





A different kind of lake



omme De Terre Lake is increasingly becoming the sister to Lake of the Ozarks, where locals pull an RV to on the weekends. In fact, many of them have parked a trailer at Pomme de Terre for an easy getaway from the bustle of the Lake of the Ozarks region.

Not as developed as the Magic Dragon, Pomme De Terre is entered by the tiny town of Hermitage. Hermitage is the county seat of Hickory County. The Hickory County courthouse sits on the downtown square. Hickory County was named for President Andrew Jackson, who bore the nickname, "Old Hickory." Settlers to the area came from the eastern United States in the 1830s. The fertile region and abundant waterways drew eastern population with four families setting up shop among the many rivers and creeks. Oak, hickory, and walnut trees provided good timber for building structures. The Civil War in 1861 saw the town divided between Union and Confederate loyalties. Some slaveowners fought with Union troops. Eventually those well-built structures burned, and a lot of the population fled Hickory County due to the many guerilla conflicts. It took a long while for Hickory County to rebuild after the war. The old Hickory County Jail, a native stone structure complete with iron door, still stands lurking behind the brick courthouse.

Lake Pomme De Terre was created by damming of the

Pomme De Terre River by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Named after a potato, or earth apple; that is what Pomme De Terre translates to, the river was dammed into a lake to control flooding in 1957 by the Corps, taking until 1961 to complete. Pomme De Terre State Park is within the Missouri State Parks system and contains 650 campsites and two beaches, comprising most of the limited commercial development of its 113 miles of shoreline.

There are several wonderful places to grab a bite while relaxing on the forested shores of Pomme De Terre. Some are seasonal and already closed for the winter. The Crappie Hole Bar and Grill and Pomme De Rita's are two that remain open in September. The Crappie Hole Bar and Grill is located on State Highway 254 and Pomme De Rita's sits right across the road to the Pomme De Terre Dam at the junction of State Highway 254 and State Highway 64. Anyone knows that a good family style fish house is a must on a lake location. The Crappie Hole provides that with a menu including fried catfish baskets and shrimp, along with a special featuring a walleye sandwich. Pomme De Rita's has Tex-Mex and BBQ. The menu is eclectic. If you love a mesh of food styles, Pomme De Rita's has choices that pull from both BBQ and Mexican, such as the build your own burrito with pulled pork. A \$2 taco special

is available for the thrifty traveler.


The town of Wheatland, a mere 4.5 miles south of Hermitage, is also a gateway to Lake Pomme De Terre. Most know Wheatland as the home of Lucas Oil Racetrack and Lucas Cattle Ranch. But there is a little history in what is left of Wheatland's downtown district. The old Settler's Village still stands, welcoming visitors with a glimpse of living history. The historical landmark was host to the Wheatland Harvest Festival on September 16th and 17th, 2023. They will host a Trunk or Treat in the Settlers Village on October 27th. According to Missouri Genealogy Web Project site, www.mogenweb.org, Log cabins numbering 13 were relocated to Wheatland, Missouri within the county of Hickory. The Pioneer Village was constructed by the Hickory County Economic Development Council, a non-profit organization, along with volunteers in 1992. The village log cabins had to be disassembled from their original locale, brought to Wheatland and put back together. An original stagecoach relay station from 1858 operating on the Butterfield Overland Mail trail was also brought. The 13 structures at the Settlers Village include guest cabins, mail relay station, a blacksmith shop, corn cribs, barn, and houses. All those structures were donated by owners in Hickory County (Wheatland Hickory Co. Mo, n.d.).

Wheatland is home to a favorite stop, The Hickamo Store and Restaurant. Hickamo has about everything that the traveler could ever need, and some things that you never knew that you needed. The country mercantile theme translates to tasty food in the café, with fresh baked cinnamon rolls and brownies, to a quaint boutique of rustic style clothing. Finally, a full grocery market entices customers for camping goods, or to take home some of the area's fresh grown and made horseradish sauces. The Hickamo Country Store also sells handcrafted, locally made furniture. It is located at 18718 Highway 54, Wheatland.

