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




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NEW TO BOATING OR RENTING THIS SUMMER? CREATE LASTING MEMORIES AS YOU EXPLORE THE LAKE.

ake of the Ozarks averages 10 to 12 million visitors per year and a vast majority take to the water for the first time. With so many people heading to the lakes and rivers of Missouri, many are getting behind the helm of their own boats or renting a vessel for the day.

There's a lot to know about driving a boat, and it can be difficult for new captains to know how to navigate safely. Whether you're interested in fishing, water sports, or simply cruising, these tips will get you started and keep you safe while out this summer.

KNOW THE LAW

Before you rent a boat or a PWC, there are a few things you should know. Missouri law requires anyone born after January 1, 1984 to pass a boater safety course and carry a boater education card to operate a motorized vessel. The class can be done online (www.boat-ed.com/missouri). There is no minimum age requirement to take the course

and you do not have to be a resident of Missouri, however, you must be 14 years or older to operate a vessel in Missouri.

All you have to do is study and pass the course. The cost is \$29.50 as well as a state fee of \$17. Once completed, print the online completion document off and you are ready to go boating. It's highly recommended that you don't stop

Boats operate different than cars. There are similarities but major differences and various influences affect the operation and control of the vessel. A short three hour on-the-water class can make the difference in an enjoyable, safe time verses a horrible vacation memory. You can take a class by contacting Ozark Boat Safety Training at 573-216-8141 or by signing up at ozarkboattraining.com.

A class will combine what you learn in the online classes with real-word experience. You'll learn about navigation rules, boater courtesy, fueling, docking, wake, and speed management.

A DAY ON THE LAKE

If you don't own a boat and plan to rent, there are many things you'll need to know to easily get out on the water and enjoy the day. Renting a boat comes with all the fun and much less stress than owning a boat. It is a great way to bring family and friends together, enjoy the summer out on the water, and make memories.

There are many things to consider before you rent a boat but with the proper preparation and by following the following tips, you can have a great rental experience.

1. Plan In Advance


It is wise, especially if you live in a location where boating is seasonal, to make a rental reservation in advance.

Boating season runs through Labor Day weekend at Lake of the Ozarks and summer weekends are very busy for marinas. They may not have any boats available if you plan to just walk in and secure a rental. It is a good idea to make your plans as early in the season as possible. This will ensure that you have a boat to ride when you want it.

2. Get There Early

In addition to making early reservations, make sure to arrive early on the day you booked.

Getting there ahead of time will allow you to get the paperwork and required checklist accomplished. This can be a big deal if you are going out for a day trip and have to be back by a certain time. You will want to make sure you are out on the water as much as possible to get the most out of your money.





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3. Make Check-in Easy

The best way to check-in smoothly is to read any details in the confirmation letter and to know what you need to bring. Most companies will outline any documents you need, when you should arrive, what accessories or other equipment will be included, and other important information.

4. Get The Right Boat For You

When renting a boat, make sure you get the right type of boat. Consider the needs of your party and capacity. You do not want to overcrowd the vessel. If you plan to do water sports, a boat with enough power to pull the equipment will be needed. Pontoons are always a great choice for families wanting a leisurely day on the Lake.

5. Go Over The Boat

Even though your rental boat is not something that you are purchasing and they are often well maintained, you will still want to ensure that the boat is in good working condition.

There is nothing worse than being stranded out in the water due to engine issues. Before you go out, ask if everything is in working order and bring it up with the rental company if you notice any issues.

Most places will do a walk-through of the boat to acclimate the captain and crew. Check the outward appearance of the boat as well. This will allow everyone to take note of what condition the boat is like before you leave. If you do notice anything, make the marina aware of it. Unreported damage ahead of time could mean damage charges for you when you get back, even if you did not cause the damage. Don't forget to look at the condition of the prop!

6. Be Prepared For Weather

Since the reservation is likely being made in advance, it can be hard to predict the weather. Keep an eye on the forecast and prepare for anything that might happen. Watch the weather radar to determine if it's safe to travel. Another consideration to make is what to wear. Bring a backup layer of clothing in case it gets colder, which it typically does in the evening on the Lake. It's better to have and not need than to need and not have.

7. Make A Float Plan

This tip is for every boater. Having a plan and letting someone know that plan is a great way to stay safe.

A float plan should include, departure time, route and stops, expected time of return and who is going out in the boat. That way if something unexpected happens, people will know where to start looking.

