MONTE VISTA — The San Luis Valley Potato Festival is less than a week away. This year's festival will be held on Sept. 7 at Chapman Park in Monte Vista.

Suicide Prevention 5K 'Color Run' is Sept. 13

CENTER — The Center Viking Youth Club will again be hosting a Suicide Prevention 5K Walk/ Run entitled the "Color Run," on Friday, Sept. 13, beginning at 7 a.m. Registration is \$20 per person.

Center Viking Youth Club Director Carmen Pavlovsky spoke about the race and the STARS Program of Center.

"The race will start at the Viking Club. We are doing the race in collaboration with the STARS Program, which stands for students

teaching about relationships and success. The STARS Program puts this annual Suicide Prevention 5K Walk on every year. We do a Color Run; the students get to get all colored up in chalk. The person in charge of STARS is Camille Villa. She is also the crosscountry coach, and her cross-country kids will be doing the 5K, too. We have a suicide coordinator on the campus at the school. Her name is Aspen Paiz. She is available to speak with students about suicide and crisis. We are all working together on 5K run."

Pavlovsky stated that one of the the word 'suicide' to be normal in

biggest goals of the suicide prevention coordinator, and the Viking Club, "is to bring suicide awareness and prevention to the kids, to help children feel comfortable when they need to talk about it. We have Aspen, who can speak with the students if they are having bad thoughts and want to talk about it."

Pavlovsky stated that students do think about suicide, more than anyone realizes.

"Our goal is to help students feel comfortable with the term. We want





Go all-electric—and help change the world

of Buttermilk Mountain in Aspen, Colorado. Environmentally, we killed it: argon-gas-filled windows, superthick insulation and comprehensive air sealing, 100 percent electrification using heat pumps instead of gas boilers. All within budget.

Yet one of the first comments we received was from a famous energy guru: "Nice building. But why do you have a heating system at all?" Or more simply put: "Why didn't you build a perfect building, instead of just a really good one?'

Solving climate change could depend on how we answer that question. My answer: Society needs the Prius of buildings, not the Tesla X.

The green building movement didn't originate only from a desire to protect the environment. It often had elements of the bizarre ego gratification that trumped practicality.

Recall "Earthships" that used old tires and aluminum cans in the walls. Geodesic domes were interesting looking but produced inordinate waste to build. They also leaked. Rudolf Steiner's weirdly wonderful Goetheanum was an all-concrete structure designed to unite "what is spiritual in the human being to what is spiritual in the universe."

Early practitioners such as Steiner, Buckminster Fuller, and Bill McDonough, among others, were often building monuments, whose ultimate goal became the concept of "net zero." Net zero was a building that released no carbon dioxide emissions at all.

The company I work for recently emissions, but at extraordinary cost that built a new ticket office at the base came in the form of added labor, expense and lost opportunity.

While net zero wasn't a good idea even when most buildings were heated with natural gas, the rapid decarbonization of utility grids happening almost everywhere - and advances in electrification make the idea downright pointless.

Instead, all you need to build an eventual net zero building is to go allelectric. It won't be net zero today, but it will be net zero when the grid reaches 100% carbon-free power. So, all that really matters is that building codes require 100% electrification.


Yet many communities remain focused on that sexy goal of net zero, and therefore include requirements for solar panels, or "solar ready" wiring. Even apart from the issue of cost, many utilities don't need rooftop solar because they increasingly have access to huge solar arrays, giving them more electricity than they need in peak times.

What utilities really need is energy storage and smart management.

That means home batteries and grid integration that allows utilities to "talk" to buildings and turn off appliances during peak times. The problem is that environmentalists haven't evolved: Just like we can't retire our tie-dyes, we think 'green" means rooftop solar panels.

My company's Buttermilk building passes the only test that matters: "If everyone built this kind of structure, would it solve the built environment's portion of the climate problem?" The answer for our building is "yes."

Still, aspirational monuments matter.

Electrification, for example, is getting cheaper every year. Years ago, I served on an environmental board for the town of Carbondale in western Colorado. The overwhelming interest there ended dandelion spraying in the town park. But at one point, we worked on a building.

After a long conversation about the technical tricks and feats we could pull off, a Rudolf Steiner disciple named Farmer Jack Reed said: "We should also plant bulbs in the fall so colorful flowers blossom in the spring." "Why?" I asked, stuck in my own technocratic hole. He said: "Because flowers are beautiful and they make people happy."

