# **CAMDENTON BOYS SWIM**



## **DISCIPLINE WILL LEAD TO CONTINUED SUCCESS FOR LAKERS IN 2023**

The Camdenton boys swim team has expectations of returning more swimmers to the Class 1 State Championship Meet where they had the highest team finish in program history a year ago.

The Lakers finished 12th out of 40 teams represented at State, the highest team finish in program history. "Almost every meet of the season, the team dropped their times in the 200 relays, obliterating the previous school records set during the 2019 season, and every swimmer gained PR's in their respective events," said Lakers coach Sarah VanBebber.

The Lakers are led by senior Ethan Vance, who capped off last season at the Class 1 State Meet with two individual third place finishes in the 50-yard freestyle and 100-yard freestyle, and he's confident in the 2023 squad. "The team is looking pretty strong this year," Vance said. "I think we are going to have a pretty good season, hopefully break some records."

Camdenton achieved a fifth place finish in the 200-yard free relay (Vance, Hunter Johnson, Jonah Rapp and Fischer Lapine), and an 11th place finish in the 200-yard medley relay (Vance, Johnson, Rapp and Lapine).

Vance noted that he would like to see the Lakers keep the same steady progression from last season. "For this year, that's our goal," he said. "To qualify for State, break last year's record and make something special happen."

VanBebber enters her fifth season coaching the Laker swim team and fourth as head coach at Camdenton High School. "It is always interesting to see the new dynamics with each team at the beginning of the season," she said. "This year, I have been most impressed with the willingness of the boys to get in the water and get the job done."


"There is a mentality of putting in work, even when they don't want to, that I know will contribute towards success down the road in November. The biggest thing I look for in a team is willingness and drive to be better, and I see that with this group," she said.

Expectations for the Lakers in 2023 are held high by VanBebber. "I am expecting a lot out of this team. I know the ability is there to beat the records from the 2022 Laker team," she added. "It will take a lot of work."

According to VanBebber, there are two positions open in the Lakers relay team left by graduating seniors that need to be filled. "We have the swimmers capable of filling those roles," she affirmed. "It will depend on who wants it more, and who will get the job done."

"I do believe we will have relays qualify for State again. I also believe there are possibilities for more individual qualifiers for the State Championship Meet in November," she said.

VanBebber noted that Camdenton has swimmers with diverse abilities in different strokes that will need to be fine tuned to help the team earn points in the individual events throughout the season. "We need to beef up our presence in some of the other events at meets to beat out the larger teams of our conference."

## LADY LAKERS FOCUSED ON BUILDING IN YEAR TWO UNDER TEICHMEIER



The Camdenton girls tennis team is looking to build on the foundation set last season under second year head coach Jacob Teichmeier.

The Lady Lakers finished last season with a 4-10 record, but this squad is focused on pushing each other to grow as a team, while remembering to have fun along the way.

Camdenton won a first round match of the District Tournament, beating Rolla 5-1, who the Lady Lakers lost to twice earlier in the year. "The biggest thing about last year was laying a foundation of how we want to compete and how we want to play," Teichmeier said. "Last year we had a good group of senior girls that did a really good job of being coachable, being good teammates and I think they laid a strong foundation for our seniors coming up, and we just hope to continue that into this year."

Returning to help lead the Lady Lakers is senior Audrey Blake, along with junior Delaney Stanfield . "Audrey was our number one last year, Teichmeier said. "She's not a super vocal leader, but she leads by the way she plays. When she's out on the tennis court she just competes, and she won't show up an opponent but she's going to play hard and play her game."

"Delaney was our number two as a sophomore last season, and I'm hoping to see her improve on that," Teichmeier added. "We're excited to have their leadership and ability to help mentor the younger students such as how to balance homework, school, and friendships along with tennis."


According to Blake, the first week of practices went pretty great."We have a lot of incoming freshman which I am really excited about and they show a lot of potential, so that's really good for us as a team," she said. "We have a lot of great seniors that I really get along with, and I think we're all having fun as a team and making those connections with a lot of the new people."

Blake said showing up and trying their best is key for improvement. "Just showing up everyday ready to get going, always having energy and trying our best on every drill even if it's not a match. Like working on our swings and things, and putting in the effort every day," she noted.

