# **Estate** sale benefits local 4-H

MONTE VISTA — An estate sale in Monte Vista the past two weekends has helped raise more than \$4,000 to help the 4-H Foundation in the San Luis Valley.

The foundation and the Colorado State University Extension San Luis Valley Area Office are trying to raise money to fund a second 4-H agent in the SLV for decades.

According to estate sale organizer Ruthie Brown, so far, the sales have yielded \$4,204, but that total was expected to grow as they tally everything. "There are still some very nice items

available, so we can make more, but that is the running total so far," she said.

According to Brown the estate sale items were donated by an area family.

"Larry Garner, spoke to the family, and told them about me, and about the 4-H Foundation. They were looking for a charity to donate to, and they decided that 4-H would be a good fit. There was a lot of stuff donated. We have had good prices on everything, too. Hopefully, we can sell some more, and I can also sell it in my store at the Green Spot, and continue to donate the money from whatever is sold, to the foundation," Brown said.

The Colorado State University Extension SLV Area Office has had a campaign going to raise money for an endowment. Larry Brown, of the CSU Extension Office, explained that an endowment is where an organization receives a money and then invests the money so it can earn interest, and the organization uses the interest for what they are doing without ever touching the base amount of money.

"We have had a campaign going to raise \$3 million," Larry Brown said.

# El Pomar awards \$114,000 to 15 organizations in SLV

COLORADO SPRINGS — Fifteen non-profits and government agencies in the San Luis Valley have been awarded grants from the El Pomar Foundation, totaling \$114,000.

Thirteen of the grants were awarded based on recommendations from El Pomar's San Luis Valley Regional Council, which recommends grants in Alamosa, Conejos, Costilla, Mineral, Rio Grande, and Saguache counties. Council members are regional leaders in the business, nonprofit, and public sectors and provide first-hand information about current needs in their own communities.

The remaining two grants were awarded due to a competitive process. The 13 grant recipients recom-

# Go all-electric—and help change the world

The company I work for recently built a new ticket office at the base of Buttermilk Mountain in Aspen, Colorado. Environmentally, we killed it: argon-gas-filled windows, super-thick insulation and comprehensive air sealing, 100 percent electrification using heat pumps instead of gas boilers. All within budget.

Yet one of the first comments we received was from a famous energy guru: "Nice building. But why do you have a heating system at all?" Or more simply put: "Why didn't you build a perfect building, instead of just a really good one?'

Solving climate change could depend on how we answer that question. My answer: Society needs the Prius of buildings, not the Tesla X.

The green building movement didn't originate only from a desire to protect the environment. It often had elements of the bizarre ego gratification that trumped practicality.

Recall "Earthships" that used old tires and aluminum cans in the walls. Geodesic domes were interesting looking but produced inordinate waste to build. They also leaked. Rudolf Steiner's weirdly wonderful Goetheanum was an all-concrete structure designed to unite "what is spiritual in the human being to what is spiritual in the universe."

Early practitioners such as Steiner, Buckminster Fuller, and Bill Mc-Donough, among others, were often building monuments, whose ultimate goal became the concept of "net zero." Net zero was a building that released no carbon dioxide emissions at all.

Designers achieved that goal by constructing well-sealed, heavily insulated, ter. We need the Lincoln Memorial, properly oriented and controlled buildings but then they did something wasteful. They added solar panels to make up for carbon dioxide emissions from heating with natural gas. The approach zeroed out emissions, but at extraordinary cost that

came in the form of added labor, expense and lost opportunity.

While net zero wasn't a good idea even when most buildings were heated with natural gas, the rapid decarbonization of utility grids - happening almost everywhere — and advances in electrification make the idea downright pointless.

Instead, all you need to build an eventual net zero building is to go allelectric. It won't be net zero today, but it will be net zero when the grid reaches 100% carbon-free power. So, all that really matters is that building codes require 100% electrification.

