

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

GUIDE TO SPRING FISHING

ated as one of the nation's most popular vacation spots, Lake of the Ozarks also has a reputation of being one of the best fishing lakes in the country. The 54,000-acre reservoir annually makes Bassmaster

Magazine's 100 Best Bass Lakes list and is a popular stop for national crappie tournament circuits. From February to April, the lake draws numerous bass tournaments ranging from national and regional events to club derbies.

The lake contains plenty of fish-attracting cover and structure such as boat docks, planted brush piles, steep bluffs, creek channels, humps, and points for tournament and recreational anglers

The various arms of the lake offer diverse water clarity and structure so anglers can catch fish with a wide range of tactics. The Osage arm runs 98 miles from Bagnell Dam to Truman Dam and changes in appearance from one end to the other. The lower end contains some of the deepest and clearest water on the lake, while the upper Osage near Warsaw narrows until it turns riverine in appearance with the water remaining stained to murky most of the time. The Niangua and Little Niangua tributaries combine to form the winding Niangua arm that resembles a large river more than a reservoir since it has few major coves and a narrow main channel for most of its length.

The Gravois and Little Gravois creeks form the clear waters of the Gravois arm that flows 10 miles down to the lower Osage. The Grand Glaize arm runs about 16 miles from its confluence with the Osage arm to the swinging bridges area where the Glaize narrows down to a stream.

Several marinas and resorts rent boats to visiting anglers who don't own one and want to venture out on the water. Public launch ramps are available at the Missouri Department of Natural Resources' Grand Glaize Recreation Area (Public Beach #2 and Pa He Tsi), Lake of the Ozarks State Park Public Beach #1, and McCubbins Point and Missouri Department of Conservation access areas at Coffman Beach, Shawnee Bend, Brown Bend, Gravois Mills, Larry R. Gale, and Wigwam School. Public ramps are also available at Bledsoe Ferry, Drake Harbor, and Lay Park at Warsaw.

The lake is loaded with keeper-size bass thanks to the Missouri Department of Conservation's 15-inch minimum length regulation on black bass. February and March are prime months for catching heavyweight bass because the fish start moving shallow during the prespawn. The best tactics for catching lunker bass is twitching a suspending stickbait or pitching a jig along 45-degree rocky banks. Running an Alabama rig adorned with swimbaits over the tops of brush piles 15 to 25 feet deep is also a productive method for catching heavyweight bass throughout late winter and early spring.

As the water warms in April, bass migrate to pea gravel banks to spawn in the shallows. The biggest bass tend to build nests in hardto-reach spots such as behind the cables of boat docks. A variety of lures, including jigs, Texas-rigged soft plastic lizards and craws, finesse worms, stickworms, and topwater lures will coax nesting bass into biting.

The Missouri Department of Conservation's 9-inch minimum length limit on crappie has helped keep crappie fishing consistently good. Massive schools of crappie suspend over deep water at the mouths of coves and creeks throughout February and can be tricked with jigs presented with either vertical or horizontal presentations. Limits of keeper-size black and white crappie can be taken in the shallows on jigs and minnows throughout March and April. Crappie usually spawn in April along pea gravel pockets in a depth range of one to eight feet depending on the water clarity.

op performance, size, and a comfortable ride are keys to choosing a quality fishing boat for the Lake of the Ozarks. Fully rigged bass boats with all the latest bells and whistles have become the standard fishing crafts for the lake. These types of vessels can still run into trouble, though, if the boats lack the durability and size to handle the lake's rough waters created by heavy boat traffic.

The longer the fishing boat the better for the Lake of the Ozarks, so the most popular selling bass boats at the lake are at least 20 feet in length. A 19-foot bass boat can handle the lake's turbulent water sometimes, but a 20-foot boat or longer is recommended for the roughest water periods on the weekends.

Picking the right horsepower outboard motor for a bass boat is simple. Every bass boat has a maximum horsepower rating recommended by the Coast Guard, so the boat you buy should be powered to the

Lake of the Ozarks anglers can be typically classified into three categories: hard core tournament competitors, recreational weekend anglers, and panfish enthusiasts. All three types of anglers seem to prefer fully rigged fiberglass or aluminum bass boats to fish for a variety of species at the lake.

Three local marine dealers that sell fully rigged fiberglass or aluminum bass boats for the lake are Performance Advantage Marine in Sunrise Beach, Sport World Boat Center in Sunrise Beach, and Surdyke Yamaha & Marina in Osage Beach.

Performance Advantage Marine General Manager Cody Henick considers the iKon Legend Series LX21 bass boat the dealership's most popular selling fishing boat for the lake. The LX21 model is a 21-foot, 10-inch fiberglass boat with a 98-inch beam. The boat is powered by a Mercury 250 HP Pro XS engine with a fuel capacity of 50 gallons.

The iKon's hull design allows the boat to handle hard turns and rough waters without disruption to speed, and provides ample space on the front deck for storage and maneuverability. "The boat is actually wider in the front allowing anglers to move around more and keep more rods up front," Henick says.

The boat's standard features include a 35 gallon live well and large insulated cooler. "Through iKon we can pretty much customize the boat for any person to what they want to be using whether it is Garmin or Humminbird (electronics) pretty much across the board," Henick says. "If you want to customize the boat you can do everything from electronics (and trolling motors), down to the colors of the boat, down to even the stitching on the seats."

A fully equipped Vexus VXs20 bass boat provides high performance and a comfortable ride for fishing the lake.





Sport World Boat Center sells both fiberglass and aluminum Vexus bass boats. The most popular selling fiberglass Vexus at the lake is the VXs20 model, according to the dealership's owner Gary Burris. The VXs20 features a 20-foot, 6-inch deep v-hull with a 97-inch beam. Powered by a Mercury 250 HP V8 engine, the boat has a fuel capacity of 54 gallons.

Standard features for the VXs20 include a fourbank battery charger, AirWave Suspension bucket seats, 22 gallon oxygenated live well with a pump out system, tandem axle trailer, and custom cover. The boat also features the angler's choice of Garmin trolling motors and Garmin electronics.

Sport World's best-selling aluminum bass boat is the Vexus AVX2080, a 20-foot, 2-inch model with a 95-inch beam and an all-welded high-performance pad hull. The boat is powered by a Mercury Pro XS 200 HP motor and has a fuel capacity of 35 gallons. Burris suggests the fully rigged AVX2080 with its Garmin trolling motor and Garmin electronics is a tournament bass boat and claims it rides better in rough water than other 20 and 21-foot fiberglass bass boats.

Surdyke Yamaha Sales Associate Dennis Phelps considers the G₃ Boats Sportsman 2400 and G₃

Boats Angler V21F as the dealership's most popular selling aluminum fishing boats for the lake.

The Sportsman 2400 is a 23-foot, 11-inch boat with a 95-inch beam powered by a Yamaha VF 250 HP engine. The boat has a 50 gallon fuel capacity and features aerated front and rear live wells, a walk-through windshield, and three-bank battery charger. "It is more lined up as a catfish-type boat with a huge live well in it," Phelps says. Options include a variety of MinnKota trolling motors and Humminbird electronics.

