

FISHING

MISSOURI DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION



'ou don't need to spend a lot of money on fancy equipment to go fishing. In fact, the following basic items will equip you nicely for your first outings.

Shopping List

- A good all-around rod-and-reel combination something that will let you catch fish of all sizes. Ask the clerk for a medium-light rod from 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 feet long and a matching reel that will handle lines from 4-pound test to 12-pound test. (The "pound test" tells you how strong the line is.)
- Monofilament line, 8-pound test, light blue, clear or green. Check your reel or the instructions that came with it to determine how much 8-poundtest line it will hold. Usually a 100-yard spool is large enough to fill a medium-light reel.
- Package of hooks, size 6 •
- A "wheel" of split shot in assorted sizes •
- One package of three bell sinkers, 1/2-ounce •
- A small plastic tackle box
- Two or three bobbers
- Stringer
- Landing net (optional, unless you're fishing for trout)

A Missouri fishing permit (if you are between 16 and 64 or are a nonresident) and a trout permit if your target is trout, except in the state's four trout parks, where you will need a daily permit. Learn more about permits.

Other useful items

- Pair of needle-nose pliers
- Pair of fingernail clippers
- Cooler or bucket (also bring ice to keep your catch cool if fishing in warm months)

Choose a Rod and Reel That Works for You

Before buying the rod and reel, consider the type you would feel most comfortable using.

With an open-face spinning reel, the rod is held in the right hand with the reel on the underside for both casting and retrieving. Right-handed anglers reel with their left hand; however, most open-face reels can be set up to reel with either hand.

Closed-face reels with levers are also held in the same underside position. With a push-button, closed-face spinning reel, the rod is held reel up. Cast with the rod in the right hand and switch the rod to the left hand before retrieving. Reel with the right hand.

Bagnell Dam Report

The lake level was 658.2, generation of 1,000 CFS (cubic feet per second) throughout the week for a lake level of 658.3 by the weekend. Surface temperature at Bagnell Dam was 79 degrees. Truman Lake was at the 705.3 level. To Note: the Lower Lake is from the dam to the 22-mile mark; Mid-Lake is from the 22- to 44-mile mark, the Upper Osage is from the 44-mile mark to the Route 65 Bridge.

Tournament Results

No tournaments were reported last weekend.

Bagnell Dam spillway/Osage River

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Good on jigs along rock banks. Crappie: Fair on minnows along current breaks. Catfish: Good on cut shad and skipjack herring.

Lower Lake

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Slow on lipless crankbaits in the backs of coves or on topwater lures, swimbaits and drop shot rig finesse worms along wave breaks. Crappie: Good shooting jigs under main lake docks.

Gravois

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Fair on Texas-rigged soft plastics around shallow docks. Crappie: Good trolling crankbaits halfway back in creeks or shooting jigs under main channel docks. Catfish: Good drifting cut shad and skipjack herring.

Mid-Lake

Water clarity: Stained. Black bass: Fair on drop shot rig finesse worms and Texas-rigged 10-inch plastic worms around brush 20 to 25 feet deep along secondary points. Crappie: Fair on jigs over brush 15 feet deep.

Grand Glaize

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Fair on Choppos, buzz baits, shaky head worms, square bill crankbaits and drop shot rig finesse worms around logs in backs of coves. Crappie: Good on jigs around brush 8 to 25 feet deep.





Niangua

Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Fair on suspending stickbaits, jigs and crankbaits around docks in coves. Crappie: Slow on jigs and minnows 8 to 12 feet deep.

Upper Osage


Water clarity: Clear. Black bass: Fair on jigs and Texas-rigged plastic worms around docks. Crappie: Fair on minnows around docks 8 feet deep. White bass: Fair on Roostertails along points. Catfish: Good on cut shad and prepared baits.

Truman Dam spillway

Water clarity: Clear. Crappie: Slow on jigs and minnows in the dead-water channel. White bass and hybrids: Slow on topwater lures and small swimbaits in the evenings.

Award-winning professionals at the Lake

TWO PGA GOLF PROS ARE ENHANCING THE GAME OF GOLF THROUGH PROGRAMS AND COMMUNITY SERVICE

ake of the Ozarks is home to 13 golf courses and several of the PGA golf professionals who manage those facilities have been recognized by their peers with some high honors. Let's take a closer look at two of these dynamic PGA professionals who have done, and continue to do, great things in our community.

