# Lawsuit alleges sexual miscues

A former female deputy with the Camden County Sheriff's Department has filed a lawsuit against the CCSD, Sheriff Tony Helms and former Deputy Christopher Twitchel claiming sexual harassment and sex discrimination.

Twitchel is currently Chief of Police with the Buffalo Police Department.

Bethany Bowen, then Bethany Stephens, is alleging a long list of complaints during her tenure with the CCSD between April 2017 and March 2020. She seeks injunctive relief to cease unlawful sex discrimination and retaliation within the department, lost past and future wages, compensatory damages and punitive damages, other monetary expenses incurred as the plaintiff, attorney's fees and other relieve the court may deem equitable.

The lawsuit, with Bowen as plaintiff and Helms and Twitchel as defendants, includes two counts:

Count 1 - sex-based unlawful deprivation of the federally protected rights of Bowen under the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment, by engaging in and/or condoning and not promptly remedying sexual harassment of Bowen and then denying advancement opportunities and forcing her to resign.

Count II - Unlawful deprivation of federally protected rights under the First Amendment after Bowen was retaliated against for engaging in protected speech.

Bowen says in her complaint, filed April 10 in 26th Judicial Circuit Court, that:

•Female deputies were generally treated less favorably than male deputies.

•Between Jan. 1, 2017, and Feb. 25, 2020, at least 13 male deputies were promoted and no females were promoted. During that time,

## Pileup on Highway 5 near SB

Two people were hurt in a three-vehicle accident about 4:29 p.m. April 8 near Highway 5 and Beachwood Drive, according to the Sunrise Beach Police Department.

Taken to Lake Regional Hospital by ambulance was Matthew Robert of Gravois Mills. William Whittaker had injuries but declined treatment at the scene and indicated he would seek treatment later. A third individual, Ryan Rogers of Sunrise Beach was issued a SB municipal citation for careless and imprudent driving causing a crash.

According to the SBPD, Rogers was traveling north on Highway 5 when his Ford Fusion crossed into the southbound lane colliding with a Nissan Titan driven by Mathew Robert of Gravois Mills. After striking the Titan, Rogers' vehicle lost its front driver side tire causing the Fusion to turn sideways in the southbound lane where it was struck in the passenger side by a Dodge Caravan driven by William Whittaker.

Rogers told the officer on the scene that he did not know what had happened, that he had been tired, and had the air conditioner and radio on.

All drivers were wearing

seatbelts.

The SBPD would like to warn drivers of the risk associated with driving while tired. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention about 1 in 25 adult drivers report having fallen asleep while driving in the previous 30 days. More

admit driving while sleep deprived.

What drivers may not realize is how much drowsy driving puts themselves and others at risk. An estimated 6,400 people died annually in crashes involving drowsy driving. Driving while drowsy is similar to driving

under the influence of alcohol, according to the SBPD.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that every year about 100,000 people people driving drowsy are involved in crashes resulting in nearly 800 fatalities and about 50,000 injuries.

- Male employees were generally better compensated than females.
- Twitchel, one of Bowen's

supervisors, made sexual comments to Bowen.

- Bowen was chilled and intimidated by Twitchel's alleged sexual innuendos and behavior
- Twitchel alleged sexually harassed a dispatcher.
- Twitchel resigned after being accused during former Sheriff Dwight Franklin's ad-

ministration of having a sexual relationship with an informant.

- Sheriff Helms, after taking office on Jan. 1, 2017, rehired Twitchel and was given the rank of captain.
- Additional allegations that Twitchel made sexual harassment remarks and innuendoes on several occasions.

wonderful employees throughout the years, there's one in particular that has been her right-hand man. "My employee Dianna Hartung has been working at Clipper for the past 38 years. "Dianna has been a blessing to me for so many years," she reminisced.

## Ameren fuel charge to drop

Union Electric Company, d/b/a Ameren Missouri, has filed a request with the Missouri Public Service Commission to adjust the fuel adjustment clause (FAC) charge on the bills of its electric customers.

As a result of these two filings, the FAC charge for a residential customer using 1,036 kWh (kilowatt-hours) of electricity a month would decrease from approximately \$2.85 a month to approximately \$0.42 a month. The proposed change would take effect on June 1.