The Angler V21F is a 21-foot, 2-inch craft with a 96-inch beam and a 40 gallon fuel capacity. "It is more of a universal type fishing boat," Phelps said. He suggests the V21F also serves well as a "family boat" for skiing and tubing. Powered by a Yamaha VF 250 HP motor, the V21F can also be equipped with various MinnKota trolling motors and Humminbird electronics. Standard features include two aerated live wells, three-bank battery charger, and stereo with two speakers.

A fully rigged aluminum or fiberglass fishing boat with plenty of performance and durability are a necessity for anglers whether they make short or long runs on the vast 54,000 acres of Lake of the Ozarks.

The iKonLX21 bass boat has a spacious front deck offering plenty of room for Lake of the Ozarks anglers to move around and store their rods.





OSAGE NATIONAL GOLF RESORT:



The Osage National Golf Resort has been a fixture at the Lake of the Ozarks since 1992.

ince 1992 the Osage National Golf Resort has been a fixture of the golf landscape at the Lake of the Ozarks. Like many golf courses and real estate ventures, Osage has been through its share of ownership changes and trying times. Since 2016 Osage has been owned and operated by Great Life Golf which is headquartered in Harrisburg, PA and has satellite offices in Kansas City. They manage over 50 golf courses nationally, and have brought stability and a forward thinking approach to Osage and all the facilities they manage. Now they are set to invest in the future of Osage with an expansive renovation project that began this past October as the River course was closed for a makeover.

The three-year master plan to overhaul the three nines at the resort has begun. Crews led by architect Todd Clark, who owns and operates CE Golf Design out of Kansas, and Osage Golf Course superintendent Jeff Sommerer started the renovation process. In October the River nine was shut down for play and an excess of one million dollars will be spent on the River Course renovations.

Every bunker on the River nine was renovated in some

respect from moving, reshaping, removing, or redesigning it. New player premier white sand was also added. Let's take a closer look at each hole and see what you can expect this

A new bunker was added left of the green on hole 1 where there was a grass bunker. The bunkers left of the green on hole number 2 were reshaped and made slightly smaller. On hole three, the cart path was rerouted slightly and a directional fairway bunker was added on the right side of the fairway for a visually appealing aiming point off the tee.

The par three hole number 4 received a complete redesign with the green being completely redone. It has been flattened and widened, and the area behind the green has been built up so it will no longer be a disaster to hit it long into the swale. Brush and debris have been removed from the creek fronting the green and rock rip raff rock has been added for a visually stunning approach. The par five hole number 5 saw a vast amount of tree removal by the tee box and down the river side of the hole and the cart path has been rerouted behind the tee box. With the trees gone the back tee is now a viable option to utilize.

Hole six got a major facelift as the tee has been expanded to lengthen the hole and the fairway cart path has been re-routed to the left. All of the trees along the right side of the hole and on the island have been removed making the water very visible, and allowing for the tees to be varied to allow for a drivable risk reward hole if they choose. Hole seven saw a bunker added to the right greenside approach, and brush has been cleared along the river allowing for better views of the river itself.

On hole eight the waste bunker on the left has been eliminated and three new smaller bunkers line the left side of the fairway. The trees right and behind the green have been cleared and a magnificent view from the fairway has been created as you can see for miles down the channel of the river. On hole nine, you will notice the island tee has been eliminated and the cart path has been rerouted down the right side. Two new tee boxes have been added by the cart path for the forward tees and the large bunker left of the green has been reshaped and made smaller.

General Manger Ryan Manselle explained "the renovations were made for ease of maintenance, playability, visually better, and to address several drainage issues that have arisen over time. The changes have been approved by the Palmer design team, so it will not impact the signature Arnold Palmer design stamp that the course holds." The River Course is scheduled to open mid to late April 2025.

Moving forward, the Links and the Mountain nines will also get a facelift beginning in the fall of 2025 and will continue through the spring 2027. The current plan is to have all 27 holes open Mid-April through Mid-October during the renovations, with it all being completed by May of 2027. All of the bunkers on the Mountain and Links nines will be reworked during the renovations to mirror the changes that have already been completed to the River nine. Other changes to the individual holes are still in the planning phases, with details of those being announced as the fall of 2025 gets closer.

I personally can't wait for spring so I can see and play the new changes. Osage has always been a favorite of mine and I can't wait to see what the future holds. Osage is in great hands and is looking forward to its future as one of the premier golf facilities in the entire Mid-West.

Located within a few hours drive from the hub of the Lake of the Ozarks, these towns offer fun, food, and festivity for those of all ages.

Versailles

Named after the town in France, Versailles serves as the gateway to one of the most defining natural landmarks in the area, the Lake of the Ozarks. Country Living has ranked Versailles, a town that hosts just about 2,800 residents, among the 40 best small towns in America.

For the history enthusiast, the Morgan County Historical Society Museum is located in the old Martin Hotel in downtown Versailles. The museum is on the National Register of Historic Sites in Washington, D.C.

While the best time to enjoy the spirit of Versailles is when it stages the annual fall Olde Tyme Apple Festival, Versailles offers visitors several other fun-filled attractions as well. These include Jacob's Cave, the largest cave in the area, which first-time visitors often find overtly surreal. Versailles also plays host to Weaver's Country Market, one of the oldest Mennonite-owned businesses in Missouri and a carryover of the town's rich Mennonite legacy.

Annual events include an open air market held from April through October, the annual Fourth of July fireworks extravaganza, and The Versailles Saddle and Sirloin Club's annual rodeo in July.

Cole Gamp

Katie Blake, PR Specialist, Missouri Division of Tourism, shared some ideas:

Cole Camp is a historic town located where the Ozarks meets the great prairies in Benton County, Missouri. It is dated from its first post office in 1839, and it was the site of one of the first land battles of the Civil War. The town boasts several buildings dating from pre-Civil War times, and the downtown is on the National Register of Historic Places. Additionally, many residents still speak the Low German language brought over by their ancestors. There are many antique shops, and The German Table Restaurant is a must visit.

Known as the "Festival City" many festivals and special events keep the town a busy place. The area's Oktoberfest features German food, beer, music and vendors. There are other engaging German events, including Christkindlmarket, Saengerfest, Christbaumfest, and a German Christmas Concert.


It's an idealistic location with rolling prairies to the north and hills and streams to the south, offering beauty and variety. Hunting and fishing are popular sports in this area. Older homes and farmsteads dot the countryside, recalling years past. Likewise, the rich soil of the prairie and creek bottoms provide for excellent farming with fields of tall corn, soybeans, and wheat being common sights. ow that the worst part of the cold season is over, many of us are counting down the days until we take that first boat ride of the season. As we pack away our cold weather gear and welcome warmer Lake days, it is a good idea to take time to check that your boat and dock fared well through the freezing temps. A few area experts gave their advice on how to assure everything is in working order and ready for the season ahead.

We queried some experts here at the Lake and they shared their knowledge about tips to physically prepare your boat and dock for the upcoming season. Myrick Coil, Shop Foreman at Performance Boat Center and award-winning Super Cat racer, has driven in World Class races worldwide. He has won numerous awards with Performance and Dave Scott, and also Anheuser Busch.

He came to the Lake to get into the boat repair business and embraces all things boats. His boat to-do list includes making sure to have a trained professional de-winterize your boat and inspect the boat for the start of the season.


