#### **Creede office closes** for winter

**DEL NORTE** — The Divide Ranger District of the Rio Grande National Forest announced Aug. 20 the immediate closing of its Creede office. The early closure is needed to prepare for renovations that will begin in the coming weeks.

"We had a fantastic year at the Creede office, highlighted by valuable engagements with both visitors and locals alike," said Divide District Ranger Patrick Moran. "Our planned renovations will begin soon, and it would not be prudent to keep our doors open to the public while the work is being implemented. We look forward to next spring when we can resume our information services and education programs."

Improvements to the office will include window replacements, electrical upgrades, exterior painting and repairs, and other improvements.

To obtain firewood permits, woodcutters will now need to visit the Divide Ranger Station in Del Norte during regular business hours of 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

**DEL NORTE** — The Rio Grande County Museum will be hosting a Heritage Fair on Sept. 21 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. In addition to the fair, the museum will be working with the congregation of the St. Francis of Assisi Church which is in the Seven Mile Plaza south of Del Norte.

For the past several years, parishioners like Ernie Martinez and his wife have worked to raise funding to help save the St. Francis of Assisi Church that is in dire need of repair. The building needs a new roof and patch work done to the outside stucco as well as work to the inside.

According to research provided by History Colorado, the St. Francis of Assisi Mission Church was constructed in 1881. Approximately 30 years had elapsed since Spanish settlers first arrived in the San Luis




Brandt said she has been truly blessed to have worked with so many talented actors and supporting staff over the years.





# A major adventure up Major Creek by a retired major

U.S. Forest Service, Saguache Ranger District

My plan today was to go check out the Major Creek trail in the northern Sangre de Cristo range. Earlier in the week, the Colorado Division of Reclamation, Mining and Safety let our office know that they would be installing safety exclosures to abandoned mines along the trail. The exclosures keep people out of the dangerous mines and allow cave dwelling creatures, such as bats, to access the old shafts. I thought this would be a great opportunity to see how this operation works and would be a useful (and fun) thing to do on my rare day away from the desk.

Unfortunately, my day started out with the usual problems associated with an office in the far reaches of the National Forests. The office printer failed needing some impromptu maintenance. Aweeklong preparation for horsemanship training came to a quick end when one of our new mules took ill and had to be transported to the veterinarian. (She is fine BTW). And numerous administrative details had to be taken care of before I could into the woods.

Now finally at the trailhead, I grabbed a small pack with some water down to the trail. and headed out. The well-groomed trail climbs a short hill and then drops series of switchbacks. As I crested the hill and started the zig-zag route and juniper trees and then zig zags

the reclamation crew as they made their way back to the trailhead. My morning delay at the office caused me to miss the exclosure installation, but we had a very nice discussion about the project and they gave me directions to the site. After the short visit in the shade, we headed our separate ways.

A short distance from the bottom of the switchbacks, I came across the exclosure work. An area was nicely marked with a set of old steel rails the miners used to dump tailings. One of the mine shafts had already collapsed and the crew had sealed off the entrance with rocks and dirt. The second, a gaping hole in the shape of a square that was blasted into the solid rock of the hillside, lay open before me as I ascended a short incline. The mine entrance was still quite visible, but now covered with a steel frame drilled into the rock wall and a heavy-duty cable net that spanned the entire opening. A quick peek through the net revealed places where the mine had already started to collapse within. This was definitely a good place to stay away finally jump in a truck and head out from. Looking up the drainage, it seemed like Major Creek Trail was mostly clear up to timberline where snow was still visible on top of the mountains.

As I headed up the switchbacks, I met a lone hiker walking down the trail in the same spot that I met the reclamation crew. The hiker had come from Salida and planned to dispersed camp along the trail for the evening. After a pleasant visit, we parted and I headed back to the

At the parking area I jumped in the truck and started my way back to Saguache, and my desk. On the way back I had time to reflect on my adventure away from the office. I determined that even though my trip got cut short, it gave this retired major a chance to have a "major" good day few more minutes, snapped a couple on a "major" good trail here on our Rio Grande National Forest.

# Kent Rominger Airport fuel sales up

#### By LYNDSIE FERRELL

**DEL NORTE** — The Kent Rominger Airport in Del Norte has had a successful year, first rolling out the red carpet for their new fueling system and then launching a new program that helps track airport traffic 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Rio Grande County Airport Manager Brian Burrell stated that the Colorado State Aeronautics Division is looking to install this new tracking system in airports around the state and Burrell was the first to volunteer to try the system. "When we heard about the new tracking system called Runaway Stats, I volunteered to allow the system to be installed here."