Ameren Missouri made two filings. In its first filing (Case No. ER-2022-0262), Ameren Missouri proposes to adjust the FAC charge to reflect changes in

its fuel and purchased power costs, net off-system sales revenues and associated transportation experienced during the four month period of October 2021 through January 2022. The second case is Ameren Missouri's true-up filing (Case No. EO-2022-0263).

Applications to intervene and participate in these cases must be filed no later than April 19 with the Secretary of the Missouri Public Service Commission, P.O. Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102, or by using the Commission's Electronic Filing and Information System (EFIS) at [www.psc.mo.gov](http://www.psc.mo.gov).

# House okays state budget

The members of the Missouri House of Representatives have given their stamp of approval to a \$46.5 billion state operating budget. The state spending plan, which received support from both sides of the aisle, makes a record investment in the state's system of education while also allocating funds to help the state's most vulnerable citizens, pay for road improvements and repairs, invest in water and broadband infrastructure, and bolster the state's reserve fund.

By approving the spending plan for the upcoming fiscal year, lawmakers provided full funding for the state's K-12 foundation formula. In total, House members approved nearly \$10.1 billion in funding for K-12 education, which represents an increase of more than \$2.6 billion in funding when compared to the previous budget. That increase is fueled primarily by an additional \$2.4 billion in federal funding. The plan also works to improve teacher pay by allocating approximately \$37.4 million to revive the Career Ladder program.

Other than the Budget, we sent many bills to the Senate this week. Some of this legislation is described below.

HJR 116 would, upon voter approval, establish a "Missouri Department of the National Guard" charged with providing the state militia, upholding the Constitutional rights and liberties of Missourians, and other defense and security mechanisms as may be required.

HJR 131 would, upon voter ap-

proval, clarify that only citizens of the United States are eligible to vote. The resolution requires that voters cast a single vote for each office or issue. The resolution also requires the use of paper ballots and voting records which are preserved for use in any election audit.

HB 2012 would make it a felony offense to use or donate fetal tissue other than to diagnose anomalies, determine paternity, or for law enforcement purposes. The bill also makes it a felony offense to hoard aborted human remains.

HB 2120 establishes the "Personal Privacy Protection Act", prohibiting public agencies from disclosing or requiring the disclosure of personal information, as defined in the bill.

HB 1472 modifies the statute related to the offense of money laundering. It adds a definition for "cryptocurrency" which is a digital currency in which transactions are verified and records are maintained by a decentralized system using cryptography.

HB 1682 prohibits any county, municipality, or political subdivision from imposing or enforcing a moratorium on eviction proceedings unless specifically authorized by state law.

HB 2697 provides that a person commits the offense of organized retail theft if they commit a series of thefts of retail merchandise on the premise of a merchant or through the use of the internet with the intent to return the merchandise to the merchant for value or resell, trade, or barter the merchandise for value in any manner.

HB 2032 gives the juvenile court exclusive original jurisdiction in proceedings involving a child who has been a victim of sex trafficking or sexual exploitation. Additionally, the bill specifies that a person will not be certified as an adult or adjudicated as a delinquent for the offense of prostitution if the person was under the age of

18 when the offense was committed. HB 1684 establishes the "Missouri Nuclear Clean Power Act", which allows clean base load electric generating plants or facilities rated at 200 megawatts or more that utilize renewable sources to produce energy not in commercial operation as of August 28, 2022, to charge for costs associated with construction work in progress before the facility is operational.

HB 2088 establishes the "Earning Safe Reentry through Work Act of 2021". Under the bill, offenders may earn a credit that is equal to a one-day reduction in a sentence for maintaining eligible employment. Supporters say the bill will help with the current workforce shortage and would incentivize inmates to learn valuable job skills.

# Is the Trump Show over?

Chris Sununu, the Republican governor of New Hampshire, said this at a Washington, D.C. dinner about the last Republican president: "The press often will ask me if I think Donald Trump is crazy. And I'll say it this way: I don't think he's so crazy that you could put him in a mental institution. But I think if he were in one, he ain't getting out."

Sununu later said he was only joking, but he was clearly speaking what my dear wife Cokie would have called "vicious truths." The mere fact that a sitting GOP governor would say such things about Trump reveals a basic fact about politics today. The former president remains the most powerful force in the Republican Party, but his strength is slipping; his flame is flickering.

