weiser, the La Sierra Environmental Guardians Committee and the Land Rights Council will be hosting a community meeting at 2 p.m. on Wednesday, July 10, at the Centennial School

Weiser will be visiting San Luis, the oldest town in Colorado and home to the historic Sangre de Cristo Land Grant. The Attorney General is interested in hearing from the community regarding the impact the construction of the 8-foot-high fence on La Sierra has had on the watershed, erosion, wildlife, hunting, and community happiness and comfort.

According to a press release from the La Sierra **Environmental Guardians Committee and the** Land Rights Council, a dramatic increase in streamflow caused by bulldozed fence line has uprooted trees, eroded land, damaged habitats and created sediment fields. The fence pictured also significantly impedes and restricts wildlife movement.

Biden tells congressional Dems he is staying in the race

pledged Monday to stay in his race for reelection, even after a weekend in which a growing number of Democrats asked for him to withdraw and a key U.S. House Republican called for an investigation into the president's doctor.

In a letter to congressional Democrats, Biden argued that the calls for him to drop out of the presidential race — with just 119 days until Election Day ignored the results of Democratic primaries and caucuses that he handily won and said he remained the best candidate to defeat former President Donald Trump.

The two-page letter ended with a call for party unity and an end to the public back-and-forth among Democrats over whether Biden should leave the race, after a June 27 debate performance that shook some high-ranking Democrats' confidence in his ability to overcome his polling deficit against

"The question of how to move forward has been well-aired for over a week now," Biden wrote. "And it's time for it to end. We have one job. And that is to beat Donald Trump."

Congress returns Monday from a weeklong July Fourth recess after several days in which members of both parties continued to press the issue of Biden's fitness for office.

Republicans also began pressing for more details. House Oversight and Ac-

Other accounts reported more members on the call, including Susan Wild of Pennsylvania and Jim Himes of Connecticut, also opposed Biden's continued candidacy. Wild later told the Pennsylvania Capital-Star she expressed concerns about Biden's electability.

In an impromptu call in to the MSNBC show "Morning Joe" on Monday, Biden insisted again he was staying in the race and called for any opponents he had to "challenge" him at the party's convention The White House did in Chicago next month.







DEAR SMOTHERED: Your in-laws can have a relationship with anyone they wish. You cannot control who sends them texts, photos and gifts, particularly if they enjoy them. You may feel your sister has no place in their

lives, but unless they agree,

you are out of luck. Of course, your feelings are your feelings and, from what you have written about your sister's past treatment of you, you're entitled to them. But to allow her to take up any more space in your head than you already have is counterproductive.

Talk with a therapist about this, if necessary, to help you quit obsessing about her. The problem isn't her -- it is how you continue to react to her.

involved. Is there a right way to revive our constant flow of letters and emails, like in the old days? The letters are respectful, and we write about a wide variety of top-




