

MDC invites the public to float into fall with their introduction to paddling event Sept. 27 Participants will take a leisurely float on the Gasconade River.



he Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) invites the public to float into fall with an introduction to paddling event on the Gasconade River on Sept. 27 from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

Participants will be given a flat-water course the evening before the event on Sept. 26 beginning at 5:30 p.m. at Binder Lake near the boat ramp in Jefferson City. This precursory event will introduce participants to kayaks, how to use a kayak, and kayak safety. On Sept. 27, participants will meet at Runge Nature Center to be shuttled to the starting point at Rollins Ferry Access. Participants must arrive at 8 a.m. to get shuttled to the access point.

This event is designed for participants over 12 years of age, and registration is required. To register, go to

https://short.mdc.mo.gov/4eY. Please note that all participants younger than 16 years old must be accompanied by a guardian. All kayaking equipment for this event will be provided, and participants are asked to wear closedtoe shoes, bring a water bottle, pack a lunch, and dress for the weather. 

The Fishing Report

he lake level was 658.2, generation of 1,000 CFS (cubic feet per second) throughout the week for a level of 658.0 by the weekend. Surface temperature at Bagnell Dam was 77 degrees. Truman Lake was at the 704.2 level.

To Note: The Lower Lake is from the dam to the 22mile mark; Mid-Lake is from the 22- to 44-mile mark, the Upper Osage is from the 44-mile mark to the Route 65 Bridge.

Tournament Results

Jim Dill and John Sapper won the Cops and Bobbers Tournament last Saturday with five bass weighing 26.08 pounds.

Bagnell Dam spillway/Osage River

Water clarity: Clear. Fishing is slow for all species.

Lower Lake

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Fair on drop shot finesse worms and Texas-rigged 10-inch plastic worms 13 to 15 feet deep along bluff points. Crappie: Good shooting jigs under main lake docks. White bass: Excellent on topwater lures, swimbaits and inline spinners when fish are busting the surface at the mouths of coves.

Gravois

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Fair on square bill crankbaits and topwater lures around shallow brush. Crappie: Good trolling crankbaits in the coves and shooting jigs under docks. White bass: Good on topwater lures and small swimbaits when the fish are surfacing in the coves. Catfish: Good on shad sides drifting around shad schools.

Mid-Lake

Water clarity: Stained. Black bass: Good on square bill crankbaits and Texas-rigged Brush Hogs around docks in coves. Crappie: Good shooting jigs under docks in coves. White bass: Good when busting shad on the surface on topwater lures and small swimbaits in coves.

Grand Glaize

Water clarity: Stained. Black bass: Fair on shaky head plastic worms 20 feet deep around brush along bluffs and flats. Crappie: Fair on jigs 10 to 20 feet deep around brush.



Niangua

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Slow on shaky head plastic worms and Texas-rigged creature baits 15 to 20 feet deep in brush piles. Crappie: Fair shooting jigs under docks. Catfish: Good drifting shad sides.

Upper Osage

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Good on Texas-rigged plastic worms, jigs, square bill crankbaits and buzz baits around brush 3 to 10 feet deep inside points and halfway back in coves. Crappie: Good on minnows 8 to 10 feet deep around docks. White bass: Good on Roostertails, jigs and topwater lures along points early and late in the day. Catfish: Good on rod and reel or trotlines baited with goldfish.

Truman Dam spillway

DAY TRIP

The backroads of Route 66



ot all portions of the famous Mother Road Route 66 are found in the small cities and towns of Missouri. Some are off the grid as is the segment that runs from Miami, Oklahoma, into Kansas and the southside of the state out of Carthage into Springfield. Sometimes the deserted historic highway is found on accident when one gets lost, as in this case. But occasionally getting lost is a good thing. Often that is where the absolute best gems are found.

Traveling the designated road to head north from Miami, Oklahoma is easy, there are plenty of way markers and blacktops emblazoned with the bright red, white, and blue logo painted right on the road.

A charming stop in the north end of town has an entire park dedicated to Route 66 complete with a sunflower motif. Another dedicated Route 66 roadside park is located at Quapaw.

Heading north from downtown Miami, with a historic section of the Mother Road designated on the National Historic Register of Ottawa County, Oklahoma, and takes a northeast turn from Miami to the south end of Quapaw, Oklahoma on the way back into Missouri and Kansas on alternate U.S. 69. It is home to the Quapaw Tribal Headquarters.