Safety is the number one concern any time you are out on the water. Even with the most cautious boat operators, accidents can happen and you want to make sure there is someone on land that is informed of plans.

8. Know What To Pack

If you are going out on your own boat, you will likely know everything that is onboard, but that's not the case with a rental. Some of the things you will want to pack includes all-weather clothing, sunscreen, food, water, a cooler, towels, hats, charger for phone, first aid kit including medications, and sunglasses.

You will also want to pack anything that you plan on doing while out on the water. This can include floaties, fishing supplies or water sport equipment.



9. Know How To Operate Your Vessel

Even if you are not required to take a boating safety course, make sure that you know what you are doing when it comes to navigating your vessel. Be confident that someone in your party is competent in operating a vessel. If you are uncomfortable with any part of the process you should ask the company before going out. Some rental companies will have no problem giving you quick on-the-spot training and instruction.

10. Consider A Captain

If you really do not feel comfortable operating a marine vehicle, are not familiar with the area, or just want to be out on the water stress-free, consider hiring a captain.

This is not always an option but some places and some types of vessels will offer a charter option that will provide a list of qualified captains. Or you can go online and hire a captain. One reliable source is CaptainsMO.com.

This is most often offered with large power yachts, but it's not the only way to get a captain for your vessel. You might even be able to hire an independent operator to help you out on your rented vessel.

This will allow you to still have a tailor-made boating experience without the pressure of having to navigate and control the boat yourself.


11. Know What You Are Signing

More often than not, when you are renting a boat you will have to sign a waiver with the company. Read the document thoroughly before you sign and know what you agree to. This should be something you do every time you sign something.

The standard waiver will make you liable for the boat and the people on board and property damage that is caused by the wake of the boat. This includes any damage to the boat, or any injuries

You will also be required to pay a deposit as well as be responsible for the fuel cost, in addition to an hourly or day rate.

wo years removed from the pandemic I'm often asked, "how is the local and national golf industry doing?" In one word ... solid. Golf has seen two major corrections over the last century. It took a world war to end the first, and a pandemic to end the second. Only time will tell how long this positive trend will continue.

In the 1920s private clubs in the United States were all the rage and a steady increase in the number of affluent clubs opened to meet the demand. In the 60s the middle class started demanding to play as well, so public courses opened at a record pace to meet the need. In the 90s we saw another boom fueled by real estate developments that were anchored around golf. By the mid 2000s, however, there had been a net decline of about 2,200 18-hole equivalent courses, or roughly 13 percent of courses. If you look at those numbers you may wonder how this can be positive for the golf industry. If you look at the big picture, almost 5,000 18-hole courses were added the prior 20 years so a little correction of supply and demand was necessary.

Then came 2020 and the pandemic. In 2020 everyone wanted to be outside and golf was the perfect outlet. An estimated 502 million rounds were played in the United States that year. This was a 14 percent increase over the previous year, or 500,000 more people played golf in 2020 than in 2019. In comparison, in 2006 almost 30 million people played and it bottomed out in 2017/2018 at 23 million. Golf has seen a steady increase since with the biggest spike from 2019 to 2020. Small growth has continued since and indicators suggest an upward trend moving forward.

The evolution of golf alternatives to traditional golf being played on a course has also helped spur the numbers and interest in golf over the last several years. Facilities such as TopGolf, Top Tracer ranges, Big Shots Golf, PopStroke miniature golf, and many other fun, fast non-traditional golf alternatives have brought young adults 18 to 34 into the sport. In particular, female golfers are flocking to these non-traditional avenues as 41 percent of non-traditional golf participation is by females.


According to the National Golf Foundation, 25.6 million people played on a golf course and another 15.5 million participated exclusively in off-course golf activities in 2022. A record number of 3.3 million people played a course for the first time in 2022. The largest customer age segment is between 18 and 34 years old, with 6.2 million on-course participants and another 5.8 million off-course. Since 2019, the net gain in female golfers is 800,000, a 14 percent increase.

Juniors are another huge and growing segment of golfers. In 2022, 3.4 million juniors played on a course — which is the highest level since 2006. Of those, a whopping 37 percent were girls compared to 15 percent in 2000. With those numbers, golf seems to be heading in the right direction for sustainability.


