Osage Beach

Aldermen considering phase-in approach to raising utility rates

Public hearing set June 20 on more modest increases over two years

Osage Beach residents who pay utility bills will get another opportunity to voice their opinions after the board of aldermen last week gave its unofficial blessing to a revamped water and sewer rate proposal.

A public hearing will be held during the regular board meeting Thursday, June 20. Aldermen will consider first reading of an ordinance establishing the new rate structure. If approved, second reading would be at the first regular meeting in July.

City staff went back to the drawing board after a proposal in March to raise water rates 35 percent and sewer rates 85 percent drew a packed house

for a public hearing. The consensus among the public then was that the increases were exorbitant, especially for residents on fixed incomes. The suggestion was to phase in the increases rather than implement one large rate hike.

Aldermen asked city staff to come back with other options, which they did May 16.

According to comments by City Administrator Jeana Woods at the May 16 meeting, the financial activity that the city has experienced since mid-2022 has outpaced historical cost trends that have affected the data used for forecasting the rates that were presented in March. Simply, costs have outpaced utility rate fees and now the city is playing catch-up. Woods explained that water and

sewer rate increases are needed to replenish reserves and to continue to fund repairs to the system as it ages. The city has used income from the Community Improvement Tax (CIT) for several years to subsidize the water and sewer departments at about \$1.9 million a year. The board now believes the utility rates should cover water and sewer costs rather than using CIT funds, or a pay-as-you-go approach rather than rely on reserves.

"Economic factors such as inflation, supply chain issues, etc., as well as unexpected system failures, have contributed to the unprecedented increase in expenditures since mid-

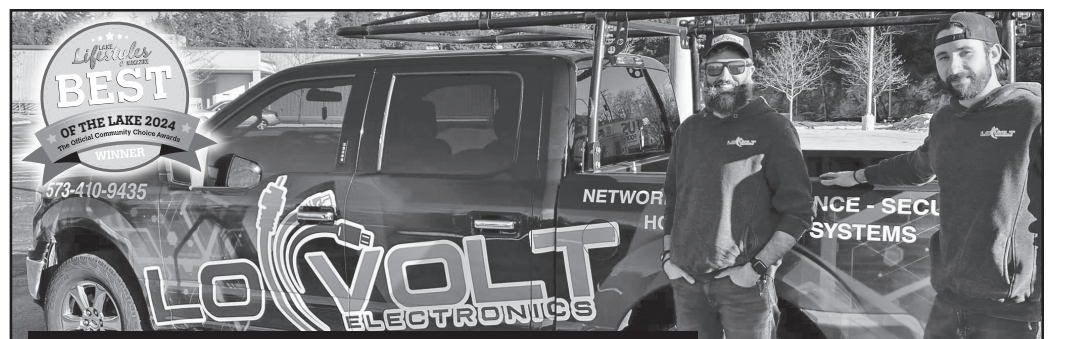

to-late 2022 to present day," Woods said.

Options

Woods presented two options for the board to consider. One was a full-rate, aggregate increase of 33 percent for both water and sewer. That would phase the need for CIT subsidy to meet fund reserve needs more quickly.

The option the board chose by consensus was a two-year phase-in of rate increases to meet sewer and water system needs and to rebuild the reserve account. Aldermen felt that would be more palatable for residents.

The proposed aggregate rate adjustments that will be considered during a public hearing are:

- Effective in 2024 for 5/8-inch meters (about 90 percent of users), the aggregate increases:

- 17 percent increase for in-city users, or approximately \$9.65 a month for water and sewer

- 17 percent increase for out-of-city users, or about \$26.77 more per month

- 18 percent increase for multi-family in-city users, or about \$146.80 for multi-family facilities per month/\$9.18 per unit

- 14 percent increase for commercial in-city (using 1-inch meter), or about \$17.48 more a month.