Yet many communities remain focused on that sexy goal of net zero, and therefore include requirements for solar panels, or "solar ready" wiring. Even apart from the issue of cost, many utilities don't need rooftop solar because they increasingly have access to huge solar arrays, giving them more electricity than they need in peak times.

What utilities really need is energy storage and smart management.

That means home batteries and grid integration that allows utilities to "talk" to buildings and turn off appliances during peak times. The problem is that environmentalists haven't evolved: Just like we can't retire our tie-dyes, we think "green" means rooftop solar

My company's Buttermilk building passes the only test that matters: "If everyone built this kind of structure, would it solve the built environment's portion of the climate problem?" The answer for our building is "yes."

Still, aspirational monuments matthe Empire State Building. But if we're going to solve climate change in buildings, which is about a third of the total problem, new structures will have to reconceive what we consider efficient and beautiful. And it doesn't have to

break the bank.

Electrification, for example, is getting cheaper every year. Years ago, I served on an environmental board for the town of Carbondale in western Colorado. The overwhelming interest there ended dandelion spraying in the town park. But at one point, we worked on a building.

After a long conversation about the technical tricks and feats we could pull off, a Rudolf Steiner disciple named Farmer Jack Reed said: "We should also plant bulbs in the fall so colorful flowers blossom in the spring." "Why?" I asked, stuck in my own technocratic hole. He said: "Because flowers are beautiful and they make people happy."

So, too, are realistic solutions as we adapt to climate change.

According to research provided by History Colorado, the St. Francis of Assisi Mission Church was constructed in 1881. Approximately 30 years had elapsed since Spanish settlers first arrived in the San Luis Valley and established settlements in the area around San Luis, Colo-

In the 1850's, settlers from the southern part of the San Luis Valley arid northern New Mexico also moved into the northern and



western reaches of the San Luis Valley. Anglo settlers soon started to move into the area to pursue their interests in the mining, agriculture, transportation, and commerce, but the settlements in the hills south and east of Del Norte were primarily focused on farming and ranching and strongly centered around the practice of the Catholic faith.

In 1881, travel in the immediate area was accomplished primarily by horse. It was not practical to travel long distances daily for trade or worship. Thus, there were many small Hispano settlements throughout the area. The people lived in relative isolation in closeknit communities. The St. Francis church and cemetery are located

by Juan Pio Valdez in a community known as Plaza de Los Valdezes. Today, it is sometimes called Plaza. In the 1870's and into the early twentieth century, there was also a schoolhouse, and a railroad stop in addition to the church.

In the early days, a small number of priests served the widely dispersed Catholic population. Priests traveled to the various parishes as they were able. By 1895, the Del Norte parish served twelve missions, including St. Francis of Assisi. After the advent of automobile travel, the priest was able to visit on a weekly basis. The 1920's through the 1940's were probably the heyday of the Mission Church of St. Francis of Assisi. The community was closely knit and devout. The large families filled the church to capacity. After the war, people became more willing and able to travel by auto to Del Norte and Monte Vista to attend mass.

The Heritage Fair will also include demonstrations by local artists and herbalists and reenactments by local historians. The St. Francis of Assisi Parish will be cooking in the old style Spanish Horno oven and supplying food for the occasion. It will be an event the entire family can enjoy so come on out, support a wonderful cause and have some fun to kick off Fall in the San Luis Valley!

It's been said that "A journey of a thousand miles begins with one step."

The biggest thief of our dreams is

procrastination. We can think about doing the right thing, plan to do it, and talk about doing it, but nothing changes in our lives until we start consistently doing what we need to do!

For instance, perhaps you are struggling with bad habits that are holding you back. You would like to change, but you're not sure you want to change. Someone once said that said that bad habits are like a comfortable bed; they're easy to get into, but hard to get out of.

But think of it this way: Are you willing to sacrifice and do the more difficult thing now in order to enjoy a life of freedom later

Hebrews 12:11 says, "No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it" (NIV).