"The things they should be looking for include checking all fluids and adding fluids if needed, and visually inspecting bilges and all mechanical parts such as belts, hoses, and large cables to insure they are not loose or corroded," he explained. "The boat needs to be dropped in the water at this time, and I like to have the boat floating on its own and not sitting on a lift or trailer. I then visually inspect it for any additional water leaks. If no leaks are noticed, the boat can then be started. Once the boat is started, I quickly look at the gauges to make sure the oil pressure has come up, and immediately following that I look for water pressure."

Coil recommends if the boat does not have water pressure gauges, look at the exhaust of a stern drive boat to make sure water is coming out. If it's an outboard, make sure it's coming out of the tattletale hose. Most outboard motors, he explained, do have a water pressure gauge. Once you have verified that the oil pressure has risen and the water system is pumping water, he then lets the boat idle until it achieves and maintains running temperature.

"At this point if all systems are within desired parameters and there are no alarms, it would be safe to say you are ready for your maiden voyage of the season," he added. "A lot of the maintenance that is required on boats usually is scheduled in the fall, ensuring that way they are ready when spring comes."

One of the main reasons he and his team prefer to do maintenance in the fall is so they can check that the outdrive/lower unit does not have any water intrusion into the oil. This intrusion could cause a freeze break if the boat is kept outside during the cold winter temperatures.

Coil explained that Mercury outboards are usually on a 100-hour or every year maintenance schedule. And every 300 hours it's recommended they go through a more extensive service. Mercury sterndrives have a similar maintenance schedule with an annual service or every 100 hours, whichever comes first.

Another familiar name around the Lake is Kelly's Port. Kyle Kelly, the General Manager, has plenty of experience when it comes to boats and docks. He recommends you start by giving your boat a good spring cleaning.

Kelly noted, "First, give your boat a good purge and cleaning to check for any potential damage over the wintertime. Sneaky raccoons, feral cats, and other animals sometimes like to call your boat 'home for the holidays.' Don't forget to check your life jackets, fire extinguishers, and other safety equipment to make sure they're in safe, working order. Second, I strongly recommend you test your battery, electrical systems, engine fluids, and start the motors to bring them up to temp which is a great way to ensure you start the season off right. Third, a review of your maintenance records and getting pertinent maintenance scheduled is very wise. Of course, we have those "do it your selfers" who enjoy this type of work, or you're welcome to call the professionals at Kelly's Port to see how we can make sure you're spending your time making memories on the water that last a lifetime."

Another Lake expert is Darin Kronk, who has been in the industry since 1988 and is known as the General Manager at the old Yacht Haven Marina. He is now working with First Mate Yacht Services off HH in Lake Ozark. Kronk recommends that in to ensure safety for yourself and all passengers on your boat, it's advised to have a certified marine mechanic inspect all vessel systems. This includes the fuel system, electrical system, and engine for proper operation.

The mechanic, he agrees, should ensure all belts, hoses and electrical connections are in good operating condition and ready for the boating season. Batteries, he said, should also be tested to see if they need replacing. Other things that should also be checked include up to date fire extinguishers, adequate life vests and safety devices for all passengers on board, an operational horn, and all navigation lights to ensure they are visible and working properly.

"For the exterior of your boat, a good quality buff and wax will prepare and protect the finish from the hot summer sun and any other rough weather conditions that can be damaging.. If your boat sits in the water for extended periods of time, or permanently, you should have bottom paint on the boat to prevent blistering or delamination," Kronk advised. "It is important to have your bottom paint inspected and/or reapplied every three to four years."

He recommends boaters make sure to always turn their exhaust blower (also called a bilge blower) on at least four minutes prior to starting the engine to ensure all fuel vapors are removed from the engine compartment. He suggests opening the engine hatch, if possible, for extra ventilation. "Always double-check for lingering smells with your nose before starting the engine," he said. "Gasoline fumes can be highly explosive, and if they are ignited by any spark from the engine it can result in an explosion or fire. This is why it is important to make sure all the electrical connections in the boat are properly installed and secure."

Finally, as we know, it is always a good idea to make sure your registration and insurance are up to date in case you get that friendly Water Patrol inspection while out on the water. If your insurance does not cover assistance towing on the lake and your boat decides to take a break, you can always contact TowBoatUS for towing services (573-216-4701). They also have great membership packages that will cover unexpected towing needs.

Kronk also has advice to assure your dock is ready for the season. "You want to make sure the dock cables are tight and secured properly to the dock and sea wall," he stressed. "You should have them inspected regularly to make sure they are not rusty or stretched out and are in good condition, so they do not break during the summer months when the water can get rough. This will ensure your dock remains in the position it was intended to be in and does not decide to take its own vacation out on the water. Inspect all the water lines to the dock to make sure there are not any frozen/cracked lines from the winter months. You will also want to make sure all electrical cables and plugs are in good condition and have NO bare wires that can lead to electric shock on or off the dock, or in the surrounding water. It is important that your dock is properly grounded, and breakers are installed to prevent electrocution. One of my recommendations is to use Dock Lifeguard LLC. for any electrical needs and safety improvements."

Someone who has plenty of Lake experience in the industry is Mark Maasen, co-owner of Poly Lift Boat Lifts. Maasen has some important tips and suggestions for boat, dock and lift owners. He reiterated Kronk's comments noting, "I'm not the dock expert, but I've been around and on docks for over 50 years. You need to check your dock cables to make sure they are not frayed or broken, and that dock ramp bolts are tight and secure. It wouldn't hurt to look at electrical connections to be sure they are intact. Just checking for loose bolts or cracked welds, and getting those fixed early can save a person a ton of money later. When inspecting, make sure you check where your Z purlins and posts are connected as well."

For boat lifts, he recommends checking all the bolts for tightness that may have come loose during the winter months, and look at the dock bracket attachments to make sure they are securely connected to the frame of your dock. Turn the control unit on and if the motor sounds raspy it's advisable to change it out before it becomes an emergency. Give the lift a good once over and even look below the water surface. If you see bolts or parts with excessive rust, it might be a good time to have a technician come and check everything for structural integrity. "But remember, just because it's rusty doesn't mean it's bad," he noted. "One last thing to look at are the hoses to make sure they are not rubbing against each other or anything else."

With the right inspections and adjustments needed, you'll be ready for a safe and hassle-free boating season.

SAFE BOATING IS NO ACCIDENT:

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

ou purchased a boat or wave runner and you're anxious to hit the water. You've gathered your friends, packed your cooler, applied sunscreen, and you're ready to show off your new toy. Driving a boat is just like driving a car, right? Actually, it's not at all like driving a car. The best advice for a first time boat owner is to enroll in a boat education course before taking the helm. In fact, all boaters can benefit from this education.

Most states require boaters to complete an official and certified boater education course. The Boater Education Card (sometimes called a boater's license) is proof that you have successYou must be at least 100 feet from a dock when creating a wake with your vessel.

fully completed your state's official and approved course. Boating Education requirements vary from state to state. Missouri's Boater Education Law went into effect January 1, 2005. The law states that any person born after January 1, 1984 must successfully pass a Missouri Boater Education class and test before operating any motorized vessel on

the waters of the state.