Since the pandemic of 2020 play has significantly increased even with a four percent decrease from the record high in 2021. In 2022, rounds finished 13 percent up over the five-year pre-pandemic average from 2015-20219. In terms of the number of courses in the world, the National Golf Foundation estimates there are about 40,000 courses worldwide, scattered among 209 different countries. Almost 17,000 of those are in the United States with the next closest country being Japan with a mere 3,200 courses. The states with the most "Top 100" ranked courses are California, Florida and Oregon. The one thing these states have in common are the beautiful ocean views.

Locally the Lake has seen sustained growth similar to the entire country. The years 2020 and 2021 saw record round totals and we even experienced an increase of eight percent in 2022 over 2021 for an estimated 300,000 total rounds being played at Lake area courses. Local residents, season pass holders, visitors and club members have all seen the changes in the landscape. Increased play and inventory of tee times being limited on certain days have effected how players have begun to schedule their tee times. They have also had to become a little more patient as play increases, sometimes that three-and-a-half hour round of golf turns into four

For those of us in the industry however we hope that this trend continues for the health and sustainability of the golf business where we make our livelihood. The golf operators have had to make changes to the way we do business as well. Be patient as the dust settles on the increased demand on both the course, staff and your time. Continue to enjoy this great game, as it is the sport of a lifetime!

ASKTHE EXPERT

When is it appropriate to allow players to play through another group? I typically play with one other person and get behind a foursome on many occasions.

John D., Iberia

This question has many layers to peel. According to the rules of golf, a foursome has precedent on the course. However, common courtesy would tell you that faster players or smaller groups should expect to go through a foursome. Even though a foursome may be playing quickly, a group of less than four can play faster than four if everything is

Factors to consider are: is the group directly in front of you keeping up with the group in front of them, or are they waiting as well. Here at the Lake you may only see the group in front of you and you don't realize that the group in front of you is waiting as well. Use the course marshals to ascertain what is happening with the group and or groups ahead of you.

If the course is full for many holes in front of you, it probably is not adventitious to let another group play through as this will continue to slow everyone down. If you are the group behind a foursome, be patient and allow course attendants to address your concerns. If you are the foursome, be aware of other players behind you and if possible let the faster or lesser player groups go through.

Do you feel the Lake area can support some nontraditional golf activities such as a TopGolf facility?

Andrea G., Stover

Looking at the statistics of how many people participated in non-traditional golf activities since 2020 I think the Lake is ready to embrace this part of the game. I believe in the next three to five years there will be something at the Lake. It may not be a full scale TopGolf venue but I could see a facility installing a Top Tracer Range or a PopStroke miniature golf being installed.

PopStroke is very similar to TopGolf, with food and beverage offerings around a full scale miniature golf course geared toward adults. As the Lake continues to add entertainment activities, I think it is only a matter of time that these types of golf entertainment venues will be here.

There are a limited amount of Mid-Missouri passes available each year that offer a reduced rate for two rounds of golf at each participating facility. These typically go on sale in January and sell-out very quickly. Another option is to look into league play at some local courses. You can typically pay a small league fee and play in their once a week league for a nominal charge.

Most courses have afternoon or weekday rates that are reduced and many courses have daily specials online on their websites. These change daily as business demand dictates.

Last minute deals are out there if you're flexible when you can play, similar to the airline business.







ocation, location, location. Anyone who's spent time searching for homes at Lake of the Ozarks knows it can be tricky finding the perfect waterfront location. Terrain challenges and rough water are just two of the biggest considerations people often face when deciding where

When Mike and Jennifer Renton decided to establish a place to call home on the Lake, those were two of their main concerns. Finding the right location and contractor for the job was key. The couple lives most of the time in Lincoln, Neb. but makes the six-hour trip to the Lake as often as possible.

After visiting for more than six years, they decided to establish a permanent residence where they could eventually retire. Having rented condos along various parts of the Lake, the Rentons knew exactly what they wanted. Like many people who set their sights on building at Lake of the Ozarks, they wanted a home on the water in a quite cove. They found what they were looking for at the Mistwood Moorings

Subdivision near the 35-mile marker by water and just outside of Greenview by land.

"We wanted to be able to easily get to Lake attractions, but not live in the center of the action," Mike said.

They hired Dan Spanburg, general manager of Ozark Custom Homes and Design. The location of the family subdivision, along with Dan's history and knowledge of Lake of the Ozarks, and his more than 40 years of home building experience, was exactly what they needed to make their dreams a reality.

"We chose to work with Dan because we had the ability to completely change the floor plan from the initial concept to its final design," Mike said.