- Effective in 2025 for 5/8-inch meters, the aggregate increase for water and sewer would be:

- 14 percent increase for in-city users per month, or about \$9.19 per month

- 13 percent increase for out-of-city users, or \$22.94 per month increase

- 14 percent increase for residential multi-family facilities, or \$138.24 per month/\$8.64 per unit

- 13 percent increase for in-city commercial (with 1-inch meter), of \$17.69 month

"The city is committed to operating its water and sewer systems in a safe, lawful and

financially sound manner, and providing excellent water and sewer utility services," Woods said in a recent news release. "To achieve this goal, it is necessary to increase user fee rates."

Rate modifications are needed for the purpose of operating, maintaining and improving the water and sewer systems and to replenish adequate reserves and ensure revenues for overall operation and maintenance of the system are generated, she continued.

The city's water system was built in the early 2000s and currently serves nearly 6,100 users. The city's eight wells with four water towers produced nearly 380 million gallons of water for the system's users.

The city's sewer system was built in the 1980s and currently serves nearly 7,100 users. The system includes over 1,200 grinder pump stations and 59 sewer lift stations. Sewer flows from the system's users and equate to more than 352 million gallons in 2023.

Over the past four years, the number of utility users has grown 6 percent in both the water and sewer systems.

Aldermen certify election results, appoint president

The Camdenton Board of Aldermen approved accepting the certified results of the Tuesday, April 2, General Municipal Election at their Tuesday, April 16, meeting.

Assistant City Administrator/City Clerk Renee Kingston administered the oath of office to the elected officials. The officials included Daniel Ousley - Ward I, Sandy Gentry - Ward II, Don Neuharth - Ward III, and Bill Jeffries - Special Road District Commissioner. The board also approved Alderwoman Sandy Gentry to continue to serve as board president.

Public works

The board presented a resolution of appreciation and congratulations to Camdenton Public Works Director William 'Bill' Jeffries for his 27 years and eight months service to the city. Jeffries began working with the city in the position of water laborer in 1996. He was then promoted to water crew leader. In 2000 he was promoted to Public Works Director.

The board also approved promoting Camdenton Interim Public Works Director Chris Finley to take Jeffries' position as public works director. Finley's position is effective Wednesday, May 1. Dustin Sneller was hired to fill a vacant Laborer 1 position in the water department. He began employment with the city on Wednesday, April 17.

The public works department responded to four calls relating to sewer backups due to the excessive rain in March. It was reported utility needs are increasing in the city, with the majority being for COMO fiber. The street department is cutting trees in the rows and on city property. They have started mowing the airport property and city lots. MoSeal met on Tuesday, April 16, to conduct a walkthrough for annual overlaying of city streets for planning purposes. The street overlay project bids were underbudget and the work is slated to begin in May.

Planning and zoning

A public hearing was held on Tuesday, April 16, for a rezoning request by Tori and Tracy Brown and Cody and Scott Stonitsch to rezone property from R-1 Single Family Residential to C-2 Highway Commercial. The property is located at 118 Lakeview Drive.

Citizens Teresa and Scotty Henderson, Troy and Elizabeth Onstott and Tom McDowell spoke in opposition to the request. They did not want the property zoned commercial because it is located next to homes. The property in question is contiguous to both commercial and residential property. They voiced con-

cerns over what type of business would be allowable in C-2 zoning.

According to City Administrator Jeff Hooker, the Browns had discussed building a structure that would hold cars. The citizens were wary because the C-2 zoning would leave the property wide open to any kind of business, and if the property were sold the new owner could function in a way that would not be conducive to residential zoning.

"We are trying to possibly negotiate a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) that would allow for only a parking lot," Hooker said.

If the property sold, the CUP would go away and the new owner would have to apply for a different use/zoning. If an owner constructs a building or a business, the CUP, if approved, would be rescinded back to residential use.

"We are not sure if we can get it done," Hooker said. "I am confident the zoning will not be C-2."

Since there was opposition, the decision was tabled until the Tuesday, May 7, Camdenton Board of Aldermen meeting.

Code and fire

Camdenton Code and Fire Official Christy May reported she inspected 13 businesses and re-inspected eight in March. There were 18 sign violations and two commercial site inspections. She also assisted Osage Beach Fire Department with inspecting Lake Regional Health System Hospital on Tuesday, March 5, and Wednesday, March 6. May also attended a monthly code officials meeting on Tuesday, March 26, in Rocky Mount.