The irony is that we are often unwilling to suffer for a short while just to do what needs to be done. Then we end up with continual misery, dread, guilt, and the penalties of having put off something that would have taken a few minutes or a few

In other words, by putting off the pain of doing something hard, we often spend much more time avoiding it than it would take to just do it!

To me, nothing feels better than knowing that I am doing my best, making the best choices I can make, and consistently making progress toward the best life that God has for me.

Being mediocre does not feel good to me, and I doubt that it feels good to you either. You may have gotten used to it and forgotten that there is something better, but this is a wake-up call to arise and be all you can be. The best time to get started is now!

Procrastination is very deceptive. It makes us complacent by telling us that we are going to do the right thing. It justifies inactivity. I once heard a story someone made up to illustrate this point...

Three demons who were graduating from their course on how to deceive people in the world and prevent them from knowing God. Satan was questioning each demon, and he asked each one how he would deceive people.

The first one answered that he would tell people there was no God. Satan answered, "You won't deceive many because most people down deep inside of them do believe God exists even if they have not chosen to follow Him."

The second demon said he would tell people that heaven and hell didn't really exist. Satan said, "You will deceive a few more than your coworker, but you won't

get many souls either."

The third demon said that he would tell people that there was no hurry, and they could put off the decision to follow God until another time. Satan got excited and said loudly, "You will reap many souls for the kingdom of darkness by simply telling them to make the decision later."

I have never forgotten this story even

though I heard it more than 30 years ago.

Procrastination is a thief—it steals our time, our potential, our self-esteem, and our peace of mind. It is like a lullaby that whispers, "Go to sleep—everything will be fine." But everything will not be fine if we put off doing what we need to do. And the task isn't going to get done by itself!

Procrastination is very deceptive, and we can only conquer it by becoming what I call a "now" person. Be aggressive when you know you need to do something. Don't put it off and keep putting it off—just do it! When we put things off, they aggravate

us. We may not even be consciously aware of it, but unfinished projects pressure us.

If you walk through your home and see dishes in the sink, laundry on the floor, trash cans filled to the brim, beds unmade, every countertop piled high with mail that needs to be sorted, I feel certain that it pressures you in some way. You may even get grouchy and start an

argument with someone else in the house just because you feel overwhelmed. When we find fault with someone else it diverts our attention from how we feel about ourselves. Procrastination never makes us feel good.

If the grass needs to be cut, the weeds need to be pulled, the car needs to be washed and the oil needs to be changed, and the garage is a disorganized mess, it pressures you. You can complain about the mess, or you can stop procrastinating and take action one item at a time to bring

order to your home. God is certainly a God of order and Moving Up Higher Joyce



and the Temple are just amazing to me. God made sure that everything was done in the most orderly and best way possible. Chaos makes us feel confused, and God is not the author of confusion, but He's a God of order and peace (1 Corinthians 14:33). I encourage you to form the habit of being

now person—one who does what needs to be done as soon as you can. All truly successful people have this habit. We don't become successful by putting things off!

Again, something can seem so big in our minds, but if we make a decision to just get going and take action, it's amazing how much differently things appear after we make a little progress.

Galatians 6:9 is so encouraging. It says, "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up" (NIV).

Take a few moments right now and ask God to give you the grace to become a now person. Then write down one or two things—even if they are small—that you can do today to get started. Then do them. Little by little, you can defeat procrastination if you refuse to give up.





# History Colorado to engage communities in preserving Valley's past

### By PRISCILLA WAGGONER

**DENVER** — History Colorado has been awarded a \$300,000 grant from the Mellon Foundation to collaborate with residents of the San Luis Valley to develop sustainable, communityled preservation plans that preserve sites of meaning, provide economic and social benefits and increase representation of the Valley on the State and National Registers of Historic

The basis of this project is to create deep, meaningful engagement with local leaders and community organizations in the San Luis Valley to identify 10 sites that are eligible for listing on the State and National

Sites will be considered for research and nomination based upon the benefit their designation will be to the public, including factors like how accessible the site to the community is, what kind of learning opportunities can the site provide and what are the site's relationship and contributions to the local economy and social infrastructure.

