



CAMDENTON BOYS TENNIS Lakers Look To Keep Growing

The Camdenton boys tennis team will make its debut in the CMAC Conference looking to capitalize in 2025 after improving to an 8-9 record last season with sophomore Alex Hendon returning as the singles No. 1.

The Lakers bounced back in 2024 after a 2-11 record in 2023 and this season head coach Kirk Richey will look to deploy a new lineup for singles and doubles matches after losing four seniors.

"Last season we graduated four of our top seven varsity players and lost one additional varsity player to transfer of schools from that team," Richey said, who enters his 25th year of coaching at Camdenton High School and his 20th year of coaching tennis.

Richey shared what has impressed him through the first few practices and what he expects from this Laker squad in 2025.

"All 14 players on the roster, at all levels of play, are eager to learn and improve their individual game during every practice," he said. "Team expectations are to improve every day at practice and learn from every match played and be playing our best tennis of the season during individual/team districts."

Camdenton will be led by its three varsity returners, Hendon, sophomore Fischer Richey (singles No. 5/6 in 2024) and senior Jonny Semau (singles No. 7/8 in 2024). Newcomers to the Laker tennis roster are junior Jackson Berg and sophomore Carson Stoufer.

According to Fischer (Richey) and Hendon they will be doubles partners and shared what they have been working on to prepare for the season in a new district and conference after leaving the Ozark Conference and district.

"To prepare for this season I have worked on my serve and just being more consistent and getting the ball in more," Hendon said.

"I have just been working on how to keep my pace in singles and how to compete other great players," Fischer said.

Fischer Richey noted how the first few practices have gone while adjusting to





"We're definitely young this year with just two seniors (Semau, Wesley Werner), so it will definitely be a growing year," Richey said. "It's important for us to get to know each other out here playing tennis and learn how to win with each other or lose, but come together as a team all together. It's definitely fun getting to go through it (entering a new season) with Alex (Hendon) and a few of these guys that I have been really good friends with and had a lot of fun with, so I can't wait to continue that."

Camdenton will welcome two newcomers to its varsity roster this season with sophomore Landon Klee (infielder) and freshman Mason Sykora (outfielder). Klee transfers from School of the Osage where the lefty primarily played third base. Sykora looks to compete for a position in the outfield.

"We're young and our core is in our sophomore class. I have been saying that to everybody and that's who we are building around," said Lakers coach Bryce Durnin, who enters his 10th season at Camdenton. "Being a young team, we'll make some young mistakes and we need to find guys on the mound that are going to get outs."

The Lakers pitching rotation will be anchored by the sophomore duo of Potts and Turner. According to Durnin, Potts is expected to start on opening day when Camdenton hosts Eldon on Friday, March 21, with first pitch set for 4:30 p.m.

"Blake Potts was our Saturday starter last year and if you were to ask me who my ace is going to be, I mean it's supposed to be Blake," Durnin said.

Layman returns as the Lakers leadoff hitter and, according to coach Durnin, the lefty will spend time as the starting centerfielder and will also have an increased pitching role.

"He will be asked to pitch a whole lot more and he will be our table-setter," Durnin said. "We will put him at the top of the lineup and ask him to get on base and score runs and play centerfield when he's not pitching."

Layman noted he's feeling more confident going into his senior season.

"We're looking really good, and I think we are going to have a way better season than last year, and I'm just really grateful to be on this team," Layman said. "I feel a lot more confident with my pitches this year and I picked up some more movement and speed on a lot of my pitches. The main goal is being a team player and getting whatever needed done."

After missing opening day last season due to rehabbing from an anterior cruciate ligament injury, Karson Durnin shared how the team in shaping up.

"It's still early, but we are taking shape and I just feel like every day our hitting is getting cleaner and improves," Durnin said. "Really, it's a challenge to just be the best that we can be by our jamboree and then it's on to Eldon."

Coach Durnin added how it feels to have Karson healthy after a late start last season due to injury.