The Fishing Report

Your guide to catching fish at LOZ!

he lake level was 657.5, generation of 3,000 CFS (cubic feet per second) at the beginning of the week decreasing to 1,200 CFS throughout the week for a level of 657.3 by the weekend. Surface temperature at Bagnell Dam was 76 degrees. Truman Lake was at the 704.8 level.

To Note: The Lower Lake is from the dam to the 22mile mark; Mid-Lake is from the 22- to 44-mile mark, the Upper Osage is from the 44-mile mark to the Route 65 Bridge.

Tournament Results

Travis Harriman won the three-day Major League Fishing (MLF) Toyota Series tournament last weekend with 11 bass weighing 42 pounds, 12 ounces.

Bagnell Dam spillway/Osage River

Water clarity: Clear. Fishing is slow for all species.

Lower Lake

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Slow on topwater lures, drop shot rigs with finesse worms and jigs along bluffs and wave breaks. Crappie: Fair shooting jigs under docks along points 10 to 25 feet deep.

Gravois

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Fair on Texas-rigged plastic worms, shaky head finesse worms, jigs and topwater lures around brush and docks from 10 to 20 feet deep. Crappie: Good shooting jigs under docks on the main lake and in coves. Catfish: Good drifting skipjack herring in the coves.

Mid-Lake

Water clarity: Stained. Black bass: Fair on Texas-rigged soft plastics 2 to 8 feet deep around docks. Crappie: Good on jigs along main channel docks 15 to 20 feet deep. Catfish: Good drifting skipjack herring in coves.

Grand Glaize

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Fair on heavy jigs 12 to 25 feet deep around brush piles and along points. Crappie: Fair on jigs and minnows in brush piles 20 to 30 feet deep.

Niangua

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Slow on jigs, shaky



head finesse worms and creature baits around docks with brush piles about 12 to 18 feet deep. Crappie: Slow on minnows and jigs around docks.

Upper Osage

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Slow on Texas-rigged plastic worms and jigs 5 to 7 feet deep around docks. Crappie: Good on minnows and jigs 8 to 9 feet deep around docks. White bass: Good on inline spinners and topwater lures along points. Catfish: Good on rod and reel or noodle lines baited with cut shad along flats.

Truman Dam spillway

Water clarity: Clear. Fishing is poor for all species.



Pick Pumpkins

The Cave Pumpkin Patch planted thousands of pumpkins this year and they are ready to be picked. Located in Brumley, the pumpkin patch has dozens of other activities included in the admission price. Tour the haunted cave, enjoy tons of yard games, dig in the corn box, play mini golf, ride the a train, and enjoy the other fun games on the property.

Catching a glimpse of the solar eclipse

he April 8, 2024, total solar eclipse is six months away, and the excitement is building at the prospect of this oncein-a-lifetime event for the Ozarks. While the path of the eclipse is long in the U.S., stretching from Texas to Maine, a relatively small band of totality will be seen in Missouri. One of the best opportunities for Show-Me state residents to view this special astronomical occurrence is in West Plains where the path of totality will surpass the three-minute mark and a local task force has been planning for the event for the past three years.

Out of the group's planning has come the "Party in the Path," a fourday festival which kicks off with a concert on Friday, April 5, and continues over the weekend to include a neon parade; Cosmic Carnival for Kids; Sunshine Festival with food trucks, vendors and beer garden; a 5K run; hot air balloon glow event which includes concerts by Ha Ha Tonka and Fender Bender; a mural-painting event by internationally known artist Bolaji Ogunwo; art exhibits and self-guided art and history tours; live music; and other activities, leading up to and including the main event on Monday, April 8, when totality begins at 1:54 p.m.

City of West Plains Tourism Manager, Melissa Wharton, says, "Don't be satisfied with only seeing a partial eclipse. You need to get to totality! Those who have witnessed the difference can't emphasize this enough. And you may think you've seen a total eclipse like we'll experience next April, but if you live in south-central or southwest Missouri, unless you've travelled to totality you have not seen a total eclipse! The one in 2017 was not total for this region, only for extreme southeast Missouri, and before 2017, the last total solar eclipse visible from Missouri was on August 1, 1869. After 2024, the next total solar eclipse visible from



Missouri will be in 2178."