"The San Luis Valley was historically both a geo-political and cultural borderlands, in which the combination and collision of Indigenous, Hispano, and Anglo peoples formed a hybrid culture that is like no other in the United States," said Dawn DiPrince, President/CEO of History Colorado and State Historic Preservation Officer.

"Preserving the sites that tell the authentic stories of the Valley and provide collective meaning to its people is critical to recognizing the full breadth of our state's history

before it is lost to time.

"This effort will also provide us an opportunity to invest in the future prosperity of the Valley as historic designations can provide access to funding avenues that can be used to protect sites which define communities," DiPrince said.

While the specifics of how this project will be implemented are still being developed, Luke Perkins, History Colorado's Manager of Communications and Public Relations, told the Valley Courier, "We're planning to hold three major convening events where we will engage with community leaders to identify the sites. We'll also be offering an honorarium for those people who attend."

In addition to providing technical support in researching and nominating sites, this grant funds consultation opportunities with grant-writing and sustainability planning experts who will help locals establish sustainability plans for each of the sites added to the State and National Registers. This consultation will assist locals to develop funding applications that support ongoing maintenance, operation, and/or redevelopment and restoration plans for sites so they both preserve the past and serve the contemporary and future needs of San Luis Valley and its residents.

It's the hope of History Colorado that the preservation support and projects put in place by this grant will continue to pay dividends for the community long after the grant funded effort is completed by empowering locals to lead preservation efforts across the San Luis Valley and provide a model for how preservation can meet the needs of underresourced communities.

It is the organization's hope that community input provided through this project will help remove any undue barriers that restrict marginalized communities

# Mean Moose open season with 28-8 win over Pirates

ALAMOSA — The 2024 high school football season got started on Friday with a San Luis Valley contest between Alamosa and Monte Vista at Adams State University's Rex Field.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Mean Moose kicked it into gear as they scored a 28-8 win over the Pirates.

"It was a good night," said Alamosa coach Drew Sandlin. "We played well in all three phases of the game."

"Our kids competed," said Monte Vista coach Manny Wasinger. "We knew Alamosa was going to be prepared and they're very well-coached. Dyson Woodward was special tonight. He beat us with his feet a lot. (Zane) Zook ran hard. We're going to get better, and I can live with the effort."

The Pirates got the first turnover of the game as Jacob Pacheco intercepted Woodward. However, they went three-and-out and punted.

The Mean Moose finally got on the scoreboard midway through the second quarter as Zook ran into the end zone from six yards out. Ryan Higareda converted the point-after for a 7-0 lead.

Alamosa got one more touchdown before halftime. Woodward put the Mean Moose into scoring position with a 44-yard screen pass to Zook, and then Woodward tossed a 7-yard scoring strike to Brennen Maez. Maez also scored the two-point conversion and the Moose led 15-0 at halftime.

Alamosa scored late in the third quarter with Woodward going to the end zone on a 19-yard run. Higareda again booted the extra point, and the Mean Moose led 22-0.

The Pirates went on a potential scoring drive early in the fourth as they advanced to the Alamosa 6. But Kaden Madrid was pressured and was eventually picked off by Landon Garcia who returned the play 49 yards.

The Mean Moose came up empty but got another turnover later in the period as they recovered a fumble.

This time, Alamosa turned the turnover into points as Woodward scored his second touchdown, this time on an 8-yard run.

The Pirates finally got into the scoring column late in the game as Madrid threw a 49-yard touchdown pass to Alex Marquez. The two also hooked up for the two-point conversion to end the scoring.

Alamosa had 354 yards of total offense with 215 coming on the ground. Woodward led the way with 124 yards on 18 carries, followed by Zook with 85 yards on 16 carries.

Woodward also completed 10 of 14 passes for 139 yards. He threw to eight different receivers with Zook leading the way with two receptions for 58 yards. Kevin Gonzales also had two catches for 19 yards.