THE FUTURE LOOKS BRIGHT

Mike Cummings has been the PGA head golf professional and general manger at the Eldon Golf Club since 2003. Before going to Eldon, Cummings spent two years at a junior college before enlisting in the United States Air Force. He spent four years on active duty and four years in the reserves.

Cummings got his start in the golf business at Tan-Tar-A Resort (now Margaritaville Lake Resort) in 2000. During his tenure at Tan-Tar-A, Cummings used his GI Bill to start the educational process of becoming a PGA member. He spent three seasons as an assistant golf professional at Tan-Tar-A before moving on to become the head professional at Eldon in 2003. Cummings would go on to achieve Class A membership in the PGA of America at Eldon. During his time at the club they have elevated his responsibilities to general manger as well as head golf professional.

Eldon has prospered in large part by his involvement in the community, the local veterans associations and with junior golfers and their parents. The PGA of America started an initiative called PGA Junior League in 2011. For the past eight years Cummings and his team have had more than 60 kids participate each year, growing his program into one of the best in Missouri. This year marks the fourth straight year they have sent a team to Regionals. Eight teams qualify each year out of hundreds from PGA sections, the Gateway, Midwest and South Central that make up our region.

Cummings' passion for junior golf started when his son Eli showed interest in the sport his dad makes as a career. Cummings and his family travel nationwide with Eli as he competes and was a member of past Jr. League regional qualifying teams. Cummings credits the Eldon member-

ship for making all of this possible. "I wouldn't be able to do what I do with the juniors and

Eli if the club didn't support the youth in our community and take a vested interest in the future health of the club by promoting a safe and secure place for our juniors to come each day to play and practice," Cummings said.

For over 20 years the club and Cummings have produced multiple high school state qualifiers, all state players, a state champion and helped crown Matt Miller and the 2023 Missouri Junior Stroke Play Champion, Teagan Hull.

Cummings has demonstrated a passion for his club and the junior golfers in his community and the future looks bright. With Matt Frey, Eldon's golf coach, and Cummings teaching the players they have a very solid foundation. Both boys and girls teams have three players under the age of 14 who are already accomplished players in their age divisions. Cummings has been recognized by his peers within the Gateway PGA Section by being awarded the 2018 and 2022 Youth Player Development Award, the 2016 Patriot Award for his work with wounded veterans through PGA Hope, and in 2018 he completed an advanced class to obtain his Certified Golf Professional status in Golf Operations.

BECOMING A MASTER PROFESSIONAL

Larry Salsman, the director of golf at Osage National Resort accomplished master professional status in 2022. Obtaining PGA master professional status is the highest educational designation a PGA professional can currently obtain.

Since 1970 when the master professional designation was established just over 450 PGA golf professionals have achieved this honor. Currently there are over 29,000 PGA professionals worldwide.

Salsman has also been honored by his peers as the Gateway PGA Resort Merchandiser of the Year three times, most recently in 2022. To earn the designation master professional, Salsman first had to complete a series of educational accomplishments to become PGA certified. He became certified in both golf operations and general management in 2017 and 2018.

To begin the master professional program he had to be a member of the PGA in good standing for 10 years and be in the selected career path for master specialization for 10 years. He began the process of obtaining master professional status by completing a 264 page project containing a three year business plan of his facility. Topics that were included but not limited to were: tournament operations, golf cart fleet management, merchandising, inventory control and he had to highlight a specific area of his golf operation that he had implemented. Salsman chose his success and understanding of yield management and dynamic pricing as it relates to tee time management.


Hundreds of hours of time and effort culminated in the finished project being submitted to a panel of three of his peers at the PGA headquarters in Frisco, Texas. Once accepted he went to the home office and did an hour-long presentation and answered a minimum of 45 questions over his presentation to satisfy the committee of his expertise on the subject matter. The panel then deliberated and voted to honor him as a master professional. Salsman has the distinct honor of being the first PGA master professional to successfully complete and pass the certification process at the new home office of the PGA of

America in Frisco.



or many, Labor Day is the last day of summer and with that it is time to tuck your baby in for a long
winter's nap.

Winterization is simply the process of making sure that any part of your boat that could contain raw water is drained and replaced with antifreeze. This is essential if you own an inboard boat and live in an area where temperatures drop below freezing for any amount of time.