Boating safety education is important for a number of reasons. It helps reduce personal injury and property damage associated with the use of recreational boats. Boaters can keep themselves and their passengers safe by learning about responsible boat operation, etiquette, and the rules of the waterways.

Thousands of boating accidents occur each year, and many can be avoided if the drivers take precautions. The United States Coast Guard recommends that all boaters take a boating safety course that meets the National Boating Education Standards prior to getting out on the water.

Without a doubt, the most common causes of boating accidents include not wearing a personal flotation device (PFD), falling overboard, capsizing and collision, and operating a vessel while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. A boating safety class addresses all of these concerns and much more, making one aware of the danger associated with careless boating and ways to boat safely and responsibly.

The slogan, "Safe Boating is no Accident," encourages every boat skipper to become involved with the safe boating process by enrolling in a class. But the education doesn't stop there. Safe boating is a family affair and information shared can provide the entire crew with a fun and learning experience.

There are other advantages to enrolling in a boating safety course. If you successfully complete an official course such as Boat Ed (www.boat-ed.com) or ilearntoboat (www.ilearntoboat.com), your boater education card is valid in every state that requires mandatory boating education. On successful completion of a boating education class, several insurance companies offer a discount on your premium.

Boating education courses are offered both in the classroom or online where you can work as your schedule permits. While this provides you with the information you need for safe boating, applying it on the water is the key to safety. A next step that proves beneficial for first-time boat owners is to seek the assistance of a United States Coast Guard credentialed Captain. A day on your boat with them will help you learn the proper way to operate and dock your vessel. The difference between handling an inboard versus an outboard can be addressed, as well as situations like close quarter turns, what to do when approaching another vessel, and so much more.



Children under the age of seven must wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved life jacket unless they are in the cabin of a houseboat or cruiser.

BASIC MISSOURI BOATING LAWS:

Any person born after January 1,1984 must successfully pass a Missouri Boater Education course and test in order to operate a motorized vessel on the waters in the State of Missouri. This includes boats and PWC's.

You must be at least 14 years of age to operate a boat or personal watercraft (PWC), unless you are under the supervision of someone who is at least 16 years of age.

You must have a U.S. Coast Guard approved life jacket on board for every person on the boat. Children under the age of seven must wear a life jacket unless they are in the cabin of a houseboat

The speed limit at night is 30 mph, from 30 minutes after sunset until one hour before sunrise.

No person shall anchor a vessel positioned within one hundred feet of a permitted boat dock in a manner that obstructs ingress or egress of a watercraft to and from the dock, unless authorized by the boat dock permit holder.

No person shall secure a vessel to or enter upon a private permitted boat dock unless authorized to do so by the boat dock permit holder. This does not apply during inclement weather conditions or other emergencies.

You must operate at no-wake, idle speed within 100 feet of a dock, pier, anchored boat, or buoyed restricted area.

If you want to jump the wake of a passing vessel you must be at least 100 feet behind them.

Fire extinguishers are required and vary depending on the class of vessel.

Vessels from 16 to 40 feet must have a sounding device, such as a horn or a whistle. Vessels over 40 feet must have a sounding device and at least one bell.

From sunset to sunrise all vessels must display proper navigational lights.

In Missouri, it is illegal to operate a boat or PWC while intoxicated (BWI). Missouri's blood alcohol concentration limit for BWI is 0.08%. A chemical analysis of the defendant's blood, breath, saliva, or urine can be used to determine

if the BAC is above the legal limit. Charges for a BWI range from first offense to a Class E felony depending on number of offenses, injury to another person, and more.

ENCOUNTERING OTHER VESSELS:

When operating a power driven vessel, you must give way to:

Any vessel not under command, such as an anchored or disabled vessel.

Any vessel restricted in its ability to maneuver, such as a vessel towing another.

A sailboat under sail.

A canoe or other vessel powered by paddles or oars alone.

Stand-on vessel: The vessel that should maintain its course and speed.

Give-way vessel: The vessel that must take easy and substantial action to avoid collision by stopping, slowing down, or changing course.

CROSSING SITUATION:

Power vs Power: The vessel on the operator's port (left) side is the give way vessel. The vessel on the operator's starboard (right) side is the stand on vessel.

Power vs Sail: The powerboat is the give-way vessel. The sailboat is the stand on vessel.

OVERTAKING: COMING UP FROM BEHIND.

The vessel that is overtaking another vessel is the give-way vessel. The vessel being overtaken is the stand-on vessel.

MEETING HEAD ON:

If both are under power, neither vessel is the stand-on vessel. Both vessels should keep to the starboard (right).

If one is under power and the other is under sail, the powerboat is the give-way vessel. The sailboat is the stand-on vessel.

Starla & Scotty:

A DYNAMIC WELL-KNOWN DUO AT THE LAKE

ne of the hardest working live music acts around the Lake area is Starla & Scotty. When first hearing them perform at the local horse rescue autumn weekend festival, their pure vibes stopped visitors in their tracks. Starla Queen plucked a bass that is taller than her demure height. Scotty Henderson sat behind the keyboards, adding melody to Queen's deep stringed beat. The duo not only have clear, harmonizing vocals they both are multi-talented instrument artists.

Their start at the Lake is interesting. The Jazzabiilies, a western swing band, brought the genre to the Lake of the Ozarks in 2006. A style born in Texas, it became popular with lovers of bluegrass as a more kicked up, danceable beat. The lead vocalist and composer was Queen (Hillbilly Music). Their recorded CD was named "Show Me" and the tongue-in- cheek nod to their Missouri roots translated well to listeners. The tune introduces each band member on the title track, and highlights "who they were and where they were from" according to Queen.

The band included Starla Queen, Jimmy Queen, Dave Owens on bass, Tony Smith on fiddle, Matt De'Peiro on accordion, and Matt Wallace on drums. The Jazzabillies played regularly at Kula Bay in Hurricane Deck for some time. But, when the summer season drew to a close, the musicians pursued their own projects. Steel guitar and vocalist Scotty Henderson, as well as Dave Owens, played in that country ensemble, belting out a lot of the same rockabilly, jazz and western swing tunes. Their CD topped some charts and the Jazzabilies CD went #1 on Mike Gross Western Swing Chart, #1 on the Powersource Western Swing Chart, and #1 on the Roots Music Report Western Swing Chart.

Originally from Bowling Green, Missouri, Queen moved to the lake area in the 1980s. She is a Paralegal at the law offices of Allen & Rector in Lebanon. RAISING HOPE FREE STORE:

Heartfelt Heroes Helping Those in Need

he retirement years look different for everyone. For many, the focus is on travel, golf, reading, or other activities that took a backseat to work. For Jack and Judy Tezak it's all about helping those in the Lake community who need it. The Tezak's are the owners and operators of Raising Hope Free Store in Camdenton, This nonprofit resource for families and individuals provides everything from clothing to furniture, programs, services, and more all at no cost to those who need it. They bridge agencies and have formed a web of interconnected sources to best assist those in need. The organization is run by Jack and Judy, their manager Michael, and the help of 16 volunteers. No one is paid a salary. Their mission, they explained, is to improve the quality of life for those in the community.