An eerie portion of Route 66 is located at Picher, Oklahoma, on your way through Quapaw back to Springfield, Missouri. A feeling ensues when traveling this 30-mile segment of the mother road that ghosts of the past still haunt the area. Tiny rock houses lining the highway are an oddity that stands out at Phelps, Missouri alongside the lovingly restored one room Phelps School.

Keep going back into Missouri and you'll find the town of Miller, home of the Hangar Café. It is a bit of a drive off the lonely highway from Miller to Springfield, but very much worth it. The town is home to 699 residents, located in Lawrence County. Venture out to the Ozarks Skydive Center at Kingsley Field. Offering beginner's adventure jumps, Ozarks Skydive Center is adept at shuttling folks over the edge and out the door in a tandem leap. Prices range from \$259 with add on video packages.

Where to eat

While visiting the skydiving center, eat at the Hangar Kafe, because it is literally the only eating establishment out there in that lonely segment of the golden southern prairies. Open for breakfast and lunch, the restaurant features an aviation theme housed in a real airplane hangar. The food is excellent and extra big portions are common there. Skydivers from Ozarks Skydive actually land right in front of the wall of windows to the delight of diners. The unobstructed view also allows diners to view planes arriving and departing.

The aviation theme extends to the menu, with charming names relating to flying such as an appetizer menu dubbed "Preflight," and a kids menu called "Little Jenny's." The menu is simple American diner fare, but the portions are big enough for a take home box. The chicken fried steak and fried pork tenderloin dinner are the most popular choices.



eed trees and shrubs for your landscape? Go native with tree and shrub seedlings from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC). Native trees and shrubs can help improve wildlife habitat and soil and water conservation while also improving the appearance and value of private property.

MDC's George O. White State Forest Nursery offers a variety of low-cost native tree and shrub seedlings for sale for reforestation, windbreaks, erosion control, wildlife food and cover, and other purposes.

The nursery provides mainly oneyear-old, bare-root seedlings with sizes varying by species. Seedlings varieties include: pine, bald cypress, cottonwood, black walnut, hickory, oak, pecan, persim-

mon, river birch, maple, willow, sycamore, blackberry, buttonbush, hazelnut, redbud, ninebark, elderberry, sumac, wild plum, witch hazel, and others. MDC recommends ordering early for the best selection.

"The nursery grows millions of seedlings each year, but some species are very popular and sell out quickly," said Forest Nursery Supervisor Mike Fiaoni. "And some seedlings occasionally succumb to harsh weather or hungry wildlife, despite the nursery staff's Orders can be placed beginning Sept. 1 through April 15, 2024. Place orders online at mdc.mo.gov/ trees-plants/tree-seedlings.

best efforts." Fiaoni added that even if a species is listed as "sold out," customers can still place an order for those seedlings because other orders may get cancelled, freeing up inventory. Customers won't be charged for seedlings unless they are available to ship.

Seedlings are available in bundles of 10 or increments of 25 per species. Prices range from 34 cents to \$1 per seedling. Sales tax will be added to orders unless tax exempt. There is a shipping fee and a \$9 handling charge for each order. Receive a 15% discount up to \$20 off seedling orders with a Heritage Card, Permit Card, or Conservation ID Number. Orders will be shipped or can be picked up at the nursery, located near Licking, from February through May.

Changes to hunting season

he Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds deer hunters of regulation changes for the upcoming 2023-2024 deer-hunting season. The changes include a new firearms early antlerless portion, a new firearms CWD portion, changes to firearms antlerless permit numbers, and the addition of 14 new counties to the MDC CWD Management Zone.

"The changes to deer hunting regulations for the 2023-2024 deer season were motivated by increasing deer numbers throughout much of Missouri and in response to changes in the distribution of chronic wasting disease (CWD) in the state," said MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Jason Isabelle. "With a growing deer population in most Missouri counties, we're increasing opportunities for hunters to harvest deer both within and outside of the CWD Management Zone this year."

New Firearms Early Antlerless Portion Oct. 6-8

MDC will offer a new firearms early antlerless portion Oct. 6-8 in the 100 counties open for the firearms late antlerless portion Dec. 2-10. Reynolds County will now be open during the antlerless portions.

"With deer numbers being at desired levels in most counties but continuing to increase, additional antlerless harvest is needed to stabilize the deer population," said Isabelle. "This new season portion will help increase antlerless deer harvest prior to the November portion, when many hunters focus on harvesting bucks."