Winterizing your boat is important because it protects your boat from damage that can occur during the winter, and it can help you get back on the water faster in the spring:

- **Freeze damage:** When water freezes, it expands by about 9% and can put a lot of pressure on your boat's parts, which can cause cracks, splits and other damage.
- **Mold and mildew:** Water left on your boat can lead to mold and mildew growth, which can corrode metal and electrical components.
- **Corrosion:** Unprotected boats can corrode, which can reduce the efficiency and lifespan of your engine.
- **Fuel issues:** If you don't drain your fuel, algae can form and clog your filters and injectors.
- **Time:** Winterizing your boat now can save you time and energy when you're ready to get back on the water in the spring.

At what temperature should I winterize my boat?

32 degrees. Freshwater cooled engines without proper coolant can freeze when temperatures dip below 32°F. While an unexpected overnight frost may not freeze your engine, you should aim to start winterizing your boat well before 32 degrees.

Can you do it yourself? And what is the cost?

If you go the DIY route, it will cost you about \$250. If you take it to a professional mechanic, you're looking at \$500 and up. Like most things, it all depends on the size of your boat. For smaller boats, winterizing might mean disconnecting the battery and the portable fuel tank then draining the fuel from the engine. Winterizing is costly for larger boats with inboard power plants, water systems, live wells, heads and gallies.

How to winterize your boat

Boat winterization is changing the oil, fogging the engine, greasing the gears, etc. There are several -13 to be exact - steps you'll need to take to ensure your boat, its motor and systems are ready to go when the snow melts and the weather warms.

Step #1. Drain the engine

For inboards and stern drives, you'll need to locate and open the petcocks underneath the manifolds and on the sides of the engine block. Some engines will have bronze plugs similar to bilge plugs. Next, remove the water-pump hose from the bottom to let it drain completely.

Draining the engine will ensure the water in the cooling chambers can't freeze, expand and crack the engine block and manifolds, costing you up to tens of thousands of your hard-earned cash.

Step #2. Check the hull

While fiberglass is made to stand up to the sun, sand and saltwater, some snow will be its kryptonite. Snow eventually becomes ice, and when water freezes, it spreads, which can cause open hatches and window tracks to split, causing leaks. If you plan on utilizing out-

You should also check for stress cracks around the bow eye and Gelcoat blisters as they indicate structural damage. Accordingly, a professional should look at it if this is the case. Next, if your hull is aluminum, bang the drum slowly with a rubber mallet to knock out dents. After you work out your frustrations on the hull, scrape off any barnacles and other unwelcome hitchhikers stuck to your boat's bottom and sand away any

residue. Finally, a power wash will remove all other sea scum and dirt.

Step #3. Replace engine oil

Changing the engine oil is a must to eliminate moisture and prevent corrosion, as old oil in the crankcase of a stored boat forms acids. Extra water and humidity cause excessive wear, leading to loss of power, poor fuel economy and possible engine failure.

Step #4. Fog the engine

Just as changing the oil prevents corrosion, fogging prevents corrosion of inboard or outboard engines stored for an extended period. Fogging oils and sprays are specially formulated to penetrate deep into the engine and coat parts with a protective layer of anti-corrosive compound until spring.

Hook "ear muffs" and a garden hose to the engine, start it and then spray the fogging-solution lubricant directly into the air intake until it's gone.

Step #5. Add a high-quality fuel stabilizer

The next step is to treat your boat's fuel with a stabilizer to ensure carburetors and fuel injectors won't get clogged with varnish deposits that ruin fuel systems. After adding the stabilizer to the fuel, run the engine for at least 10 minutes so it circulates throughout the engine.

Step #6. Drain gear-case lubricant

Check the color of the liquid while draining the gear case, as it will indicate potential issues. If it's clear or amber-colored, the gear-case is well lubricated. If it's milk-colored, there may be water in the oil, meaning you'll want to replace the seals over the wintertime. If tiny chips of metal flow out, your gears are likely grinding against each other.

Step #7. Fill the engine block with antifreeze

Filling the engine block with antifreeze will prevent residual water from freezing and cracking. A non-toxic propylene glycol antifreeze is best, and your location should determine its strength.

Step #8. Grease gears and fittings

You'll likely locate your engine's grease fittings in the steering mechanism area. Use a high-quality marine lubricant to protect against rust, corrosion and oxidation. In addition, the owner's manual should list other vital areas that need greasing before winter storage.

Step #9. Drain fresh water plumbing systems

Heads, sinks, tanks and anywhere else, water accumulated during the season must be drained and pumped full with antifreeze to protect them and prevent moisture from gathering as you wait for the next boating season. Additionally, drain the other internal systems like the bilge (remove the plug to prevent moisture build-up in the hull) and raw water washdowns.