The Free Store was originally created in early 2014 by LANI (Lake Area Needs Initiative) and was located in the Keystone Industrial Park. Until mid 2016, it had been operated in several locations with different individuals involved and with limited success. It was then Jack and Judy decided to solely spearhead it and apply for their own non-for-profit. In 2017 it was renamed Raising Hope Free Store. Since that time, the word has spread throughout the community and the organization has grown tremendously, both with those who donate and those who utilize the services.

This past July, Michael Sutyak came on board as the manager. Originally from the Kansas City area, Sutyak had been traveling the country with his dog for the past three years, looking for a place that felt like home. "I traveled through 47 states in three years," he explained. "I had been taking care of my grandparents and needed to fill that void in my life." Sutvak used to visit the Lake area as a kid, and as fate had it ended up back here. He was looking for substance and service in his life, and making a connection with Jack and Judy has provided him with what he was longing for.

"This changed my life," Sutyak said. "Jack and Judy are like my parents, and I needed something like this. I love working with teams like this. The camaraderie and the volunteers, and knowing I'm here for them and they're here for me is wonderful."

The Lake area was familiar to Jack. He had been coming here every summer since he was a kid in 1966. In 2008 the couple left their Joliet home and decided to make the Lake their permanent residence. "This was not my plan for retirement but God's plan," Judy said. "I've always been a faithful person and feel we are tremendously blessed with being able to do this. The people who come in are like family."

Judy can be found six days a week at the store, doing everything from office work, to sorting shelves, to welcoming the store's shoppers. "I basically have my hand in everything," she explained. Jack is the primary pick-up person for those donations people can't bring in themselves, and fills in other areas as needed. Together, they harmonize to bring a much needed resource to the community.

Raising Hope Free Store provides clothing, household items, furniture, personal items, baby and kids items, working appliances, and an emergency food closet for those who need some help. They are not a food bank, but support those who have an immediate food crisis. Donations help stock freezers with meat and those who need it are given food to make an entire meal.

Shoppers can frequent the store once every 30 days, and may be limited to what they can take depending on the current supply. A small section of the store houses a donation boutique of items. "These are more wants than needs," Judy explained. On several occasions, Judy has ignored the suggestion of a donation and has given an item to someone who displayed a special attachment to it. One such item was an infant christening gown. An elderly shopper saw the gown and couldn't believe this was the exact one her daughter had been baptized in. Where it had been all these years, the woman said, was a mystery.

The Tezak's provide services beyond food and clothing for those that are homeless. A shower and toiletry items are available for those who need it, along with a washer and dryer to use free to charge. Although the store has operating hours, it is available 24/7 for a number of Lake area organizations that help those that need immediate help for their crisis.

This past holiday season, their toy store gave away items to ensure 400 area kids had a gift for Christmas. This surpassed their number of 244 items the year before. Knowing these numbers will continue to rise, Judy said they are in need of toys to prepare for the next season.

As a result of their continuing efforts, three cars were donated to needy families this past year. These cars were the result of generous donations from individuals and the Super Cat Fest 4 Kids event held annually in connection with the Lake of the Ozarks Shootout. This event makes generous donations annually to the store. Those in need of a car were asked to submit a letter stating why they needed it, and ultimately it was a

raffle that determined who received them. The organization doesn't rely on national grant money, but thrives on donations from individuals and other area organizations. Some individuals donate monthly to the store, and outside organizations donate and hold fundraisers for them. "I have angels that come in and drop one-hundred dollar bills," Judy said.

Shoppers and those who utilize their services, Judy said, are from multiple facets of the community. "Most of my seniors were working for minimum wage years ago and don't have a large income," she explained. "We get single parent families and foster families. We have people that have been coming into the store for years and their kids call me grandma. Most of the people who frequent the store are working, they have jobs and they are trying." Some are homeowners and many pay rent, but just need a little help to make ends meet.

Several area organizations also use the store for their client's needs. These include Family Facets, CADV, Pathways, Bridges of Missouri, Central Ozark Medical Group, Red Cross, Light House, Cedar Ridge, Missouri Mentors, and the Department of Family Services from all four counties in the Lake area.

In addition to the store, the couple have a second not-for-profit organization. They own a four-bedroom home that provides transitional housing for men. "This is for those who beat an addiction and can't find a place to stay for whatever reason," Judy said. "Residents have to adhere to strict rules like attending church, no use of drugs or alcohol, they need a job, they pay rent, and they have to work on moving on with their life."

The Tezak's have numerous plans in the works to continue helping those in need. The construction of a conference center and computer lab is currently underway. They will be providing assistance for interview and job preparation, resume writing, and help filling out job applications. Classes being considered include meal planning and cooking on a budget, household budgeting, self defense classes, and smoking cessation. Their ideas, they said, are limitless. But funding needs to be had to implement much of this.

"I do this because it fills my heart and soul," Judy explained. "Doesn't God ask us all to serve? This is my way of discipling." For Jack, the effort is equally rewarding. "I've learned to let go and let God," he said. "I used to live with blinders on, but now I pay attention to opportunities or doors put in front of me."

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HOW TO SURVIVE A

HEART ATTACK OR STROKE

ebruary is American Heart Month. Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States for both men and women. It's the time to raise awareness about heart disease and encourage people to take care of their cardiovascular health. In the event of a heart attack or stroke, it's important to know what steps to take.

"The first step is recognizing what's happening," explained Zubair Khan, M.D., FACC. "You want to be familiar with all of the signs of heart attack and stroke so you are ready to act immediately. The faster you seek care, the less damage done and the more likely the person will survive and even recover."

SIGNS OF HEART ATTACK

Not all heart attacks have chest pain. Suspect a heart attack when the person has any of the following symptoms:

- A feeling of pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of the chest.
- Discomfort in one or both arms, the back, the neck, the jaw, or the stomach.
- Feeling short of breath for no known reason.
- Feeling nauseated or light-headed or breaking out in a

"If someone shows these signs of a heart attack, seek medical help, even if the signs go away," Dr. Khan said. "Heart attacks often begin with a partial blockage that causes signs that may be easy to dismiss. You want to catch that blockage before it completely stops blood flow."

SIGNS OF STROKE

An easy way to remember the signs of stroke is to remember, BE FAST:

- **B** Balance. Has the person lost their balance? Ask if they
- **E** How are their eyes? Ask if they are having trouble seeing.
- **F** Face drooping. Ask them to smile. Does one side droop?
- **A** Arm weakness. Ask them to raise both arms. Does one side drift downward?
- S Speech difficulty. Ask them to repeat a simple sentence. Are the words slurred?
- T Time to call 911. Don't delay. If the person shows any of these signs, call 911 immediately.

DON'T HESITATE. GET HELP

People often delay calling for emergency help. One major reason: They don't want to be embarrassed if it turns out not to be serious. "But, it's better to be safe than sorry when your life is on the line," Dr. Khan stressed.

Also, it's best to call 911 for an ambulance rather than driving to the hospital. The emergency medical services professionals will begin important tests and call the hospital while on the way, giving the care team a chance to prepare for your arrival.

"Every minute matters, and the information provided from the ambulance while it's in route can significantly reduce the time between arrival and treatment," Dr. Khan added. "Don't delay. Act fast. Call 911."