Trump seems at times like one of those aging stars playing to gray-haired crowds in minor league arenas. He's singing the same songs, his Golden Oldies, but the cheers echo with nostalgia for the past, not excitement for the future.

In a recent NBC poll, only 36% of Republicans described themselves as primarily Trump supporters, while 56% professed loyalty to the party. During the 2020 election, 53% had identified as Trumpists first. In a CBS survey, only 35% of Americans — Trump's hardcore base — wanted him to run for

president again.

"Things feel like they've been shifting," Republican pollster Patrick Ruffini told The New York Times. Trump voters "are looking at alternatives," and while they still feel "a strong attachment" to their hero, they are increasingly open to what Ruffini calls a "next-generation Trump candidate."

Others are betting that Republicans would even consider a non-Trumpist candidate. Maryland's popular moderate governor, Larry Hogan, is already plotting trips to early primary states and telling the Associated Press: "There is a large and growing lane of Republicans and Americans across the political spectrum who are fed up with toxic politics and want to move in a new direction."

There are many factors behind the shift Ruffini discerns, but it starts with a sense of fatigue, a desire to forget the insanity and instability that dominated the Trump years. GOP pollster Kristen Soltis Anderson quotes a Republican voter named Barney who joined a focus group discussing Trump's future. "His show's over," Barney concluded. "We need some new blood at the head of the country and different types of leaders. I mean, this divide among the parties is getting really crazy."

The signs of discontent are sprouting up like spring flowers. During a Trump rally in rural Georgia last month, Greg Bluestein of the Atlanta Journal-Constitution tweeted, "This is the smallest crowd I've seen at a rally of his in Georgia since he won the 2016 election." NPR reporter Stephen Fowler noted that the crowd was "not very enthusiastic" and kept "streaming out," even as Trump was still speaking.

Then there is Truth Social, the new

messaging app Trump created after he got kicked off Twitter and Facebook. Its launch has been marred by technical glitches, the departure of three key executives and waning public interest. "The app, which quickly became Apple's top free app following its launch on the evening of Feb. 20, has since fallen to number 84," reports The Daily Dot.

Sure, Trump retains considerable clout in Republican primaries, but many of his endorsed candidates are faltering. Take Georgia, where Trump is trying to purge Gov. Brian Kemp for committing one unpardonable sin: He told the truth about Trump's defeat in 2020. But Trump's preferred candidate, former senator David Perdue, is trailing Kemp by 10 points, and Republican lawmaker Clint Dixon explained to the Times that Georgia voters "have turned the page on the election."

Trump's rivals are also emboldened by his mounting legal troubles and the growing possibility that he could be charged with several serious crimes before the next election. Federal District Judge David Carter wrote that "it is more likely than not" that Trump obstructed justice on Jan. 6, 2021. And while the judge cannot bring legal action against Trump, the Justice Department can, and its new budget includes \$34 million to hire 80 attorneys to advance that investigation. Other prosecutors, from Atlanta to Albany, are also targeting Trump's legal liabilities.

It's not yet certain that the Trump show is over. He still has a lot of money and fervent support from his base. But as the old rocker belts out his Greatest Hits, the lights and the applause are starting to dim.

Taste. Smell. Touch. Sight. Hearing. All of our senses elicit memories. Elton John's "Benny and The Jets" came on the radio when I was going back to the office with my mid-day 32-ounce Styrofoam cup of Diet Coke. Instantly, like a newly installed light bulb, my mind flipped back 58 years to The Tall Corn Motel in Shenandoah, Iowa.

I was a fledgling reporter at the now-defunct The Evening Sentinel, the daily newspaper in Shenandoah. It was my first job out of college and a gaggle of us 20-something singles routinely headed to the motel's popular watering hole to de-stress.

Among our group were three reporters, three schoolteachers, a just-graduated University of Nebraska quarterback (Van Brownson), and others who escape my sketchy memory. We were young and restless and not bound by the clock, so weekends were usually a blur until work responsibilities wrested us from sleep Monday morning.

My paternal family was from Shenandoah, so that "good elf" on my shoulder kept me from making some serious mistakes. Or at least from getting caught. I do, however, remember one morning getting into my car and realizing I had left the company camera on the floor in the back with the window down after a torrential rain.