So, too, are realistic solutions as we adapt to climate change.

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APD seeking public's help in identifying suspect

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
ALAMOSA - The Alamosa Police Department has released an enhanced photo of a person-ofinterest in an armed robbery from March of 2023.

El Pomar awards \$114,000 to 15 organizations in SLV

COLORADOSPRINGS-Fifteen non-profits and government agencies in the San Luis Valley have been awarded grants from the El Pomar Foundation, totaling \$114,000.

Thirteen of the grants were awarded based on recommendations from El Pomar's San Luis Valley Regional Council, which recommends grants in Alamosa, Conejos, Costilla, Mineral, Rio Grande, and Saguache counties. 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History Colorado to engage communities in preserving Valley's past

DENVER — History Colorado has been awarded a \$300,000 grant from the Mellon Foundation to collaborate with residents of the San Luis Valley to develop sustainable, community-led preservation plans that preserve sites of meaning, provide economic and social benefits and increase representation of the Valley on the State and National Registers of Historic Places.

The basis of this project is to create deep, meaningful engagement with local leaders and community organizations in the San Luis Valley to identify 10 sites that are eligible for listing on the State and National Registers.

Sites will be considered for research and nomination based upon the benefit their designation will be to the public, including factors like how accessible the site to the community is, what kind of learning opportunities can the site provide and what are the site's relationship and contributions to the local economy and social infrastructure.

"The San Luis Valley was historically both a geo-political and cultural borderlands, in which the combination and collision of Indigenous, Hispano, and Anglo peoples formed a hybrid culture that is like no other in the United States," said Dawn DiPrince, President/CEO of History Colorado and State Historic Preservation Officer.

"Preserving the sites that tell the authentic stories of the Valley and provide collective meaning to its people is critical to recognizing the full breadth of our state's history before it is lost to time.

"This effort will also provide us an opportunity to invest in the future prosperity of the Valley as historic designations can provide access to funding avenues that can be used to protect sites which define communities," DiPrince said.

While the specifics of how this project will be implemented are still being developed, Luke Perkins, History Colorado's Manager of Communications and Public Relations, told the Valley Courier, "We're planning to hold three major convening events where we will engage with community leaders to identify the sites. We'll also be offering an honorarium for those people who attend."

In addition to providing technical support in researching and nominating sites, this grant funds consultation opportunities with grant-writing and sustainability planning experts who will help locals establish sustainability plans for each of the sites added to the State and National Registers. This consultation will assist locals to develop funding applications that support ongoing maintenance, operation, and/or redevelopment and restoration plans for sites so they both preserve the past and serve the contemporary and future needs of San Luis Valley and its residents.

It's the hope of History Colorado that the preservation support and projects put in place by this grant will continue to pay dividends for the community long after the grant funded effort is completed by empowering locals to lead preservation efforts across the San Luis Valley and provide a model for how preservation can meet the needs of under-resourced communities

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Semi-truck accident causes power outage in Center

CENTER — An accident involving a semi-truck into a power pole on Wednesday afternoon, Aug. 28, caused parts of Center to be without power and internet, according to Facebook posts by the Center Consolidated School District and the San Luis Valley Rural Electric Cooperative.

The accident was at the corner of 4th and Broadway streets near CCSD's preschool at approximately 3 p.m. CCSD reported that no students or staff were injured, but that preschool students of the district were being released at the kindergarten for pickup rather than the usual designated area.

SLV REC announced they were providing "mutual aid" to the town and working to get power restored and that Ciello was working on the internet.

Power and internet services were restored around 6 p.m. according to SLV REC and Ciello, but they also warned residents that they may still experience service interruptions while they made permanent repairs.

Center resident Barbara Ulibarri spoke about the outages and how it was worrisome to be without power.

"I was at work when we heard what happened," she said. "We were without power for a couple of minutes before our generator kicked on, so we had some power to our building. I left work and went home and had no power at home. A neighbor told me that she heard that we might be without power for up to 24 hours. I decided to go to town to purchase something for dinner that wouldn't have to be cooked, and when I got home, the power had been fully restored."

Ulibarri said that power was restored around 5:20 p.m. Ulibarri said she was worried that Center would be without power overnight.

"Thank goodness that didn't happen," she said.

Information about why the accident occurred has not been released.