Wake Up To Water:

THE ALLURE OF LAKESIDE LIVING

ith the construction of the Bagnell Dam and formation of the Lake in the early 1930's, the Lake of the Ozarks area experienced significant growth as a vacation destination. The addition of amenities and activities to attract tourists continued to fuel this growth. Today, many are turning this vacation destination into ownership opportunities and a more frequent use opportunity. There are a number of ways to experience Lakefront living and all the attributes it offers.

Matt Schrimpf, broker/owner of Lake Ozark Realty at Berkshire Hathaway in Lake Ozark, suggests ways individuals can achieve the dream of living on the Lake. Shrimpf was raised at the Lake and has been selling real estate here for the past 22 years.

"Things to consider in purchasing a property is your lifestyle, affordability, how much maintenance you want to do, and what fits your needs," Schrimpf explained. "There's many different opportunities and price points depending on the size and location."

Well known areas with larger homes, such as Porto Cima and The Villages, are higher priced he said. The home sizes, amenities, and desirable location affects the price of these properties. The north shore Rocky Mount area off of Hwy W is further down the Lake and offers less ease of travel, but offers more affordable options. "If you're just looking to get yourself on the Lake, you can get into a one-bedroom condo at Southwood Shores for around \$139,000," Schrimpf said. "A single family home on the Lake can be more affordable if you're willing to put some sweat equity into it. A small cabin of sorts with a dock can be found for \$200,000 - \$250,000, but will require some work."

Lakefront single family homes and condo's can be found throughout the Lake of the Ozarks area. Either can be the right choice depending on your budget, needs, and desired location. Single family homes require outside maintenance and upkeep, but often come with a private dock for your personal use. Condominiums don't require the outside maintenance and are the preferred choice for those who just want to come and enjoy, but are often limited to a community dock space. Either gives you the advantage of living Lakefront.

The further away from the central hub of the Lake, the more affordable real estate becomes. Although the majority of buyers prefer a cove location, Schrimpf said this affects the desirability of the property but not necessarily the price. Other options to get the Lakefront living experience is a golf cart community, in which you often have a view of the Lake and easy access to a dock space, and the newly constructed Toy Box man cave area in Lake Ozark.

Mission Bay in Camdenton is a golf cart community that offers a variety of options to experience Lakelife. This includes single family homes on the Lake, Villas on the Lake, Duplexes on the Lake, Single Family Lake View off the Lake, and duplexes with a Lake view off the Lake. Second tier properties also offer Lake access. The development offers residents several amenities, including a golf cart path with easy access to the community dock where you can easily access your boat that's already in the water.

Wendy and Dennis Marotta moved from the Chicago area to Mission Bay in September of 2023. They built a ranch home with a walk out basement on a Lakeview lot. Dennis had visited the Lake a number of times for golf trips, and it only took Wendy one visit to fall in love with the area. The couple decided this was where they wanted to retire. They visited Mission Bay and were sold.

"We absolutely love it here," Wendy said. "It's a smaller golf cart community with great amenities. We have wonderful neighbors who look out for each other, and a gorgeous clubhouse with indoor and outdoor pools. Our docks are off the main channel in a small cove near the 32 mile marker. The Lake isn't as busy here, and we can still get to three grocery stores within 15 minutes." Easy access to their pontoon boat, Wendy said, is one of the biggest perks about living in this community.

A new development in Lake Ozark offers The Toy Box luxury lofts, or man caves as some are referring to them as. Situated on approximately 20 acres at the corner of Horseshoe Bend and Bagnell Dam Blvd., this location offers a 180 degree panoramic view of the Lake. The units offer a small living space with a kitchenette and bathroom along with garage space to store a boat, RV, or vehicle. A number of amenities are available to owners, including a pool, pickleball courts, and a clubhouse. These units are for residential use only.

Another way to afford owning a Lakefront property, Schrimpf said, is to look into a vacation rental. "More people have been buying vacation rentals over the years," he explained. "Ten years ago, this wasn't a big deal. A few years ago this became a hot topic." The advantage of rental property is that the owner can receive some income, yet still use the property for their personal use. "What's great about the Lake is it offers something for everyone," Schrimpf said. "If you like action, activities, and being around a lot of people we have it. If you want quiet and to get away from all of that, it's available also."

Born and raised in Macks Creek, realtor Linda Eldridge has been helping buyers and sellers for the past 20 years. Working with Coldwell Banker in Camdenton, Eldridge said she enjoys people and helping them find a property they will fall in love with.

Eldridge said more people are choosing to retire at the Lake than ever before, and others are choosing to buy rental properties. Although rental is slower in the winter, people still come to the Lake for holidays and such. Since 2021, home prices she said have doubled in price. Condos prices are one and one-half times the cost of what they were prior to 2021. The majority of her clients, she said, request the west side of the Lake. "Prices aren't as expensive on this side, and the further down the Lake you go the better the prices get," she explained. "The difference is a minimum of 20 percent difference in price in some areas."

Eldridge has some sound advice for someone who is considering a property to rent out. "If you're going to use it as rental property, verify before you purchase it that it can be rented. Some communities don't allow short term rental," she said. "Many owners choose to use a management company to handle the business. Look into this versus handling the rentals yourself." Condo's, she said, tend to attract more weekend visitors. A condo offers much less maintenance than a single family home and can be a deciding factor for many. On the flip side, condos typically come with monthly assessment fees, and insurance rates for these properties have increased significantly.

"The winter market is always slower, so it's easier to negotiate the purchase price of a property," Eldridge said. "In January, the market starts picking up. People selling second homes often sell them furnished because they don't want to move the furniture or they have no use for it."

Regatta Bay and Palisades are just a sampling of the condominium communities at the Lake.

The RV scene is booming at the Lake of the Ozarks, and more and more lakefront RV parks are popping up. An affordable way to enjoy the attributes of living on the water, many people are finding this a preferred and affordable option. Coconuts RV Resort, located at the seven mile-marker of the Gravois arm, offers a number of amenities for those who stay there. Anton Bergmann, Resort General Manager, said construction of the park was started in 2021 and completely opened in 2023. "It added a premium space for people who don't want to pay a premium price," he explained. "The biggest advantage is you are at Coconuts and there's plenty to do."

The space is located adjacent to the Coconuts Bar & Grill property. RV sites are available for annual or nightly rates. The resort offers a laundry facility, pickleball court, shower house, a convenience store, pools, the waterpark area, a dog park, a fitness center, and short or long-term boat and wave runner slip rental. Boat slips are 10x30 or 12x40 and are covered. This allows residents to keep their boats in the water for easy access when they want to get out on the water.

For annual members, there are exclusive happy hour events, monthly gatherings, and discounts on boat rental. RV sites available include premium Lakeview back-in sites, poolside back-in, standard back-in, and partial Lakeview back-in. The size limit on sites is 10x50 feet, and include water, sewer, trash, and 20, 30, or 50 amp electric. The area is gated and pets are allowed.

Bergmann explained that 80-percent of the residents are seasonal, and come from Kansas City, St. Louis, Iowa, and Omaha among other areas. Although some amenities are seasonal, residents can pay the annual rate and enjoy their RV year round.