Isabelle noted that timing of the early antlerless portion was chosen to provide hunting opportunity when weather conditions are usually favorable and to minimize conflicts with archery hunters, who usually hunt most in late October and early November.

New Firearms CWD Portion Nov. 22-26

MDC will offer a CWD portion of firearms deer season Nov. 22-26 in CWD Management Zone counties during the 2023-2024 deer season. According to MDC, hunters will be able to use any unfilled firearms deer hunting permits during the CWD portion and must abide by the statewide limit of one antlered deer during the firearms deer season, all portions combined. Hunters must also abide by county-specific firearms antlerless permit numbers.

"Because higher deer densities can increase the rate of CWD spread, additional deer harvest in the CWD Management Zone is needed to prevent further increases in deer numbers and help minimize the spread of the disease," said Isabelle.

Isabelle noted that the CWD portion is timed to occur during the tail end of the primary rut, when deer movement is typically good and hunter interest remains high. CWD testing is not required during the CWD portion.

Changes to Firearms Antlerless Permit Numbers

MDC has also increased the number of firearms antlerless permits hunters can fill in most counties, including allowing hunters to fill a firearms antlerless permit in Butler, Carter, Scott, and Wayne counties. Hunters in Bollinger County will be able to fill two firearms antlerless permits beginning this year. Qualifying landowners in Reynolds County may now receive two Resident Landowner Firearms Antlerless Deer Hunting Permits. MDC has also increased the number of firearms antlerless permits from two to four in 85 counties.

"The liberalization of antlerless harvest opportunities will help slow population growth and keep the deer population at desired levels," said Isabelle.

He also noted that the additional firearms antlerless permits will help hunters and landowners to meet their deer management goals in areas where more antlerless harvest is needed.

Expansion of the CWD Management Zone

MDC has included 14 new counties as part of the CWD Management Zone this year: Bollinger, Caldwell, Carroll, Clay, Clinton, Dallas, Grundy, Jasper, Livingston, Madison, Montgomery, Pemiscot, Ray, and Schuyler.

As with all counties in the CWD Management Zone, grain, salt products, minerals, and other consumable products used to attract deer are prohibited year-round. Hunters must also follow carcass transportation regulations. The antler-point restriction has also been removed from Caldwell, Carroll, Clinton, Grundy, Livingston, Montgomery, Ray, and Schuyler counties.

Hunters who harvest deer in select CWD Management Zone counties during Nov. 11-12 must take the deer (or its head) on the day of harvest to a mandatory CWD sampling station.

New speakeasy experience opens in Eldon.

here's a new restaurant at the Lake but getting through the doors might be a little tricky. Capone's is an authentic, prohibition-style speakeasy serving locally-sourced gourmet food, wine, spirits and beer. To get in, you'll need the secret password so the doorman can let you through.

Owner Zack Ewing opened the restaurant near downtown Eldon a few months ago. Through his company called Eldon Hospitality, Ewing wants to offer diners a unique experience.

"Eldon is where I live and I wanted to help bring life back into our great town," he said.

His background includes owning other restaurants, and he was a consultant for food safety and restaurant inventory management.

Capone's serves classic handmade cocktails and gourmet scratch-made dinners. Their mission is to serve guests with quality, local food and beverages while creating a memorable and one-ofa-kind experience.

Three-course dinners include the Depression Po Boy made with slow-roasted chicken, remoulade sauce, pickle, tomato, onion on a fresh hoagie bun. The most popular dish is the Chicago Beef Dip – slow-roasted brisket, provolone and au jus on a fresh hoagie. The dinners include the soup of the night and side. Vegan options are available.

The most popular Cocktails in Capone's are the signature Old Fashioned and Mary Pickford. Don't miss the first annual Craft Wine and Whiskey Festival is planned for October 21. They are also in the process of opening a members only VIP room which has dining, a cigar lounge, and spa.

To figure out the password for entry, check their Facebook page for a hint the night you plan to visit. Open at 5 p.m. for cocktails with dinner service from 6-9 p.m. Steak dinners require reservations 24 hour in advance.

Taco Salad, Cowboy Nachos, the Navajo Taco, Southwest Fajita dinner, Chili Burger and Tamale dinner are just a few of the items that stand out on the menu. There is also a kid's menu and bulk items available for take-out. The Green Chili is open Tuesday-Saturday.