A moment of irresponsibility the night before. Camera ruined. The cost of a new one came out of my next week's salary. Lesson learned: Make sure the windows are rolled up; never mind the late nights of partying.

Our Friday night forays into the music of the 60s and 70s embedded us into the staff of the bar. It wasn't long and the waiters and waitresses knew us by name. Sad but true.

Our young ways eventually ebbed into more responsible outings and led me to a job as an editor in Glenwood, Iowa. Another of the reporters took a job in public relations with Creighton University in Omaha, Neb., and later as director of community relations with University of Nebraska Medical Center. The other reporter slipped into PR for a bank in Minnesota.

Life goes on.

It isn't often, but on rare trips to Omaha I pass the exit off Interstate 29 to Glenwood. I don't remember much about my two-year, single-male stint with the newspaper. I do, remember, another important lesson: Don't eat cooked ham that's been in the refrigerator too long.

It was the closest to full-fledged food poisoning I want to come. I avoided the serious impacts of eating bad food. I continue to love ham, but the first smell sends me back — briefly — to being single and alone in a vacant house a long way from home.

As I've gotten older, I've learned to be more appreciative of how my senses shaped my life.

The smell of fried chicken like my mother made on a Sunday afternoons; the sight of tens of thousands of geese following their instincts headed south in the fall along the flyways of the Missouri River bottom; the sounds of Frank Sinatra, or Andy Williams or Dionne Warwick wafting from the oversized speakers in my parents' living room; the taste of freshly prepared morel mushrooms after searching the bluffs near my hometown of Hamburg; or the touch of my mom taking my arm as we walked down the skyways in downtown Des Moines after a dinner at 801 Grand during the annual Iowa Newspaper Association Convention.

I do try to savor the smells, the sights, the sounds, what life lies in front of me daily. As I've told my grandsons, when you look at a tree look beyond the branches — look at the buds, the leaves, the branches, the creativity of the bark, what makes up the tree.

There's more to life than just the tree trunk.

### Young Eagles Flight Rally encourages youth aviation

Local young people ages 8-17 will have a chance to take to the skies on April 23, 2022 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., as Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) Chapter 1254 hosts a Young Eagles Flight Rally at Camdenton Memorial - Lake Regional Airport 20, Airport Dr, Camdenton.

The rally is part of the EAA Young Eagles Program, created to interest young people in aviation. Since the program was launched in 1992, Volunteer EAA pilots have flown more than 2 million young people who reside in more than 90 countries.

"The Flight Rally is more than just free plane rides for kids," explained Christina Williams, mother of Ray Scholarship recipient and 20-year-old private pilot Marie Williams. It's a great way to spark an interest in aviation. The individual relationships which are created between pilots and youth can lead to a lifetime interest in a STEM field. STEM is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics.

Pilots at the event will explain more about their airplanes, allowing young people to discover how airplanes work and how pilots ensure safety is the prime concern before every flight.

In addition to the Certificate the new Young Eagle will be given a Logbook with an access code for a complete free online Flight Training course offered by Sporty's Pilot Shop.

# A guide to the Easter liturgical celebration

Easter is the holiest day of the year for Christians. According to biblical scripture, Jesus Christ is the promised Messiah and Savior to the World. Easter Sunday marks His resurrection from death on the cross, upon which He paid the full penalty for humanity's sins by offering a spotless sacrifice in Himself, established the Christian religion and belief in everlasting life after death.

### The road to Easter

In the weeks leading up to Easter, the faithful participate in a 40-day period of fasting, repentance and spiritual discipline known as Lent. In western Christianity, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. Easter is preceded by Holy Week, which starts with Palm Sunday, the celebration of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, and encompasses Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday.

Services during Lent and Holy Week are special and differ from others in the liturgical year. On Palm Sunday, for example, Roman Catholics and other Christians will take part in the reading of the Passion, which details Judas' betrayal of Jesus Christ, and His crucifixion.

### Easter Vigil

The Easter Vigil is an ancient liturgy celebrated on the night before Easter Sunday. It began as an all-night vigil, but has since been shortened. The Vigil begins with the church shrouded in darkness before a candle is lit from a fire outside the church. The candle represents Jesus Christ, the light of the world. Eventually all the candles in the sanctuary are lit from the Easter can-

dle. Readings focus on God's marvelous plan and span from Genesis to the New Testament.