"It's very friendly and family oriented," Bergmann said. "There are monthly block parties and people form their own little community here. It's a neighborhood and our goal is to build more off of that. Future plans, he said, include several family focused upgrades scheduled to be completed soon.

Another RV park new to the Lake area is 38 Special Luxury RV Resort. Opened in 2023, this resort covers an entire peninsula at the 38 mile-marker of the main channel. An adult focused gated community, all 40 of the RV sites offer a spectacular view of the Lake.

Each spot offers standard RV hookup, 100 mbps fiber internet, a smokeless fire pit, a pair of Adirondack chairs, and a four person table. Amenities include a pool, a large open-air pavilion with a kitchen, a bathhouse, laundry facilities, and a white sand beach with a swim dock. Two docks off the point of the resort offer boat slips for lease, and there's a boat ramp for convenient launching. Planned events bring the sense of community to the resort.

Deer Valley RV Park in Sunrise Beach offers over 300 campsites that are rented primarily on a yearly basis. Short term rentals are also available. Conveniently tucked behind Franky & Louie's Beachfront Bar & Grill at the 10 mile- marker of the main channel, the wooded area offers covered boat docks and is golf cart friendly. A new pickleball court has been added, and all the amenities of Franky & Louie's are just a short distance away.

Other RV Resorts around the Lake area include Westside RV Park in Sunrise Beach, Millstone Marina & RV Resort in Gravois Mills, and Mermaid Cove which is located on the Gravois Arm of the Lake.

FEATURING STARS UNDER THE STARS

f you have not experienced an event at the Ozarks Amphitheater, you have been missing out. Recently named the "Best Live Music Venue in Missouri", it's located in Camdenton and the heart of the beautiful Lake of the Ozarks. There have been some showstopping entertainers gracing the stage recently, including Willie Nelson, Dwight Yoakam, Dierks Bentley, and Cody Johnson. A concert under the stars at this beautiful Lake area venue is truly a great way to enhance the warm weather season.

"The Amphitheater was built in 1993," noted Mary Kay von Brendel, Director of Operations. "It unfortunately had two false starts. Our owners had previous experience working with Red Rocks Amphitheater in Colorado, and when the venue came up for auction in 2013, they decided this was an opportunity for them to own their own. It took two years of hard work to bring the venue back to life, and we reopened our doors in June of 2015. We have been working ever since to rebuild the venue's reputation within the industry."

In addition to music and comedic performances, the venue offers a variety of food and beverage vendors including BBQ, hot

dogs, pizza, nachos, snacks, soft drinks, alcoholic beverages, and more. Tailgating in the parking lot is not permitted. Cell phone cameras are allowed and bags must be small purses under a certain size or clear bags. Bags and purses are subject to search. A list of items not permitted inside is available on the website. Smoking is permitted in designated areas.

Stadium style seating is on a rising grade and at full capacity can accommodate 10,222 visitors. The venue offers VIP seating, Reserved +, Reserved, and General Admission seating options. Tickets are required for all persons, except for children under two years of age.

The venue enjoys bringing the most popular performers to the stage, and at the end of each season they survey their fan club to see who they want to see. They then combine all this data in a spreadsheet, and in October they attend the IEBA Conference in Nashville.

"This gives us the opportunity to meet with the artists' agents face to face to discuss what worked and what didn't, and what the venue has planned for the upcoming season," von Brendel said. "We also discuss the artists we are interested in

and their availability for the upcoming season. Our calendar in the off season is similar to a revolving door as most dates have numerous artist holds on them."

By doing this, they have built a great relationship and reputation with these agents, so now the opportunities go both ways. She explained, "We make offers on acts we would like to have, and they come to us with ideas of artists that would work well for us and who will be near our venue, and would like to be featured."

The venue will kickoff it's entertainment this May and are slated to have over 25 shows this year, with some national tours making a stop at the Lake. Say "T Do" With A View

HOSTING A LAKE AREA WEDDING

he arrival of Spring brings a favorite season for many couples: the wedding season. The Lake of the Ozarks has become one of the most sought after wedding destinations in the midwest. With so many options available, how does one go about planning the biggest day of their life?

Sacha Patires is the owner of Whimsical Weddings & Events and has been helping to plan weddings at the Lake for the past 20 years. Although she's seen many changes in detail preferences, her basic advice remains the same. "My first tip is to not procrastinate in booking a venue," Patires said. "Spring and Fall are the most popular times of the year for weddings at the Lake, overtaking the hot summer season." As a wedding planner, Patires knows that local vendors are not always the possible or preferred choice. Due to some limited resources at the Lake, Patires encourages her clients to look outside the area too. "Remember your guests and don't act like the day is only about you," she advised. Patires said it's important to treat all guests and bridal party persons with respect and gratitude. In planning the event, Patires strives to keep brides realistic in terms of what they can afford and the options available. The most important piece of advice, she said, is to stay humble and be present. "Just enjoy the entire journey," she said. "Plan your event in the following steps: Celebrate the moment you get engaged, make your to do list, set your budget, and then start your planning." A Lake wedding today, she said, can cost anywhere between \$8000 when simply done to the average cost of \$30,000.

The Lake has always been a popular destination for those from other areas as it provides a vacation spot for all invited. In fact, Patires said ninety-percent of her business are clients from somewhere other than the Lake area, or those who have a second home here. "People come to the Lake for the experience of everyone being able to have fun in one location," she said.

Since the COVID pandemic, Patires said weddings have become smaller. "It gave people time to re-evaluate who they really want at their wedding," she said. "It hit a lot of people hard financially, and this affected wedding planning also." As a result, a number of new trends are emerging on the wedding scene.

For one, people are turning to digital means more for save the date announcements, wedding invitations, and responses. Wedding parties are becoming smaller, with the bride and groom reigning in on who they want by their side on the big day. Vintage themes are making a comeback, with those wanting to get back to the better days. This includes more muted colors rather than the bold and bright, which provides a subtle and beautiful look. Although flowers are still tradition, more fruits and vegetables are being used for centerpieces and accents. Candlelight, Patires said, will always be a classic staple for any wedding and is one of the most overlooked aspects in design. As far as music is concerned, anything goes and is dependent on the budget. Morning after brunches, once the rage, are being replaced by events held prior to the wedding as guests typically need to travel home the day after. Above all, Patires said, it's important to stay true to who you are. "When brides get too trendy they stop looking like themselves," she said. "It's important to stay authentic to yourself, your style, and who you are."

As stated, venues at the Lake are limited and often need to be booked well in advance. One popular choice this season are those that are more rustic in appearance and design. The Lodge at Camp Pin Oak in the Lake of the Ozarks State Park at Kaiser offers a hall, use of the commercial kitchen, seating for 130 guests, and cabins that are used as accommodations. It does not include decor, furnishings, linens, and tableware. There is no staff or meal service which does put the expense and labor on the bride and groom. The setting can't be beat if you're looking for a rustic retreat. Camp Pin Oak's grand lodge is majestic with a stone fireplace that's the perfect backdrop for photo opportunities.