Hooker reported the pool resurfacing project bid came in \$30,000 under budget. Demolition is complete, the restoration has started, and the resurfacing project is expected to be finished in time to open the pool in May. Tile work is complete along with some minor repairs.

City finances

City revenue for the past month was 4.26 percent above last year and the city is at 3.81 percent for the year. Since October 2019, revenues are at 45 percent to the positive. The total general fund tax receipts in March were \$182,232.95. Transportation receipts were \$89,614.50, and the capital improvement received \$91,116.38.

The city of Camdenton requested bids on a 23,000 square foot, two-level community center. The project would have moved forward if the bids came in within budget. Unfortunately, the bids came in between \$7.6 and \$7.8 million. Hooker reported this was way over budget and they will rework the plans with the architect to attempt to cut costs.

Camden County

County commission approves bids

The Camden County Commission opened and approved Road and Bridge bids during its meeting on May 7.

The Commission received only one bid for asphalt overlay from Capital Paving.

The bid was for 12,800 tons of asphalt at 106.75 per ton to pave 21 roads.

The bid was unanimously accepted.

Commissioners also accepted a bid for Tax Sale publication.

Two bids were submitted by the Lake Sun and The Reporter.

The Lake Sun bid \$285 per broadsheet page while The Reporter bid \$320.

The Commission unanimously approved the Lake Sun's bid.

Four requests for surplus funds were also submitted to the Commission.

The first request was for Blackhawk Estates #1 for \$67,215.19.

The remaining three requests were for \$26,890.12, \$979.60 and \$6,828.15 — which were all submitted by the same owners.

Presiding Commissioner Ike Skelton noted that all the requests had been looked over by the County Attorney and Treasurer, and the Commission unanimously approved all four.

Lastly, the Commission ap-

proved the Annual Lake Area Narcotics Enforcement Group Justice Assistance Grant. This grant provides funding for the drug task force which includes budget items such as life insurance, medical insurance,

workman's compensation, travel, office rent, etc.

The Commission unanimously approved the LANEG JAG Grant in the amount of \$616,000.



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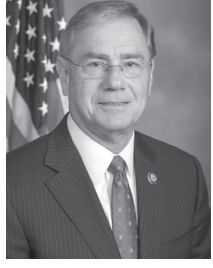

The Pied Typer

Mother's Day slipped by with little fanfare at our house. Susie, the mother of two, had good wishes from her children who live in the St. Louis area. The two of us celebrated with a nice brunch at Bear Creek Valley restaurant before settling in for the day at home.

I was only able to offer silent "Happy Mother's Day" to my mom who died about a dozen years ago.

There isn't a day goes by that I don't think of Maxine, the mother to myself and my sister. Our family was a bit strange in that we called our parents by their given names — John and Maxine — rather than mom and dad. Occasionally, we'd refer to our mom as "mother," but that was rare.

Maxine was my protector, as most moms are. My dad, of the Greatest Generation and a World War II pilot, was domineering. Maxine often was the buffer between my dad and me. She often deflected his dominance. More accurately, she absorbed his pithy personality to spare my hurt.

Both parents were smokers, my mom quitting after some loving coercion from one of her young grandchildren. The details escape me now, but she quit cold turkey. My dad quit before she did, and I remember him replacing the nicotine addiction with chewing gum and mints.

I was in my early 30s when Maxine was diagnosed with lung cancer, many years after she had quit. That was 40 years ago and there weren't a lot of treatment options like there are today. Regardless, surgeons in Omaha removed the diseased portion of a lung. She recovered and continued limited treatment as per her wishes.

She was nearing the magical five-year cancer-free mark when the ugly disease returned. There would be no more surgery, she said, because she didn't want to go through it all again.

Maxine was a strong, courageous woman and stood tall with the disease as long as she could. She continued to run the household. She cooked. She did laundry. She kept the house as clean as she could under the circumstance.

It was the way it was for that generation, apparently.