Teichmeier added what improvements need to be made in order to keep building

# LAKERS FOCUSED ON BUILDING IN 2023



After sending two runners to the Class 5 State tournament last fall, the Camdenton cross-country team is young and eager to return in 2023.

Coach Lauren Moriearty enters her fourth season as head coach of the cross-country team, and it will be her seventh year coaching the sport at Camdenton.

"Last season, on the girls side, we had a full team with two girls who qualified for State," Moriearty said. "Ellie Webb and Georgi Carolus. And they have both gone on to run in college. Ellie is going to Truman State University, and Georgi is going to Drury University."

As for the rest of the Lakers squad, Moriearty has seen both the boys and girls teams make strides from last season. "The rest of the team has made vast improvements taking minutes off of their 5K time," she said.

Moriearty noted that she believes this will be a positive building year for the team. "Our expectations are still building as we go," she said, and added her experience with recruiting kids to run. "It's kind of hard recruit kids because we're out here at 6:15 in the morning, but we like to think of our team as more of a culture than just a sport. So, building that love of running in the kids, and then along the way try and help them be successful in racing."

Sisters, Ava Canales and Payton Canales are expected to lead the Lady Lakers this season. Ava is entering her senior year while Payton will be a sophomore. "Payton missed qualifying for State by I think maybe six places last year, so she looks to improve there," Moriearty noted. "Ava had her most consistent year last year, so she looks to be a shining star this year."

Ava Canales shared how she is eager to see how the the underclassmen on both the boys and girls squads can learn from each other. "I just want to be proud with how I finish, and not leave anything left out on the course," she said. "I feel like we have a lot of talented freshman coming in this year, and we have a lot of new kids so it will be interesting to see how they do."

Senior Chase Mason, and sophomore Luke Webb will look to lead the Laker boys this fall.

"My expectations for the most part is to be proud of how I finish in every race, and not worry about placing, just know that I did my best," Mason said, who enters his second year on the team, after making his way over from the soccer field because he enjoys running. He added that he also had a few classes taught by Moriearty. "I had a few classes with coach Mo, and it just looked like a lot more fun to me after coming to a couple of practices," he said. Moriearty added that Webb has been putting in a ton of work preparing for the season. "I think he is going to blow us out of the water with his improvement," she said.

Both Canales and Mason said the team's expectations remain high. "Last year as a team, our girls team was hoping to get to State, but that didn't happen so maybe this year it will be different," Canales said, "And we have a few more boys this year, so that will be exciting to see how they do."

Newcomers include some track athletes that are making the transition and Moriearty said they could possibly be the top three runners for the boys. Juniors Gunnar Rhoads and Jesus Garcia-Ortiz are bringing endurance to the squad after both participated in track and the JROTC program. "They both have showed a lot of potential and I think they will be pivotal for the team's success this year," she said. "We also have had some freshman come up on both the boys and girls teams that are looking to make an impact as well."

In terms of where to improve, Moriearty stressed the importance of working together to achieve success. "I think just working together in races as a team, because we are a very individual sport, but also a team sport. We can go out and race, and everybody can do their own thing, but at the end of the day this is a team sport," she said. "So, if we can focus on bringing the team together and working together to push each other forward, and score some points that would be ideal."

# LADY LAKERS TO RELY ON EXPERIENCE IN 2023

The Camdenton volleyball team is loaded with upperclassmen who are focused on taking the next step and pulling off a deep postseason run.

The Lady Lakers lose three seniors, including one starter. "We lost three and one of them has started for us the past two years," said Lady Lakers coach Austin Walker. "We return quite a bit, about five or six kids that have played and have experience."

Camdenton ended last season with a record of 19-12-2 and will attempt to avenge last season's 3-0 District loss to Marshfield as the Lady Lakers open their season at home against the Lady Jays. "We had a great season honestly, and our seniors led by example," Walker said.

"We lost a district match that we should have won. Marshfield is a good team and we'll have a chance at them again, and we're hungry to produce more of what he had last year."

Walker enters her 12th season as head coach of the Lady Lakers, and her 13th year of coaching volleyball. "For one year I was at Missouri Southern State University as an assistant coach after I graduated from college," she said.

Confidence is key for Camdenton to improve in 2023. "We talked all summer about taking risks, and being more confident when they step on the court," Walker said. She added that the Lady Lakers are also working on improving ball control, defense and utilizing their height going into the season.