"We have Karson back and it has been long awaited for me," Durnin said. "He will play anywhere on the infield and will also be asked to do a whole lot more than he has ever been asked to do on the mound for us this year. He will also be hitting at the top of the lineup."

Lakers Return Talented Roster

The Camdenton track and field program is hungry to return to the MSHSAA State Championships at Jefferson City High School in May.

The Lakers return 10 state qualifiers from last season led by junior Ty Wiethop, who is the defending Class 4 State Champion in the boys long jump, marking the fourth state championship in seven seasons for the Camdenton track and field program.

Other returning postseason qualifiers for the boys are seniors Gunnar Rhodes (800m) and Owen Borbe (pole vault); juniors Lukas Routh (4x100m relay) and Hunter Johnson (110m hurdles); and sophomores Mikie Pitnick (400m) and Eli Dickerson (javelin).



"Highlights last season include our Lady Lakers won our Laker Relays for the third year in a row," said Lakers head coach Nick Bruck, who enters his 20th season at Camdenton and 21st season of coaching. "The Laker boys finished third in our Southwest Missouri district in Class 4."

Wiethop shared his eagerness for the season where he will participate in the long jump, 4x100m relay and javelin. This season he wants to share the state medal stand with his teammates.



Josh Baldwin Enters First Year As Lady Lakers HC



The Camdenton girls soccer team will have a young core of underclassmen ready to make their mark under the guidance of first-year head coach Josh Baldwin.

The Lady Lakers lose five players from last season where they finished with a 9-14 record and lost 4-3 to the Zizzers from West Plains in the opening round of districts.

Camdenton returns four starters from last season led by seniors Kyla Kirby (midfielder), Kiley Bentley (defender), Ariana Delgado (midfielder/goalkeeper) and junior Jakarta Haynes (defender). The Lady Lakers will welcome five varsity newcomers who are all sophomores, midfielder Sophia Radlund, forward Lily Roberts, midfielder Brookelyn Meents, goalkeeper Bella Faes and midfielder Kylie Labelle.

According to Baldwin, he may designate a team captain on the fly as the season progresses.

"There is a very strong expectation that everyone on the team leads well," he said. "We may even designate captains on a weekly or game-by-game basis, but our three upperclassmen that really help lead the way on this are, Kyla Kirby, Ariana Delgado and Kiley Bentley."

Baldwin added what has impressed him so far through the first few practices.

"The culture shift within the team has already impressed me quite a bit," he said. "The team seems very bought in and invested in what we are trying to build and accomplish, attitudes are great and excitement is high. We are bought into each other as a team."

He added that the Lady Lakers have also shown great strides from their offseason work.

"They already look like they have a much higher comfort level on the ball in regards to our ability to pass and possess," Baldwin said.

Through the first few weeks of practice Baldwin said that Faes has emerged at goalkeeper.

"Bella will be primarily stepping into the goalkeeping position for us," he said. "She played a bit of field as well at the varsity level last season too, and may find times where she is back out there as well. Bella has the ability to play, quite literally, anywhere we need her to on the field."

Delgado noted how she's adapting to Baldwin's coaching style.

"It has definitely been a big transition from our old coaching staff to the one we have now," Delgado said. "We're learning new positions and how to play them better than some of us used to know how to play. But, he's a great coach who has taught us more things than I could even tell you now. We're definitely making progress and it might not show right now, but it will show once we start getting that momentum that we are trying to build up."

Baldwin noted how the selflessness by Delgado can help lead this young Camdenton core.

"Ariana leads by example and really helps reinforce the type of culture we want to have on our team," he said. "Maybe the best way she demonstrates this is her willingness to play any position we ask of her, which resulted in her playing keeper for us last season. While she may see some time in net this season as well, we plan on playing her back in the field more. Regardless of where we put her, Ariana selflessness can't be overstated with her willingness to do whatever is best for the team."

Baldwin added what he expects from this young Camdenton squad in 2025.