As her disease progressed, she was in and out of hospitals in Omaha (about a 50 minute drive from Hamburg), and also spent some time in the Hamburg hospital for minor flare-ups.

I was living at the Lake then, having moved here in 2001. As her days waned, I remember driving six hours to Nebraska Methodist Hospital in Omaha to see her, then returning the six hours to the Lake the same day for work. Sometimes it was about five hours up and back to the Hamburg hospital.

On a Sunday in October, I made the trip to the Hamburg hospital again. She was sitting up in bed, a supply of oxygen being pumped into her dying lungs through her nose. She was cheerful, chatty and smiling. As I readied to make the trip home, she took my hand in her soft, warm hand and said, "Oh, Dan."

Three days later she was dead. No more Mother's Day visits. No more phone calls.

Her birthday is May 18. No more birthday wishes. The sound of her sweet, soft voice no more — except in the echoes of my mind.

Happy Mother's Day, Maxine. Happy Birthday.

Session beginning to wind down

State Releases April 2024 General Revenue Report

Missouri's April 2024 general revenue report reflects a significant increase in net collections compared to the same period last year, rising by 20.3 percent to reach \$1.38 billion. This growth contributed to a year-to-date increase of 2.7 percent in net general revenue, totaling \$10.70 billion for the fiscal year. Key highlights include a notable 22.1 percent monthly increase in sales and use tax collections, which contributed to a yearly growth of 10.2 percent, reaching \$2.67 billion.

Additionally, pass through entity tax collections saw a substantial increase from zero to \$537.2 million for the year, significantly boosting overall revenue. Despite a yearly decrease of 7.3 percent in individual income tax collections, monthly collections for this tax type rose by 10.6 percent.

On the other hand, refunds increased by 5.5 percent year-to-date, amounting to \$1.47 billion, with a 2.0 percent monthly increase. The report indicates a positive overall trend in revenue growth for Missouri, driven largely by strong performances in sales and use tax collections, pass through entity taxes, and other miscellaneous collections. This growth is particularly noteworthy given the varying performance across different tax types, with some showing declines in yearly collections but compensating with strong monthly gains.

Final Week

Entering into the final week of the 2024 legislative session, the Missouri General Assembly has continued to push forward in an effort to pass several vital pieces of legislation. Several such bills have advanced, with Gov-

ernor Mike Parson officially signing off on several truly agreed and finally passed bills.

HB 2016 was signed into law on Wednesday, May 8, as Governor Parson traveled to the southern border in Texas to receive an update on Missouri personnel deployed to the border in support of Operation Lone Star. During the visit, the Governor signed HB 2016, the supplemental appropriations bill that funds the deployment, into law. The deployment strategy involves implementing rotating shifts for National Guard members and dispatching highway patrol troopers equipped with standard law enforcement gear, all of whom have volunteered for the mission. In line with these efforts, the Missouri General Assembly approved a \$2.2 million supplemental budget request to support border security initiatives and replenish the Governor's emergency response fund.

HB 1803 would expand the MO-BUCK\$ program, which helps local lenders offer reduced interest rates to eligible borrowers. Managed by the Treasurer's Office, MOBUCK\$ uses linked deposits to provide funds to lenders at discounted rates, enabling them to lower interest rates by 2-3 percent for borrowers statewide. The program, which temporarily paused new applications due to high demand, will receive a substantial \$400 million supplement through HB 1803, addressing increased demand and inflationary pressures. MOBUCK\$ supports farmers and small businesses by reducing loan interest burdens and optimizing economic returns for Missourians. The bill's approval signifies Missouri's commitment to economic stability and resident support.

HB 2634 will prevent abortion clinics from receiving Medicaid reimbursements. This legislation prohibits public funds, including Medicaid reimbursements, from supporting abortion facilities or affiliates and grants taxpayers and the Attorney General the ability to enforce these provisions through legal action. Additionally, the bill amends existing statutes to require MO HealthNet participants to use services only from qualified providers and empowers the Department of Social Services to

terminate contracts with unqualified providers due to specific offenses. It also prohibits reimbursement to abortion facilities under the "Uninsured Women's Health Program".