Dan says he takes a hands-on approach with all of this clients sitting down to discuss their needs and budget. Once a design is in place, construction begins with Dan staying on top of the process using in-house crews and contractors that have a keen eye for the details.





off of the main channel, providing dock protection and calm water. The couple has friends in the area, and the established neighborhood is full of long-time residents — the kind who stop to wave from across the cove.

The three-story home is 3,894 square feet with three bedrooms and three bathrooms. The lower level is still under construction and once completed will have an additional bedroom with onsuite bath, a game room, and media/theater room.

Like many Lake homes under construction, the slope of the lot can be a challenge and the dirt-work required to excavate can be expensive. Dan says one of the ways he balanced working with the lot and watching cost was to build two bridges that lead from the street to the garage and front door, eliminating the need to fill in the space with dirtwork.


An electric fireplace with black tile surround makes the room comfortable and cozy. Dan says they got creative with design on a budget.

About Mistwood

Dan has been building homes for 41 years. He started as a general contractor in St. Pete, Fla. and estimates over the years he's built around 150 homes ranging from 1,200-to 8,000 square feet. He moved to the Lake with his wife Karen in 1995 after her father, Gene Sellers, was killed in a car accident. They started where Gene left off in the family business and continued building in the Mistwood subdivision located down Lake Road 5-58 (Sellers Road). The family has a long history at Lake of the Ozarks. Gene was considered a pioneer and started building Mistwood in the 50s. At the time Gene and his wife, Adele, lived in a cabin with no power and water on property where Summer Place Condos is currently located. As the story goes, back then the Hurricane Deck Bridge was a toll bridge Dan grew up hearing stories of how excited Adele would get when a car would travel across, and how Gene would ride a horse to Highway 5 to catch a ride to work.

HANGING AROUND THE LAKE

BLUES TRAVELER REFLECTS ON RISE TO THE TOP, PERFORMS AT OZARKS AMPHITHEATER

our high school buddies gathered in their drummer's parent's basement in Princeton, New Jersey to jam 36 years ago. From those high school sessions emerged a group that has been continuously performing music that has resonated with fans and stood the test of time. Blues Traveler kicked off their "Blue Monsters Tour 2023" in July and will take the Ozarks Amphitheater stage on August 19.

"We were one of the few bands that never split up and never took a break," said Blues Traveler guitarist Chandler (Chan) Kinchla. "Some people thought we were a southern band, probably because of the harmonica. We consider ourselves a rock and blues band.

We grew up with the 70's and 80's classic rock." In fact, if you ask Kinchla who influenced them he will tell you among the members the answers are The Grateful Dead, Jimmy Hendrix and Led Zeppelin.

The four original members of Blues Traveler were John Popper (vocals, harmonica and guitar), Chan Kinchla (guitar), Brendan Hill (drums) and the late Bobby Sheehan (bass). Their start was performing along the New York area club circuit, often every night.

"I love sports and I still do," Kinchla said. "I had the opportunity to either continue to play football or go to New York with this awesome band. I chose the band."

Upon graduation from high school the members moved to New York City. Popper, Hill and Sheehan were students in the music program at The New School and Kinchla attended New York University. Eventually they all quit college to pursue

In 1990 they released their first album with the song "But Anyway" getting airplay on college radio stations. Their second album, "Travelers and Thieves" followed a year later. Around the same time they got national exposure with an appearance on The David Letterman Show. Kinchla refers to Letterman as the guy who gave them their first national television break. They have performed on "The Late Show with David Letterman" more than any other artist.





In August of 1999, band member Bobby Sheehan passed away. Agreeing that Sheehan would have wanted them to continue as a band, Kinchla's younger brother Tad joined as the new bassist. "My brother always hung around the band, so it was like he was a member already," Kinchla explained.

They're best known for their improvisational live shows where concert goers recognize hits such as "Run Around", "Hook" and "But Anyway." The song "Run Around" became the groups first chart hit followed by "Hook." In 1992, they founded the H.O.R.D.E. (Horizons of Rock Developing Everywhere) festival which featured traveling headliners in addition to local bands, charities, and organizations.

They went on to appear at Woodstock '94 and became an opening act for The Rolling Stones. A last-minute replacement for the artist Prince, they played on the 1995 season premiere of Saturday Night Live. They went on to record a number of songs for television shows and movies.