"We always say we want to finish in the top half of the Ozark Conference," Walker said. "Like Kickapoo who played for a State Championship last year, and is going to be great this year," she said. "Kind of staying up with the pack and competing and we can do that. Honestly the number one expectation for this season is entering the court with confidence and leave saying that we did our best job while we gradually improve throughout the season for the postseason."

Expected to help lead the Lady Lakers on a deep postseason run is senior Kenzie Swanson, who earned all-district honors last year, followed by junior Bella Brewer and returning senior libero Caitlin Garmany.

Newcomers include Lexi Dickerson who will play outside, along with Maggie Johnson.

"The team looks really good and I'm super excited for the season," Garmany said. "We have a lot more seniors than we did last year because last year we only had three, so the team is looking pretty good so far."

Garmany said last season got off to a shaky start for the Lady Lakers compared to the start to this season. "I think it was because we didn't have as many leaders on the team last year with only three seniors, but this year we have pretty strong leadership I think," she said.

If there is room to improvement this season, Garmany said it would be communication. "We tend to run into each other a bunch, but that's just a little improvement we can make over the season," she said.

Garmany also noted that her expectations for the team is to return to districts. "We have really high hopes for this season, and with this season being my last I want to make the most of it," she said.

"Kenzie has worked on her confidence and finding ways to score points for us in the middle," Walker said. "Bella is also expected to play a big role, and she's another middle that plays high level club volleyball, so her volleyball I.Q. has grown tremendously."

"If there is one thing to say about Caitlin its that she is a worker," Walker said. "And she is a great leader for the younger kids." According to Walker, sophomore Bella Asante has made improvements and will be returning to the setter position.

# LAKERS KICK OFF FIRST SEASON UNDER PAR PITTS

2023 is the start of a new era for Lakers Football as Par Pitts builds upon the coaching legacy that Jeff and Bob Shore have left as he embarks on his first season as head football coach at Camdenton High School.

The Lakers return 10 starters from last season's 9-2 team that fell 55-14 to rival Lebanon in the second round of the Class 5 State Tournament.

"Our guys have really put a lot of effort and a lot of care into the season, I'm just so excited for our guys as they progress," said Lakers coach Par Pitts, a Camdenton native who was part of the 1986, 1987 State Championship teams along with former Laker coach Jeff Shore.

Previous to joining shores staff in 2014, Pitts left his mark at Palmyra, Odessa, and Troy, before returning to his hometown. "I'm lucky that I've been here for nine years and I've coached with all of our coaches and I've got the opportunity to be connected with them," he said. "I've coached all of our players before, and I've had other jobs where I didn't know anyone. So, what an advantage that was to have those lasting relationships already. That's made it so much more smooth and I feel like I'm just guiding us," he said.

"Because the work that is being done, is done by our players and our coaches and I'm just here to kind of cheer them along and make sure that we stay on the right path."

Things are done a little bit different under coach Pitts in 2023, but most players on the team are already familiar with his style. "We're a little different kind of style," Pitts said. "So, we're having to adapt to a downhill running game at some times."

When it comes to the X's and O's, Pitts noted that he has flexibility having spent time coaching both offense and defense as a coordinator, and as Laker head coach he wants to give the freedom to his coordinators to call up the plays. "I feel very comfort-able on both sides," he said. "I'm fortunate enough to have two guys, my Defensive Coordinator Cole Walker and my Offensive Coordinator Andrew Nolting who have taken those reigns."

"I tell people that I'm just here to coach the coaches and love our players, and help them get to where they want to go," Pitts said.

On offense, Pitts wants to roll out something similar to a spread system that will


focus on running the football. "We're kind of a spread offense that can be powered by the power running game," he said.

Taking command of the offense at quarterback is senior Kade Durnin who threw for 444 yards, nine touchdowns and one interception as a back up last season.

Other notable returners to the offense are senior running back Blake Ford, who looks to be a threat in the new run heavy offense anchored by senior lineman Karson George and Garrett Hilton. Senior Kyle Eidson returns at wide receiver. Eidson racked up 312 yards and three touchdowns last season, followed by junior wide receiver Karson Durnin who had 122 yards and three touchdowns.