It wasn't long before data began pouring in from the system, showing Burrell and Rio Grande County Commissioners that the airport was seeing a higher volume of flights per day than they originally believed. "This system captures flights in the area within a 15-mile radius and that fly lower than 4,000 feet above ground level. After the data was collected, we found that we were averaging about 15 flight per 24-hour period, which was exceptionally higher than what we originally anticipated."

Burrell stated that based on the data from the tracking system they estimate that each plane that lands carry about two to three people per plane. "Once you crunch the numbers, that means that we are bringing in roughly 30-40 people per day. Most of those people go into town to utilize services in Del Norte and the surrounding Rio Grande County. That

is a huge success for us."

Other data collected by the system also breaks down transient vs local traffic. "We were also surprised to learn that most of the traffic coming into the airport is coming from out of town. We see more transient flights than we do locals, and that is really great for an airport this size."

Burrell also reported that many of the planes flying into Del Norte are Air Taxi's. Companies like Flex Jet, Net Jet, and Jet Pro are bringing people to the area either as a layover to fuel or to summer homes in the area. "Basically, people buy blocks of flight time and these companies chauffeur them to different locations throughout the world. Having the fuel available has brought more of these companies here."



With the new fuel systems in place, flights that would have had to fuel in Pueblo or other surrounding airports are now coming to Del Norte and the increase in traffic is a welcome sight. "Bringing the fuel in has been a huge benefit to the economy. One thing I think most people don't understand is the medical benefits this also brings. Medical helicopters, Flight for Life and

other medical flights are cutting responsetimes down by at least 30-minutes. That is huge when you're in a medical emergency and are needing special care." In addition to the fuel and tracking

systems, Burrell has also increased marketing at the airport utilizing social media to spread the word and share how wonderful this little mountain airport really is. "We are very fortunate

to have the support of not only the community but the Rio Grande County Commissioners as well. We have a great resource here and we are starting to see its potential."

# **Bond set for Larry** Chavez at \$10 million

ALAMOSA — At the request of the district attorney's office, the court has set bond at \$10 million in the case of Alamosa resident Larry Chavez, 33, who was arrested in connection with the Aug. 1 fatal shooting of Enrique Parra.

According to the clerk at the Alamosa County Combined Court, Chavez has been charged with 18 different counts in the case, including one count of murder in the second degree (Felony 2), seconddegree assault with a deadly weapon (F4), kidnapping (F2), two counts of motor vehicle theft (F4), four counts of felony menacing (F5), theft \$5,000 to \$10,000 (F6), third-degree assault (Misdemeanor 1), criminal mischief (misdemeanor) plus six counts of habitual criminal.

Due to his criminal history, if Chavez is judged by the court to be a habitual criminal in connection with any of those felonies, his sentence will be four times the maximum range of sentencing for each felony he is convicted of committing.

If Chavez is convicted of some but not all the felony counts he is being accused of committing but is deemed by the court in connection with that felony to be a habitual criminal, a sentence of life in prison is a possibility.

As was reported by the Valley Courier, shortly after 6 p.m. in the evening of Thursday, Aug. 1, Alamosa Police Department was dispatched to the 1700 block of State Avenue on the report of a shooting. Upon arriving at the scene, officers found a male victim, later identified as Parra, who had been shot. Life-saving measures were immediately instigated. Parra was transferred to San Luis Valley Regional Medical Center where he was pronounced deceased.

Chavez, identified as a suspect in the shooting, fled the scene, initiating a manhunt with numerous law

Valley assisting along with a drone from Colorado Parks and Wildlife.

Early Friday morning, APD requested assistance of the U.S. Marshals in locating Chavezand, within hours and the help of local law enforcement, Chavez was taken into custody in Santa Fe, N.M.

Chavez appeared in the court of Judge Daniel Walsz on Tuesday morning for a first appearance in the case. If Tuesday was any indication, District Attorney Anne Kelly will be prosecuting the case with James Valencia serving as the

The next time Chavez is scheduled to appear in court is 9:30 a.m. on Sept. 10.

This is the second time that the district attorney's office has been successful in bond being set by the court in the millions of dollars. The first case, where bond was set at \$5 million, was in the case of Henry Corrall, accused of fatally shooting two men and seriously injuring

The Valley Courier reached out to the district attorney's office for a comment on the bond amount set by the court but enforcement agencies in the San Luis did not receive a response by press time.