The band writes all their own music. Collaboratively, Blues Traveler went on to release several albums, four of which have gone gold, three platinum and one six times platinum. They've sold more than 10 million combined units worldwide. They've played over 3,500 performances and their single "Run Around" had the longest charting radio single in Billboard history. This earned them a Grammy for "Best Rock Performance by a Duo or Group with Vocals." Their first official blues album was nominated for "Best Traditional Blues Album" in 2022.

"We've always loved playing live and that's kept us engaged and into it," Kinchla said. "We had a slow build. We felt we really made it when we got our first tour bus. We had been touring in vans for years. I still love the tour bus to this day."

Kinchla added playing to large crowds and earning their first top 10 hit were also milestones for the band. "It's several steps along the way," he explained. "You work hard but you also need a lot of luck."

Other highlights over the years include opening for The Allman Brothers Band for a complete summer when the Blues Traveler members were just in their 20s. The next summer, opening for Carlos Santana was exciting.

"We were just coming out of playing New York bars," Kinchla said. "And then we are opening for these big acts."

The secret to staying together for so long, Kinchla said, is that they are a

"I don't know why bands break up, they usually end up getting back together. We love playing together live, and we always fall back on that. There's always room for someone to go off and do a solo project. We're never afraid to learn or do something new."

Having started together at a young age appears to be an asset for the group. "We grew up together," Kinchla added. "We are a family. Like families, there's room to have some tantrums and that's ok."

The band continually tours and has a new rhythm and blues album coming out later this year. This summer's tour consists of 27 shows with stops in 17 different states. Since 1994, with the exception of 1999 and 2020, the band has headlined a fourth of July show at Colorado's Red Rocks Amphitheatre. This tradition attracts fans from all over the country.

"The goal of all our shows is to capture the environment and the vibe," Kinchla said. "We improvise all the time so it's a different show every night."



elp is always nearby at Lake Regional Health System, but which should you choose: primary care, Express Care or the emergency department? Here's how to know.





PRIMARY CARE - OPEN WEEKDAYS

lakeregional.com/PrimaryCare Lake Regional has primary care clinics in Camdenton, Eldon, Iberia, Lake Ozark, Laurie, Lebanon and Osage Beach.

Primary care covers a wide range of health care needs, from acute illnesses, such as a sore throat or fever, to managing chronic conditions, such as diabetes and high blood pressure. You choose your provider —could be a doctor, nurse practitioner or physician assistant — and establish care with an introductory visit. Then you return to this provider for future needs.

"Contact your primary care office first for nonemergency ailments and injuries," said Jessica Whitworth, FNP-C, a primary care provider at Lake Regional Clinic - Camdenton. "Your primary care provider has records of your medical history throughout the years and is likely to be the person with the best understanding of treatments and medications that work for you."

But when your primary care provider isn't available, it's still important to get the care you need, when you need it. In that case, our Express Care team members are here for you.

EXPRESS CARE – OPEN DAILY

Lake Regional Express Care provides walk-in care in Camdenton, Eldon and Lebanon.

The clinics look and feel similar to primary care, but with walk-in care, you do not establish care with a provider.

"Express Care is a great option for urgent but not lifethreatening issues, such as fevers, colds, stomachaches, allergies and rashes, especially after hours or on weekends," Whitworth said.

Express Care also treats minor injuries, such as sprains, minor fractures, minor cuts and mild burns. Patients must be at least 3 months of age.

"If you have a medical emergency, then you need to call 911 or drive straight to your nearest hospital," Whitworth said. "Express Care is not an emergency department."

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hen Ilene Vanabbema decided to open up a waterfront bar on the Gravois Arm, she wasn't quite prepared for the challenges that would soon follow. Like many Lakefront establishments, finding seasonal employees on the heels of a pandemic proved to be a difficult.

No stranger to the restaurant business, Ilene has owned Maggie's Bar & Grille in downtown Boonville for more than 15 years. Named after a formerly-beloved pet, the popular restaurant is a local hangout in the style of an old English pub. Once the pandemic hit and things began to slow down, Ilene found herself spending more time at her old log home in Gravois Mills. A patron of the long-established Frog's Bar & Grill, Ilene said when it was placed on the market in 2020 she decided to take it over. After 25 years of being known as "Frog's" the restaurant reopened with a new name, a new look, and a new menu.