According to Pitts, the Laker defense will be looking to attack the line of scrimmage. "We want to be an attacking defense," he said. "We're going to bring people from different angles and places, so we want to be an aggressive attacking defensive front."

The Laker secondary will also be a force in 2023 as they have impressed Pitts early. "Yeah they have done a great job," he said. "They probably have more experience than

some of our other areas. Our defensive line and our defensive backs are probably the most experienced on this team."

Senior Spencer Mellencamp returns to lead the secondary at strong safety/free safety, and he's transitioning smoothly into the season on both sides of the ball, by taking some reps at quarterback. "We've been more efficient at these practices with the shortened time so that we stay fresh, and I feel like with that we go a little harder each play," he said. "We're really going to trust our guys to do their jobs, and work on communicating."

Mellencamp tallied 78 tackles and three interceptions for the Laker defense in 2022. Senior middle linebacker Sam DeMott earned All-ozark conference honors as the Lakers leading tackler a year ago with 132 tackles, along with five sacks, and five tackles for a loss. Eidson has been a force at outside linebacker and cornerback, while senior Jeshua Balderas wrecks havoc on the defensive line. Last season Balderas had 49 tackles and six tackles for a loss. "Those guys have kind of stepped in and picked up where they left off last year," Pitts said.

Some newcomers to Camdenton football in 2023 feature junior linebacker Sterling Sederwall, senior linebacker Landin Moore.

Pitts said that the Lakers have adapted well to his style spending time during the spring and summer at camps. "They're getting it. We've put them in some tough situations and they've responded better, and sometimes not the way that we want to," he admitted. "But, the key is to kind of callus them up, to where if tough times come we're able to handle it."

Callusing up this 2023 team reminds Pitts of his days shoveling asphalt in the summertime. "When I started my hands were soft. I would get blisters and I had to develop those calluses," he said. At times he said the job felt like torture, but he adapted to the environment with grit. "But once I had those calluses on there, I was able to do it. So, we kind of need to think in those similar terms," he added.

# LADY LAKERS SET HIGH EXPECTATIONS FOR 2023

The Class 4, District 6 champion Camdenton softball team has set a new goal of being the last team standing in Class 4 by the end of the 2023 season.

The Lady Lakers ended last season with a 4-2 loss to Helias Catholic in the quarterfinal round of the Class 4 State tournament. Camdenton ended its season with a 24-9 record overall, going on a seven game win streak to cap off a District title over Branson.

"The first week has gone really easy because all of the girls who have been here at practice were here over the summer, so we have had a pretty seamless transition," said Lady Lakers coach Tyler Dinsdale. "We've been able to implement stuff this week that we were implementing in weeks two and three last season, so for us as a coaching staff I think we're ahead of where we were last year."

The expectations for Camdenton softball might be as high as ever entering the season with Dinsdale entering his sixth year as head coach, and his ninth season coaching Camdenton softball. "Last year our goals were to be conference champs, and then district champs," he said. "That was our goal last year, and well that's our expectation this year."

Dinsdale said the expectation this season is to repeat as conference and district champions, with a new goal in mind. "Our goal is to be the last team standing in Class 4 at the end of the year," he said. "I think it's a realistic goal, and we have to shoot for that or we're going to fall short."

The Lady Lakers return a pair of fist team all-state honorees in senior centerfielder Zoe Lockhert, who earned Ozark Conference Player of the Year honors, followed by junior pitcher Cayden VonSande, who earned Ozark Conference Pitcher of the Year honors.

VonSande will anchor the pitching rotation, followed by Anna Lucas, who earned all-district honors in 2022, and Ellie Moore who will spend time pitching and playing outfield.

Incoming freshman have impressed Dinsdale with their pitching and hitting, and he expects sophomores Ellie Moore, Addy Baker, Dakota Hawksley and Makenna Sheer to expand their roles on varsity this season.

"We look a lot better than last year," Lockhert said. "Our practices are a lot more uniform and organized. So, I'd say we look good going into the season so far, and we're having fun which is most important."

Lockhert said the team grew a lot last season. "We started off not as well as we're starting right now," she said. "But we had new coaches so everything was pretty new to us, so everything was a little wonky before we started really catching on to our competition and playing really well together."