Starting its sixth year, this program offers a place where participants can work toward their personal fitness goals in a non-judgmental setting while enjoying a support network of fellow cancer survivors. The program also gives Adams State undergraduate and graduate kinesiology students experience in fitness testing and guiding and supporting program participants throughout the exercise program.

DENVER — Black bears in Colorado are entering hyperphagia and will spend up to 20 hours a day trying to search out and eat as much food as possible as they fatten up for winter. In the coming months, it is critical that people are vigilant and proactive in removing all attractants from outside homes and campsites in order to prevent conflicts and encounters with black bears.

Twenty chicken sandwiches, 10 large orders of French fries, 10 soft drinks and 10 milkshakes is the approximate fast-food order needed to total 20,000 calories. That is how many calories hyperphagia, an increase in feeding ac-

tivity driven by biological need, drives can destroy property or even become a hungry black bear to consume every single day as they pack on the pounds to build up their fat reserves to survive the winter.

Over half of bear incident reports in 2023 occurred in the months of August, September and October. And as bears begin this annual quest to prepare for winter and hunt for food, Coloradans may see more bear activity in urban areas.

Reported conflicts with bears most commonly result from attractants such as trash, bird seed, pet food, and barbecue grills. When bears become too comfortable around people, they

a threat to human safety.

"Research shows that bears prefer natural sources of food. But they will seek out sources of human-provided food if it's available which can become dangerous to humans," said CPW Northwest Region Senior Wildlife Biologist Brad Banulis. "Preventing bears from relying on human food sources takes a community effort, and it's important that we all take proactive steps to limit human food sources in order to avoid any possible conflicts with bears and bear-proof our homes."

All cancer survivors ages 18 years or older are welcome regardless of gender, type, or stage of cancer. This fall's research study begins the week of Sept. 2 with appointments for individual fitness testing. There is no cost to the participant, but completing the entire twelve weeks of the study is crucial to ensure accurate results are obtained. The study consists of one week of pretesting followed by 10 weeks of exercise programming, with post-testing to identify changes in fitness and overall health starting the week of Nov. 18. berries, fruits, nuts, plants and grasses that grow naturally in the foothills and forests. When natural sources of food become scarce, a bear's drive to search for food can overcome its fear of humans.

Become Bear Aware

CPW offers a reminder that by taking some simple precautions, you can avoid human/wildlife conflicts and help to keep bears wild. CPW encourages you to share Bear Aware information with your neighbors and communities.

Bear-proofing your home:

• Keep garbage in a well-secured location. Only put out garbage on the morning of pickup.

• Clean garbage cans regularly to keep them free of food odors: ammonia is effective.

leave pet food or stock feed outside.

• Use a bear-resistant trash can or dumpster. • Bird feeders are a major source of

bear/human conflicts. Attract birds naturally with flowers and water baths. Do not hang bird feeders from April 15 to Nov. 15.

• Don't allow bears to become comfortable around your house. If you see one, haze it by yelling at it, throwing things at it and making loud noises to scare it off.

• Secure compost piles. Bears are attracted to the scent of rotting food.

• Clean the grill after each use, and clean up thoroughly after cookouts. • If you have fruit trees, don't allow

the fruit to rot on the ground. • Talk to your neighbors and kids

about being Bear Aware. Cars, traveling and campsites:

 Lock your doors when you're away from home and at night.

• Keep the bottom-floor windows of your house closed when you're not at home.

• Do not keep food in your vehicle; roll up windows and lock the doors of your vehicles.

• When car-camping, secure all food and coolers in a locked vehicle.

• Keep a clean camp, whether you're in a campground or in the backcountry.

 When camping in the backcountry, hang food 100 feet or more from the campsite; don't bring any food into your tent.

· Cook food well away from your tent; wash dishes thoroughly.

Protecting your chickens, bees, livestock:

 Keep chickens, bees and livestock • Keep garage doors closed. Do not in a fully covered enclosure, especially at night.


> • Construct electric fencing when possible.

 Don't store livestock feed outside. Keep enclosures clean to minimize animal odors.

• Hang rags soaked in ammonia and/ or Pine-Sol around the enclosure as a scent deterrent.

CPW asks all residents and visitors to help save Colorado's bears by being actively bear aware throughout the late summer and fall seasons. Bear conflicts and, unfortunately, bear euthanization is most often traced back to human behavior. It is all of our responsibility to help minimize risks to humans and bears alike by being mindful of our impacts.