"We don't really talk in terms of wins and losses on our team, our expectations for this season revolve around becoming the tightest knit team we can as a soccer family, and from there being willing to selflessly play for one another when it is game time," he said. "We expect to be competitive in every game we play, and will be incredibly tough and resilient both physically and mentally."

Senior Jake Griffith (pitcher/utility) earned All-District honorable mention last season with a .528 batting average. Griffith also led the team with 19 total hits and four doubles. On the mound, Griffith led with an 8.506 earned run average with a record of (0-8).

Newcomers to the Cougars squad are junior Karter McCuller (pitcher/infielder); sophomores Sam Skinner (utility) and Gary Smiley (utility); and freshmen Caden Barber (utility), Wyatt Boles (pitcher), Connor Dickman (utility/pinch runner) and Hunter Tiffany (pitcher).



"Our first team goal is to be competitive," said Cougars coach Andrew Doyle in a questionnaire. "We want to play seven innings each night. There is a lot of talent and potential on this team if they will buy in."

Doyle added that the Cougars will use last season as fuel, because the only way is up when it comes to Climax Springs baseball.

"This team had a difficult 2024 season. We do not need to dwell on it, but instead feed off of it," Doyle said. "Use it as fuel for this year and realize there's only one direction to go from here and it's up. We need to get better offensively and be more consistent on the mound. We have some decent arms, but they have not been able to go deep into games. It is imperative to pound the zone and pitch to contact to be able to go six or seven innings. We also have to be able to score runs. Having productive and quality at-bats will be our mindset." Griffith and Tiffany shared what they expect from this season.

"I am excited to see what the upcoming season will bring," Griffith said. "We return six starters and have a few newcomers that bring excitement for this season. I want to have a strong senior year and do all I can to bring some winning tradition to Climax Springs."





"With the team we have now, we have lots of opportunities," Tiffany said. "This upcoming season should be a good season. We just have to put in the work and make the season what we want. We have kids out here that haven't played much, but with having the older guys, we can help them along the way and help them help us through the season. Overall, I think it's going to be a good season. All the work we put in reflects on the outcome. So, honestly, if we work as a team, and grow as one, we have the season that could change the face of baseball for Climax Springs. We just have to make it."

The School of the Osage boys golf team will have a new home course in 2025 as the Indians return just four varsity golfers to its 12-man roster.

"We're younger with about six freshmen out this year and a lot of kids who have a lot of experience and enthusiasm, so I'm excited," said Indians coach Travis Squire, who enters his fifth season at Osage after 11 years of coaching at Cuba High School.

Due to construction at the Osage National Golf Resort, the Indians will claim Bear Creek Valley Golf Club and The Oaks Golf Course at Margaritaville as their home courses this season.

Sophomores Jarin Grant, Kingston Bommarito, Jackson Long and Lane Stokes all make their return. According to Squire, he expects Grant and Bommarito to lead the way on the greens with a talented freshmen class.

"Freshman Seth Duncan, his folks own this golf course here (Bear Creek Valley Golf Club) so he's had a lot of experience and his game I think is top for us going into the season," Squire said. "Freshman Xavier Fowler has looked pretty solid, and freshman Andre Torres looks like he came out and played a lot of golf last year, and you can tell all these kids have been playing in the offseason."

Squire noted his expectations for this young Osage golf squad in 2025.

"We have an amazingly tough conference (Tri-County Conference) with our neighbors to the north, Eldon, and just them in general is quite a squad to compete with," he said. "So, I tell the kids right now, look you're young and we're trying to build good habits and interest in the game and with that their scores are going to rise. Performance wise, we are setting our expectations low, but also understanding that with a young crop like this all you can do is grow and get better."

Grant was slated in at the No. 3, 4 and 5 spot last year and noted what he has been working on to prepare for the season and his expectations for the team.

I think the kids are going to get more playing opportunity out here and that will benefit us. They (Bear Creek) has been very nice to us out here and we appreciate it because we enjoy playing here." Osage will tee off the season on March 24 at 4 p.m. when they host Waynesville for a home dual at The Oaks.