SB 727 and HB 2287 together form a comprehensive legislative package focused on education reform in Missouri.

These bills aim to permanently raise the minimum teacher salary to \$40,000 annually and increase salaries for experienced teachers with a master's degree to \$48,000 by 2027, with annual adjustments tied to the Consumer Price Index. The package also boosts state funding for early childhood education programs, expands access to Empowerment Scholarship Accounts, encourages 5-day school weeks in larger municipalities, establishes the Elementary Literacy Fund, doubles small school grant funding to \$30 million annually, safeguards retirement benefits for educators continuing to teach after retirement, and initiates the Teacher Recruitment and Retention State Scholarship Program. These measures collectively aim to enhance teacher compensation, support early education, and improve educational opportunities statewide.

HB 1751 will allow the City of Raymore and its residents to have a voice in where Kansas City is allowed to place a landfill near Raymore city limits. HB 1751 increases the municipal approval radius from one-half mile to one mile for landfills, solid waste processing facilities, demolition landfills, and sanitary landfills. This change means that the Department of Natural Resources will not issue a solid waste disposal operating permit to one municipality without the approval of an adjoining municipalities' governing body if the permit location is within one mile of the adjoining municipalities' border.

The Following Bills Still Await the Governor's Signature:

HB 2111, a measure aimed at bolstering government transparency and accountability, awaits the Governor's signature. This bill grants the State Auditor broader authority to audit any political subdivision where evidence of misconduct, including fraud or waste, exists, without requiring an

invitation from local authorities or voter petition. It also ensures the confidentiality of audit records to protect whistleblowers. This legislation fulfills Missouri's commitment to transparency and responsible governance.

SB 912 encompasses a comprehensive set of measures aimed at supporting the military community. It includes provisions such as enabling a full state tax deduction for military and National Guard enlistment and re-enlistment bonuses, simplifying the process for veterans to obtain a handicap placard for their vehicles, covering expenses for military specialty license plates for veterans, and mandating collaboration between the Missouri Veterans Commission and the Department of Mental Health to combat veteran suicide. Notably, the bill extends benefits to veterans who served on active duty or in the National Guard between 2001 and 2021, streamlining procedures for disabled veterans to present VA documentation instead of requiring alternative paperwork to the DMV to verify their disability status.

HB 1495 emphasizes the state's commitment to addressing veteran mental health and preventing suicide. This legislation tasks the Missouri Veterans Commission, in collaboration with the Department of Mental Health, to expand efforts in line with the Commander John Scott Hannon Veterans Mental Health Care Improvement Act of 2019. The bill mandates a thorough review and subsequent implementation of procedures, programs, and treatment options to combat veteran suicide, with a focus on tailored support and proactive measures. HB 1495 also requires annual reporting on progress and effectiveness, demonstrating Missouri's proactive approach and dedication to ensuring the well-being of those who have served the nation. HB 2057 aims to modernize the state's regulation of video service providers by expanding the definition of "video service" to include streaming content. The bill emphasizes fairness and innovation by exempting streaming providers from franchise fees, aligning with federal law that prohibits attaching franchise fees to internet services.

A story of trauma

In less than 30 seconds, Jimmy Myers went from a peaceful day picking up black walnuts on his Ulman farm to needing emergency care.

Myers, then 77, was thrown from his four-wheeler when the throttle stuck and sent him full-speed into a barbed wire fence. His injuries included several lacerations — including one that nearly took off his right ear — a broken and dislocated shoulder and a broken foot, hand and wrist.

Despite his injuries, he remained calm.

"I knew I was hurt and I needed to get somewhere," he said.

Myers found the care he needed at Lake Regional Emergency Department.

May is National Trauma Awareness Month. Sherrie Williams, R.N., trauma nurse coordinator for Lake Regional, explains the benefits of seeking care at a trauma center.

"Lake Regional is a state-designated trauma center because we have staff and resources ready to treat traumatic injuries 24 hours a day, seven days a week," Williams said. "Not all emergency departments apply for trauma center designation, and none of the hospitals in Jefferson City, Lebanon or Rolla is a trauma center. So we meet a critical need for our region."