### The Mass of Easter

(The Resurrection of the Lord)

Easter Sunday Mass is a celebratory time for Christians. Most attend services in their formal clothing and give thanks to Jesus and to bask in the light of His eternal life.

According to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, Easter Sunday features key readings and responses. The First Reading is from Acts 10:34a, 37-43, and speaks of Jesus of Nazareth being anointed with the Holy Spirit. The Second Reading is from Colossians 3:1-4 or Corinthians 5:6B-8, which details following Christ and turning away from sin and

into His Glory. The Gospel that will be read can be one of these four: John 20:1-9, Matthew 28:1-10, Luke 24:13-35, or Mark 16:1-7. These readings each speak to the discovery of Jesus' empty burial tomb and reassure disciples they should not be afraid because He has been raised from the dead in glory.

Depending on the parish, refreshments may follow the Easter mass and there is a fellowship of the community joined together on this holy day. Families then go home to their individual Easter celebrations, often sharing a lamb or ham dinner with family and friends.

Easter Sunday Mass is the penultimate Holy Week celebration in the Christian Church. It is a time of great joy and tradition.

# Explaining Holy Week

Easter is a significant holiday for Christians across the globe. Though Easter Sunday is when faithful Christians gather to celebrate their faith, the week preceding Easter Sunday is full of significant events as well.

Known as Holy Week, the week preceding Easter begins with Palm Sunday and ends with Holy Saturday, the day preceding Easter Sunday. Holy Week commemorates different events that unfolded over the final days of Jesus Christ's life.

• **Palm Sunday:** According to Catholic Online, Palm Sunday celebrates the entry of Jesus Christ into Jerusalem. On the day of Christ's entry into Jerusalem, residents laid palms before him, which is why palms are distributed to the Christian faithful each year during Palm Sunday Mass. Palms are blessed at Mass, and many Christians turn their palms into crosses upon arriving home. The palms are eventually returned to the church, where they are burned, and the ashes of the palms are then used during the following year's Ash Wednesday services.

• **Holy Thursday:** Holy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper, when Jesus celebrated the Passover feast with his disciples. In the story of Jesus Christ, the night of

the Last Supper was the same night that Jesus was betrayed by his disciple, Judas.

• **Good Friday:** Good Friday commemorates the trial, punishment and crucifixion of Christ. Though the official presiding over the trial of Jesus, Pontius Pilate, found no evidence of Jesus's guilt in relation to the charges filed against him, he ultimately agreed to Christ's crucifixion anyway in an effort to appease the crowd and avoid a riot. As a result, Christ was stripped, flogged and crowned

with thorns before being made to carry his cross through the streets to the place where he was ultimately crucified. On Good Friday, the tabernacle inside Catholic churches is left empty to symbolize that Christ is departed.

• **Holy Saturday:** The final day of Holy Week, Holy Saturday is a day to remember that Christ descended into hell, where he preached the gospel and opened the way to heaven for all those who were worthy.

by senior Norman, "Our guys did not disappoint and the pitching performance by Noah Norman was as sharp as he has been all year."

## What Is The Idiots Club's Clothes Program?

*Editor's Note: This is the second of six articles on the work of a local, grassroots charity with an unusual name -- Lake of the Ozarks Idiots Club, also known as the Jesters of Goodwill. The articles are being submitted by Denny and Danna Hiner.*

The Jesters of Goodwill understand how important it is for children to feel like they "fit in". In schools' social structure, how a child dresses has always had an effect on children, both from the way a child is seen by other kids and how they personally see themselves. Children living in poverty just don't have the money to dress like better-off children.

Danna Hiner, co-founder said, "Most of the time, children living in poverty only wear hand-me-down clothes or used clothes from a thrift store. So, new name-brand clothes are all the Idiots Club provides to children in-need. These clothes allow them to feel like they 'fit in' and feel better about themselves."

Here's how the clothes program works. A professional working with a child on their school's Free or Reduced Meal Program identifies their clothing needs with sizes, color and style preferences, and any other clothing likes or dislikes. A request is then emailed to the Idiots Club.

The request is approved by the charity's volunteer Shopper Coor-

ordinator. Then, the request is forwarded to a Shopper Volunteer usually the same day the request email is received. The shopper volunteer has a charity credit card which they use to purchase clothes, shoes and others clothing items.