Step #10. Prevent mold and mildew buildup

The humidity of your boat's cabin may cause mold and mildew during its time in winter storage. The musty odor aside, mold and mildew can permanently damage upholstery and, worse, lead to respiratory illness in sensitive individuals. Below are some measures to consider:

Ventilate: You can use a device like cowl ventilators, clamshell ventilators and louvered ventilators or use a shrink wrap ventilators.

Dehumidify: You can reduce humidity with specialty moisture absorbing crystals from Star Brite, Mary Kate and other manufacturers. Treat: Or, use chlorine dioxide technology to treat the boat's cabin during storage or when recommissioning in the spring.

Step #11. Remove valuables

Boatyards rarely see people during the winter, which makes break-ins easy. To prevent your valuables from getting stolen, remove expensive electronics and other costly items from your vessel. In addition, your boat should have insurance, even when it's not on the water.

Step #12. Remove or disconnect batteries

This is an optional step, but it's wise to remove and charge your batteries while your boat is in storage. In any case, disconnect the cables or move the battery to the offsetting and take any on-marinized electronics indoors.

Step #13. Cover your boat

Finally, regardless of if your vessel is heading to storage, shield your boat with a durable cover or shrink wrap.

As the temperatures fall toward freezing, you'll know it's time to winterize your boat to protect it from all the elements. To find the latest information about frost/freeze in your area, visit the National Center for Environmental Information. Though we hate to see the boating season end, this is your chance to ensure your boat is ready for its first spring splash.



ainstream Country Music has lost it's soul. Just ask John Farrell.

Since 1968 Farrell has been playing traditional country music. No, not the kind you hear on the radio. Real country music.

"People ask me 'what do you play?' I play anything BG, Before Garth (Brooks)," he said.

It started out as a hobby for Farrell, something that used to generate income in the '70s. He was a drummer then. Today it's more about preserving country music and pure enjoyment. Now he plays the electric bass.

Farrell is the president of the Genuine Country Music Association, a non-profit formed at the Lake in 2009 in an effort to keep "the real thing" alive. The group was chartered after Farrell and some of his friends kept seeing traditional country music fade away.

"What they call country music today is a farce," he says. "The Country Music Association, the Grand Olde Opry has turned into bad rock."

So the idea was born to band together to preserve country music. In the process, it has also turned into an organization benefitting the community. In October each year, the GCMA hosts a Country Jamboree for the Lake Ozark State Fair Community College. The money stays in the Lake area, helping local students with the expenses of earning a degree.

The Jamboree will be held Oct. 13 starting at 2 p.m. at the Lodge of Four Seasons, Campana Hall, 315 Four Seasons Drive, Lake Ozark. Doors open at 1 p.m.

issouri is blessed with a great variety of trees, shrubs and woody vines. In autumn, their leaves turn color at different times, so Missourians enjoy a fall color season that may last six to eight weeks. It progresses in phases. Sassafras, sumac and Virginia creeper are some of the earliest to change, beginning in mid-September. By late September, black gum, bittersweet and dogwood are turning.

The peak of fall color in Missouri is usually around mid-October. This is when maples, ashes, hickories and oaks are at the height of their fall display. Normally by late October, the colors are fading and the leaves are dropping from the trees. Fall color is usually finished by the middle of November.

The progression of color change usually starts earliest in northern and western Missouri and moves southward and eastward across the state. Generally, the color change is predictable, but it can vary from year to year. Predicting the peak of fall color can be difficult. Much depends on the weather: during fall, but also during the entire growing season.

MDC's Fall Color Reports usually begin in the second half of September (whenever colors start to appear) and wrap up around the middle of November, when most of the leaves have fallen or turned to brown. Reports appear weekly and are usually posted by Thursday evenings.

Where's The Best Place?

You can enjoy Missouri's fall color almost anywhere.

- For spectacular vistas, choose routes along rivers with views of forested bluffs, and along ridges with sweeping scenes of forested landscapes.
- On a smaller scale, drive on back roads, hike or take a float trip under a colorful forest canopy on a clear, blue-sky day. Visit MDC Conservation Areas and Missouri State Parks.
- Even treeless areas, such as prairies and roadsides, display beautiful shades of gold, copper, purple, olive and auburn with autumn wildflowers, shrubs and curing, rustling grasses.
- If you can't get out of town, enjoy places with mature trees, such as older neighborhoods, parks and even cemeteries.