As a Level III Trauma Center, Lake Regional has acute care and trauma surgeons on call 24/7. All of the Emergency Department physicians, physician assistants and nurses complete annual trauma education and maintain trauma-specific certification. In addition, Lake Regional's Intensive Care Unit nurses maintain a trauma-specific certification and also complete annual trauma education.

So when Myers arrived at Lake Regional Emergency Department — driven by his wife of 48 years, Peggy — he found a team ready to treat his many injuries. His care included numerous stitches and two surgeries, including a total shoulder replacement. He spent 10 days in the hospital.

"From the day I went into the hospital, I had nothing but good care," he said. "The doctors and nurses who took care of me were just great." After his hospitalization, Myers received home health care and physical therapy to improve his shoulder. Even as he continues to heal, he's



thankful to be back to life on the farm. "I still mow and weed eat, and I hunt and fish," he said. "I'm doing real well."

Deadline near for LIHEAP application

Ameren Missouri is reminding its customers that the deadline for applying to the state's Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is May 31. The company partners with more than 800 community agencies, such as Central Missouri Community Action (CMCA), to help customers apply for LIHEAP and additional energy assistance programs.

If you qualify for LIHEAP, you will receive assistance in the form of a one-time payment of your choice for your heating or cooling bill. Qualifications are based on the number of people in your household, your household income and your energy source.

You may also qualify for the Energy Crisis Intervention Program (ECIP). If you are in financial crisis, ECIP can provide additional assistance of up to \$800 for winter energy costs now through May 31. Starting June 1, ECIP can also provide up to \$600 for summer energy costs. A disconnection notice is required for this program. Junior midfielder Lucy Moore scored to break the 1-1 draw for the No. 4 Bulldogs (12-7-1) over the No. 5 Lady Indians (12-8) in the second half.

Fresh off scoring her 100th career goal on Senior Night, striker Grace Larson tied the match at 1-1 with under 15 minutes left before halftime.

"We have had a fantastic run," said Lady Indians coach

MDC reports hunters took 43,380 birds this spring

Top harvest counties for the regular season were Franklin, Callaway and Texas

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows turkey hunters checked 43,380 birds during Missouri's 2024 regular spring turkey season, April 15 through May 5. Top harvest counties for the regular season were Franklin with 940 birds harvested, Callaway with 822 and Texas with 780.

Young turkey hunters also harvested 3,739 turkeys over the youth weekend, April 6 and 7, bringing the overall 2024 spring turkey harvest to

47,119. According to MDC, that is a 6-percent increase in total harvest from 2023 and a 20-percent increase in total harvest compared to the previous five-year average.

"2024 was the third year in a row in which harvest increased," said MDC Wild Turkey Biologist Nick Oakley. "The ability to hunt all day on private land may have had a role in this increase. Successively better hatches starting in 2021 meant there were also likely more turkeys on the landscape as well. We are still looking at the data to see how much of the increase in harvest can be attributed to the new regulation, as well as how many new hunters the regulation change helped to get into the field. A

6-percent increase in harvest is in line with what we would have expected knowing that many factors play into harvest totals."

Last year, young turkey hunters harvested 2,566 turkeys over the spring youth season and hunters harvested 41,977 during the regular spring season for a 2023 spring season total harvest of 44,543.

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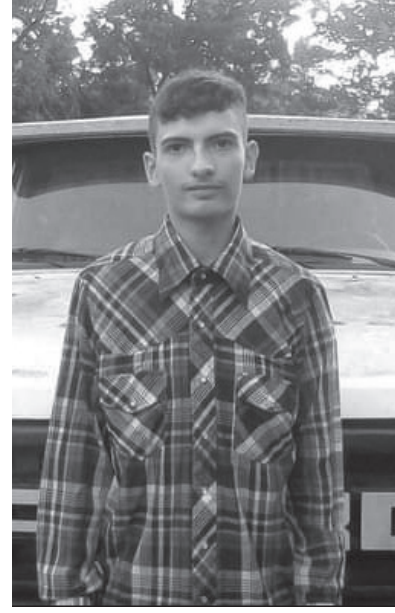