# Judge Newmyer-Olsen: 'Next time, a plea or resolution in the case'

ALAMOSA — Mari Felix appeared in court earlier this week for yet another hearing in connection with the charge of accessory to a crime, a class 5 felony related to the alleged sexual abuse of a child by her husband, Martin Felix-Lopez.

In mid-July, the last time Felix was in court, it was hoped that Wednesday's hearing would determine if the case was going to trial or a resolution had been reached but, in at that time, Felix's attorney, Michael Martin, explained that the district attorney's office "has brought in an attorney to handle specifically these kinds of cases."

hiring of Assistant District Attorney Wesley Stafford.

He added, "I believe that this will facilitate a probable resolution."

Stafford, who was in court Wednesday with Martin appearing via Webex, told the court he had not yet had time to review the case.

District Judge Crista Newmyer-Olsen agreed to postpone the hearing "one more time", setting the next court date for Sept. 3 at 3:30 p.m. She also made it clear that she expected at that time for "Ms. Felix to either enter a plea of not guilty or for both parties to have reached a resolution in the case."

of her children reported to a school counsellor a history of sexual abuse by Martin Felix-Lopez, Felix's husband.

At that time, Felix was charged with Martin was referring to the recent four felonies for alleged complicity in sexual assault on a child and child abuse. However, in early January of 2023, District Attorney Anne Kelly reduced Felix's charges to a single count of accessory to a crime, a class five felony.

> Mari Felix has been Alamosa County Clerk and Recorder since July of 2022 when she was appointed to the position following the resignation of her predecessor, Nicole Jaramillo. Just a few months later, Felix, who ran unopposed, was elected to office.



# CPW reminds people to remain bear aware this fall as bears become more active

DENVER — Black bears in Colorado are entering hyperphagia and will spend up to 20 hours a day trying to search out and eat as much food as possible as they fatten up for winter. In the coming months, it is critical that people are vigilant and proactive in removing all attractants from outside homes and campsites in order to prevent conflicts and encounters with black bears.

Twenty chicken sandwiches, 10 large orders of French fries, 10 soft drinks and 10 milkshakes is the approximate fast-food order needed to total 20,000 calories. That is how many calories hyperphagia, an increase in feeding activity driven by biological need, drives a hungry black bear to consume every single day as they pack on the pounds to build up their fat reserves to survive the winter.

Over half of bear incident reports in 2023 occurred in the months of August, September and October. And as bears begin this annual quest to prepare for winter and hunt for food, Coloradans may see more bear activity in urban areas.

Reported conflicts with bears most commonly result from attractants such as trash, bird seed, pet food, and barbecue grills. When bears become too comfortable around people, they can destroy property or even become a threat to human safety.

"Research shows that bears prefer natural sources of food. But they will seek out sources of human-provided food if it's available which can become

Northwest Region Senior Wildlife Biologist Brad Banulis. "Preventing bears from relying on human food sources takes a community effort, and it's important that we all take proactive steps to limit human food sources in order to avoid any possible conflicts with bears and bear-proof our homes."

A black bear's natural diet consists of berries, fruits, nuts, plants and grasses that grow naturally in the foothills and forests. When natural sources of food become scarce, a bear's drive to search for food can overcome its fear of humans.

Become Bear Aware

CPW offers a reminder that by taking some simple precautions, you can avoid human/wildlife conflicts and help to keep bears wild. CPW encourages you to share Bear Aware information with your neighbors and communities.

#### **Bear-proofing your home:**

- Keep garbage in a well-secured location. Only put out garbage on the morning of pickup.
- Clean garbage cans regularly to keep them free of food odors: ammonia
- Keep garage doors closed. Do not leave pet food or stock feed outside.
- Use a bear-resistant trash can or dumpster.
- Bird feeders are a major source of bear/human conflicts. Attract birds naturally with flowers and water baths. Do not hang bird feeders from April 15 to Nov. 15.
  - · Don't allow bears to become

- Lock your doors when you're away from home and at night.
- Keep the bottom-floor windows of your house closed when you're not at night. at home.

- When car-camping, secure all food and coolers in a locked vehicle.
- Keep a clean camp, whether you're in a campground or in the backcountry.
- When camping in the backcountry, hang food 100 feet or more from the campsite; don't bring any food into
- Cook food well away from your tent; wash dishes thoroughly.

Protecting your chickens, bees, livestock:

- Keep chickens, bees and livestock in a fully covered enclosure, especially

- Don't store livestock feed outside.

- Hang rags soaked in ammonia and/ or Pine-Sol around the enclosure as a scent deterrent.