Another country style setting can be found at Sassafras Springs, located just outside of Eldon. Named Best of Eldon in a 2023 reader's poll, the venue features a 4000 square-foot barn that houses an impressive crystal chandelier. There is a quaint lake and arched bridge on the property, stone fire pits, and spacious fields for outdoor event needs. A Photo Booth, tables, and chairs are included. hether it's the adrenaline rush you're looking for, a good workout, or just a little fun there's a water sport for you. The progression of water sports has definitely changed over the years, from waterskiing to tubing to wakeboarding, wakesurfing, and even wakefoiling. Whatever your age, passion, or ability there's opportunity to ride the waves at the Lake of the Ozarks. And there's professional instruction to help you learn and even master it.

Kirby Liesmann, owner of Kirby's School of Wake in Osage Beach, offers the ultimate water sports experience in a fun, safe, and professional learning environment for riders of all levels. From May until September, his services at the Lake include instruction in skiing, wakesurfing, wakeboarding, and wakefoiling.

As the Lake becomes busier, navigating it can be a little more challenging. A newer boat may have instrumentation the driver isn't accustomed to. Or maybe a refresher course for a seasoned driver is just what is needed to become more comfortable behind the wheel. Liesmann offers boating operation instruction for first time to veteran boat operators. "I offer both boat driving and boat sport driving," he explained. "It's about wake responsibility, how to be a respectable driver, how to navigate the best location to participate in the water sport, and how to basically use their water sport vessel."

Off the water enhancements to learning water sports include cable park lessons, trampoline lessons, and video trick analysis for those looking to master the basic to advanced tricks. Throughout the summer, Liesmann also offers a variety of camps and special programs.

Kirby's School of Wake provides many opportunities for everyone to participate and get the most out of their time on the water. They cater to both individuals and groups, and first-timers to experts. They consider themselves a one-stop-shop for all your water sport needs. This includes professional service and coaching, a family-friendly environment, safe licensed boat drivers, and top of the line boats and equipment.

A professional wakeboarder, Liesmann started Kirby's School of Wake in 2008. He was first introduced to the sport at the age of 14, rode Jr. Pro in 2006, and has been riding in the Pro division since 2010. His passion for teaching, he explained, is rooted in his past experience at the "school of hard knocks." His own personal hard falls and failed attempts has been the driving force for helping riders at all levels progress in a fundamentally correct and safe manner. He's spent thousands of hours training and shadowing the best professional coaches in the industry, and is able to create a specialized program for students of all levels. "My theory is that if I can get a student to feel the proper form, either through a simulation on the back of the boat or through an on-water drill, they are going to grasp the concept much quicker in the application of what they are learning," he said. His students have ranged in age from a three year-old wakeboarder to a 78 year-old on a wakesurf board.

Although waterskiing was once the rage, Liesmann explained many are trading in their skis and turning to wakesurfing instead. Wakeboarding, he explained, has also taken off and offers endless possibilities for those of all ages. "Wakeboarding is an extreme sport and many people seek the adrenaline rush," he explained. "There's endless possibilities with it involving speed, jumps, and extreme tricks. We teach ways to do it by starting with lower speed and less impact and go from there. We instruct on the softest way to ride a wakeboard and ways to help avoid the hard falls." For younger students and beginners, wakeboarding is a preferred option because the feet are attached to the board, making it easier to get up and out of the water at a slower speed. It can be done behind any single engine boat that is less than 30 feet in length.

Wakesurfing, Liesmann noted, is the fastest growing trend in water sports. With people of all ages drawn to the sport, wake surfing requires a specific vessel designed for this purpose. The correct instruction, boat setting, and equipment, Liesmann said, determines the outcome of the success in learning and mastering it. "Wakesurfing is done at a slower speed with less impact, but is challenging and provides a great workout," he added. "It's more social as the rider is situated much closer to the boat."

Wakefoiling, which you may have seen around the Lake, places the rider higher above the water. It's basically a wakesurf board with a long mast shaft attached to an airplane wing type device. Performed slow and with no impact, Liesmann said it provides the rider with the sensation of snowboarding through deep powder snow. "It's a very freeing sensation and is quiet, with no drag or vibration," he said.

For those warriors looking to master the sports on their own, Liesmann has some advice. First and foremost, go with someone who knows what they're doing. What you naturally think you should do, he explained, is often the complete opposite of what should be done. In addition, make sure the rider is wearing a coast guard approved vest that fits properly. For wakeboarding, make sure you are using a wakeboard specific rope and handle, Making sure the board is the correct size is determined by the fit of the boots.

In all sports, the driver is critical to the success of the outcome. Slow and steady is the way to go, Liesmann said. Contrary to what many believe, drivers don't need to hit the throttle hard and pop the rider up and out of the water. A slower approach, he said, provides the rider with more control, better balance, and ultimately less injury when first learning. For the rider, the three critical points to remember is to keep the arms straight, knees bent, and let the boat pull you up. "People think they need to do all the work," Liesmann said. "When trying to get up on anything, let the boat do the work. Go in with the mindset that it may be difficult and will take some time. Above all, remain calm."

In the State of Missouri, a spotter on board is not necessary as long as the vessel is equipped with a 14-inch rear view mirror. For safety purposes, Liesmann said it is advised to have another person on board during the busier times on the

For the newest and youngest of beginners, Liesmann uses a Zup Board for instruction. Ideal for those of all ages, this sled like board is perfect for anyone who wants to build their confidence and get the feel of being pulled behind a boat. Liesmann's own daughter mastered the Zup Board before she was two years old. Liesmann also uses a BB Talk and Intercom system for his instruction that allows him to communicate directly with the rider while driving the boat. "We are in sync at all times and this leads to a high degree of success and fulfill-

"I would not be able to do the things that I do in wakeboarding and my business without the support of the powerful partnerships I have, and the support of my family and community," Liesmann said. "I am so very thankful for their support."

A FEW APPETIZER RECIPES **TO ENJOY WITH YOUR** COCKTAIL


STUFFED MEDJOOL DATES:

In a mixing bowl add 1/2 cup crumbled Feta Cheese, 1 tbsp Olive Oil, 1 tbsp Pineapple Juice, 2 tbsp Crushed Pineapple (drained), 1 tbsp Fresh Parsley (finely chopped), dash of salt and black pepper. Mix well and spoon into pitted Medjool Dates. Top with additional chopped parsley. Should make about 10 appetizers.

APRICOT SWEET AND HEAT BITES:

Place a tsp or so of whipped cream cheese on top of a whole dried apricot. Place a toasted pecan or english walnut in the cream cheese and drizzle with hot honey.





DARK CHOCOLATE CHERRY-TINI:

First chill your glass in the freezer for just a bit. Remove and dip in chocolate syrup and then shaved chocolate. In a shaker with ice add 40ml Cherry Liqueur, 40 ml Dark Chocolate Liqueur, 30 ml Malibu Rum and 50 ml Coconut Milk. Shake until well chilled and strain into your glass. Garnish with cherries and a Lindor truffle.

IRISH MUDSLIDE:

In a blender add 1.5 ozs each Irish Whiskey, Kahlua, and Baileys Irish Cream. Add 3 ozs Half & Half, 1 cup or so of crushed ice, and 3-4 drops of green food coloring. Blend until smooth and pour into your glasses. Garnish with some whipped cream, chocolate syrup, and a few green sprinkles.