A Scientific American article from 2017 written by Edwin L. Turner, a professor of Astrophysical Sciences at Princeton University, drives the point home about the need to not settle for partial viewing:

"First and most importantly, you will not see anything particularly spectacular unless you are in the path of totality, where the sun is 100 percent covered by the moon....The standard astronomical way of describing eclipses is highly misleading in this respect. It simply states the maximum fraction of the sun covered by the moon as seen from some location. So a total eclipse is 100 percent, but over a much wider area of the world, the moon will cover a smaller fraction, say, 95 percent or 80 percent or 40 percent or whatever.

"A reasonable person might conclude that an 80 percent eclipse is 80 percent as interesting/spectacular as a 100 percent eclipse. That is completely wrong.... it gets about 10,000 times darker when the moon covers the last 1 percent of the sun's surface."

Wharton also notes that West Plains is an ideal choice for eclipse viewing because the city is the largest in a 100-mile radius in Missouri, and its infrastructure, overall, is better prepared for an influx of visitors than many of the surrounding, smaller communities. "Starting just to the west of West Plains, the path of totality is measured in seconds, not minutes, so driving an extra twenty miles to our city center is crucial to maximizing the eclipse experience. Additionally, as the county seat of Howell County, resources are available to provide amenities and entertainment to add to the special experience, and a four-lane highway is at our door step."

Phat Sal's West adds park location

The Hillbilly Fairgrounds at the Laurie City Park have shelter buildings that are under private ownership, but also under contract with the City of Laurie to be open and in business during the Hillbilly Fair. Phat Sal's is leasing the former Burger Shack, the first in line of shelter buildings. It is a premium location and has hosted a BBQ business, and the former JJs at the Copper Pot.

Phat Sal's West debuted a new item, smoked chicken wings, at the Hillbilly Fair. The wings sold out and were such a hit that Phat Sal's West went

back to the Laurie City Park to run a satellite business from their main store in the Laurie Terrace Mall on Highway 5 in the same shelter building. They transferred carry-out pizza orders with their phones ringing at the park, and are able to serve a limited menu at the Phat Sal's at the Park location. Pizza, wings, their famous parmesan truffle fries, sub sandwiches and tiramisu and dessert cannoli round out the Laurie City Park location of Phat Sal's West. The new smoked wings are available bone-in, with a variety of choices of sauces. We chose the sweet and tangy golden Carolina sauced. The team sold out of their smoked wings again on Sunday, closing at 5 p.m. with 80 pounds of chicken wings served.

The ownership of Phat Sal's West has also made an interesting shift. Two servers at the popular west side restaurant

recently took the helm. The former owners made the move back to their home state of Colorado after bringing the business from the Bagnell Dam Strip to the Laurie Terrace Mall. They offered the business to two of their servers, Shelby Sandborn and T.J. Sutton. The two took over, along with Chef Caleb Tallmage, Sutton's husband. He trained to make the incredible pizza under the former owner and chef, but Tallmage, Sandborn and Sutton have added a little of their own flair, such as the smoked wings and smoked turkey to the menu. Otherwise, Sutton said the desire was to keep everything in place that customers have come to expect and love about Phat Sal's West Italian menu. Another change was expanding the weekly ravioli special into a rounded pasta special. Lorelei Schiermann came with the culinary team and was staffing the food shack on Sunday. She then took the Hillbilly Fair stage to teach a dance class when the crowds slowed down Sunday afternoon. She is a dance teacher and plans to open a dance studio in the Laurie Terrace Mall.

The Laurie City Park location will continue to be open on Sunday afternoons from 12-5 p.m. as long as customers want to keep enjoying eating al fresco dining in the picnic table area. The ladies are interested in advancing community spirit in Laurie, and Laurie Parks Director James Bryant and the Laurie Board of Alderman are supportive. Sutton and Sandborn are sponsoring a Witches Night Out event near Halloween and an Enchanted Walk on two different evenings this holiday season run of the Enchanted Village of Lights.

ocal restaurants Tavern at Trails End and The Tavern Smokehouse will be hosting a visit from America's Best

Restaurants in mid-October 2023. America's Best Restaurants, a

The Tavern Smokehouse opened about a year after the Buchanans opened Trails End. They offer a full barbecue menu of sandwiches, bowls, plates and sides.