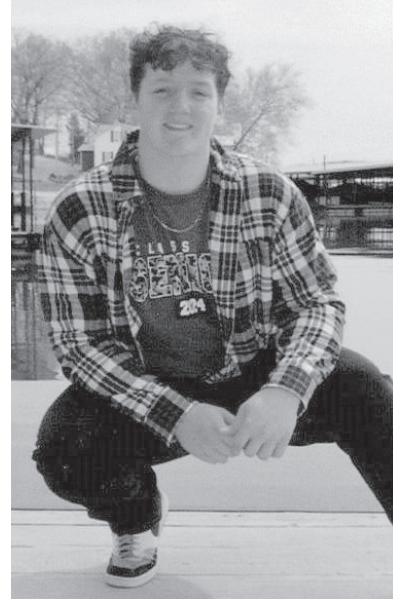

New parents' bill of rights raises concerns of teacher intimidation

Concerns over teacher intimidation and the critical thinking skills of students were discussed during a Wednesday House hearing on legislation creating a parents' bill of rights.

House bill 2160, sponsored by Rep. Ben Baker, R-Neosho, would "provide a list of rights that parents may require school districts that receive federal and state money to follow," and would penalize such school districts violating them by withholding state funding.

The listed rights include being able to review curriculum and books, to visit their child in school during hours and to receive school records. It differs from a previous version of the bill brought up last year as it does not include a provision for a teachers' bill of rights.

The bill also includes what Baker referred to as "guardrails to protect against the teaching of extreme racial themes in the classroom."

The language of the bill cites the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and states that "teachers and students cannot be compelled to adopt, affirm, or profess ideas" as it would violate Titles IV and VI of the act.

Rep. Marlene Terry, D-St. Louis, aggressively criticized the bill for threatening to take away funds from schools and its framing of the Civil Rights Act.

Terry also said she has heard that "a lot of students are actu-

ally walking out of their classrooms because they're not able to be taught some of the things that they want to hear and be taught."

Another opponent of the bill, Rep. Doug Mann, D-Columbia, said that the bill could prevent students from learning important skills.

"We have seen (this) in states that have passed things like this," Mann said. "That's a detriment to the students as well because they're not getting the activities, they're not getting the education that they need to grow and be productive members in a society that is diverse."

Noting her experience as a teacher, Rep. Kathy Steinhoff, D-Columbia, said reading the bill for the first time "felt very confrontational."

Steinhoff called most of the listed rights reasonable but noted that they already are given to parents. She also said how some rights could violate parents' rights, citing an example of how visiting during school hours could make some parents uncomfortable, and that it could harm teacher recruitment and retention "at a time when we really need to work on that."

"I wish (this bill) would look more at how parents' rights and educators' rights ... can work together to make sure that we have good, outstanding educational outcomes for our kids," Steinhoff said.

Rep. Ed Lewis, R-Moberly, spoke supportively of the bill

Rep. Ed Lewis, R-Moberly, spoke supportively of the bill but said it should be reworked to include language with teachers' rights to prevent it from scaring them from doing their jobs.

but said it should be reworked to include language with teachers' rights to prevent it from scaring them from doing their jobs.

"I understand people's opposition, especially teachers' opposition," Lewis said, "because they're afraid Big Brother's sitting on their shoulder waiting for them to make a mistake and someone's going to come after them."

In witness testimony, Dava-Leigh Brush, speaking against the bill on behalf of the Missouri Equity Education Partnership-Action, said it would harm education and diversity in the state, and prevent teachers from forming authentic relationships with their students.

Sharon Geuea Jones, representing the Missouri State Conference of the NAACP, voiced opposition to the bill and cited cases of racially motivated violent bullying in the Republic School District.

"The response that we're getting from the administrators in that district is that they are afraid to do anything because they don't want to be seen as doing CRT (critical race theory)," Jones said.

Jones also mentioned how parents whose children face this aggressive harassment are "trying to figure out if it's safe to send their kids to school."