Monte Vista accumulated 212 total yards – 107 rushing and 105 passing.

Madrid completed eight of 15 passes for 105 yards. Marquez was the leading receiver with five catches for 79 yards, followed by Azariah Hurtado with two for 18 yards.

Pacheco was t5he Pirates' leader in rushing with 72 yards on 15 carries.

Alamosa (1-0) will play on its home field for the first time this season this coming Friday, Sept. 6, as it will host Banning Lewis Academy.

"They've moved up to Class 2A," Sandlin said. "They were a powerhouse in 1A last year. They were a quarterfinal football team, so we'll have our hands as well."

Monte Vista (0-1) will be on the road again this coming Friday as it will travel to Rye.

"Rye is a perennial playoff team," Wasinger said. "We'll get some film on them this week and get back to work on Monday."

Both games begin at 7 p.m.

# CPW reminds people to remain bear aware this fall as bears become more active



CPW reminds people to be vigilant and proactive in removing all bear attractants from outside homes and campsites as bears search out food to prepare for the winter.

**DENVER** — Black bears in Colorado are entering hyperphagia and will spend up to 20 hours a day trying to search out and eat as much food as possible as they fatten up for winter. In the coming months, it is critical that people are vigilant and proactive in removing all attractants from outside homes and campsites in order to prevent conflicts and encounters with black bears.

Twenty chicken sandwiches, 10 large orders of French fries, 10 soft drinks and 10 milkshakes is the approximate fast-food order needed to total 20,000 calories. That is how many calories hyperphagia, an increase in feeding ac-

tivity driven by biological need, drives can destroy property or even become a hungry black bear to consume every single day as they pack on the pounds to build up their fat reserves to survive

Over half of bear incident reports in 2023 occurred in the months of August, September and October. And as bears begin this annual quest to prepare for winter and hunt for food, Coloradans may see more bear activity in urban

Reported conflicts with bears most commonly result from attractants such as trash, bird seed, pet food, and barbecue grills. When bears become too comfortable around people, they

a threat to human safety.

"Research shows that bears prefer natural sources of food. But they will seek out sources of human-provided food if it's available which can become dangerous to humans," said CPW Northwest Region Senior Wildlife Biologist Brad Banulis. "Preventing bears from relying on human food sources takes a community effort, and it's important that we all take proactive steps to limit human food sources in order to avoid any possible conflicts with bears and bear-proof our homes."



- to Nov. 15. Don't allow bears to become comfortable around your house. If you see one, haze it by yelling at it, throwing things at it and making loud noises to
- Secure compost piles. Bears are attracted to the scent of rotting food.
- Clean the grill after each use, and clean up thoroughly after cookouts.
- If you have fruit trees, don't allow the fruit to rot on the ground.
- Talk to your neighbors and kids about being Bear Aware.

- Lock your doors when you're away from home and at night.
- Keep the bottom-floor windows of your house closed when you're not at home.
- Do not keep food in your vehicle; roll up windows and lock the doors of your vehicles.
- When car-camping, secure all food and coolers in a locked vehicle.
- Keep a clean camp, whether you're in a campground or in the backcountry.
- When camping in the backcountry, hang food 100 feet or more from the campsite; don't bring any food into your tent.
- Cook food well away from your tent; wash dishes thoroughly.
- Protecting your chickens, bees, livestock:
- Keep chickens, bees and livestock • Keep garage doors closed. Do not in a fully covered enclosure, especially at night.
  - Construct electric fencing when
  - Don't store livestock feed outside.
  - Keep enclosures clean to minimize animal odors.
  - Hang rags soaked in ammonia and/ or Pine-Sol around the enclosure as a scent deterrent.

CPW asks all residents and visitors to help save Colorado's bears by being actively bear aware throughout the late summer and fall seasons. Bear conflicts and, unfortunately, bear euthanization is most often traced back to human behavior. It is all of our responsibility to help minimize risks to humans and bears alike by being mindful of our impacts.