Danna explained, "When the volunteers have completed shopping for a request, they remove all of the tags from the clothes (returns can only be made through the charity), take a photo of them, and deliver them to the professional who made the request. The pro-

fessional then gives the clothing items to the child."

Denny added, "This entire process usually takes place in 2 or 3 days from when the request is made until the clothing items are delivered and sometimes even the very same day. We are a rapid response team!"

Danna said, "It's amazing the Thank You notes we get from some of the children or the professionals from the children the professionals relay to us. 'I love my new shoes. They make me run so fast!' from a

2nd grader. Or the 4th grade girl who would not leave the counselor's office until she could 'put on an outfit of her new clothes to wear the rest of the school day and then danced around my office,' from to her counselor."

"The Clothes Program represents the biggest share of requests the Idiots Club receives," said Denny. "All clothes are purchased lo-

cally, except for certain sizes and special clothing and shoes which are ordered online."

## Gravois Fire District has duty at Raceway

The Ozarks International Raceway is a new, multi-use racing complex with a 3.87-mile road course that is beginning racing in April. It is located at the junction of Highway 135 and State Road J on the property previously known as 4 J Farms.

The Raceway is within the operational boundaries of the Gravois Fire Protection District and pays taxes to the GFPD for fire protection.

The GFPD is obligated to respond to any calls for service to the facility as it would to any property or visitor to the area consistent with the GFPD Mission and Purpose: "Prevent destructive fires, contain all fires and to extinguish said fire in a manner to minimize damage and loss to the greatest degree possible, to perform emergency rescue, to conduct all operations with the highest regard for the safety of all involved."

The estimated revenue for the GFPD from the Raceway will increase from the \$200 annually prior to the start of construction to an estimated annual payment of \$12,000 and will increase as construction is not yet completed.

The Raceway also is building a public safety building that is necessary for track operations and has expanded the facility to provide bay space and housing for an ambulance and fire ap-

paratus. Some of this space has been offered for use by the GFPD, and has potential to have another firehouse operational and possible future staffing to provide quicker response time to the Highway 135 and surrounding area.

The Raceway has needs above and beyond that of the GFPD's normal course of business. It will require dedicated fire and rescue personnel on the racecourse during an event. The Gravois Fire District and the Ozarks International Raceway have entered into a Contract for Special Service as allowed by Missouri Statutes. This agreement authorizes the GFPD to as-

sist in providing needed fire and rescue services for an event.

This agreement is to provide a quick response vehicle with firefighting and rescue capabilities and the personnel to operate it. The Ozarks International Raceway will compensate the GFPD at an agreed upon rate for any resources provided.

The GFPD will provide the requested resources using off duty and volunteer personnel using second-out or reserve apparatus dependent on availability. This agreement does not obligate the GFPD to provide re-

sources if they are not available.

At no time will on-duty career personnel or first-out structural response or rescue apparatus be used.

The GFPD will not participate in any dedicated opera-

tions at the Raceway that will have a negative effect on its ability to respond to any requests for service to the GFPD. The GFPD anticipates that this new facility will bring additional revenue to the area, provide an exceptions recreational venue

and bring additional guests to the area. The additional visitors should bring additional money to the local businesses through lodging, shopping, food and motor fuel.

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## Recycling, waste collection planned in Sunrise Beach

Miller, Camden and Laclede County residents will have the chance to dispose of furniture, clothing, tires, electronic waste, bulk debris and appliances Saturday, April 30, in Sunrise Beach.

The Lake of the Ozarks Solid Waste Management District is sponsoring a recycling and waste collection event from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. that day at the Woods Supermarket parking lot on Highway 5 in Sunrise Beach.

Items will only be accepted from residents, not commercial businesses.

There is a charge for disposing of tires - \$2 each for the first four, then \$5 per additional tire. No

yard waste, treated lumber or paint will be accepted.

It is noted that paints can be dried with kitty litter or sawdust and thrown out with weekly personal trash.

In addition, a reuse swap area will be available for residents to drop and swap reusable collected items, such as furniture and appliances.

Hazardous waste will not be accepted at the event. Hazardous waste materials may be dropped off at the Lebanon Public Works facility between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. Saturday, April 23 at 1401 W. Commercial Street.