Due to the difficulty of finding employees, Maggie's was only open four days a week the first year in business. With fingers crossed, Ilene brought in more help this season and has not only been able to stay open six days a week but has expanded the menu. At first it consisted of mainly fried foods and pizza, but this year many homemade items and some locally-sourced ingredients are crafting dishes that leave patrons craving more. The 7-ounce Missouri Angus beef hand-pattied burgers have become as wellknown at the Lake as they are at the Boonville location. Another popular item are the hand-breaded Wisconsin cheese curds, homemade fried pickles and the homemade chicken bites.





Pizza comes in thin, extra think or a gluten-free cauliflower crust. Salads, baskets and a variety of burgers and sandwiches make up the remainder of the menu.

WARM HOSPITALITY & ENTERTAINMENT

Ilene doesn't mind being busy. It's a place that thrives on camaraderie so she'll often stop to check on a table or help the bartender sling a few drinks. There's not an aspect of the business she doesn't handle daily

— from running to the supply room or stepping into the kitchen to help during the dinner rush.

"I'm a social person," she says. "I like the stress when it's busy."

The bar's interior pays homage to its past with vintage photographs, signs and articles explaining the history of the area. Table games such as Brain Teaser and Connect Four, cornhole on the outdoor patio, songs on the jukebox, and friendly staff keep the atmosphere fun and playful.

Those seeking refuge from the summer sun will find it without having to give up being outdoors. The additional dock space provides ample parking for boaters and the amount of outdoor seating allows everyone to have a view of the Lake while enjoying their meal. The indoor dining room is easily converted to outdoor space by opening up the garage doors leading to the patio.

Locals gather on weekdays, especially for the scheduled entertainment and Monday night bingo from 6-8 p.m. Ilene shops specifically for the prizes awarded to bingo winners and admits some of them might be a little unusual. Live music is regularly held on Saturdays.



ake a trip to the islands this summer, break free from the familiar, and embrace something different. Caribbean Mix, a new and authentic Caribbean restaurant on the Bagnell Dam Strip, is where distinct flavors and diversity come alive.

After moving to Lake of the Ozarks from the Dominican Republic in 2016, Cesar Jimenez had a hard time adjusting to the culinary options of the Midwest.

"We are used to flavor," he said. "The closest thing I could find in the area was Mexican (food)."

After countless trips to their favorite Mexican restaurant in Camdenton, Jimenez knew if he wanted

something different, he'd have to make it happen. He enlisted the help of his family and some connections back home, and in the spring of 2023 opened the restaurant in Luby's Plaza. The goal is to create an inviting and cultural fusion of flavors that transports diners to the islands — and so far it's been a success.

It's a family affair with is wife Philana, his son, and other family members working on various tasks from serving to cleaning and being the cashier.

A small but cozy dining room offers a comfortable reprieve from the busy crowds of the Strip. Hospitality and unforgettable flavors come together in this tropical hideaway.

Hailing from the Dominican Republic, chef Yeuris Ramos is able to immerse each dish with rich flavors and the aroma of exotic spices. He graduated from the Mariano Moreno Culinary Institute in Miami, Fla. and moved to the Lake to help open the restaurant. Diners are sure to walk away with an appreciation for the complexity of the dishes. Many flavors come out in sauces, which you will see listed throughout the

You might just find a few unexpected favorites. The Rice Balls appetizer became an instant hit. These deep fried balls are stuffed with oxtail and cheese, and served with avocado cilantro sauce. Another popular appetizer is the Yaroa, made of layers of fries, beef and cheese, topped with a pink sauce.

Two frequently-ordered entrées are the Jamaican jerk ribs, and the Mofongo — fried plantains mashed with chicharron and garlic, topped with a creamy sauce. You can add chicken or shrimp to the dish.

Puerto Rican creamy stew with seafood and rice makes up the Asopao de Mariscos or try the Boca Chica Style Red Snapper (fried fish in an Escabeche sauce). Sides include tostones (fried green plantains), fries or rice.

For lighter fare, there's an Avocado Sandwich, a Cuban Sandwich and the Dominican Tostada — a Dominican bread roll served with cheese, ham, mayo and tomatoes.

On Friday and Saturday, a late-night menu is available from 10 p.m.-2 a.m. and the bar is open late serving all your favorite libations. Ask for the cocktail menu for a selection of handcrafted drinks that are made from real juices. The Pina Colada comes in a glass or a pineapple shell. Other signature drinks are a Hurricane, Cuba Libre (dark rum, lime juice and soda), a Mojito, Planter's Punch (dark rum, lime juice, grenadine and mint) and a Daiquiri. The two most popular are the Caribbean Breeze and Mojito.