She added that it was pretty cool to experience the 2022 postseason run to the state tournament. "That run didn't even feel real," Lockhert said. "It felt like we were all on top of the world really." This season Lockhert expects to pick up where Camdenton left off. "We have our expectations set pretty high," she said. "We really want to win State and I think we can do that. It's not something that we are used to being able to believe in so I'm really excited."

Consistency in batting and fielding is what Lockhert said is one thing the team can improve on as the Lady Lakers keep their eyes on the prize. "I think that will just all catch on as we get going," she said. Lockhart would like to keep a .500 batting average and stay hot doing what she did last year.

"That's tough because last year was the farthest we have gone in program history," Dinsdale said. "I think where we are going to improve the most is the little things like adapting to playing at a higher speed. I know it kind of sounds mundane, but focusing on the little things is going to help us out more in the long term."

Dinsdale added that the team has done a good job of considering any upperclassmen that was on last years squad, a team leader. "They have done a really good job of taking that and helping the underclassmen out," he said. "We start practice doing the exact same little things every day and our girls have done an excellent job of taking the girls that are new to the program and making sure they understand how we do it, why we do it. So, I'd say we have 24 leaders in some capacity."

The Camdenton boys soccer team is loaded with 14 seniors who are hungry to compete in 2023.

"The expectations are the highest they have been since I have been here at Camdenton," said Lakers coach Tyler Sevon, who enters his fourth season as head coach at Camdenton, and his ninth year coaching boys and girls soccer.

Basham made the switch from football to soccer during his sophomore year. "The first year was just about getting my touch back because I played when I was seven years old," he said. Basham ended up cracking the starting rotation his sophomore year scoring three goals, followed by scoring 30 goals his junior year in a district match against Branson. "But those 30 goals would not have been possible without the great passes from my teammates," Basham added.

Dickerson added that the team seems much more eager to learn at practice this season. "They have shown me that they are very eager to improve, and that's exciting



The School of Osage boys soccer team is coming off its first Class 2 District 5 title in school history, and despite losing 11 seniors the Indians are ready to build on a strong foundation.

The Indians fell 3-0 to Marshall in the first round of the Class 2 State tournament, after beating Logan-Rogersville 2-1 in penalty kicks to capture the District Championship. Osage ended the 2022 season with a record of (18-7).

Long added that with the strength of schedule it is always hard to predict outcomes. "We will commit to developing players so we have more depth on the varsity bench this year," he said. "Which is a hard lesson we learned last year once we got into post season play, and the number of games we played started taking its toll on our overall health and fitness."

Senior defensive center back Trent Lierheimer is ready to prove 2022 was no fluke. "It's been great getting back into it honestly," he said. "I've loved what I have seen so far and I'm loving the approach that coach Long is going at, since we have had such a big loss of seniors. I like how he's incorporating everyone and shaping us up to be a really successful program this year."

With Osage only having five seniors, Lierheimer stressed the importance of focusing on depth. "We have a solid first squad, and our varsity ended up having a good record last year, but I want to make sure that our JV team and underclassmen are really good," he said. "I think that will play a big role in keeping the winning program that we have."

People may have mixed expectations due to losing 11 seniors, but hearing the noise just adds more fuel to the fire. "I think a lot of people are going to be doubting us," Lierheimer said. "Maybe they think it's a one time District title run, but people also have high expectations where we got to that point and they have hopes for us to get back there and further. The feedback just fuels us, and fuels me more to prove the doubters wrong."

Lierheimer said this year will be different with just three seniors. "But I think we will still get it done, We'll still work it out and make sure we're a good squad, but we can't get lazy."

Junior midfielder, Alex Kauten can see the potential after the first few practices, but knows it's all about a consistent work ethic. "I think we put in a lot more work in our first week of practice than we did last year," Kauten said. "We may not have the talent we had last year, but we are putting in the work which is good."

According to Kauten there is plenty of room to improve, such as making better passes, and shared how everything feels new with new faces on the team. "This team doesn't know each other well, so its that connection that we need to have together to be successful, and we also need to improve on our communication," he said.

Returning to the District Championship would be nice, but Kauten knows it will be a process. "Going to Districts back to back would be great, but I think the main focus is just how our personal development can lead to team development," he said.





Kylie Allen will make her debut season as head coach of the Climax Springs softball team in 2023, with five upperclassmen hoping to improve on a 1-18 record last season.


